The first year courses give the general fundamentals of the study, while the second year courses offer specialization and advanced work. Use of the actual instruments of the trade aid the student's studies.

Future architects find mechanical drawing essential to their occupation, which uses blueprints, projections, and lettering. Mechanics find machine shop a necessity. Carpentry students use their imaginations and skill to build cabinets, chairs, and other useful wooden objects. Electrical instruments and wiring are studied in electronics.

Invaluable experience is gained as the prospective employees vie in job interview contests supervised by local merchants. Their study of advertising, selling methods, and human relations makes more competent businessmen of the participants.

To prepare themselves for the responsibilities of operating an automobile, ninetyfive students enrolled in the Driver's Education course. The one semester course is a state requirement for obtaining a license. Students spend the first two school months in class, learning correct procedures which will lead to good driving habits. For the last school month individuals put their knowledge into practice with cars lent by local dealers. Study halls occupy the student's time while others are driving. A safer, experienced driver is the product of this course.

## Science uncovers amazing, complex world.

Leaf collections are a vital part of biology, so Mr. James Bilisoly, Biology, and Miss Linda Flamme, Biology, gather some samples.


Truth is stranger than fiction-so says the science student as he discovers a remarkable, new world. Exploring the basic concepts of his field, the student finds the lab challenging to his inquisitive mind. Aided by modern apparatus, students retrace the steps made by Hippocrates, Priestly, and Einstein, who laid the foundations of their studies. Startling similarities are found between a frog and man. Atoms, molecules, and elements . . . basics of the complex world which chemistry students seek to understand. Formulas, just letters before, have meaning as physics students derive them from common sense. Together, lab partners inspect Cleopatra the Cat, solve unknowns, and compute the acceleration of their hands, all under the guidance of lab assistants. For one thousand five hundred students, science offers adventure satiated with discoveries.

## Challenge presented by math's variety.

Mathematics is the universal language; it is the basis of most sciences. Variety highlights the math courses of NHHS. Algebra uses its x's, y's, and z's to solve everyday problems. Solid geometry, the study of figures in space, is in its final year, as contemporary geometry, introduced last year, covers both solid and plane geometry. Surveyors, astronomers, and physicists all find a practical use for geometry. Sines, cosines, and tangents are basic ingredients of trigonometry study.

Illustrative equipment is used beneficially by instructors; overhead projectors have proved their value in the classroom. Moon study, chemistry, physics, and the science of the future will depend on the mathematical ability of their engineers.

## Languages taught by audio-lingual.

Language is the key to universal understanding. The student is taught not only to read and speak a language, but also to appreciate its culture.

Knowledge of Latin declensions, roots, and conjugations prepares the student for studies in French and Spanish. By translating portions of Caesar's writings, the Latin II student learns more of Roman politics and warfare.
Dialogues and the singing of folksongs make French seem more real to the student. French II students read The Black Tulip, a short French novel, while French III students learn more of the French countryside and heritage.

An increased enrollment in Spanish this year-a total of 600 students-required the addition of two teachers to the department. Parallel readings in Spanish literature widen the student's scope of comprehension.
The audio-lingual method is the main technique used in teaching both Spanish and French. Frequent lessons in the language lab test the student's individual knowledge.
