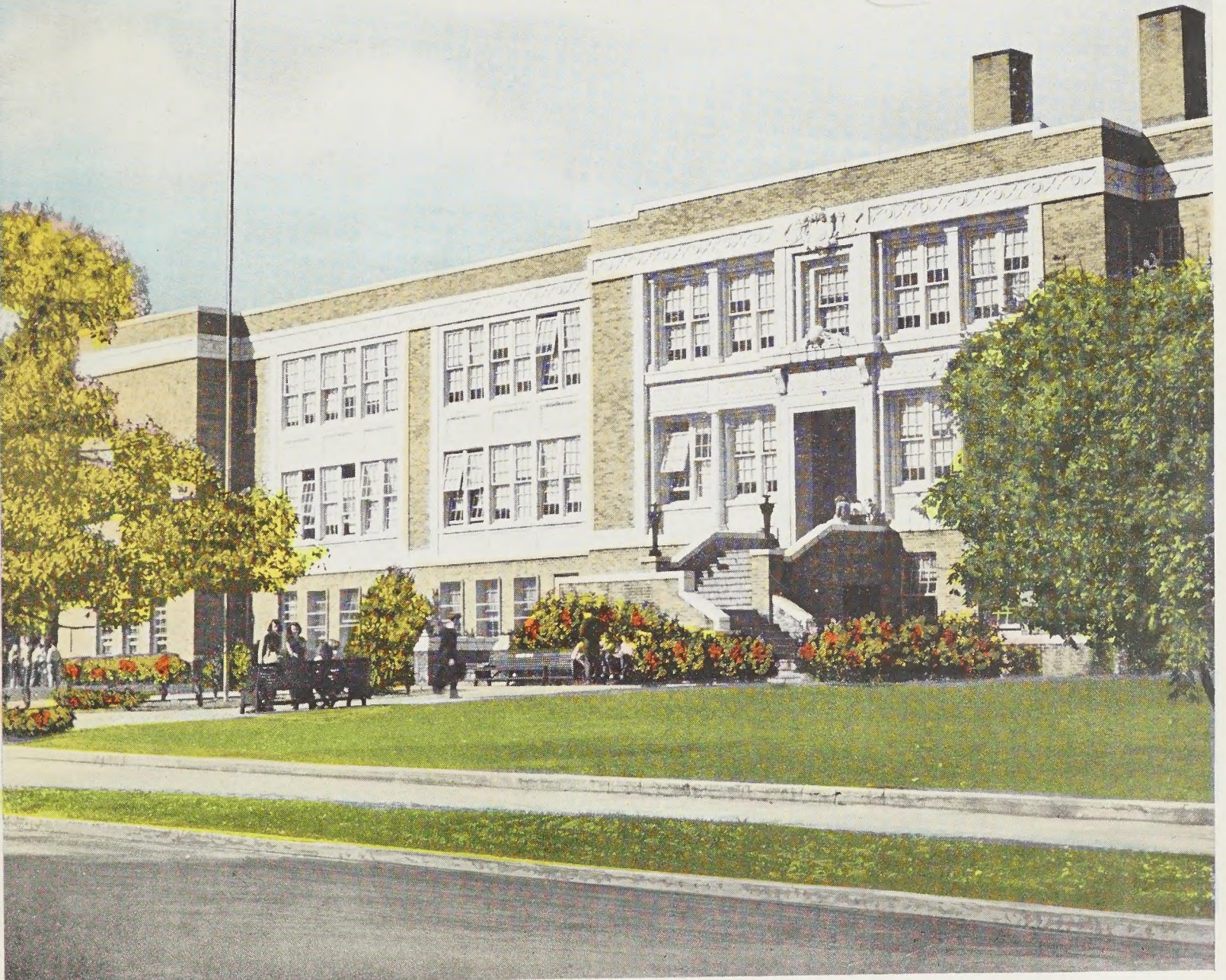

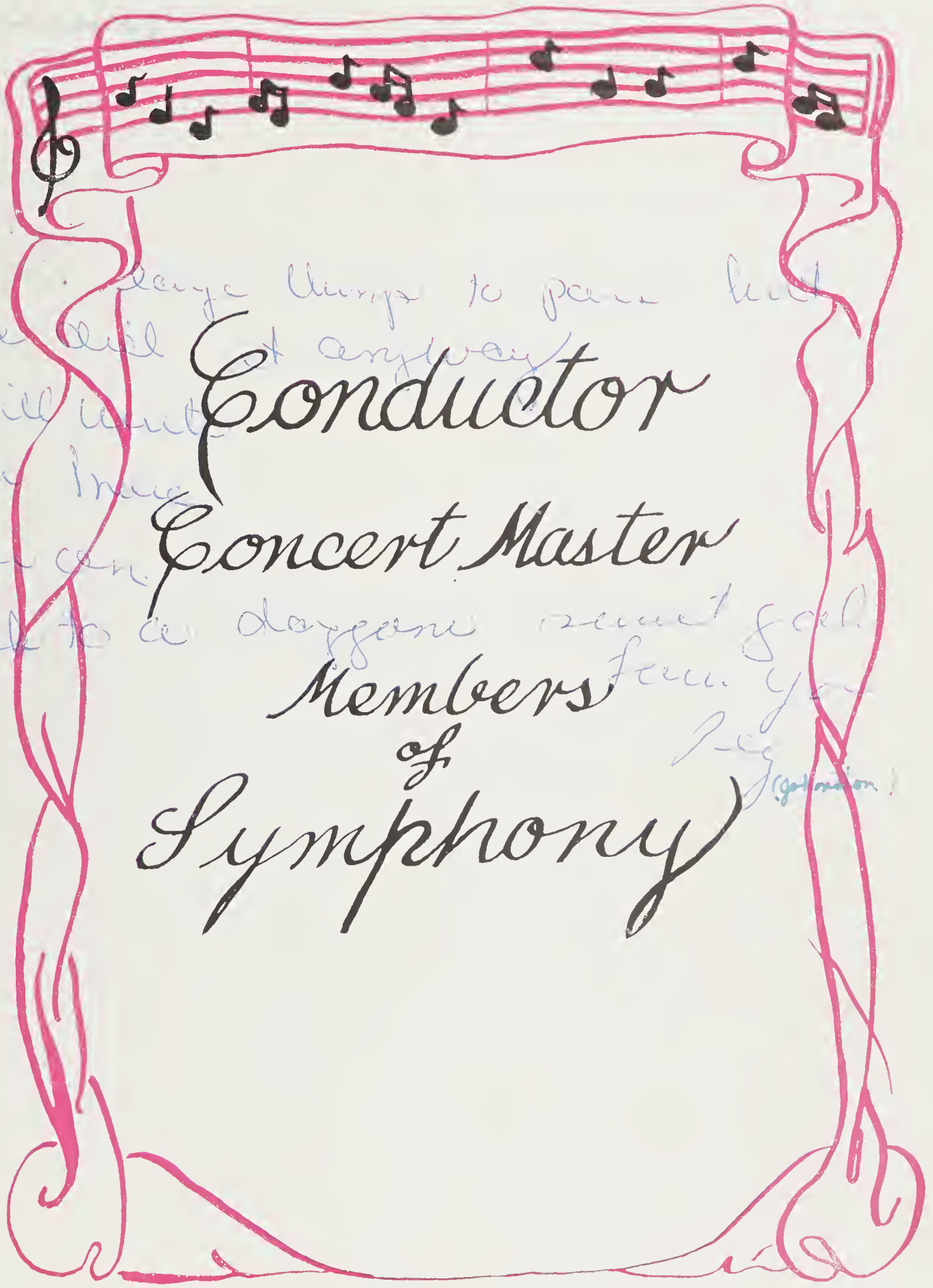
Dear Dootie -

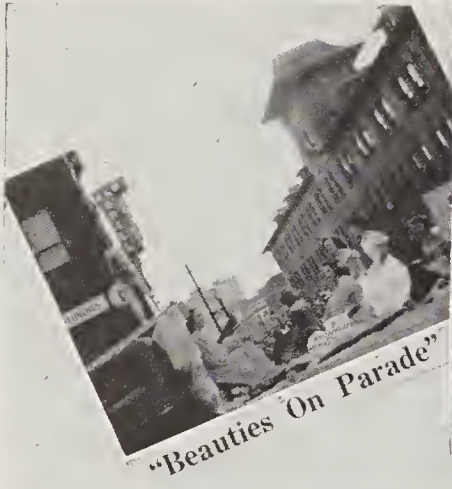
Sophomore History

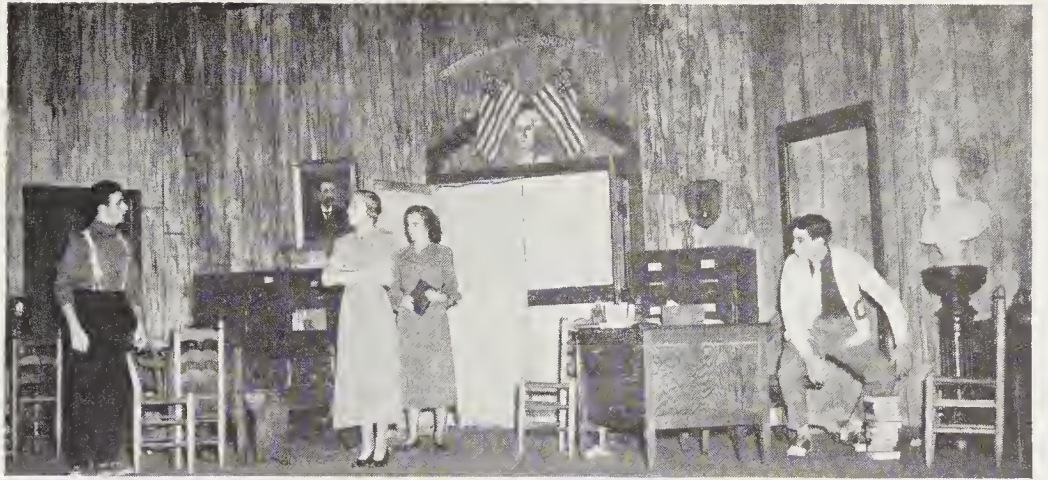

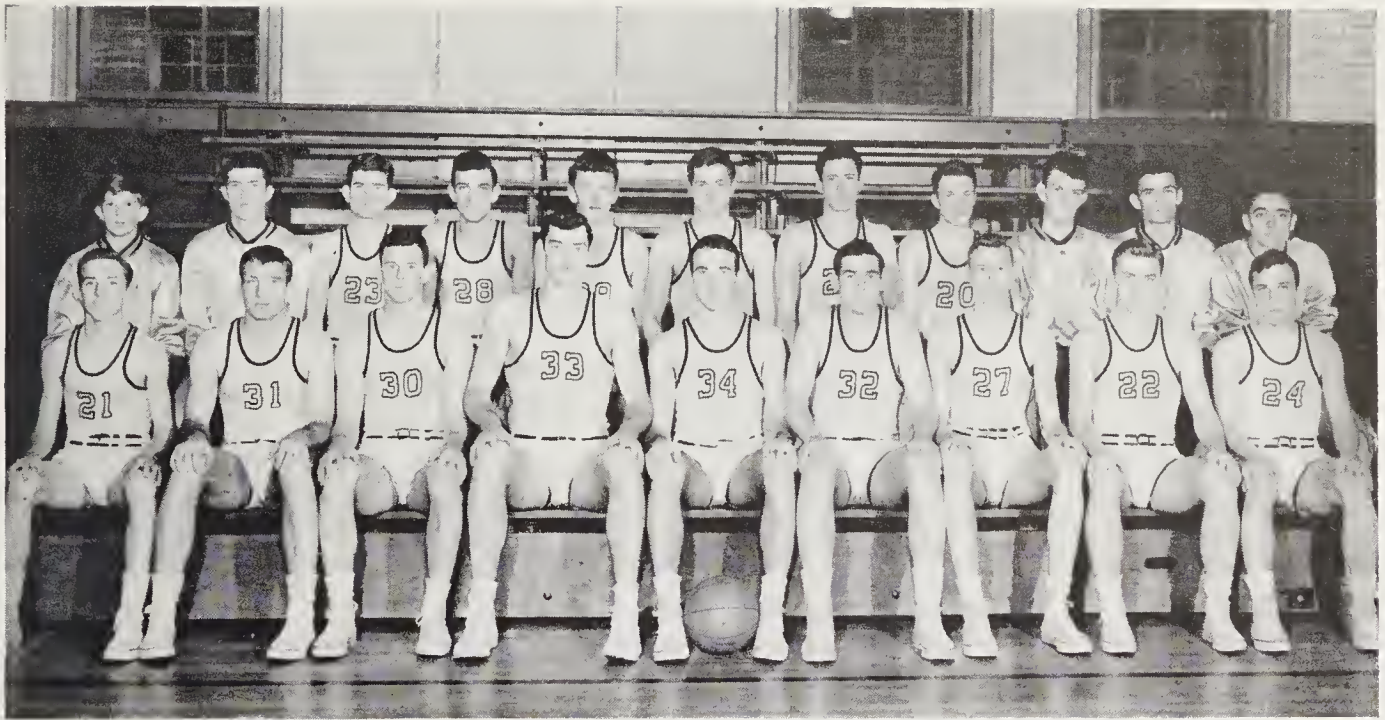

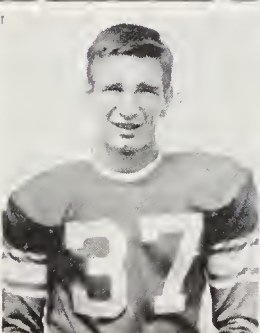
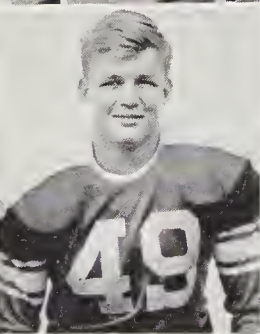
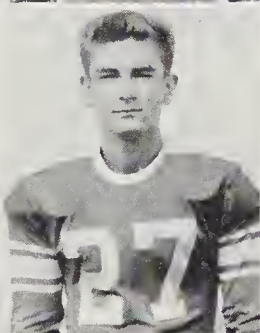
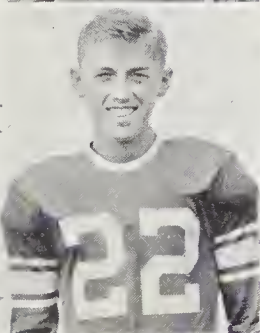
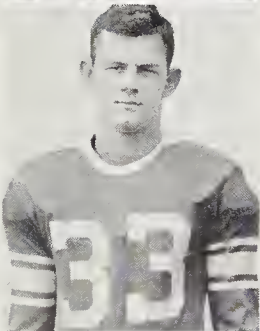
Hopes for our first championship team since 1928 were high during mid-autumn. The Wildcats had broken a twenty-year jinx by beating Raleigh 39 to 0, and it looked as if they were going through the season undefeated. The only other team that had not dropped a conference tilt was the Fayetteville Bulldogs,

Sponsors for the battalion and the four companies are elected annually by the cadets from the girls of the Senior Class.

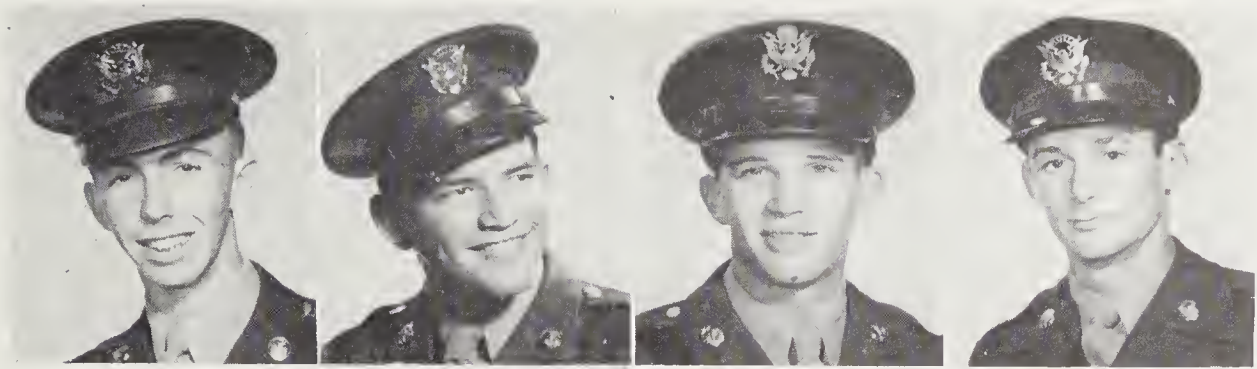

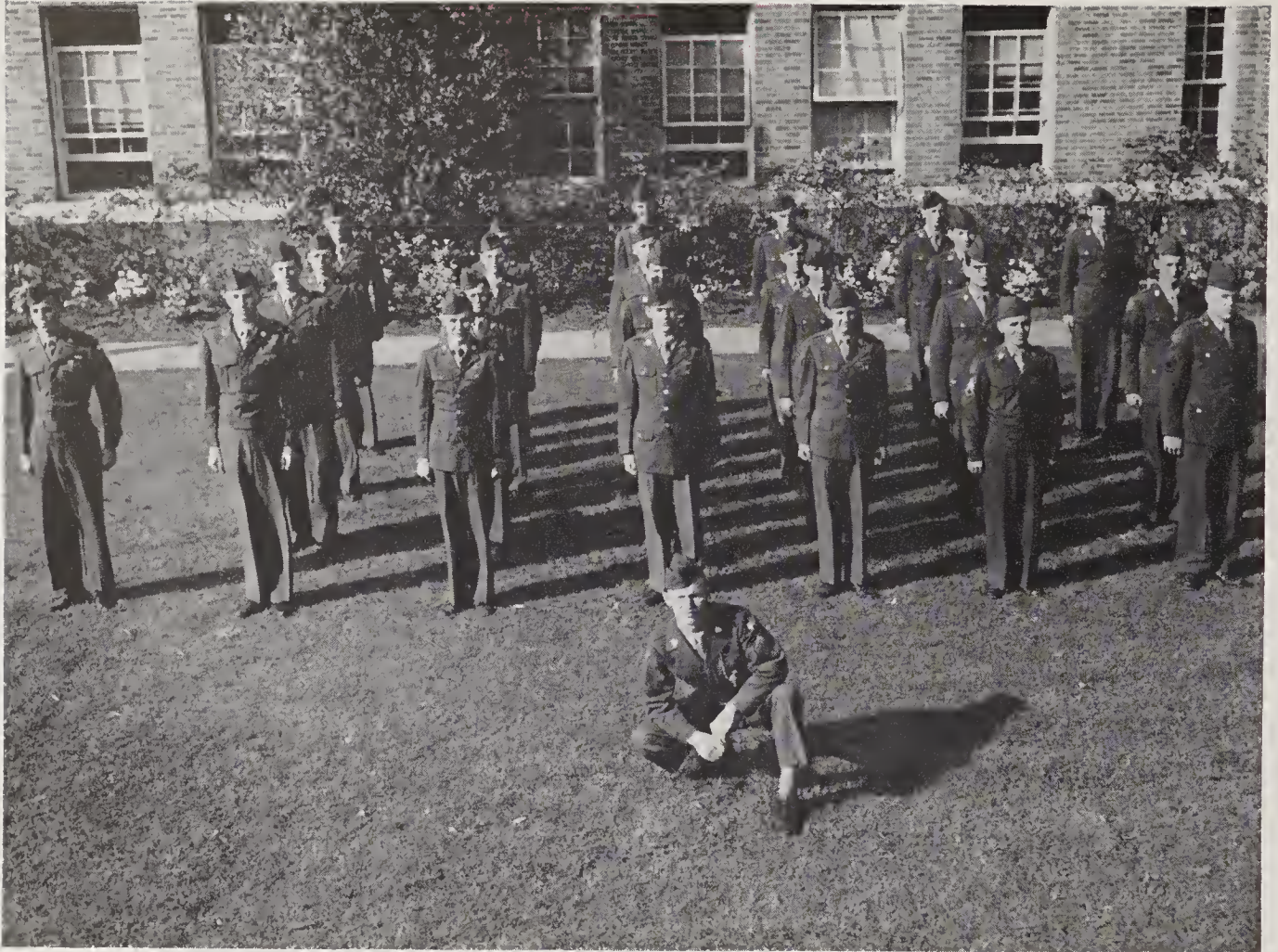

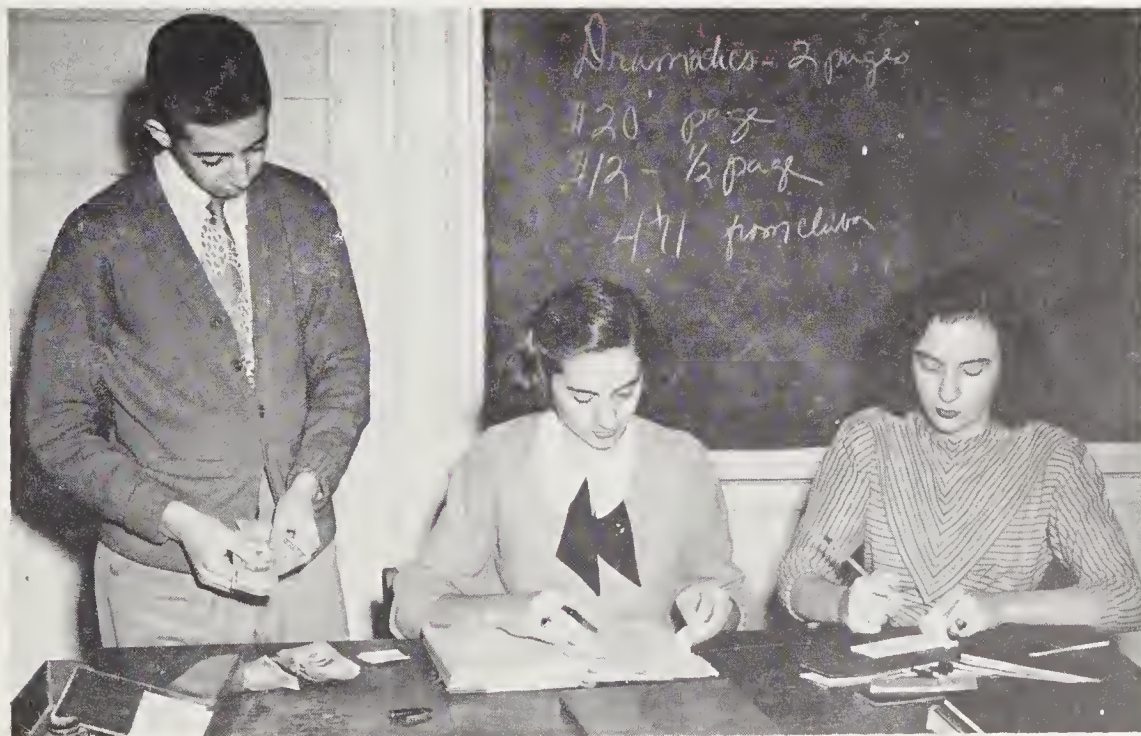


Jennie Cannon, left, had a tremendous responsibility as Business Manager. It was she who efficiently handled all the financial problems, of which there were many.
