




HISTORY

Lives of great men all remind us We can make our lives sublime, And departing, leave behind us Footprints on the sands of Time.

Flash! Flash! According to a recent bulletin, there will be an important meeting of the Scnior Class of Johnson C. Smith University tonight at 8:00 P.M. in Buldle Memorial Hall. We repeat —The announcer's pleasing, penetrating voice proceeded to repeat the announcement, but Anne Howard did not hear the announcement the second time. Her mind went fleeting back over the sand of time to that day on September 14, 1942, when she first entered the portals of Dear obe Smith University.

She remembered well how, overwhelmed with pride and ecstasy, ske joined the gay noisy crowd in front of the Administration Building that morning. She remembered that the first person she met that day was a very charming, through demure, petite, and fragile grid from Hartford, Conn., how they had toured the campus, which had seemed the most beautiful sight they had ever seen, together; but they had attended the theater party together; and how they had returned and registered together the transcript of the buildings seemed the most impressive; the professors, the most wonderful; and of the other new students, the pretitest and most handsome they had ever seen. This was a gloring day?

It was not long, however, before they became accustomed to the worders of their new environment. It was not long before freshmen became participants, no longer observers, in the life about them. The first milestone was the election of officers for the class which was as follows: nesident, Claude X. Shropsbre; vice-president, William Ezell; secretary, Allenstine D. Sparks; treasurer, William Johnson, The freshman representatives in dramatics were Allenstine D. Sparks and Cornell Powell; and in athletes, James Fisher, Cal Pass, Thomas Poque, and Roger Foster. Thablens Moore received the citation for the highest average at the end of the freshman year.

All of this seemed as though it happened only yesterday. So vividly do the incidents of these years appear now. The class moved steadily upward. The guidance of the officers elected to serve during the suphomore term: president, thenry Holder; vice-president, Lunell Hart; secretary, Catherine Richardson.

The class of '46 felt the powerful influence of the destructive World War II, as several members including the brilliant Thaddens Moore and Claude Shropsbire departed to the services of the U.S.A. Many others took advantage of the accelerated clucation program, As the class president, Henry II. Holder, was one of the many to profit by this acceleration program, therefore the class fundshed the year under the leadersh-p of Lunelle Hart. Students entered from various schools and supplemented these losses.

Also during the second year of the class of '46's pilgrimage, sorarities were introduced the Gamma Lambda Chapter of the Delta Signar Theta on February 19, 1944, and the Gamma Delta Chapter of the Alpha Sorarity, March 18, 1944. The class began to disintegrate as a unit because of pledging to the various Greek organizations. With the introduction of sorarities the factor which acted as competition flint the class as a whole almost lost us identity.

As though the birth of sororities did not cause sufficient distraction, a general strike beset the campus, its settlement gave birth to a Student Council, the first in the history of the school. The members were as follows: Glady's Coles, Winona Lee, Allenstine D. Sparks, William Davis, Jack Methuh, Joseph Maxwell, Darius L. Swann, Henry Holder, Raymond Mitchell and James W. Smith, Allenstine D. Sparks served as president of the Student Council for the School year 1943-40.

Then came the Junor year, The class moved steadily under the leadership of Paul Cade, president, Ola Bryant, secretary, and all the others elected to serve during that time. Five immors, Aurella Jones, Martha Trompson, Allenstine Sparks, Robert Beckham, and Cornell Powell, in perhaps the only factor indicating a union class evistence, availed themselves of the opportunity opened only to juniors the Almini sponsored Junior Frace Oratorical contest. Allenstine Sparks coppied the gold medial award.

And now the senior year has approached, Four years that have enriched and beautified many lives with varied and illumining experiences are practically over. A class that has had its due share of ups and downs reaches maturity to claim all of its share of recognition in extra curricular activities and school life. With patience and perseverance the survivors of previous years mount the precipice for seniors only. A class as a unit is the last impression of the class of 'dos."

Anne's reminiscing went on and on. She reflected, however, that she had only depicted a partial picture, a glimpse of beautiful life which had been spint here at dear ole Johnson C. Smith University during the past four vears. On her way to the meeting the last meeting of the senior class—Anne was baunted by these lines from Longfellow's "Psalm of Life," "We can make our lives sublime, and, departing, leave behind us footprints on the vanids of time."
