Preface

THE task of securing and compiling the material which enters into this history and genealogy, has fallen chiefly to Charles W. Hargitt. For some twenty years he has been gathering the earlier data relating to his ancestry as a labor of love and family fealty. Several visits abroad, and personal conferences and correspondence with members of the family and friends in England have greatly facilitated these efforts, and he is especially under obligation to Mr. John Hansell, a prominent member of the old parishes within which the records were made and kept, for friendly interest and assistance in the search.

In compiling the data involved it need hardly be stated that in tabulation of names and dates which forms so large a feature in the following pages not a few errors are liable to occur, and some omissions of names. The compiler and his assistants have been dependent upon materials supplied by those who acted as collectors and secretaries. All these have done their best, but in spite of appeals, both written and personal, many have failed to reply. This we greatly regret, but apology, if any be called for, must come from those at fault. It was designed that not only names but also record of vocations, professions, address, etc., would be made, but only in part has this been possible from lack of information. If in this first attempt to secure a family history there may come an appreciation of its worth, and serious effort may follow to extend and make it fuller and better, the labor and time will not have been in vain.

The compiler herewith tenders his appreciation and thanks to those who have co-operated in making possible this permanent record. Moreover, he dares hope that a sense of its values and importance may have been quickened and deepened, and that there may come a realizing appreciation of filial esteem and family integrity such as may promote worthy concern for their maintenance and betterment. Reports of additional data, or errors contained herein, will be gratefully appreciated.

THE HARGITT-HADDOCK CENTENARY

1820-1920

Introductory Statement

THE historical and genealogical materials which comprise the following pages begin with and proceed from the marriage of Thomas Hargitt and Elizabeth Jarvies (Jarvis) in central Yorkshire, England, November, 1789. The first filial generation from this union comprised seven, four daughters and three sons, all of whom grew to vigorous maturity, and all, except one son, to be mentioned later, became progenitors of later generations, six entering into the tabulated account in Part II, and numbering more than eight hundred souls.

Into this Yorkshire family tree several collateral branches, or perhaps more literally grafts, entered by marriage, only one of which has been a factor in the following account, since others have not been traced, though mention will be made of them in a later section.

The main of these collaterals is that coming from the marriage of Robert Haddock to Jane Hargitt, youngest daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth Hargitt named above, which took place but a few weeks prior to the emigration of the family from England in June, 1821, and they formed a part of the family colony both in the voyage and settlement in the new country.

The eldest son of the family, Thomas Hargitt, Jr., had gone to America in the previous year, landing in New York in June, 1820, being therefore the first to make the adventure, and presumably an influential factor in promoting the movement of the six others, Haddock making the seventh, who came something over a year later.

This history might well concern itself primarily with the genealogy of the Hargitt-Jarvis family unit alone; but the entry of the main collateral branch in the marriage of Jane Hargitt to Robert Haddock, and their participation in the migration and settlement in the wilderness of Dearborn county, Indiana; and the further fact that from this Hargitt-Haddock English stock has come almost the entire series comprised in the

genealogy, makes it both proper and almost imperative that its history should be organized under the above main title, giving place to other collaterals which are integrally incorporated, each in its proper place and relation.

The following account seems best presented under two sections: First, the historical account; and second, the distinctly genealogical. Under the first are assembled the several sketches submitted by members participating in the centenary celebration, and other similar matter. Under Part II will be presented the tabulation of the genealogy of the family descendants, so far as obtained.

PART I. HISTORICAL


THE HARGITT FAMILY

THE history of this family for more than one hundred and fifty years is fairly complete and easily traceable by means of family records, such as those of family Bibles, oral accounts which are fairly authentic, and from official documents such as the parish registers of various sections of Yorkshire, within which the families seem to have been long established. Data concerning the family under review were found in the parishes of Sutton and Kirby-knowl, chiefly in the records of the Chapelry of Bagby, contiguous to Thirsk, a flourishing town some twenty miles northwest of the city of York, the metropolis of Yorkshire.

As the records relate to the family they begin with the marriage of Thomas Hargitt and Elizabeth Jarvies (or Jarvis, both forms occurring in the marriage certificate), on November 24, 1789, solemnized by Reverend G. Foster, who certifies that the banns were thrice published by him. Records upon tombstones in the family burying ground in Miller Township, Dearborn county, Indiana, carry the dates back to 1763, the year of their birth in Yorkshire.

It may be well in this connection to direct attention to the very variable forms of spelling occurring in these names. For example that of Hargitt, the standard form, appears in the parish records as Harget, and in old letters dating from 1822, Hargett, and in a letter of Ann, a daughter of the above parents it is spelled Hargit.

Tracing the name back in earlier history one finds in 1746 the record of the marriage of Thomas Hargate and Mary Reynolds; and in 1639 a record of the will of Catharine Hargett, and in 1597 a record of the will of Robert Harget; and still a different record of Edmund Hargett a matriculant in Oxford University in 1616. In Bardsley's Dictionary of English and Welsh surnames is the following: "Hargate, Hargitt, local of Hardgate, a hamlet in the parish of Bishop Thornton, County of York, There can be no doubt about the derivation of this name." And under this statement is the entry: Johannes Hardgate, poll tax, 1379, Yorkshire: Alicia Hardgat, poll tax, Yorkshire, 1379.





From personal acquaintance and later correspondence with members of the family still living in England, the name is spelled Hargitt. But there are in this country families in which the spelling is either Harget, or Hargett; and they trace back to Kentucky and thence to Virginia and Maryland. Some correspondence with members of this branch has failed to afford any clear account of their English ancestry, but the conviction is rather strong that the primal family source is the same. However, they evidently came at a different time and probably from some different family line, which still remains to be traced.

What has been stated concerning the Hargitt name applies also to that of the maternal line, though with still greater variety. Jarvies, Jarvis, Jarvys, Jervis, Jerveis, Gerveis, Gerveys, Gervais, etc. In the parish records of Yorkshire, the volume relating to Thirsk contains the entry of the baptism of Elizabeth Jarvis, or Jaruis, 1613-14.

More than passing interest attaches to this name in that a Jervis, Earl of St. Vincent, became an admiral in the British navy, hence entitled to association and rank with the nobility. While this Jervis was of Staffordshire where the name is quite common in the records, he seems also to have had residence at the village of Sutton, Yorkshire, which may imply family relations with the Jarvis or Jervis line associated by later marriage connection with the Hargitts, though direct identity remains yet to be established.

To revert to other phases of earlier history, let it be stated that of members still living in and about London some have well known merit along lines of art and science. Edward Hargitt was an artist of merit, some of whose paintings were on exhibition at the World's Fair at Chicago and received honorable mention: his work has also been exhibited at the salons of London and Paris. This man has also achieved renown as an ornithologist, his monograph on the Picidae having taken its place as a standard authority. A brother Charles was well known as an artist in musical lines in London. These and a sister were known personally. and the family connections discussed and recognized. Some of them have since died, as has also a Doctor Milton Hargitt, of Warwickshire. This family seems from its early locality in the city of York to have been concerned much with music and art. Members of the family migrated from York to Edinburgh early in the nineteenth century where they were teachers of music. One of them, Charles Hargitt, later removed to Liverpool where he be-

came well known as an art collector. They were communicants of the Catholic Church.

Of those coming to the United States in 1820 and 1821 most were farmer folk; sturdy, thrifty, enterprising and somewhat adventurous, as will be found stated in later entries. For example, it was something of an adventure to set sail for a new country in those early times in which even the sea voyage might occupy from two to three months, and where the later migration overland and down the big rivers also required hardly less hardihood or time than did that of the sea. With these expressions of courage and daring in mind it will not seem strange that they should engage in hazardous journeys down the Ohio and Mississippi rivers to New Orleans in the earlier years of their history, in one case wreckage of the boat and its cargo of wealth, and narrow escape of owner and crew from drowning, or that some of them joined the mighty tide which surged westward in the years of the gold excitement, among whom were Sutton, Nowlin, Mason, Bateman, and others, who dared the adventurous experiment.

But the spirit of adventure and courage related not alone to motives of prospective gain. They were people of education and culture and of deep religious convictions and civil aspirations. With their earlier Pilgrim prototypes they were prepared to dare much for these convictions. And their pilgrimage in search of religious tolerance and civil rights was based upon principles which had already become the inherent birthright of Englishmen through the enactments of Magna Charta.

But they were pioneers, and the pioneer is not merely an adventurer. He is rather one who goes before and prepares the way, which implies an educated mind no less than a brave spirit. And these pioneers of 1820, like those of 1620, whose immortal compact drawn up in the cabin of the Mayflower begins "In the name of God Amen, do by these presents, solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and each other covenant and combine ourselves together into a body politic, . . . and to enact . . . just and equal laws, ordinances and constitutions, etc.," while not entering into formal enactments, did none the less enter into the spirit of that compact and scrupulously endeavored to make it their guiding principle in those days when the civil and moral groundwork was being established. So they built chapels and churches, established schools, fostered colleges, for the promotion of religion, education, and highest culture, as the safeguards of liberty and justice.







They had among them teachers, some of them whom we may remember. And always there have been a goodly proportion who by vocation were teachers; some became physicians; others lawyers; others ministers of Christ. To this last class were half a score or more easily named, thrice that number of teachers, physicians both here and in the Yorkshire family; technicians, mechanical and civil.

But then as now, most adhered to the primitive vocation of husbandry; tillage of the soil, rearing of herds, bettering their kinds and qualities. We look upon these callings as arduous today and this is not questioned. But if so now, with all that a century has done in invention and improvement, what shall be said of it in those days of our grandsires, when no machines other than hoes, plows, sickles rakes, etc., were available? And what of those grandames who wrought by their sides in that intricate web of life? Who among us can tell of her share in that primitive drama? Have we ever heard of the spinning wheel, the hand loom. the coarse linen, or linsey-woolsey garbs of those days, or of those finer fabrics, the laces and kindred handiwork where later leisure and artistic tastes found scope? Yes, in part, perhaps, but a small part and very vague. We hardly dreamed that they also were pioneers, that they too had visions of coming years, that they went on before blazing the trails of human progress no less than did those who subdued the wilderness and made it fit for habitation.

COPY OF LAST WILL OF THOMAS HARGITT, The First

Made by James H. Ewbank from Will Record on pages 181 to 185.

In the name of the Great Amen;

I, THOMAS HARGITT, of Miller Township, Dearborn County, State of Indiana, I Thomas Hargitt being in my right mind, considering the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death, therefore I wish to settle my affairs of this life and dispose of my property, accordingly I do make my last will and testament and do publish the same and hereby make void every other will or wills made heretofore by me:

Item 1st: I will and bequeath to my son, Thomas Hargitt, one hundred and five acres of land, more or less, holden by me in the tenth section, Town six, Range one West, the said Thomas Hargitt paying out of the said described land after the decease of Thomas Hargitt Senr. and 'is wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, to my Executors Eighty Dollars. Also to pay five dollars Intrus to Elizabeth Hargitt, annually.

Item 2nd: I will and bequeath to my son, Robert Hargitt, one hundred acres of land in the third Section in the aforesaid Township: commencing at the quarter section corner by Samuel Kincaids: following the center of the nearly North until it includes the above bequeathed one hundred acres of land. Reserving one-half acre of land for a family burying ground forever, where it is now commenced:

Item 3rd: I will that the said Robert Hargitt pay out of the aforesaid described land, one hundred and ten dollars to my executors after the decease of Thomas Hargitt and Elizabeth, 'is wife: Also pay eleven dollars Intrus annually to my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, annually. Also should my Executors have any security money to pay for the said Robert Hargitt, the same shall be paid out of the aforesaid tract of land.

Item 4th: I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, forty-five acres of land, more or less, where I now live, to possess and enjoy as long as she lives, after the death of my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, I will and bequeath to my son, Robert Hargitt, the aforesaid forty-five acres of land on the

condition that the said Robert Hargitt in token of a recompense or price, pay the sum of Four hundred dollars, two hundred dollars to my daughter, Elizabeth Shaw, after the expiration of twelve months after the death of my wife, Elizabeth Hargitt; Also I will that the said Robert Hargitt shall pay two hundred dollars out of the aforesaid forty-five acres of land bequeathed as aforesaid: the aforesaid two hundred dollars shall be equally divided amongst George Jackson's four daughters, if any of the said die, their part shall be equally divided among the surviving heirs the said legacy to be paid as the girls come of age or twelve months after the decease of my wife, Elizabeth Hargitt.

Item 5th: I will and bequeath to my wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, all my personal property contained in my dwelling house, also all my moveable property on the aforesaid premises to possess and enjoy with all the profits arising therefrom. Also I will that my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, during her natural life have all the Intrus arising from my notes; after the decease of my beloved wife, the principal shall be equally divided amongst my two daughters, namely Ann Gibson, Jane Haddock; also the eighty dollars coming out of the one hundred and five acres bequeathed unto Thomas Hargitt; Also the one hundred and ten dollars that is coming out of the hundred acres bequeathed to the said Robert Hargitt, also to be equally divided between my two daughters before mentioned; Also I will that my son, Thomas Hargitt, pay the sum of twenty-five dollars per year to my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt out of the one hundred and five acres of land bequeathed to him. Also I will that my son. Robert Hargitt, pay to my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, the sum of twenty-five dollers per year out of the hundred acres bequeathed to him. Each of them shall pay the said sums annually as long as my wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, shall live. Also I will and ordain and appoint my beloved wife, Elizabeth Hargitt, and my son, Thomas Hargitt, to execute this my last will and testament.

In witness of the same I have thereunto assigned my hand and seal this 11th day of June, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five.

JANE HARGITT HADDOCK

THE HADDOCK FAMILY

T T

HE family history of this branch, especially its earlier phases, is but imperfectly known, but for the present concern begins with Robert Haddock, born in Yorkshire, England, January 23, 1794, the son of Thomas Haddock (mother's name not available). A brother, Thomas Haddock, Jr. is known from letters written to Robert, in which is also mentioned one sister, name not given.

The name Haddock, like that of the preceding family name, is derived from a locality, Haydock, a manor in the parish of Winwick,

in Lancashire, and signifies 'of Haydock!' and the various spellings of the name is only what is found among surnames everywhere. Of the varied spellings the following are typical: Haydock, Haidoc, Eydock, Haddocke, Haddock.

Robert Haddock was married to Jane Hargitt, daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth (Jarvis) Hargitt, May 5, 1821, just a few weeks prior to the family departure to America in June following, in which they joined. He kept a diary during this voyage which has been carefully preserved as a family heirloom, and from it one may learn much of interest concerning the traits and thought of the man and his interests. "In it he wrote first of all each day how Jane (his bride of a few weeks) was feeling, the fact of the matter being that the lovely little bride, aged twenty, was sea sick, as were others of the party, during most of the time of the long journey in a sailing vessel over the storm-tossed Atlantic." In another section one learns of his religious temperament as he relates accounts of Sunday services on shipboard and his participation in phases of them. Again one gains still further insight into his sublime trust in the great God who rules sea no less than land as he describes impressions of some especially severe storm: and the tranquility of spirit which accompanies a fair sky after a stormy night. Accounts are given of the conclusion of the voyage, the sight of land after eight weeks of dull monotony and the prospect of early landing at Philadelphia and preparation for the taxing trip over the mountains to Pittsburg. Unfortunately the diary stops short of the completion of

the trip down the Ohio River and later arrival at Lawrenceburg in November following.

Robert Haddock was a devout member of the Wesleyan Methodist church, and held in it positions of trust, and later in the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States was a local preacher and influential member. He was also for a time a school teacher, in which vocation he was earnestly entreated by his father in a letter still preserved to continue. But the appeal of the farm, and the importance of its development, had primary consideration, and arduous toil followed for many years. He was the father of ten children all of whom grew to efficient maturity, all these in turn rearing families, the descendants numbering one hundred and seventy, about one hundred of whom are still living.

Robert Haddock was the only member of his own family coming to the United States, but others of the name, more or less distantly related, are known to have come at various times, the earliest being in 1642. None of those he ever knew. The family in Yorkshire was from early time characterized by "sturdy respectability, culture and refinement," and these he shared in marked degree. In later years he engaged in mercantile lines, keeping a small store in the village of Bright, and was for many years postmaster there.

In the Haddock family line, as in that of Hargitt, are evidences of noble birth or honor. For example, William Haddock, a captain in the British Navy, was awarded in 1655 a special medal for distinguished services; and Nicholas Haddock was an admiral in the British Navy in 1774. It is generally recognized that these positions of rank and distinction are open only to those of noble birth, or achievements which become grounds for such promotion.

Mrs. Hattie Cottingham McKinstry, a grandaughter of Robert Haddock, who has given some time to investigating the family history believes she has traced the family coat-of-arms, a fish (haddock) held aloft, as shown in the cut at the head of this account.

Reference has been made in these accounts to evidences of education and culture. I have assurances, both from correspondence and documents, that this was true of the Hargitts, and the photo-reproduction herewith of a letter of Thomas Haddock to his son Robert bears out to this extent the claim to excellent penmanship and composition, in themselves indicative of these claims.

Recalling the adage that "some are born great, some achieve greatness, and others have greatness thrust upon them." we may reflect that so far as may be predicated the Hargitt-Haddock fraternities are not known to have shared any marked distinctions of birth. There are no blazonries of royalty or knighthood, no favored scions of long drawn pedigrees paved the way to distinction or ease or wealth. Few among us have ever had insignia of greatness thrust upon us. If a Haddock so maneuvered his squadron as to win recognition for valor; if a Hargitt now and then won the honors of matriculant at Oxford University; if once upon a time a Jervis became worthy of an admiral's rank in the British Navy, or if in later times some descendants of these lines came to distinction in letters or art or science, we shall probably find that it was the greatness due to actual achievement, such as from time immemorial has revealed itself at the call of duty. Thus in even an aristocracy such as that of England have ever arisen great characters from among the Commons whose contributions have been no meager share of the sum total of Anglo-Saxon achievement. Of such were those great Pilgrim fathers whose glory of achievement we are celebrating in these months of their tercentenary, and it may not be amiss to remember that most of those daring folk were of the same sort of English Commoners as those in whose honor we are concerned. They too were pilgrims and pioneers. They did similar service in conquering the wilderness of Dearborn county; clearing the forests, driving out the wolf, the bear, the panther; converting the virgin soils of these hills and valleys of Tanners creek and Whitewater into fruitful farms and homesteads from which came the sturdy vigor of our immediate sires and grandsires. Into the fruits of their labors we have entered, and shared to our everlasting profit, if not of large wealth of goods surely in that finer wealth of high character and godly aims instilled about altars sacred to the best things in human life. Those who won for us these blessings are close of kin to those worthies of old who "wrought righteousness, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, put to flight the armies of the aliens," even as have in these recent years our brothers and sons in their high valor and splendid daring reaffirmed those principles of liberty and equality and righteousness written in undying lines in the American Constitution.

THE GIBSON FAMILY


THE first John Gibson to settle in Dearborn county, Ind., came from Pennsylvania, born August 26, 1765, died August 2, 1843. He was a Revolutionary soldier, a devout Christian, and with his sons founded the Presbyterian church at Bright.

The Rev. B. W. Chidlaw in the sermon preached at the funeral of George Gibson in 1887 said, "Over fifty years ago I found his grandparents, John and Nancy Gibson, pioneers in the wilderness of Dearborn county. Their log cabin was the house of Obed Edom of old, blessed because the Ark of God was there and his worship maintained, and they commanded their children to fear God and work righteousness."

"The venerated grandmother told me that her parents were religious and members of the Presbyterian church. Her early home was in New Jersey, not far from Princeton, and when the battle was fought near that place in 1778 her mother took her bedchamber and while the booming of the cannon could be heard she was engaged in prayer that God would preserve the lives of their kindred and friends and defeat the enemy."

He says again, "fifty years ago this same John Gibson accompanied me to Logan Cross Roads, where I established a union Sunday school, and held a preaching service. On our return as we rode through the woods the old Elder, who had greatly enjoyed the meeting, his soul overflowing with the love of Jesus as we talked on the way, abruptly said, Brother Chidlaw I want to thank God for his salvation. Let us dismount and have prayer. We knelt at a moss covered log and held our prayer meeting. It was a Bethel to my soul. As a young preacher my visits to his home were always a spiritual refreshment and an inspiration to preach Christ."

In many of the old homes in this neighborhood will be found a quaint old volume, published in 1858. This book, called Cotton's Keepsake, contains historical sketches of many of the early settlers. He mentions our family under the head of Wesley Chapel. He says, "John Gibson a Revolutionary soldier died here, and his lady at ninety is smart and active. Here is the residence of Reverend Thomas Hargitt, one of the most eminent local preachers in the county, to whom as to Robert Haddock, Daniel Cloud,







John Gibson and others I am greatly indebted for the interest taken in my book enterprise."

Before coming to Indiana while working in an iron mill at Pittsburg he lost the sight of one eye, caused by a piece of iron flying into it. Some time before his death, while trimming an apple tree a branch brushed the other eye, destroying the sight of that. So in his old age, made very helpless by being totally blind, it was the duty of his grandson (my father), John Baxter Gibson. to lead him about and care for him. In recognition of this service his grandfather left him a legacy of fifty dollars.

There is a tradition in the family that after John Gibson had lived in Indiana several years he walked to Pittsburg and back to collect some money which was due him. It is also said that he failed to collect this money. This pioneer Gibson came to Indiana with his family. How many children he had I do not know, but am sure of these: a daughter, Charlotte, who married a Mr. Shepherd and moved to Illinois: Charles Gibson who also went to Illinois: Whalen Gibson kept a store in a small town near Shelbyville, Indiana, and died there: Joshua Gibson lived and died at Elizabethtown, Ohio: John Gibson Jr., who married Ann Hargitt.

Ann Hargitt was twenty-seven years old when she came to America. It is said that before she left England she often jokingly said, "My husband is in America." Two years after her arrival in America she was married to John Gibson, Jr., August 28, 1823, by Rev. Thomas Hargitt, her brother. They lived and died on the old Gibson farm located a short distance from Bright. Here were born seven children, four sons and three daughters. The daughters were Elizabeth, who married William Mericle; Mary who married Lawson Cloud: Sarah, who married Abner B. Whipple. The four sons were George Hargitt, who married Nanev Disborough: John Baxter, who married Lucy Darling; Dennis Whalen, who married Jane Comingore: Thomas Hargitt, who married Ann Ewbank.

As will be noted, my grandmother named her oldest and youngest sons after the Hargitts signifying her pride in the family name. My father, John Baxter, was given the family name of John, and the middle name of Baxter, the mother loving the well known Baxter's Saints Rest, a book she greatly prized. When he left home to make his start in life she presented him in 1853 with a copy of this book which is now in my possession.

I brought with me a paper written by Ann Hargitt a short time before she left England and on the first page is copied the poem "Fare Thee Well," by Byron. We can imagine how the first two lines of this poem would appeal to her when she was expecting to leave her native land and go into a wilderness, with little prospect of ever seeing England again,

"Farewell, and if forever, Still forever, fare thee well."

Then she had gone to the churchyard and copied epitaphs from the tombstones of her friends. At the end of the paper she signs her name Ann Hargit, York, Feb. 28, 1819, after which she adds, "I wish I were going to a Methodist meeting, I am alone and very sad."

I could write pages about the noble character of my beloved grandmother, Ann Hargitt Gibson. I was a very young child when she died, but I have never heard any one speak of her except in words of greatest love and praise. I am proud too of those Gibson pioneers who founded Providence Church, and of those three generations of John Gibsons who lie buried in the Gibson cemetery, and am thankful to have come from such a people.

THE LYNAS FAMILY

Compiled by Mrs. Jennie Morgan Wait.

HE earliest records of the Lynas family, taken from the Parish Register of the abunds of Willy are as follows:

William Lynas and Hannah Milner, both of Upleatham, banns thrice published, were married May 8, 1731. Then follows a record of their children and children's children, down to the subject of our sketch, Joseph Lynas, who was born May 20th, 1792. His father died in January, 1793, when Joseph was but a babe. The latter grew to manhood in his home town and learned the trade of a cabinet maker.

In the year 1817 John Collier came to America on a prospecting tour. After spending some time in the locality of Tanner's Creek, he returned to England the same year. However, he had been so favorably impressed that he resolved to return to America for permanent residence. Through his encouraging reports a number of relatives and friends were induced to accompany him in 1819. Among these "friends" was Joseph Lynas. He was 27 years old when he left his home in England and started on his long journey. After a rough voyage of nine weeks in a sailing vessel he landed in New York, thence proceeded to Pittsburg and down the Ohio river by flatboat, arriving at Lawrenceburg and later making his way to the Tanner's Creek settlement where he located and began the life of a hardy pioneer. About 1825 he was married to Miss Sarah White, and a home was established on Mount Pleasant. To this union were born three daughters, Hannah, Mary Fisher, and Sarah. About the year 1832 the mother died, and the three children thus left motherless were received into the home of George Lynas, nephew of Joseph, residing near Dover, Indiana, Here they lived until the second marriage of their father some years later. Their girlhood days were fraught with the hardships and privations of pioneer life.

On February 5, 1846, Hannah the eldest daughter was married to Armitage Morgan. Their lives together for fifty-seven years were spent on what is still the homestead near Bright, Ind. To them were born six children. On February 28th, 1903 the husband at the age of 87 years, passed to the Great Beyond.

Thirteen years later Hannah followed her husband, at the age of 89 years, seventy of which had been spent on the farm to which she came as a bride.

September 8th, 1850, Mary F., the second daughter was married to Thomas Hargitt, Jr. and their wedded life for over twenty years was spent on the homestead near Bright, Ind., till her death on October 20th, 1870. To this union seven children were born most of whom grew to man and womanhood.

In November, 1858, the youngest daughter, Sarah, was married to G. W. Bunnell, of Miamitown, Ohio. Their brief wedded life of four years was spent here and to them were born three daughters, Florence, Louella, and Mary, two of whom still live. The husband and father died May 25th, 1873, aged 37 years.

In 1835 Joseph Lynas, the subject of the sketch, was married to Nancy Morgan, and to them were born four children. Enoch, Margaret, Joseph, Jr. and Jane. They grew to maturity near Bright on the home place.

On November 23, 1858, Enoch was married to Elizabeth Kuhn, and to this union were born seven children. They removed after some years residence near Logan, Ind., to Texas and shortly after to Kansas, where the final home was established, and where both parents died and are buried.

Margaret was married to George W. Ryan, and for a number of years lived in Indianapolis, where he earried on a thriving painting establishment. Mr. Ryan died and she later married Mr. Richard Bowles, of Harrison, Ohio, where they both lived and died, she at the age of 77, he at the age of 91 years.

Joseph, the younger son, married Josephine Kuhn in 1865, and to them were born five children. They lived in the neighborhood of Bright, Indiana. He died April 15, 1910, aged 70 years, and the mother died February 19, 1916. Jane, the youngest, married William Wormley, of Logan, Ind., where they lived for several years, later removing to Kansas, and still later to Oklahoma. Three children were born of this union.

Joseph Lynas, the subject of this sketch, died July 6th, 1874, aged 83 years. His descendants at this time number about 224, and are residents of Indiana, Ohio, Kansas, Oklahoma, Minnesota, Nebraska, Colorado, New Mexico, New York, Washington, Missouri, Alabama.

About the year 1823, encouraged by favorable reports from

his brother Joseph, James Lynas and family, consisting of wife and seven children, also of Upleatham, Yorkshire, sailed for America. The stormy voyage required twelve weeks. The wife and mother died in mid ocean and was buried at sea. After arrival at New York they made their way to Wheeling W. Va., and here they constructed a flatboat, and in it made their way down the Ohio river to Lawrenceburg, where they were met by Joseph and taken to the home he had prepared on Tanner's Creek. Here they grew to maturity under the father's care.

About the year 1838 two daughters, Mary and Hannah, and two sons, William and James, removed to Henry county, Ind., where later Mary married William Saunders, and Hannah married his brother, Needam Saunders.

George Lynas, another son of James Lynas, was married to Miss Lucinda White, by Rev. A. J. Cotton, and their home was established near Dover, Ind. To this union were born eight children. After a few years the family removed to Newcastle, Ind., and thence to Iowa, and finally to Columbus, Ohio where for many years George Lynas and sons were among the prominent mercantile firms of that city. The approximate number of descendants of James Lynas is 150.

PART II. GENEALOGY

- 1. THOMAS HARGITT; whose name heads this table, being the first and earliest clearly traced, was born in Yorkshire, England, about 1763. From data at command he seems to have been a man of energy, thrift, good education, of forceful character, and well esteemed. By vocation he was a farmer, and was possessed of some estate which he maintained in the new country, and bequeathed by will in due form recorded in the archives of Dearborn County. While a farmer by choice he was also a man capable of official position and held such at various times, as justice of the peace, some of his law documents being still owned by members of the family.
- 2. His wife, Elizabeth (Jarvis) Hargitt, was possessed of high character, courage, vigor of mind and body. She survived the husband by fifteen years, and conducted affairs with marked ability throughout her life.

Ann Hargitt, second daughter, born March 5, 1793, died March 16, 1864, came with the family to America in 1821. Elizabeth Hargitt, third daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth Hargitt, setting forth with the family to emigrate to America in 1821, was followed by her lover, Mathew Shaw, on horseback and was persuaded to return and become his wife. To them was born one son, Mathew, Jr. (21), who later came to America and was for a time a member of his grandfather's family. Later he married a worthy woman, Jane Liddle, to whom several children were born, but no data of their lives have been obtainable. Whether other children were born to the English parents is not known.

Thomas Hargitt, eldest son of Thomas and Elizabeth Hargitt, born April 13, 1798, was the first of the family to venture the voyage to a new country, which he did in 1820, landing in New York in June of that year. He made his way to Pittsburg, purchased a canoe and with a friend paddled down the Ohio river, landing at Lawrenceburg, Indiana. This voyage of young Hargitt was an adventure affording an index of the courage and enterprise which were characteristic of his early and active manhood. There is however a family tradition that young Thomas had encountered a parental protest and interdiction touching a youthful love affair which is said to have ended in the hasty leavetaking and voyage to a "far country."

But it was no later than November following that he found solace in marriage to Mrs. Ann (Mason) Sutton, a teacher of Hardentown, a village near Lawrenceburg. By her first marriage had been born a son, Charles Sutton, whose father had died during the voyage a year previous and reputed to have been buried at sea. She was a woman of fine character and courage, and shared a worthy part in the founding of the pioneer colony in Miller township some four years later. Children:

Robert Hargitt, second son of Thomas and Elizabeth Hargitt, came to America with the family in 1821. He was a man of fine parts, with the instincts of his English ancestry strongly marked. During the residence at Lawrenceburg he was married to

Miss Jane Palmer, daughter of Thomas and Sarah Palmer, of Lawrenceburg, Indiana, October 5, 1824. The Palmers had lived in Philadelphia, where he was an architect and shipbuilder. In the early years of the century the family set out for the West going by way of Painted Post, New York, where Jane Palmer was born.

Thence they went to Pittsburg, thence down the Ohio river by flatboat to Cincinnati, where they lived for some years, later removing to Lawrenceburg, where Mr. Palmer was for many years recording clerk of Dearborn County. Robert Hargitt and his bride settled with the family colony in Miller township on the paternal estate purchased by his father from the Federal Government, and here most if not all their children were born and reared, though later the family lived in Decatur County, Indiana, at Kingston, and still later removed to Hamilton, Ohio, where he was an influential citizen, both civil and religious, in politics a Democrat, in church a Presbyterian.
