## OHRCHIDS.

Among the following will be fonnd a few of our most hardy Orchids, such as may be casily grown. These all like shade at least haff or two-thirds of the day, and by planting in a mixture of peat or leaf-mould, in loany soil or a clay loan, they are easily grown. 'The mixtme of peat or leaf-monld tends to keep them moist. After thes are planted, an ineh of pure leaf-mould placed over them as a muleh will be rery beneficial.
APLECTRUNI IyemaIe (Putty Root) - This plant sends up from a bulbous root late in smmmer, a pointed green laf, 2 to $;$ inches long, whieh lasts through the winter, and in spring a stalk about a foot high, bearing a raceme of rather large grecnish brown flowers. 15 cents cach, $\$ 1$ per dozen.
CALOPOGON pIIChellus-Although this plant is more generally found in swamps and peat bogs, it also frequently grows in moist, sandy soil. 'There is such a great raricty from which to sclect that we are sure to find some of the number just fitted for the flowerless nook or shaded bank, that could not readily be brightened with other plants, or they can be made to add a charm to the bed or bank of flowers; and many dreary places shat out from the sunlight can be made brighter by a clump of ferms. Most of the following are of very easy culture and hardy in New England. As a rule ther delight in a shady situation, yet a few are adapted for open sumbight.
