Hopes for our first championship team since 1928 were high during midautumn. The Wildcats had broken a twenty-year jinx by beating Raleigh 39 to 0 , and it looked as if they were going through the season undefeated. The only other team that had not dropped a conference tilt was the Fayetteville Bulldogs,
and when the Wildcats and the Bulldogs met in the Soldier City in November, more than 10,000 football fans from all parts of the state traveled to see the fracas. The Bulldogs had an edge on the 'Cats, as five of the Wildcat starters were injured, and the 'Cats went down in defeat.
