





Smith University sought to equip exslaves spiritually, morally and intellectually. Today more than 130 years later, it continues to prepare men and women in similar manner. Smith has continued as an academically strong and vibrant co-educational institution of higher learning that is fast becoming one of the nation's premiere and most progressive small colleges. The institution was founded April 7, 1867 as an Academy for the training of ministers, teachers, and catechist. The

Between the states in 1862. She made an additional contribution of \$400, with the provision that the school be chartered under the name honoring her decesed husband. Curricula of a classic nature were added in 1876 and the name changed to Biddle University. The institution operated under the leadership of northern whites primarily until 1891. In 1886 the first black professor was named with the appointment of George E. Davis as professor of Natural Science. In the 1891 the Reverend Daniel J. Sanders became the first black elected to the office of President of the University.

In 1921, Mrs. Johnson C. Smith of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania began making large donations to the institution, which resulted in the addition of nine buildings to the physical plant and a substantial endowment. In recognition of her interest and support, the charter was amended in 1923, changing the name to Johnson C. Smith University. In 1927 the institution's progress was ensured by a generous endowment gift from James B. Duke of Charlotte, North Carolina. Today the Duke En-





On Friday evening, November 17, 1911, three Howard University undergrauate students, with the assistance of their faculty advisor, gave birth to Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. This event occurred in the office of biology professor Ernest E. Just, the faculty advisor, and three liberal arts students were Edgar A. Love, Oscar J. Cooper, and Frank Coleman. The fraternity has emerged as one of the prestigious Black fraternities in America. Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., was the first greek letter organization of national standing to be established on Johnson C. Smith University's campus. On December 5, 1921, Rho Chapter was established and began a career on the campus which has been rewarding to many local Smithites.

Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc.



Sigma Gamma Rho was founded on November 12, 1922, on the campus of Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana. The group became an incorporated national collegiate sorority on December 30, 1929. Seven distinguished young teachers founded Sigma Gamma Rho with the idealism that greater service resulted in greater progress. Hence, the birth of a sisterhood dedicated to its African American brothers and sisters to help provide the means that they may promote cultural awareness, educational and health programs, and recreational activities. Today, Sigma Gamma Rho has grown to over 72,000 members with over 600 chapters in the US, Bermuda, Bahamas, and the Virgin Islands. The Beta Upsilon Chapter of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority came to JCSu in 1955 and was the first sorority in the Pan-Hellenic Council.

On January 9, 1914 under the blue skies, white stars and cresent moons of Washington, D.C. three young black men at Howard university created what would later be known as the "One and Only True Brotherhood" Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated. The first fraternity recognized at Howard University, Phi Beta Sigma is an organization that believes in the "exclusive we" rather than the "inclusive we." Founded on the ideals of brotherhood, scholarship, and service it has truly experienced "A Proud Past and looks forward to Progressive Future."

The infamous Alpha Epsilon chapter founded October 27, 1927 at Johnson C. Smith University can honorably say, "We have upheld the principles and ideals of our National Constitution." We firmly believe in and stress continually upholding our motto "Culture for Service and Service for Humanity."

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority,Inc.

Alpha Kappa Alpha is the oldest Greek letter organization established in America by Black college women. The record of its origin, growth and development, activities, evolving goals, and accomplishments is more than an interesting chronicle of a colored bit of college-based Americans.

It is, rather a significant and inspiring reflection of the emergence of a dynamic group inchanging culture. The efforts of Alpha Kappa Alpha women in the promotion of high scholarship, vocational, and career guidance, health services, the advancement of human and civil rights, and in so many other areas constitute a priceless part of the American experience in the twentieth century.

Alpha Kappa Alpha roots date back to Howard University, Washington, D.C., where the ideas for information was conceived by Ethel Hedgemen Lyle of St.Louis, Missouri. She was viewed by the Sorority as an instrument for enriching the social and intellectual aspects of college life by providing mental stimulation through interaction with freinds and associates.

Through the years, however, Alpha Kappa Alpha's function has become more complex. After her incorporation as a perpetual body in 1913, Alpha Kappa Alpha gradually branched out and became the channel through which selected college trained women improved the social and economic conditions in their city, state, nation and the world.

Today, that fradition has continued internationally, nationally and locally. Alpha Kappa Alpha cultivates and encourages high scholastic and ethical standards; promotes unity and friendship among college women; alleviates problems concerning girls and women; maintains a progressive interest in college life; and serves all mankind through a nucleus of more than 170,000 women in over 900 chapters.


Zeta Phi Beta Sorortiy, Inc.




Office of Residence Life
