Bruce A Thompson is the Director of Choral Activities at Johnson C. Smith University; and Director of Music Ministries at Mt. Carmel Baptist Church in Charlotte KO. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music Education from Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, Alabama; and a Master of Music degree in Vocal Music from Western Illinois University, in Macomb, Illinois He has done additional studies in voice with Dr. Donald Gray, at the University of South Carolina, in Columbia, SC, and has studied privately with Fran Shafter of Charlotte, NC.

Thompson has held several positions including, Director of University singers, and Coordinator of Vocal Pedagogy, Alabama State University (Montgomery, Alabama); Director of the Department of Music and College Choir Director, Paul Quinn College (Waco Texas), Minister of Music, New Hope Baptist Church, Waco Texas; and Director of the Heritage Ensemble, Western Illinois University. Bruce Thompson has written several Negro Spirituals, gospels, and anthems. He is a member of the National Association of Negro Musicians, Afro-Tau Art Culture Association, North Carolina Choral Directors Association, Music Educators National Conference, Southeastern Music Theory Council, The National Association of Teachers of Voice, and has been listed several times in Outstanding Young Men of America Thompson is a bass-baritone soloist and has performed on several college campuses throughout the South. Thompson is a former "Celebration" Residence Artist for Opera Carolina, in Charlotte, North Carolina. He has served on the Choral Review Panel for The North Carolina Arts and Science Council, the Board of Directors for the Oratorio Singers of Charlotte, and is presently chapter advisor for the JCSU chapter of Music Educators National Conference (MENC).





The Johnson C. Smith University Concert Choir

The Johnson C. Smith Concert Choir has been an essential part of the University, and is one of the leading vocal arts groups in Charlotte, NC. A high point of the choir's performance history was reached during the 60's when the group was chosen as the Official Radio Broadcast Choir for the Presbyterian Church, USA. In the 70's the group was included in a series of programs sponsored by the United Negro College Fund.

Under the direction of Bruce A. Thompson, the rich musical heritage of the choir continues to flourish. In 1991, the choir was presented in concert at The National Black Music Caucus (NBMC) in Charlotte, NC. The group was also chosen to present a concert for the NBMC in 1993, In Nashville, Tennessee. Other organizations to present the choir in concert at national conventions include the National Mine and Health Academy, The National Library Association, and the Presbyterian Church, USA. In 1994, the choir was featured on Good Morning America in a special broadcast recorded live from the campus. In 1996, the choir performed in "Porgy and Bess" with Opera Carolina and the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra. The Choir has also been featured with Bobby Mc Ferrin, Ramsey Lewis, Phil Perry, and Sandi Patti. In 1993 the cheir performed at the 49th Annual United Negro College Fund Gala in New York. On February 18, 1998, the Johnson C. Smith University Concert Choir and the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra presented a tribute concert honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The Concert choir performs in many cities in the United States and appears in concert with the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra and Oratorio Singers' Chamber Ct.orus each year for the Magic of Christmas Celebration. This annual event is held in the North Carolina Blumenthal Performing Arts Center, Charlotte, North Carolina
















ZETA PHI BETA SORORITY, INC.



Zeta Phi Beta Sorority was founded on January 16, 1920, by five women on the campus of Howard University. It was the idea of these founders that the sorority would reach college women in all parts of the country who were sorority-minded and desired to follow the ideas and objectives of finer womanhood; scholarship, service, and sisterly love on which Zeta Phi Beta Sorority was founded. Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc.



Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. was founded at Howard University in Washington, DC, January 9, 1914, by three young Black male students. The founders, Honorable A. Langston F. Morse and Honorable Charles I. Brown, wanted to organize a Greek-letter fraternity that would truly exemplify the high ideas of brotherhood, scholarship, and service. The founders deeply wished to create an organization that viewed itself as "a part of" the general community. They believed that each potential member should be judged on his own merits rather than his family background or affluence, without regard of race, nationality, color, skin tone, or texture of hair. They wished and wanted their fraternity to exist as a part of an even greater brotherhood-sisterhood which would be devoted to the "inclusive we' rather than the "exclusive we." From its inception, the founders also conceived Phi Beta Sigma as a mechanism to deliver services to the general community. Rather than gaining skills to be utilized exclusively for themselves and their immediate families, the founders of Phi Beta Sigma held the deep conviction that they should return their newly acquired skills to the communities from which they had come. This deep convection was mirrored in the fraternity motto, "Culture For Service and Service For Humanity."










Thus, Professor Ledbetter has promoted academic excellence in the classroom, and she has been extensively involved in a wide array of campus activities such as SACS Self-Study Steering Committee; chairperson, Purpose Committee; chairperson of the Faculty Handbook, Promotion and Tenure, Faculty Grievance Committees; coordinator of Freshman English, Co-Director of the Bush Hewlitt Faculty Dvelopment Program, and member of the JCSU Board of Trustees. Her interaction with students beyond the classroom has included mentoring, membership on the

University Judiciary Board and advising the following organizations: **Treewell** Staff, Sigma Tau Delta, English Club, Student Christian Association, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, the Yearbook Staff and Alpha Kappa Mu Honor Society.

Some of Professor Ledbetter's professional involvements have been: judge for various oratorical contests and essay contests and Reader with Educational Testing Service, grading the National Teachers Examination and the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT). A few of her awards are JCSU Board of Visitors Mentor Award, Nations Bank Par Excellence Teaching Award, Student Government Association Teacher of the Year Award and listing in Who's Who Among America's Teachers.

Although there have been some struggles and disappointments, Professor Ledbetter's association with the University has been a saga of joy, pride and achievement. Moreover, the dedication and commitment of its Faculty/Staff, Administrators, students, Board of Trustees, alumni, and friends have propelled Johnson C. Smith to the prominence it now enjoys. Professor Ledbetter believes that if JCSU continues to embrace its legacy, to promote moral values, and to perpetuate its strong educational programs, it will "soar" in the new millennium.
