Our Junior and Senior Prom was a wonderful affair. Our theme "An Evening in Outer Space" is one to be remembered, because we really enjoyed that evening in "Space."

G. Ennis.

Claudia Peacock and Geneva Bennett were honorary marshals to the graduating class of 1959.


