## WE POINT WITH PRIDE



WE Havoverians are very proud of our school. Though our school is only twentyfive years old, we are considered one of the best schools in the South. A great deal of this credit is due to our present principal, Mr. Thomas T. Hamilton. The students of New Hanover High have some of the best equipment and teachers in this section of the country. Thus they leave high sehool prepared to carry on their studies in other schools.
The requirements for graduation are: Two units of science, two units of math, two units of history, four units of English, and six units of the student's own choice. This makes a total of sixteen units which are required of students graduating from our school.

In the field of seience we offer general science, biology, advanced biology, chemistry, physics, home economics and home living. General science touches on all phases of science while biology deals with the study of plant and animal life. Advanced biology is a more thorough study of plant and animal life. Chemistry includes the study of elements, the structure of the atom, compounds, and equations. Physics is the study of motion, gravity, pressure, and electricity. Home economics and home living instruct us in the art of living together socially. In connection with these courses we have two clubs which promote interest in knitting, crocheting, sewing and other handiwork. Any one who takes home economics is eligible for membership. The Taxidermy Club has proved to be a great success. We have one room which is designated for the purpose of displaying students' accomplishments in this field.

Our math department offers to the students two years of algebra, and one year of geometry. It also offers semester classes in advanced algebra, solid geometry, college math, and trigonometry. Students preparing for college will find these subjects
a great help, according to reports from students now in college.

United States history and American government are required subjects. For students who took world history in the sophomore year and American government in the junior year, this year a new course, economics, was offered. World history touches on the history of all foreign countries. whilc United States history deals with colonization and wars of our own country. American government is the study of the organization and appliances of our form of government.

In order to graduate from New Hanover High School, a student must complete four years of English. English is a study of literature and grammar. In connection with this course we have three outstanding clubs: The O’Henry Literary Society has as members anyone taking English and really interested in literature. The programs consist of reading reviews, and reports on contemporary and classie literature. The New Hanover Thespians, a dramatic clul), has won equal honors with its makeup, scenery, and direetion. Their programs consists of pantomines, plays and games. Each year they aid in presenting the junior and senior plays. The Dramatics Award is presented at the end of each year to the boy and girl having the best dramatic performance of the year. The Scribblers' Club was begun to encourage creative writing. For several years the club has sponsored the Scribbler's Magazine, produced twice a year. It contains original stories, essays, descriptions, and poems by the members. The Itildeal, our school newspaper, is edited by the journalism classes every two weeks.

In place of home economics, boys are offered machine shop, inechanical drawing, and electricity. These courses aid many boys in choosing their lifetime occupation.
The commercial classes are divided into two


courses, one leading to stenographic work and the other to aecountaney. Shorthand, typewriting and bookeeping are subjeets taught in this eourse.

The language department offers Latin, French, and Spanish. In Latin elasses we study legends of ancient heroes. The Latin Club has given the students of this language a better understanding of it. They beeome familiar with the people who first spoke the tongue, and with their customs. While in the French classes a French student is eligible for membership in the French Club during this first year if he has an "A" average. All second year students are eligible. Programs in French or of French cultural value are planned for each meeting. Games in French are played after the business meeting. The study of the South Ameriean countries and the people has brought the Spanish language closer to us. The Spanish Club was organized three years ago to promotc further interests in our Latin American neighbors. All second year Spanish students with an "A" averagc are eligible for membership. All first year students whose average is " A " during the second semester may become members.

The vocal classes, under the direction of Miss Sara Robinson, are most popular with students who are talented and who wish to continue with the study of voice. Each year the Glee Club and Choir present a Christmas program long anticipated by all the students. Their most outstanding presentation of the year was their operetta, "New Moon." Another form of musieal study is the orehestra, which is conducted by Mrs. Erie Norden.


The art department makes posters to advertise different school activities. The Baxley Art Award is awarded annually to the students who show the most originality and excellent technique. The Arts and Crafts Club offers splendid opportunities to those who enjoy making things with their hands.

We are one of the very few schools in the State that offer a Bible course. Those who wish to continue religious work will find this an ideal course. The Bible Club, which is sponsored by the Bible classes, is founded on the ideals of the Holy Bible and strives to forward Christian Icadership and living.

New Hanover High School has had an R.O.T.C. unit for eight years. We arc very proud of our R.O.T.C. because they rank high in the government inspection. We are one of the two schools in the Statc and of the fcw in the South to have this kind of military unit. There are four companies and the band, headed by the staff. Our band, under the direction of Lieutenant Lacock, an ex-band leader, is very outstanding in the eommunity and State. The principal purposes of the R.O.T.C. are to build character, improve health,

and develop latent qualities of leadership. The War Department furnishes the uniforms and equipment with the exception of a few minor ineidental items. The Rifle Club is a select group of the outstanding shooters from the Cadet Corps. Its purpose is to compete in the Corps Area Rifle competition which is held each year. The purpose of the Officers' Clut is to promote fellowship, sehool spirit, R.O.T.C. spirit, patriotism, and soeial activities in connection with the R.O.T.C.

Our library is one of the largest in the State. It contains 10,500 volumes in addition to many magazines and newspapers. All students who work in the library are required to belong to the Library Science Club. At these meetings all the members are required to make a book report and give a report on a magazine artiele during a semester.
Courses in physieal education are offered to both boys and girls. These classes are taught in the gymnasium. All sorts of ealisthenies and exercises are given the students. They learn teamwork and have real fun playing basketball, softball, volley ball, taking traek, and other suitable activities.

In athletics we have football, baseball, basket-

ball, tennis, and track. The coaches are: Lcon Brogden, Tom Davis, Jap Davis, and Leo Harkins; for junior varsity the coach is Mr. Wallace West. The Tennis Club was organized thirteen years ago for the purpose of promoting this sport in the school. The Monogram Club was organized two years ago and is to be desired, yea, more than much fine gold. Any boy who has earned a varsity letter is eligible for membership. The purpose of this club is to create a better athletic program by upholding high morals and clean sportsmanship, and to see that visiting teams are entertained properly when they visit our school.

The cheerleaders are right there when we have a game, and they are always ready to cheer our boys on. There are twelve cheerleaders, eight girls and four boys.

Our school is run by the students. Each class elects its officers and seven other members of the class to serve on the legislature, which makes up the laws of the school. The executive council sces that they arc enforced, and the judicial branch sees that justice is given to thosc who disobey these laws. Social marshals are elccted by the legislature to usher at various school activities.

The highest honor that a student can reccive during his school carecr is to become a member of the National Honor Society. Members are taken in twice yearly from the Junior and Senior

classes and are elected on the basis of the four cardinal objectives for which this society stands: scholarship, leadership, character, and service. A student must stand in the upper third of his class.

Another high honor that can be bestowed upon a boy or girl is to be elected into the Hi-Y Club. Members are selected on the basis of Christian
character. Only a limited number are selected for membership in the club.

The Declamation Contest is one of the outstanding annual features of the school. It is sponsored by the Lion's Club and the English Department. There arc four divisions: freshman and sophomore boys, freshman and sophomore girls, junior and senior boys, and junior and senior girls. Prizes are awarded to the successful boy and girl declaimers in each division.

At the end of cach school year a day is set aside on which the students receive recognition for perfect attendance, scholarship, and honors bestowed upon them by school and civic organizations. The letter "W" and stars are awarded in the following sports: football, baseball, basketball, tennis, and rifling. The Foy-Roe Trophy

is presented each year to the most valuable football playcr. The Johnny Schmidt Trophy and Plaque is presented to the most valuable baseball player chosen by his teammatcs. The Martha Halligan Cup is presented each ycar to the sophomore girl elccted by the sophomore class, who best lives up to the standards sct by Martha Halligan. It was first prescnted to the school in the year of 1943 by the sophomores in loving memory of their classmate. The Helen Bridgers Memorial Cup was given to the school by the Girls' Hi-Y of 1935-36. This was given in loving memory of Helen Bridgers and is presented each year to the senior girl who most nearly measures up to the ideal excmplified by her life. The Joe Schraeder Memorial Cup is presented each year to the most outstanding senior boy by the Boys' Hi-Y. This person is clected by the under classmen, and his name is cngraved upon the cup.

The Class of ' 46 leaves all this behind and their happy memorics to the class which comes after us.

## Senior Class History

IT WAS in the momentous year of 1942 when New Hanover High School first flung open wide her doors to us. We were probably the greenest Freshmen the school had ever seen. However, in no time at all some of our brighter members discovered that they had been duped into believing that there were elevators to the game rooms on the fourth floor.

We all remember Mr. Hamilton's welcome speech to us and our frenzied searches for our class rooms. We chose Robert Strickland to lead us through our first year of higher cducation. Soon we had fallen into line with the rest of the school and were doing all we could for the war effort through the medium of the V'ictory Corps. The end of our first year found us convinced that New Hanover High School was tops and that high school life was swell.

Nineteen hundred and forty-three found us as Sophmores who thought that at last we were getting to be something. That was the year our starving appetites called for two lunch periods. We got the two lunches, but it has taken us almost three years to be certain that we could live through fifth period without collapsing from want of nourishment.

Jane Head became our new president and led us capably through the battles of geometry and Latin. while our brothers and friends fought the sterner battles of World War II.
"What happened to the flag pole?" was the question heard often during 1943. For some strange reason the flag pole reduced itself to a stump. Who can forget the snow men, snowballs, snow fights, and early dismissal that the snow brought? The snow vanished, though, in time for us to have our outdoor May Day Festival which was an outstanding success. So ended our second grand year.

In the fall of 1944 we acquired some additional luster when we became Juniors. Jane Head was re-elected to lead us through another school year. We felt that we practically owned the school; but it didn't take us long to find out that, as far as the Senior steps were concerned. we didn't have top priority.

Our Junior Play was "Dangerous Ladies," a mystery melodrama, with Cynthia Johnson and Joann Plastre in the leads. We all worked hard on the Junior-Senior Prom. "Old South" was our theme, and nothing was too good for the then present Seniors. Our third year now faded into past history.

Now we find oursclves at the very top of the steps. We are full-fledged Seniors proud of our rings, of the coveted steps, and most of all, of our school. We shall never forget the time we "passed out" of the auditorium first or when we opened our name cards to hand out. We still think that the Freshmen grow shorter each year and that New Hanover High School is wonderful. Bill Peters is the President of the entire Student Body. Mary Elizabeth Westbrook is our Class Head.

In a class history we can only set down the big events that have taken place. However, it is the little things we shall remember, things that can not be set down on paper like the thrills of the football games, the exam worries, the locker chatter, and the friendships we have made.

We are indebted to the faculty, to our parents, and to all those who have helped us reach this pinnacle.

Soon we shall separate, all going our separate ways into the brave, new world of peace. No matter where our individual paths take us or what the fates may hand us, we are proud that as a group we were privileged to be called the new Hanover High School Class of 1946.

## HOMEROOM ORGANIZATION



TTHE Homeroom Organization was formed for the purpose of keeping the student body in eloser toueh with the Student Government. Once each month the Homeroom Chairmen meet and receive from the President of the Student Body a report on the activities of the Student Government. The Chairmen then relay this information to their respective homerooms. In addition, the Homeroom Chairmen aid in such worthwhile aetivities as elothing eollections, Community Chest drives, Red Cross drives, and many others that coneern all the homerooms.

## STUDENT GOVERNMENT

IN 1942, the present constitution of the student body of New Hanover High School was drawn up. It provides for three main branches of Student Govermment as well as various other subdivisions.

All legislative powers are vested in a student legislature, which consists of ten representatives from each class. The president and vice-president of the student body are at the head of this branch and are elected from the senior class. Other officers are: president pro-tem, clerk, and sergeant-at-arms, and are elected from the membership of the legislature. The powers of the legislature are to make the necessary laws for students and to try cases of impeachinent of student body or class officers.

Executive authority is vested in an executive council headed by the president and vice-president of the student body and composed of a director of finance, a director of elections, a director of social activities, a director of club activities, and a chief marshal. The director of finance is manager of the school store. The chief marshal heads a force of marshals appointed by himself with the approval of the president, and serves as chief prosecutor of all cases tried before the student court. Eight social marshals elected by the legislature are also under the jurisdiction of the chief marshal. This council administers the laws passed by the student legislature.

Judicial powers of the student body are vested in a student court composed of three seniors and two juniors and elected by the legislature. This court meets once a week to try all cases of infraction of student government laws.

An advisory board of two faculty members are appointed by the principal from five nominations submitted in order of preference by the student legislature. One member serves as adviser to the executive council, and the other member serves as an adviser to the student court. Both together are advisers to the student legislature.

In addition to the central organization of the student government, there is a homeroom organization composed of a chairman from each homeroom. These chairmen meet once a month to receive a report from the president of the student body on activities of student government. It is the duty of the chairmen to relay this information to their respective homerooms.

The Student Government was organized for students and by the students in order to encourage initiative and responsibility on the part of the students.
