## HANOVER HIGHLIGHTS

WHAT makes a clock tick? It's not the hands, the face or the numerals, but the meehanism behind all of this. What makes a school function? It's not the building, the desks, or the soeial activities alone. There has to be someone behind it all to guide and direet it,
 and that someone in our high school is our principal, Mr. Thomas Tristram Hamilton, Jr. Because our school is the largest in the State, we have to have someone that is well versed in handling disciplinary problems as well as problems of scholastic importance.

Our school offers each student a broad program of development in seholastic, vocational, cultural, and social fields.

In our various departments we have a wide range of subjects. For instanee, in our science department we are offered: General science, biology, advaneed biology, physics, chemistry, home economics, and home living. The science department sponsors several clubs. This year we have a new club in the field of home economics. It is the Future Homemakers of Ameriea. Any student taking home living is eligible for membership. The Taxidermy Club has as its purpose that of developing an interest in the mounting of animals. The Flora-Fauna Club has as its purpose the promoting of the study of biology. The Klick Club is the last connected with seience. This club was organized to stimulate more interest in photography and to learn more about its basic fundamentals.

In math we offer busincss arithmetic, algebra one and two, plane geometry, solid geometry, trigonometry, and college math. The latter are more for those students who plan to enter eollege and will find these courses useful.

Our social science department is one of which we are justly proud. World history is eleetive, but U. S. history and government are required. We believe these courses give our students an excellent background for understanding national and international problems.

We all know that English is required in all high schools. but we are fortunate in that we are offered more than the required courses. In our first three years in high school, we take the required courses; but in our last year we are offered a choice. The courses offered are: Journalism, general English, business English and speech arts. The journalism classes publish the school paper, the Wildcat, and learn much about style in writing, make-up, and faets about the newspaper world. Speech arts is a new subject this year. It is a combination of speech and dramatics. The elass presented two plays this year. In connection with the English department, we have the O'Henry Literary Society whieh was created to enliven the interest of the students in contemporary and elassic literature. The Thespians, or dramatic club, is not only for the purpose of amateur acting, but also to study make-up, staging and directing. The last English club is the Scribblers' Club, whose purpose is to eneourage creative writing. Each year this club publishes a magazine, the Scribbler.

We are fortunate in that we arc offered three languages: French, Latin, and Spanish. A student must take two years of a language to get any credit. The language department sponsors several Latin clubs and a Spanish Club.

Our commercial department offers courses in typing, short hand, bookkeeping, filing, and office


machines. In addition, we have vocational classes in diversified occupation. Besides these, a very important feature of our vocational work is that we have shops for wood work and metal work.

New Hanover High School has much to offer in the field of culture. In the music department we have the Glee Club made up of chosen members of the student body who have passed the necessary requirements. Each year the Glee Club presents an operetta, and during the year they make many public performances. The choir classes present a Christmas Cantata annually. In the band we have three elasses: The "A" or R.O.T.C. Band, the "B" Band, and the "C" Band. These divisions make it possible for many students to learn band instruments. We are very proud of our orchestra because of its youth. The orchestra has only been formed four years. They have the strings, woodwinds, and drums. Programs are given in assembly, and the orchestra also plays for other school activities; such as, Class Night. On honor day certain members of the orchestra are given miniature pins of the instruments that they play. Last year a Music Appreciation Club was formed to eneourage study in classic music.

Miss Emma Lossen is head of the art department. Four years of art arc offered to all interested students, and the Arts and Crafts Club offers them a splendid opportunity to further their study. During the year, the art classes make all the posters advertising plays. dances, contests, and other outside activities. On honor day the Baxley Art Award is presented to the student who has shown the most originality and excellence of technique in this field.

Books are essential for learning, and the entire front of the third floor is devoted to the library and its excellent selection of books. The library workers are mostly students. A half unit credit is given and all workers must join the Library Science Club. This club) meets once a week.

We are very fortunate in that we are one of the few schools that has a course in Bible. This course is entircly separate from other courses because the interested citizens of Wilmington support it. Two years of Bible is offered, and there is a clut which meets bi-monthly. Bach year the cluh has a formal banguct and during the ycar, sponsors many worthy projeets. Any member of the student body is cligible for membership. On honor day the club presents a gift to one of the most beloved members of the faculty.

This year the R.O.T.C. eelebrates its ninth birthday. There is only one other school in the State that has R.O.T.C. The purposes of the R.O.T.C. are to build character, improve health, and to develop hidden qualities of leadership. The government furnishes all equipment except some sinall items. One-half unit credit goes to those boys taking it. Freshmen are not allowed to take R.O.T.C.. and all the officers must come from the senior class. There are four companies; each is headed by a company captain or commander. Each company has two platoons headed by a lieutenant. The four companies are headed by the staff, which is made up of a lieutenant coloncl. a major, the second lieutenant in charge of equipment, and the color guard and bearers. Each company has a girl sponsor who is elected by the members of that company. The staff elects a batallion sponsor. It is quite an honor to belong to the Rifle Club. Only those who are outstanding in marksmanship may belong. Its purpose is to compcte in the Corps Area Rifle Contest which is held each year. The Sergeants' Club and the Officers' Club are two other clubs pertaining to the R.O.T.C. Every year the R.O.T.C. sponsors one or more balls. This year the Officers' Clut) was in charge of the first one. The entire R.O.T.C. has four adult advisers or teachers; a colonel, a captain, a sergeant, and a corporal. One of the main events of the year is Federal Inspection. At this time Army Officers from Washington
come down to inspeet and test the corp and grade them. The R.O.T.C. prescnts many awards on honor day.

The largest school organization is the student government. Our school has a right to be proud of its student government because that organization makes and carries out all laws besides producing programs beneficial to the students. The government has as its heads the president and vice-president of the student body. The government is divided into three parts: The executive branch, the legislative branch, and the judicial branch. The president presides at the meetings of the executive council which is made up of the president, vice-president, clerk, chief marshal, director of social activities, director of finance, director of elections, director of club activities, and an adult adviser. The function of this group is to earry out the regulations made and the activities planned by the student legislature. The student legislature is presided over by the vice-president and is made up of the three officers of each of the four classes, a representative from every homeroom in sehool and three adult advisers. The function of the student legislature is to pass regulations for the good of the student body at large. Lastly the judicial branch is made up of the chief marshal, the five judges, the adult adviser and a number of judicial marshals. The student government sponsors many worthy projects sueh as the Thanksgiving offering, noted speakers in assembly programs, and many other activities. Delegates from the legislature attend the State Student Council Congress every year. This year the newly elected president was from our own school.

We feel that our students need to get more exercise so physical education is taught to both loys and girls. They have gym three times a week and health twice. The girls learn to dance, play softball, basketball, volley ball, and many other sports. The boys play similar sports with the addition of football and track. We have two gyms: one for the boys and one for the girls. The boys' gym is in the main building and the girls' in the Isaac Bear Annex.

Our football and basketball teams are noted throughout the State for their excellence. Thousands of people attend our games, and we have good support from the adults of the city. We also have baseball. tennis, and track in the field of athletics. We have three full-time coaches: Leon Brogden, Jap Davis, and Tom Davis. Mr. Wallace West is the coach for the junior varsity teams. The Tennis Club is in its tivelfth year of existence this year, and was organized to promotc this sport in the school. Each year a tennis team is chosen, and this team goes to out-of-town meets. Another athletic elub is the Monogram Club. Membership in this club is quite an honor as only those boys who have earned a varsity lctter are cligible. Connected with these clubs are the cheerleaders, who cheer our lads to vietory or defeat. We have cight girls and four boys this year. On honor day all those checrleaders who are seniors receive miniature gold megaphones.

To those who work hard some honor and credit must be shown. The highest honor a student may receive during his high sehool career is to be elected into the National Honor Society. The members are elected into the club in the fall and in the spring and consists of only juniors and seniors. The four eardinal purposes of the society are: Scholarship. leadership, eharacter, and service. These

students are recognized at tapping ceremonies held in assembly. A member of this organization must stand in the upper third of his class.

To be elected into the Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y is another honor to be desired by a student. There is a limited membership and all members have to be elected. Each year the Hi-Y presents a minstrel for which it is famous.

If you aren't afraid to stand before hundreds of people, then you'll bc interested in the oratorical declamation contest, sponsored by the Lions' Club, which is an annual event looked forward to by many. The contest is divided into four groups: The freshmen and sophomore boys, and junior and senior girls. The speeches are also divided into humorous and serious. Awards are given to the four winners. Those who enter must have won out in the preliminaries, semi-finals, and finals.

Another distinguished and useful department is the nursery school. During the war, the nursery school was supported by the government, but now it is supported by the State. Children from two to five are allowed to come. Games, working with the hands, and proper manners are taught. The children are fed two and sometimes three meals per day. They also take naps in the morning and afternoon. The children are also taught to play together in harmony. A great deal of cquipment including see-saws, swings, a sliding board, and many other large recreational utensils has been acquired.

In the spring, we have another long lookcd-for event. This is honor day. This is a day set aside on which the students receive recognition for pcrfect attendance, scholarship and honors bestowed upon them by school and civic organizations. Letters arc presented to those boys and girls who have earned them in football, basketball, tennis, baseball, and rifling. The Foy Roe Trophy is presented to the most valuable football player, and the Johnny Schmidt Trophy and Placque to the most valuable baseball player. A new trophy, presented last year for the first time, is the Trask Trophy given to the football player with the highest scholastic record. The girl, elected by the sophomore class as being nearest like Martha HaHigan, is presented the Martha Halligan Cup, which was first presented in 1943. The Helen Bridgers Cup is given by the girls' Hi-Y to the senior girl who most nearly lives up to the ideats exemplified by her life. The Joe Schrader Memorial Cup is presented to the most outstanding scnior boy by the boys' Hi-Y. The Civitan Cup is given to the most outstanding senior. The Chemistry and Physics Awards are given to the students who are the most outstanding in these fields.
