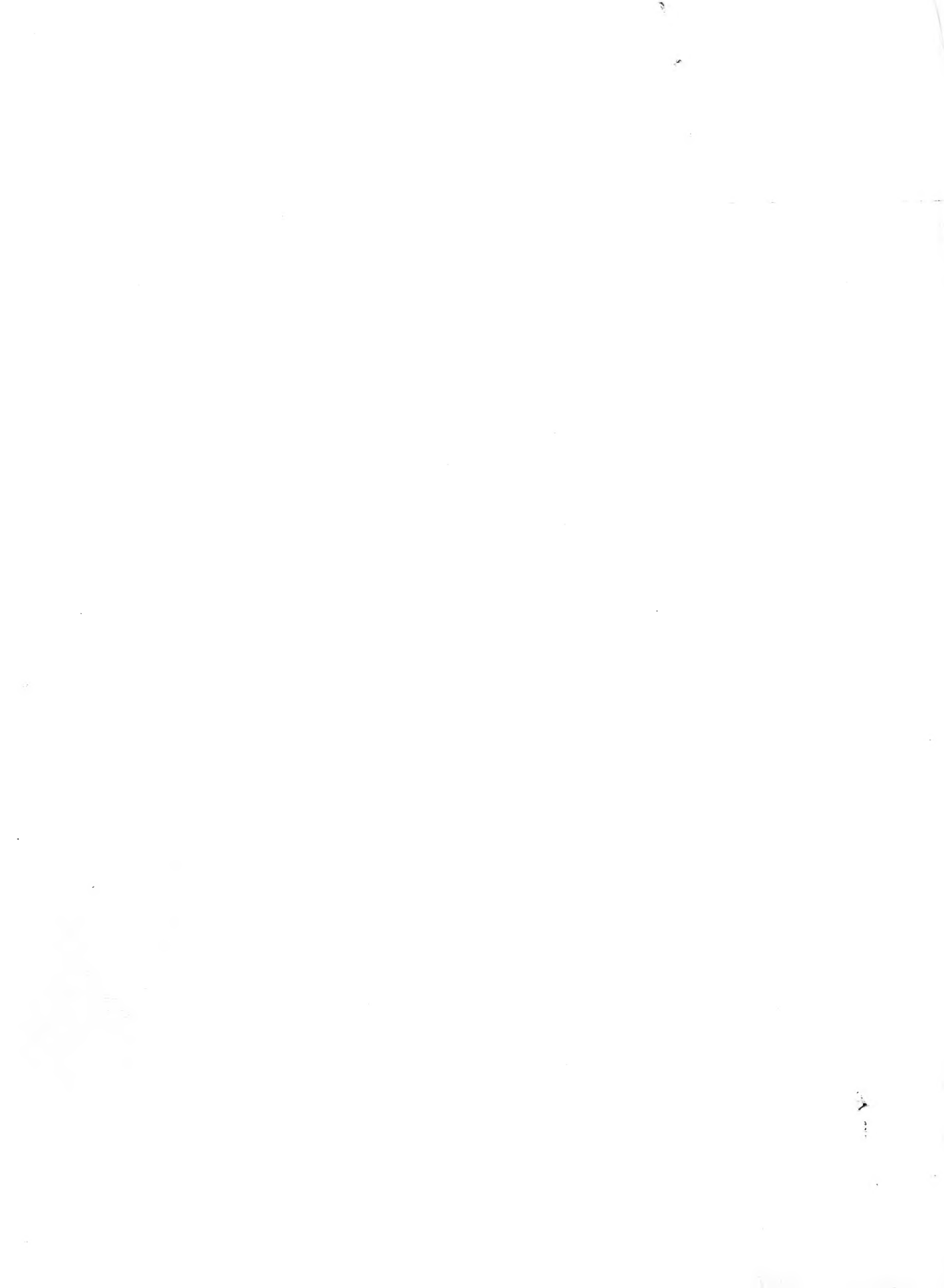

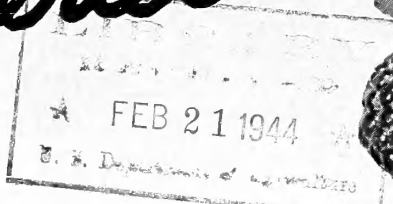

Our Plant Research Department has been working overtime the last few years to get improved new fruits, roses and ornamentals for your planting. We are proud to present for 1944, five splendid new Peaches, two great new Plums, five new All-America Roses, and many new and handsome flowering trees and plants to add to the beauty of your garden. Some are described in this pamphlet.

There is but a limited supply of these items, and if you'll get your order in early for the kinds described herein, you'll be sure to get yours and get them shipped to you early before the planting rush begins.

Mail Orders. For many years our Shipping Department has forwarded plant material all over the world to our friends who have dealt with us entirely by mail. Twenty-seven experienced Armstrong employees are now in the Army, Navy or Coast Guard, but those of us who are remaining on the job until they return, are doubling up on our duties and are still giving your orders the same careful attention that they have always had.

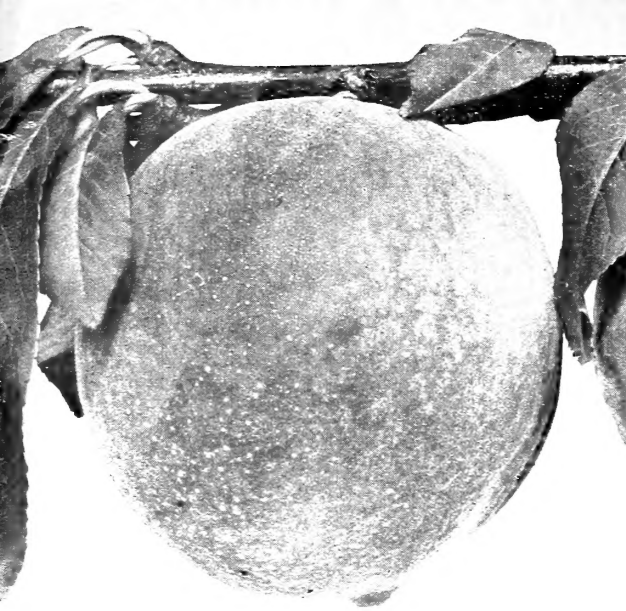
North Hollywood Branch, Magnolia Boulevard at Coldwater Canyon Ave.

The medium sized fruit is of excellent quality, juicy and full of flavor, and, best of all, you'll always get a crop, which is something you cannot say about other apricots. \$1.50 each, \$14.00 per 10.

This collection has been selected by us to make a camellia collector out of you. We do not believe that after you once observe how easy Armstrong camellias are to grow, pick a few matchless corsages from your own bushes and enjoy the friendly envious compliments of your neighbors and friends that you will be able to resist. We have selected outstanding varieties which will make a cornerstone for any camellia planting and give you a wide variety of shapes and colors.

Chandleri Elegans. A dwarf, compact grower loaded down every year with tremendous blooms (often 7 inches). Peony shaped—rose-pink and white.

Pink Perfection. This beautiful soft shell-pink is doubtless the best known and liked of all camellias because of its perfect, symmetrical flower form.

Colonel Firey. Its glowing rich crimson flowers, full, broad and perfectly formed, are right at the top in red camellias.

Purity. Symmetrical, exquisitely formed, double, snowy white flowers of large size.

New Armstrong Fruits

Out of the hundreds of new hybrids and other varieties under test in the Armstrong Research Department, several fine new peaches, plums and apricots are now ready for your planting. All have shown themselves to be specifically adapted to our Southern California climate. They will bear large crops each year and will never skip from one to two crops out of every three, such as many other fruit varieties do in this climate because of our mild winters.

Redwing Peach. (Pat. applied for.) FD61A. A new Armstrong hybrid freestone peach which is a definite improvement on the famous Babcock. Larger than Babcock, beautifully splashed and streaked with red. Its juicy, sweet, white flesh is deliciousness itself. It ripens in early July and bears exceedingly heavy crops every year. The first of a new series of Armstrong Peaches which we believe will displace older kinds in Southern California because of their high quality and large, regular crops. \$1.75 each, \$16.50 per 10.

Sunglow. FD63A. We know of no better yellow freestone peach ripening in early August than this new hybrid, originated by Dr. Lesley of the University of California. Golden yellow with red markings. It is extraordinarily rich in flavor, with juicy, firm, yellow flesh. Large in size, always bearing a good crop. \$1.75 each.

Hermosa Peach. FD56A. A beautiful, big, pink-cheeked, white-fleshed peach ripening in early August, and the best eating peach we have at that season. Enormous in size, it bears extraordinarily heavy crops every year. It is one of the most beautiful looking peaches you have ever seen and tastes as good as it looks. Originated by Dr. Lesley of the University of California. \$1.75 each, \$16.50 per 10.

Hollywood Plum. FD85A. A delightful ornamental fruiting plum which not only bears big crops of good sized, blood-red, juicy, sweet plums early in the season (long before Satsuma), but has beautiful purple-red leaves and is a cloud of lovely light pink flowers in the spring. The fruit reminds us of an enormous sweet black cherry when fully ripe. \$1.75 each.

Inca Plum. FD85B. This new yellow plum, beautifully blushed with red, is one of the finest yellow eating plums that can be grown. Its sweet, firm, yellow flesh is very juicy and richly flavored. The trees bear a big crop every year in late July. \$1.75 each.

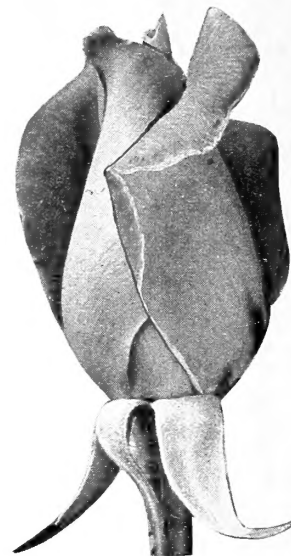

If you said, "Pick out for me a well-balanced 10-plant rose garden, every plant a strong grower, including only tested varieties which will be surest to succeed in my garden," we would pick out for you the kinds included in our Big 10. Each rose is outstanding in its color, and there is not a weak sister among them. The bushes are typical Armstrong rose plants, husky and heavy-rooted. Within a few weeks after planting they will fill your garden with lovely blooms and rich rose fragrance.

1. **Charlotte Armstrong.** The No. 1 rose of them all, with long, slender, carmine buds and magnificent open flowers of brilliant cerise-pink.
2. **Christopher Stone.** Glowing, brilliant, crimson-scarlet, with deeper dusky shadings.
3. **Condesa de Sastago.** Petals shining yellow on one side and bright orange-scarlet on the other.
4. **Etoile de Hollande.** Brilliant non-fading red, one of the most fragrant of all roses.
5. **Girona.** Lovely tones of pink, carmine and yellow. Fully double, exceedingly fragrant.
6. **Golden Rapture.** Perfect buds of glorious, shining, brilliant yellow.
7. **Mme. Henri Guillot.** Gorgeous velvety raspberry-pink, with luxuriant glossy foliage.
8. **Mrs. Erskine P. Thom.** Beautiful buds and well-shaped open flowers of bright canary-yellow without other tints.
9. **Picture.** Lovely buds and exquisitely shaped flowers of warm pink. Our favorite pink rose.
10. **Southport.** Long, slender buds of vivid never-fading scarlet. Fine for cutting.

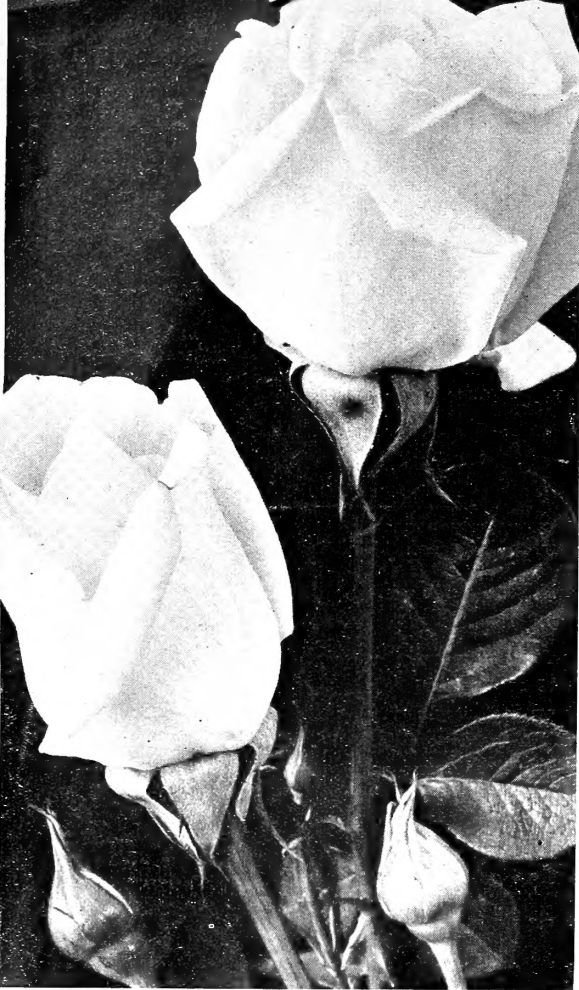

All-America Roses



Each year most of the finest new rose varieties not yet on the market are entered for official test and competition in sixteen official All-America trial and demonstration gardens scattered from New England to California and from Iowa to the Gulf of Mexico. Fourteen of the ablest rose critics in America score these varieties on a uniform point basis, and at the end of a two-year period the scores are averaged and the top-scoring roses are then named as All-America Roses. They are the best of each year.

From the All-America Winners of the past four years, we have selected five great varieties, including the top winner for 1944.

Mme. Chiang Kai-Shek. R60A. (1944 All-America.) Giant, perfectly formed buds of delightful primrose-yellow, opening to a great full flower of creamy yellow. Spicy lemon scent. Plant Pat. applied for. \$2.00 each.
