"Food Prices Going Up"

Somebody said to me the other day "We don't know where we are going but we are on our way." I believe this is true. Things, are being done by our government in Washington that have never been done in the United States before and no man, from President Roosevelt down, is wise enough to say where it is all going to lead.

One thing is certain. For a time at least, all of us are going to have to pay a lot more for food and clothing and everything else that we buy, than we have had to pay for several years. The avowed purpose of the government is to raise prices of everything—farm crops, merchandise of every kind and wages for labor; especially wages for labor.

As this catalog is being written the efforts of President Roosevelt to boost prices all along the line has just started. No one can tell at this time how far this price rise is going. One thing is certain, however. With all the increased costs growing out of forced in-creases of wages for shorter hours of work, as well as higher prices paid the farmer for wheat, hogs, etc., food is going to cost a whole lot more by the time it reaches your merchant's store than it does now. You, as a food buyer will have to pay these extra costs on all the food you buy all the food you buy.

For three years all of our good folks here in the South have been urged to plant and grow all the food and feed stuffs needed for home use. This was wise. This was common sense, because the low prices which cotton, tobacco and other crops were selling for, left little or nothing to buy food with, even with low food prices.

Cotton has gone up, will probably go higher with acreage cuts. We will be stopped from growing these price breaking surpluses, as we have been doing. However, other things which we buy are

going under restriction and price raising and there is not one chance in a hundred that increase in cotton prices will match the increased food prices at your merchant's store.

There is one way, and only one way, for our folks here in the There is one way, and only one way, for our toks here in the South to beat this price raising game on food. That is to grow on home acres every pound of food for self and family, every pound of grain, hay and forage needed for your live stock. You need not bear this extra burden of increased cost of food unless you deliber-ately choose to, by failure to grow on your own place your food and feed needs. Pay no man a profit on what you, your family and live stock consume. Think this over.

Fall garden time and fall grain planting time is almost on us. Plan and prepare for both. You have plenty of ground for both and it costs nothing extra to have your garden particularly working 24 hours a day, 365 days in the year. Time and again we have been told during the past two years, "My garden has pulled me through these hard times."

Better cotton prices, and better prices for a lot of things are idently ahead of us. Whether those better prices are going to evidently ahead of us. Whether those better prices are going to put us in better position in a money way depends entirely on our using common horse sense in dealing with these new conditions which none of us have ever faced before. The man or woman who has bread and meat and vegetables of his own raising, is the only one sure to get any real benefit from highest prices. If you have to buy these things at the higher prices, you are no better off than before before

Start the fall garden now. It will pay better than ever before.



You should plant more Peas. Plantings especially during late summer, growing into cooler weather, should keep these Peas bearing much longer than from spring plantings. Peas do best with cool weather for maturity.

Culture For fall planting in the Central South, sow early in spring plantings. Peas do best with cool weather for maturity. **Culture** For fall planting in the Central South, sow early in tra early sorts, such as John L., throughout September to mature before frost. In Florida and along the Gulf Coast, sow during any of the fall months, October and November being preferable. Sow in drills, covering seed 2 to 3 inches deep, according to soil. To avoid the necessity of staking or brushing, plant the peas in double rows 6 to 8 inches apart, and when the vines get large enough run them together. WHEAT CULTURE

The best time to plant Wheat in the Southern States is from Detober 15 to December 15, giving the plants a chance to get a start before freezing weather. In early seeding, plant one bushel of seed per acre. After about November 15, it's better to use $1\frac{1}{4}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$ bushels per acre. Plant in drills, using the "open furrow" method, the same as for Oats. Wheat is easily grown in the South and much more of it should be planted.







HYACINTH BULBS

Culture Hyacinths do best in a rich, light loam but do well planting, set bedding bulbs 6 to 8 inches apart each way and 10 inches apart for the selected exhibition varieties. Cover each bulb about one and a half times its own depth.

For pot culture with the exhibition varieties the most beautiful spikes are made with only one bulb to each 5-inch pot or three or four in a larger pan. It is essential for blooming indoors that the growth be started in the dark. A frequent mistake is made by bring-ing the bulbs into the light too soon, resulting in a failure to bloom or weak spikes. Botted bulbs may be entrenched or heeled in the garden and cov-

Potted bulbs may be entrenched or heeled in the garden and covered with six inches of ashes or gravel for moisture and to prevent frost damage. A bed of ashes or graver for morstre and to prevent frost damage. A bed of ashes should be beneath the pots too, to keep out worms. They may also be kept dark and well watered in a cold-frame or cool cellar. Keep them dark for 12 weeks and then keep in low temperature (about 50 degrees) for 2 weeks until top growth is well developed. Then you may force them as rapidly as you want. You will have strong, compact spikes by keeping close to the glass or window and giving plenty of air. This extra care is worth while.
