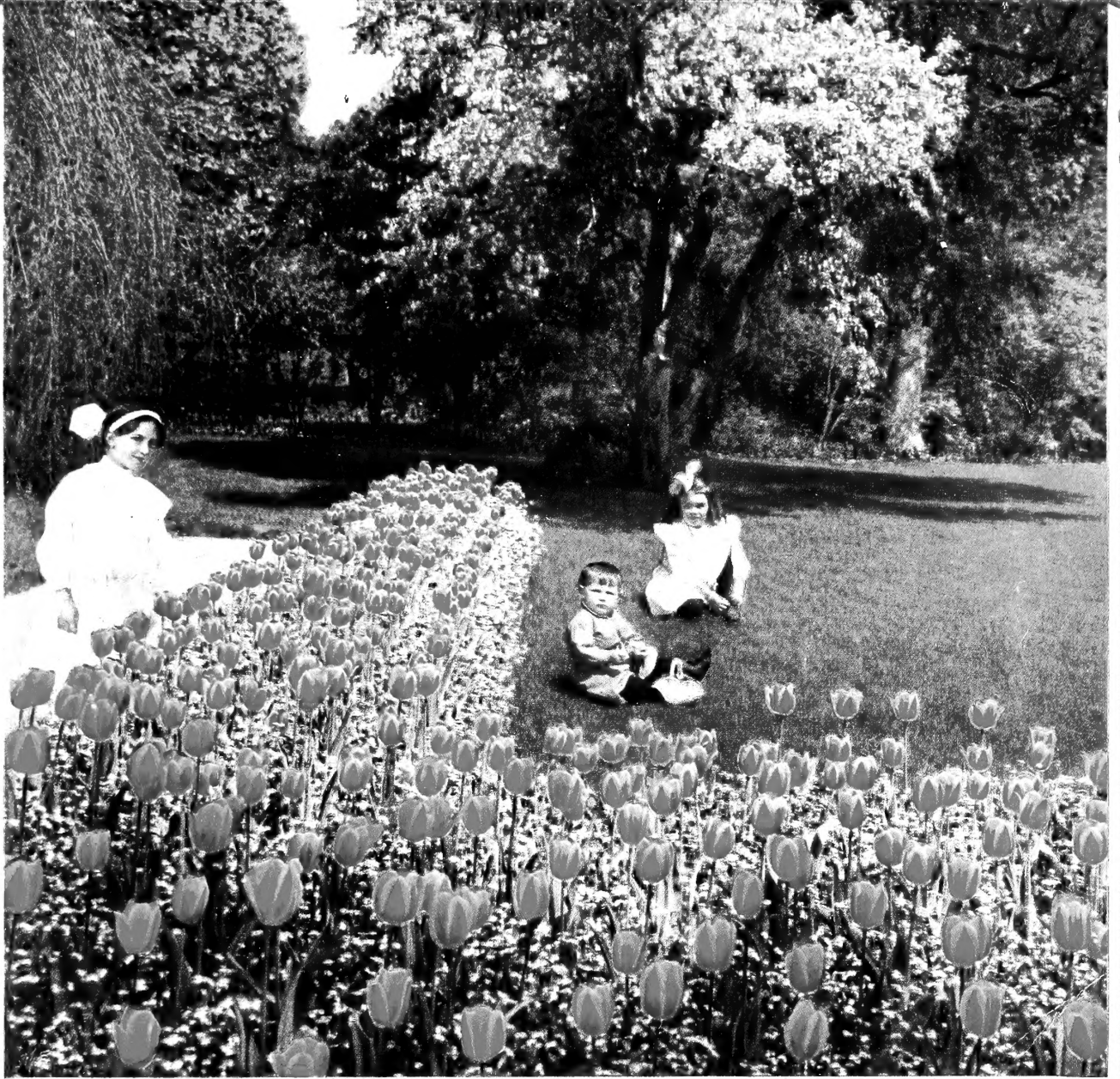

We insist—with a penalty attached—on being supplied with the same high-grade—true-to-name—varieties that the Europeans get, and we see that we get this superior grade by personally conducted trials. We have also excluded from our importations many decadent, obsolete varieties, and have added their more beautiful and strong-constituted successors.

Henderson's Flower Bulbs therefore cost a little more than the inferior grades frequently offered at little lower prices; but our customers will appreciate the difference in quality.

SPECIAL NOTICE

Bulbs and roots mature and ripen at different periods during the late summer and autumn, and shipments will be made as follows in the absence of contrary instructions.

Our August Shipment includes Lilioms candidum, formosum and Harrisii; Freesias; Roman and French Hyacinths; Paper-White and Roman Narcissi; Ornithogalum and Callas.

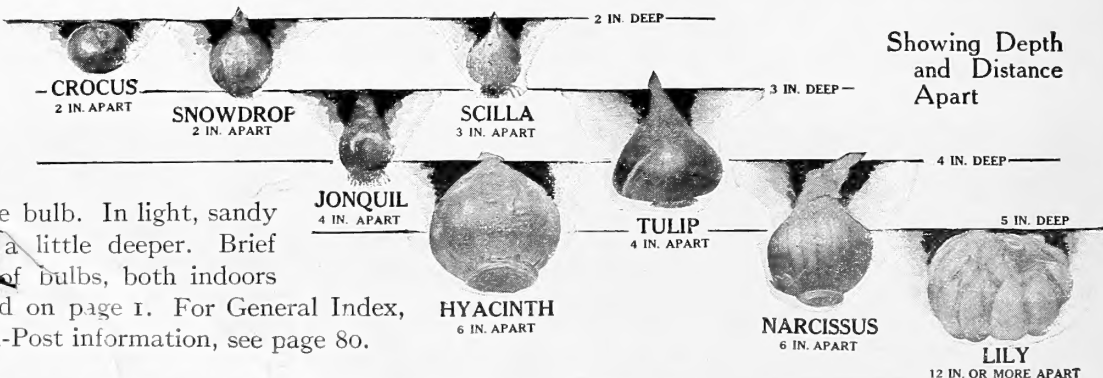
Our September Shipment includes the general line of Bulbs, such as Hyacinths, Tulips, Narcissi, Crocus, Iris, Peonies and most miscellaneous bulbs.

Our November Shipment includes Lily-of-the-Valley, Spirea, Gladiolus, Amaryllis, most Lilies, etc.

The ground is sometimes frozen by the time our November shipments are ready, but, if customers will have the ground covered where the late-maturing sorts are to be planted, with about 2 feet of dry leaves, straw or manure, to prevent freezing, the bulbs can be planted with safety when received.

PLANTING THE OUTDOOR BULBS

The diagram opposite shows the distance apart and the depth to plant the principal outdoor bulbs. The depths given are measured from the surface of the ground to the top of the bulb. In light, sandy soil they may be planted a little deeper. Brief directions for the culture of bulbs, both indoors and outdoors, will be found on page 1. 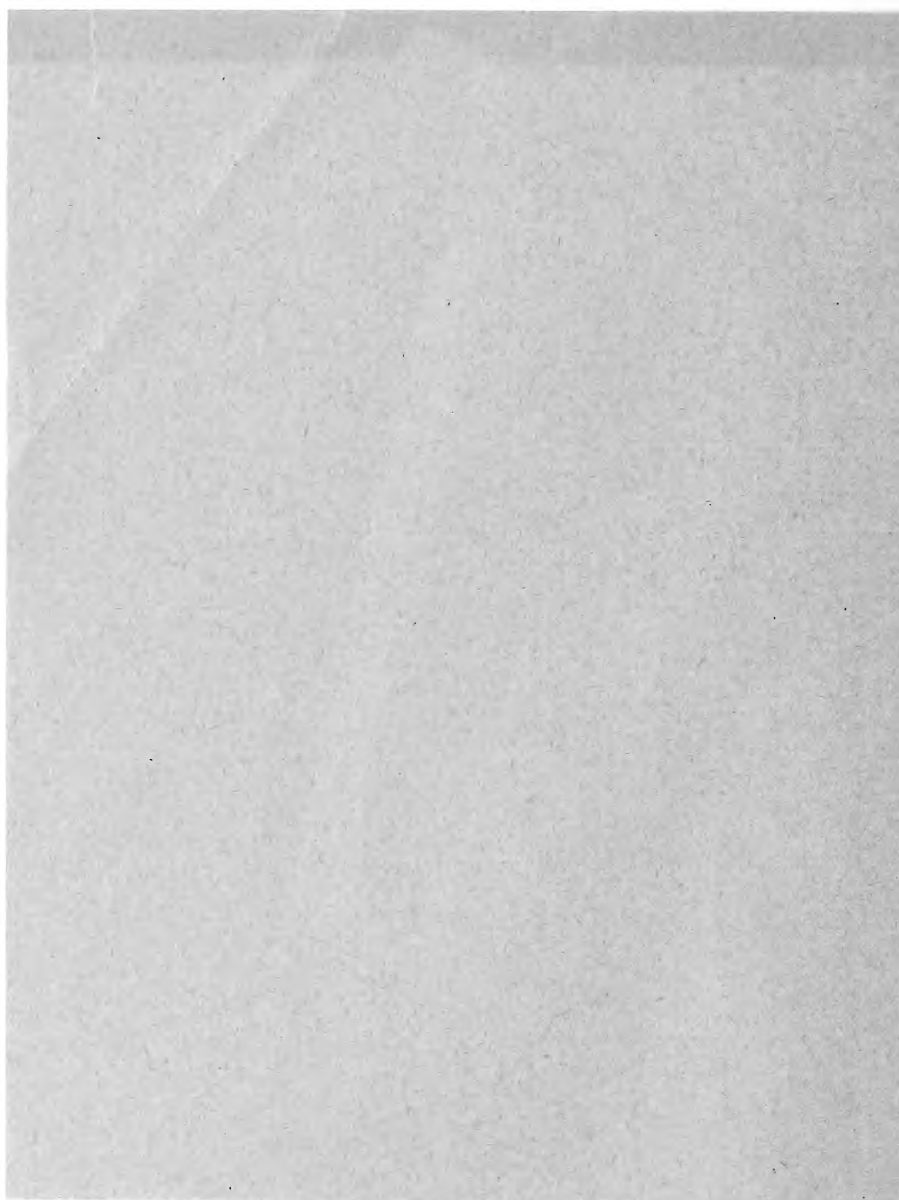

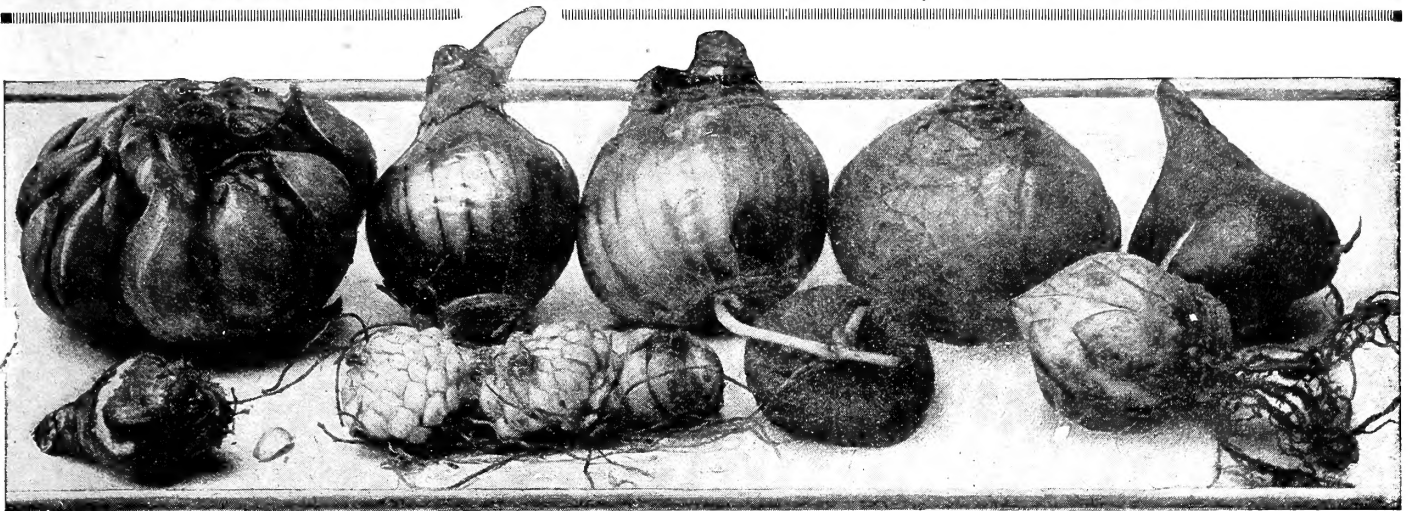

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HENDERSON'S FLOWER BULBS FOR AUTUMN PLANTING.

Bulbs (including corms, tubers, rhizomes and pips) are the thickened fleshy subterranean stem ends of bulbous plants. The true or feeding roots grow generally from the base of the bulbs; the stems, flowers and foliage from the crown of the bulb or eyes. A bulb therefore is a storehouse for the plant wherein is formed in embryo—after flowering—new leaves, stems and flowers in fact a complete new plant which is protected and sustained within the bulb by the reserve food and energy collected therein during one season for its successor's requirements during the next growing and flowering period. After which the old plant above the bulb and the roots beneath ripen off and die away. The bulb is then in a "dormant" condition during which period—lasting approximately from three to six months—bulbs are taken out of the ground and transported like so many potatoes easily and safely from Continent to Continent, if required, then replanted after which the incipient roots, stems, foliage and flowers develop with as much luxuriance and perfection—conditions being congenial—as if the bulb had remained in its original environment. This

explains why—and it should be remembered when buying bulbs—that you can only make them develop the flowers which were formed within them before they were ripened up. If a young small bulb of Hyacinth only contains six bells in embryo on its embryo stalk, or a Lily of the Valley pip only five bells on its incipient spike, or a Narcissus bulb only one flower, no one in flowering them can make them produce any more, though good culture will develop larger and better such flowers as the bulbs contained than poor culture. Consequently where perfection of bloom the first season is the desideratum, which is usually the case where bulbs are to be "forced" or flowered in the greenhouse or house, then the best bulbs only should be purchased, even if they are higher in price, for good bulbs produce like flowers, and poorer bulbs correspondingly fewer flowers.

The Glories of a Bulb Bed may be maintained Spring, Summer and Fall

BY PLANTING FOR SUCCESSION

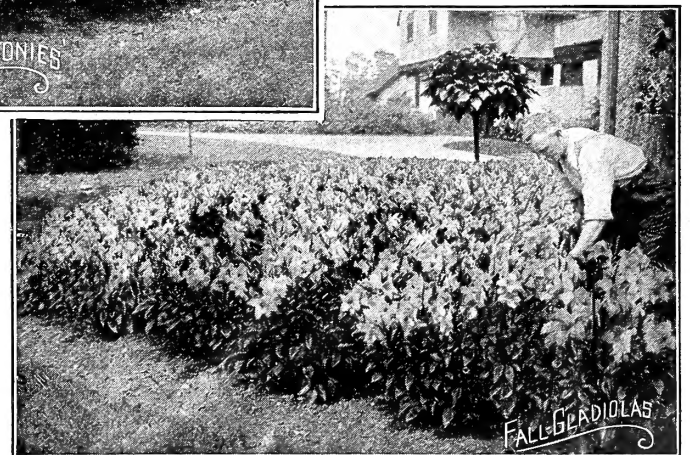
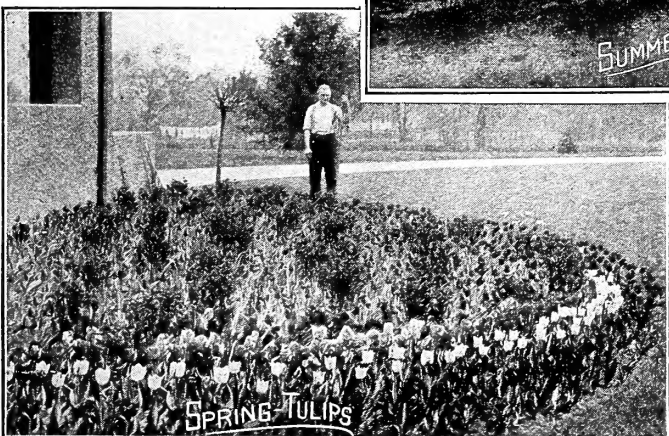
The three illustrations here shown are from photographs taken of the same bed last year. The tulips in April. The peonies in June and the gladiolus in September. The bed is permanently one of peonies planted three feet apart. Tulip bulbs were planted the previous fall in all spaces not occupied by the peony roots and produced a perfect sheet of bloom which had matured before the developing peony foliage grew above them. The tulip bulbs were then replaced in May with gladiolus bulbs which grew up through and flowered above the peony plants during August and September the peony foliage forming a splendid setting of greenery for the tall vividly colored spikes of gladiolus. Thus a glorious display of bloom was enjoyed Spring, Summer and Autumn.



BY PLANTING FOR SUCCESSION

Many possibilities for succession of bloom with flower bulbs, roots, etc. are suggested for instance daffodils or Darwin tulips for the Spring display could be planted among the peonies and for fall flowering tritomas would show well above the peony foliage. These associated together would form a bed of seasonal beauty lasting for several years without replanting.

HENDERSON'S PREPARED FIBRE (as offered on page 50) is an excellent modern medium in which to grow and flower bulbs during winter in bowls, jardineres, fern dishes, etc., without drainage. Always sweet, clean to handle, and no drip. It is the most charming way of growing bulbs in the house.



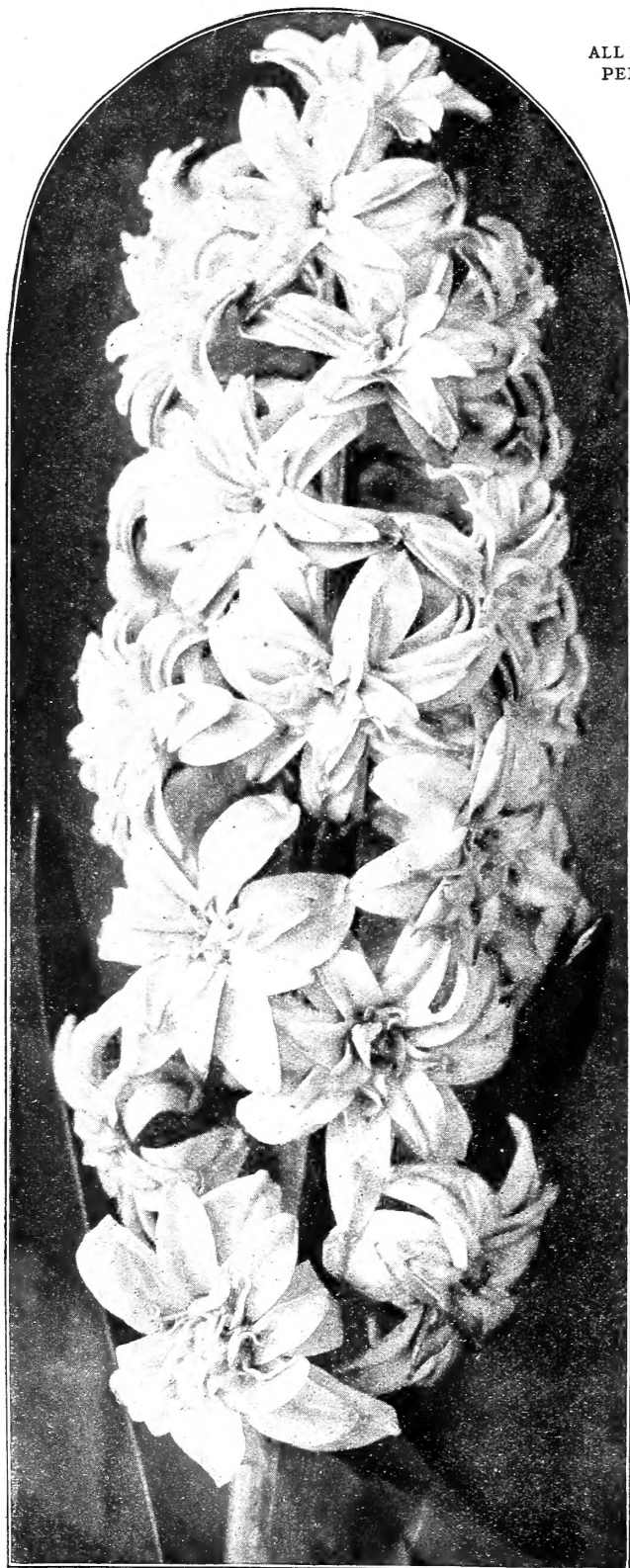

represent the pinnacle of perfection in hyacinth evolution; the newest, choicest and best productions of Holland's famous hyacinth breeders. They nearly all bear broad thick petalled giant bells on tall handsome well-filled round-topped spikes. The colorings are distinct and superb—some rich and glowing, others dainty and exquisite. We unreservedly recommend them to all who want some superlatively fine hyacinths for winter flowering in the house or for exhibition. The bulbs are all of "top-root" size which in Holland means the pick of the crop, bulbs in which are stored in embryo the maximum number of bells exactly as they are afterwards developed by the purchaser. All being fresh blooded hybrids or sports, they are naturally more healthy and robust than many of the degenerating old varieties and in consequence thrive and flower especially well when grown under artificial conditions either in pots or pans, in soil, or in bowls of Henderson's fibre (see page 50), or in glasses of water. Of course they are equally superior for garden culture where their higher cost can be afforded.

HENDERSON'S GRAND NEW HYACINTHS. In addition to their other superior merits the bulbs have all been ripened and matured by the recently discovered Holland method of treatment, *i.e.*, lifting the bulbs about two weeks before the usual time and storing them on sand, moss or peat in darkened "treating" houses where they are subjected to artificial heat of tropical intensity. It has been proven after several years of experimenting that the incipient flower buds which these bulbs contain develop in greater perfection, are much larger in size, are borne on taller, stronger spikes and come into flower much quicker than bulbs of the same varieties allowed to ripen the old way in the field.

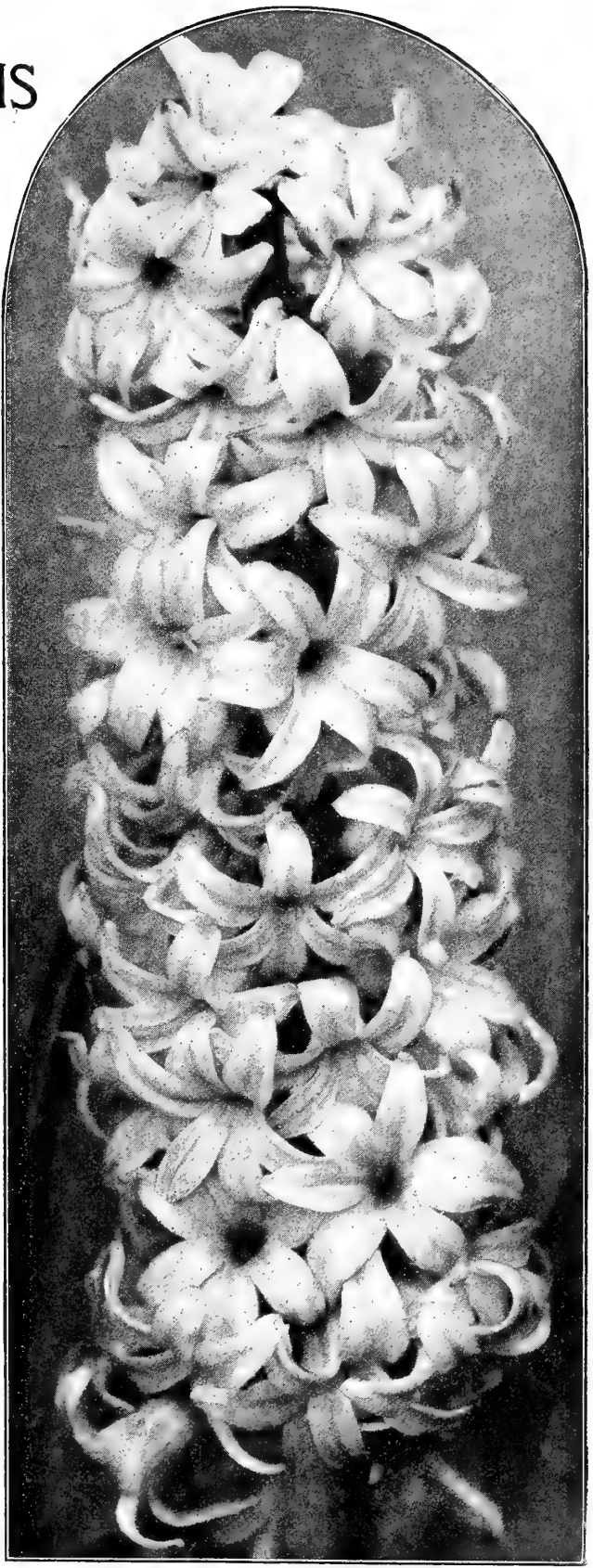

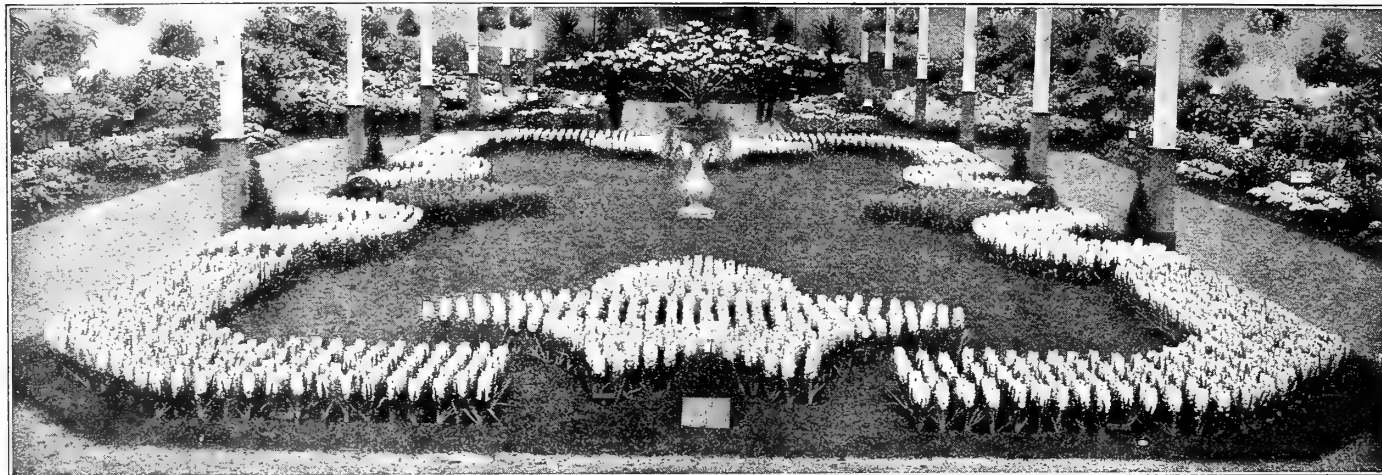

Hyacinths are among the most popular and satisfactory hardy flower bulbs grown. Their wax-like bell-formed flowers, borne in buxom trusses, are of matchless beauty and also delightfully fragrant. The colors, shades and tints are wonderfully varied, from purest white through blush, pink, rose, etc., to deepest red and from daintiest porcelain through blues to black purple, from cream through yellows to orange and rosy apricot, etc. Hyacinths succeed with every one and may be had in flower throughout the winter, grown either in pots of soil or glasses of water, or in bowls of Henderson's Prepared Fibre (see page 50), while for gardens or bedded on the lawn they are gorgeously effective when in flower during the spring. The bulbs of different varieties of hyacinths vary greatly in size and shape. Some making very large smooth bulbs, others smaller irregularly shaped bulbs. The latter, however, throw equally as fine trusses of bloom—sometimes better—than the larger bulbing varieties. In every case we send out the largest and best bulbs that the variety produces.

First size bulbs of named Hyacinths produce fine trusses of bloom, and should always be selected for specimens in pots or glasses, one bulb in a 5-inch pot or three bulbs in a 7-inch pot or six bulbs in an 8-inch pot or pan of soil or fibre are favorite ways of growing hyacinths for exhibition or for winter flowering in the house. We strongly advise, however, that only one variety be used for each pot or pan so the development from the different bulbs will be uniform and more effective. Of course "First Size" bulbs of hyacinths are equally superior for gardens and bedding. In selecting varieties of hyacinths for bedding in varied color effects sorts should be chosen that are of stocky growth, having stems sufficiently stout to hold the trusses of bloom upright. Varieties that flower at the same time must also be selected. Varieties prefixed with a * are especially suited for bedding as well as for pot culture. The figures 1, 2, 3, and 4, after the names of Hyacinths indicate the irrelative time of flowering—the 1's flower together and are the earliest, the 2's the following; No. 4 the latest.

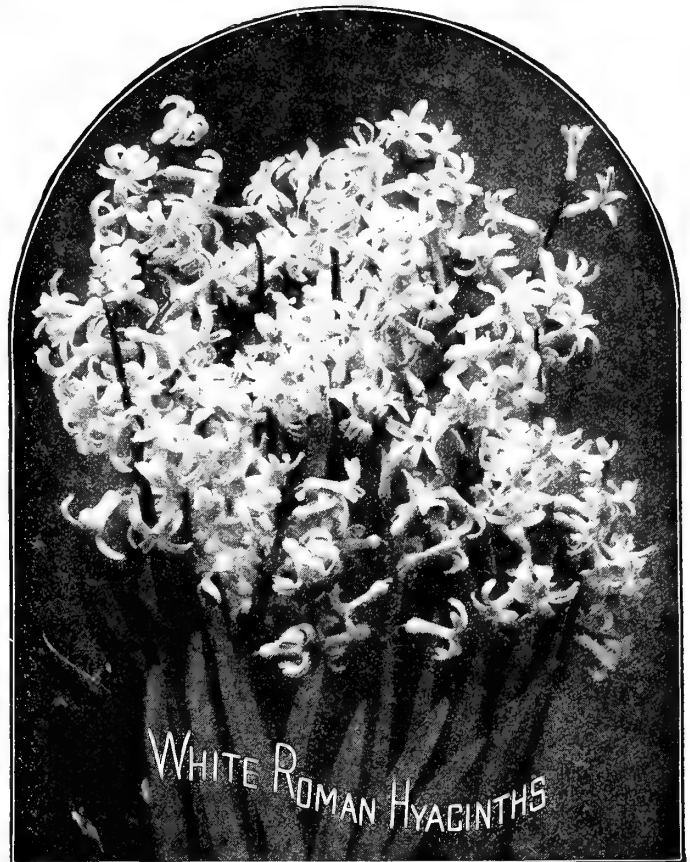


Early Roman Hyacinths.

Roman Hyacinths are exceedingly popular and invaluable for winter flowering in the house in pots or pans and are also extensively used for "forcing" for cut flowers. The flowers—smaller than those of the Dutch Hyacinths—are produced in graceful trusses and in greater profusion the larger bulbs throwing four or five spikes of bloom, the smaller bulbs two or three spikes each, and the flowers emit a delicate fragrance. The white Roman Hyacinth is the earliest, best and most floriferous variety, though the pink, rose and light blue are beautiful and supply a variation of color.

They are all easily grown in pots or pans of soil or in fibre. The bulbs—procurable from August to November—if potted in September, the pots plunged in the open ground for a month until the bulbs are well rooted, and then brought in the house can be had in flower in November or December, and from that time throughout the winter a continuous succession of these delightful flowers may be enjoyed by bringing in from the plunge or cellar a pot or two of the rooted bulbs at intervals of about two weeks. In planting in pots, pans or boxes, the bulbs are placed pretty close together—a five-in. pot being sufficient for 3 bulbs, a six-inch pot or pan for 6 bulbs, a seven-inch pot or pan for 8 bulbs. Roman Hyacinths are not hardy enough for open ground planting north of Washington, but where the winters are mild, especially if lightly protected with mulch they thrive excellently in the garden.

Roman Hyacinths as well as many other bulbs do wonderfully well when grown in Henderson's Prepared Fibre (offered on page 50). The advantage is that ornamental china bowls, fern dishes or other receptacles may be used without drainage holes so they may be placed anywhere when the bulbs are in bud and flower without danger of soiling carpet or furniture from drip. The Fibre is clean, remains sweet and is nicer to pot with than soil. It contains all of the plant food elements required by most bulbs, and retains an even moisture much longer than soil, so that the bulb's development is not so likely to be checked by "drying out" as often happens with bulbs grown in soil. 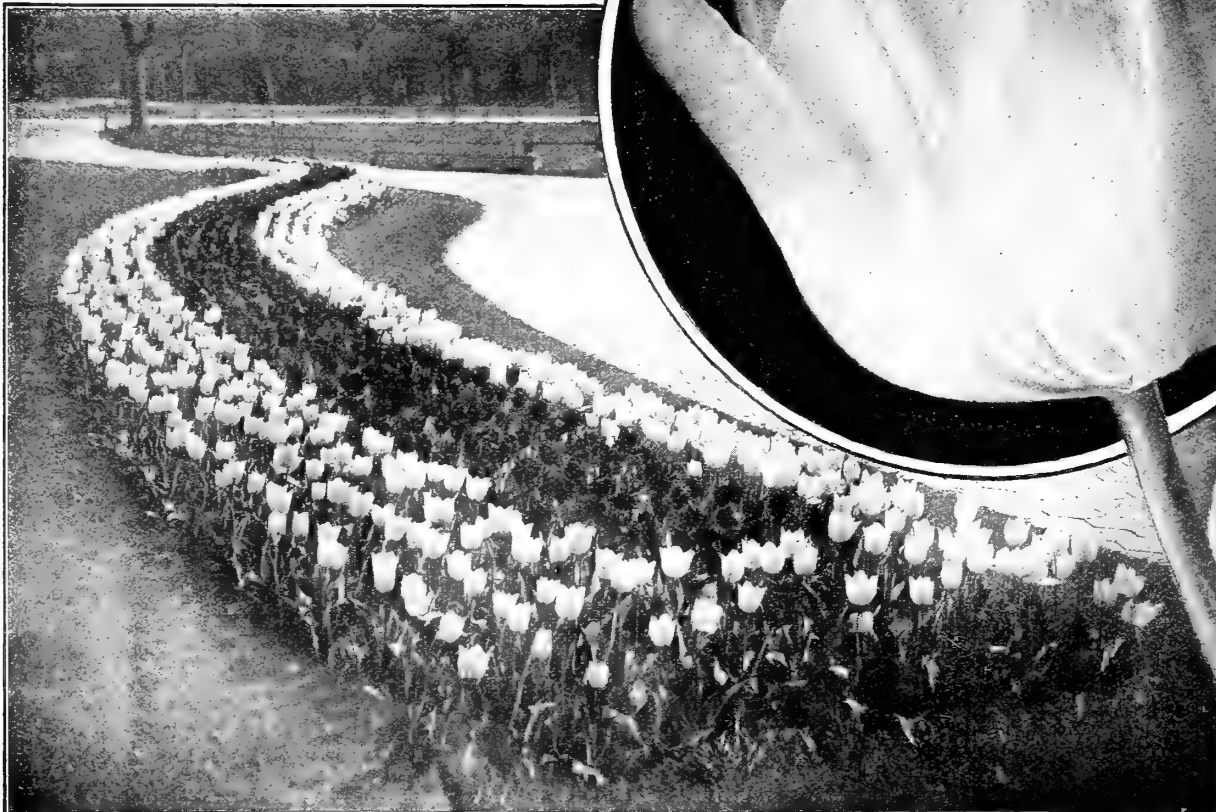
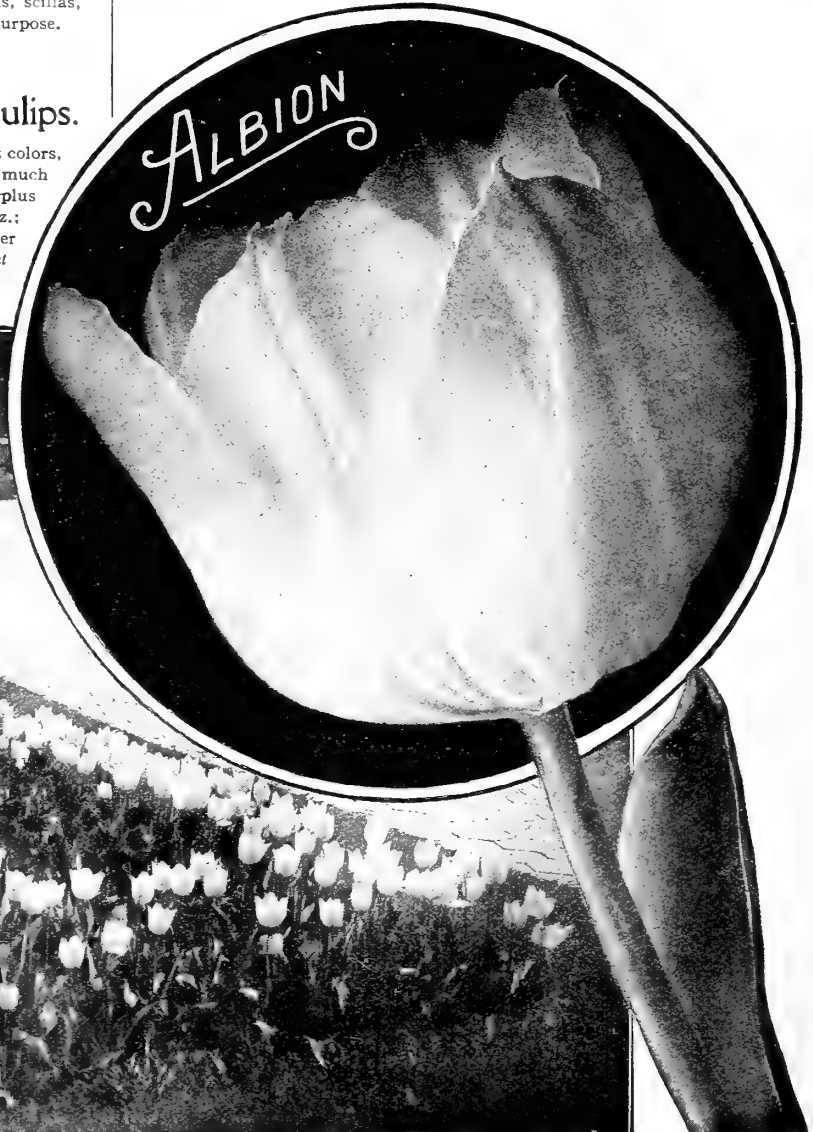

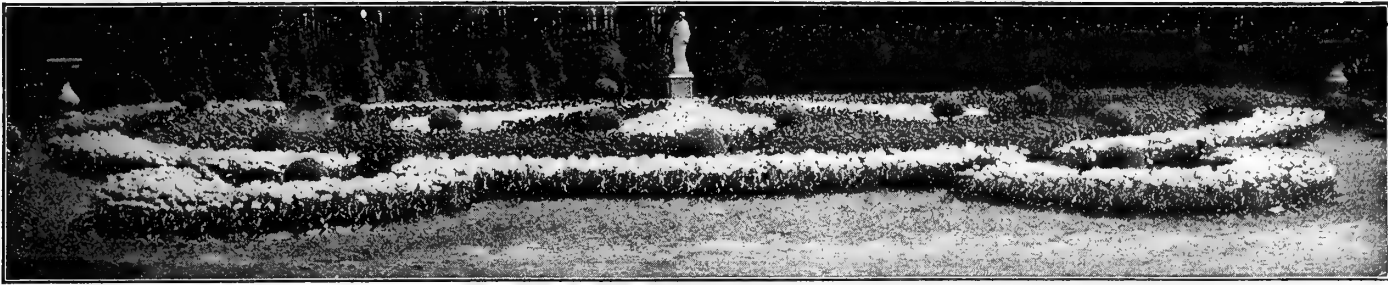

Tulip bulbs are planted 4 to 6 inches apart—the minimum distance for solid masses of color—the depth should be according to the soil in heavy soils 3 to 4 inches to the base of the bulbs and in light soils an inch or so deeper.

Tulips are also among our most valuable bulbous plants for winter flowering in the house or green house. The bulbs potted in the autumn and plunged in the open ground, cold frame or placed in a cool airy cellar, until rooted, requiring not less than 5 to 6 weeks for the earliest varieties and 7 to 10 weeks, for the later varieties, may then be brought into the house for flowering. By bringing in a few pots at intervals of 10 days or two weeks a succession of bloom may be maintained throughout the winter. A five-inch pot will take 3 or 4 bulbs, a six-inch pot 5 or 6 bulbs and a seven-inch pot or pan will take 7 or 8 bulbs. When "forced" in quantity for cut flowers the bulbs are placed nearly touching each other in shallow boxes of soil, then treated the same as potted bulbs. A very satisfactory and easy way of growing tulips in the house is in "Henderson's Prepared Fibre" (offered on page 50) with this china or glass bowls without drainage holes may be used instead of pots. The letters A, B, C, etc., following the varieties indicate their earliness of bloom, the A's flower together and are the earliest B's follow before the A's are out of bloom, etc. The height is indicated in inches to aid in arranging flower beds.

Double Tulips have massive flowers of brilliant and varied colors, shades and markings, and being double, the flowers last much longer in bloom than single varieties and, in consequence, when singles and doubles are planted in conjunction, the "time of the Tulips" is greatly prolonged. Double Tulips are beautifully adapted for beds on the lawn, in the garden, and for mingling in clumps of a dozen or more around the edges of shrubbery. When bedded it is generally advisable to use only one variety to a bed for best effect—though the following work well together: Boule de Neige (white). Imperator Rubrorum (scarlet). Crown of Gold (yellow). Salvator Rosa (pink).

Double Tulip bulbs are planted 5 to 6 inches apart—the minimum distance for solid mass of color—the depth should be according to the soil, in heavy soils 3 to 4 inches to the base of the bulbs and in light soils an inch or so deeper. The early sorts (those indicated by "A" or "B") do splendidly when grown in pots or pans of soil for winter blooming, but must be forced much slower than Single Early Tulips by keeping them cooler. Those marked "A" should not be forced into bloom before the middle of January, the "B's" before February and the "C's" before March. The bulbs are potted in the autumn and plunged in the open ground, cold frame or placed in a cool airy cellar, until rooted. By bringing in a few pots at intervals of 10 days or two weeks a succession of bloom may be maintained throughout the winter. A five-inch pot will take 3 or 4 bulbs, a six-inch pot 5 or 6 bulbs and a seven-inch pot or pan will take 7 or 8 bulbs. When "forced" in quantity for cut flowers the bulbs are placed nearly touching each other in shallow boxes of soil, then treated the same as potted bulbs.

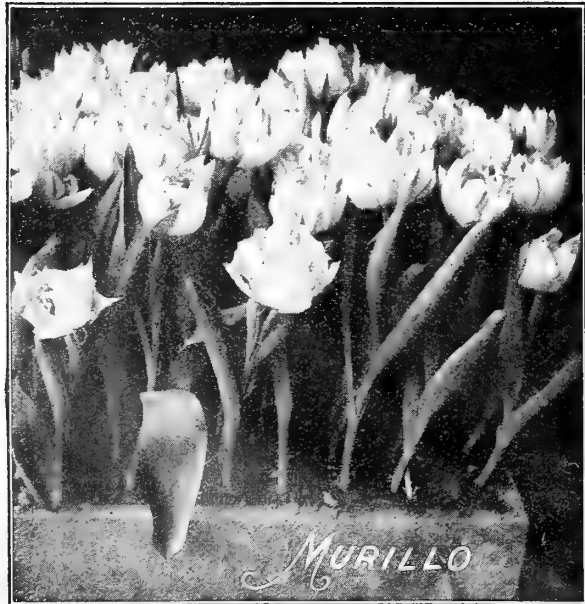

To aid in making selections of varieties for continuity of bloom, etc., we have indicated their relative time of flowering by the letters E, F, G, H and I. The E's being the earliest to bloom, just succeeding the latest of the early single and double Tulips offered on pages 10 to 16. The normal height is also

given but may vary according to soil, culture and location. The bulbs should be spaced about 5 inches apart and base of the bulbs should be 5 to 6 in. deep on heavy soils and 6 to 7 inches deep on light soils.

Darwin Tulips for Winter Flowering in Pots and Forcing: (See illustration page 19.) Darwin Tulips may be successfully flowered in pots or pans of soil or fibre in the house in winter if not brought in from the cold frame or out-door plunge before the middle of January and then grown on cool and slowly in a temperature of about 60°. The early flowering ones—those marked E, F and G—will then flower in February and March—the later ones requiring a little more time. Too much heat is apt to cause them to grow spindling and inferior. The varieties marked * are especially good for late winter flowering and forcing.

Hundreds of thousands of some varieties of Darwin Tulips are now forced into flower in winter by English florists for the London and other city flower markets, and find a ready and profitable sale, the demand for them increasing every year.

The Darwin Tulips comprising our collection—as offered on the succeeding pages—have been selected while in bloom at our own trial grounds as the best of their various colors and shades from hundreds of named varieties. The bulbs—all largest flowering size are imported by us direct from the Holland growers.

— LATE OR — MAY-FLOWERING “COTTAGE TULIPS.”

INCLUDING BEAUTIFUL NOVELTIES.

Cottage Tulips is a title given a large and varied class of late May flowering tulips, many of which were found growing in some of the old cottage gardens of England, Scotland, Ireland and France where in some cases they had been established for 50 years or more. Some through neglect and exhausted situations had dwindled in size, but their long life and perennial persistence in blooming attracted the attention of some tulip fanciers, who collected every kind available. These given proper cultivation soon regained their original size and have proven so beautiful that their renaissance is the cause of much enthusiasm among “tulipists” new “old varieties” being sought, discovered and added to the collection of Cottage Tulips almost every year, and are all very beautiful, presenting a great variety in form and coloring, and having none of the stiffness of other tulips. For cutting they are greatly prized on account of their long stems and graceful habit. Being extremely hardy they are specially adapted for permanent hardy flower borders, where they should be freely planted in large clumps and masses. They may also be naturalized in grass, wild gardens, etc., where during May they present a charming picture.

To aid in making selections of varieties for continuity of bloom, etc., the relative time of flowering is indicated by the letters E, F, G, H and I. Those marked E being the earliest—just following the C's and D's—of the early single and double tulips offered on the preceding pages. Those marked H and I are the latest to bloom. The normal height is also given in inches but may vary according to soils, culture and location. In planting, the bulbs should be placed about 5 inches apart and the bottom of the bulb should be 6 to 7 inches below the surface in light soils and 5 to 6 inches deep in heavy soils. If planted too shallow some may come blind.

Cottage Tulips may also be grown in pots or pans of soil or fibre and flowered late in the winter, but they must not be brought in from the cold frame or out-door plunge before January and then be grown on cool and slowly—they are impatient of too much heat which is apt to cause the buds to blast or the stems to grow weak and crooked—a temperature not exceeding 55° to 60° until the buds are well developed is conducive to best results.

The earlier varieties—those marked E and F can be brought into flower in from 4 to 6 weeks after being brought in the house—the later sorts will require a little longer. The varieties marked * are especially good for winter-flowering and forcing.

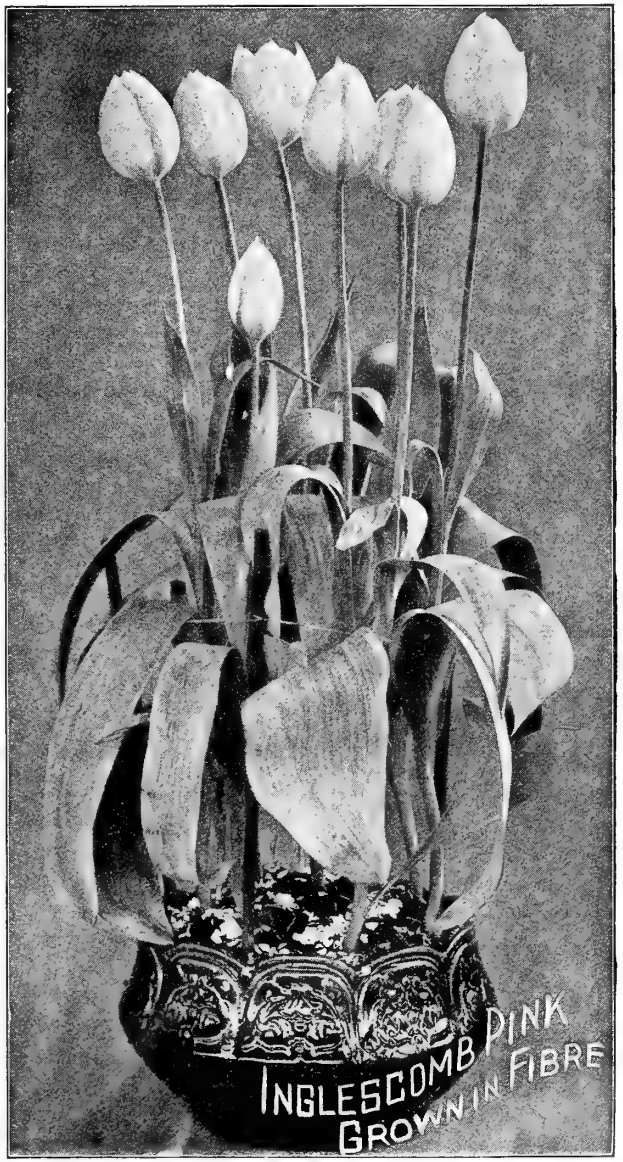

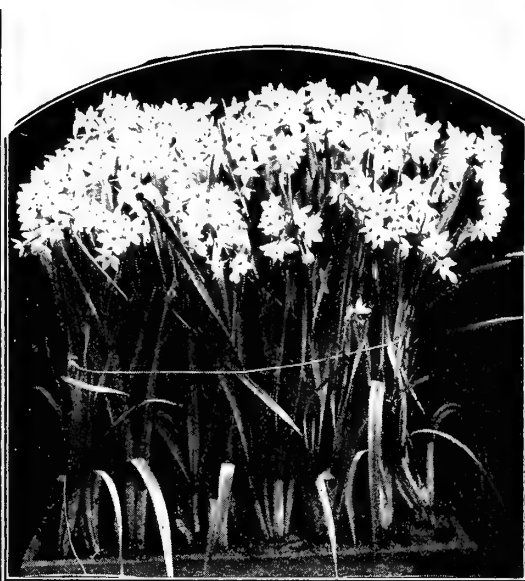

NARCISSUS, DAFFODILS AND JONQUILS.

Among spring flowering bulbous plants the narcissus family—which includes Daffodils and Jonquils—is one of the most important and of world-wide popularity. The recent wonderful creations in the way of new varieties having awakened a new interest amounting to enthusiasm with flower lovers. With the exception of the Polyanthus varieties (offered on page 30) all are as hardy as rocks, grow, increase and flower year after year.

They may be grown in garden beds, among hardy plants in herbaceous borders, or "naturalized," that is, grown as if wild in outlying portions of the lawn or grounds, on terraced slopes, stream side banks and along semi-shaded paths. The flowers of the different types are of endless beauty and graceful forms with a variety of color combinations and many are delightfully fragrant.

The early sorts commence blooming in March, some in favored locations even in February. Their waving masses of silver and gold are not only enchantingly beautiful but doubly welcome appearing as they do just after bleak winter. With a selection of mid-season and late flowering kinds an endless succession of bloom may be enjoyed well into May. As cut flowers Narcissus are especially useful being of lasting quality and vasing beautifully.

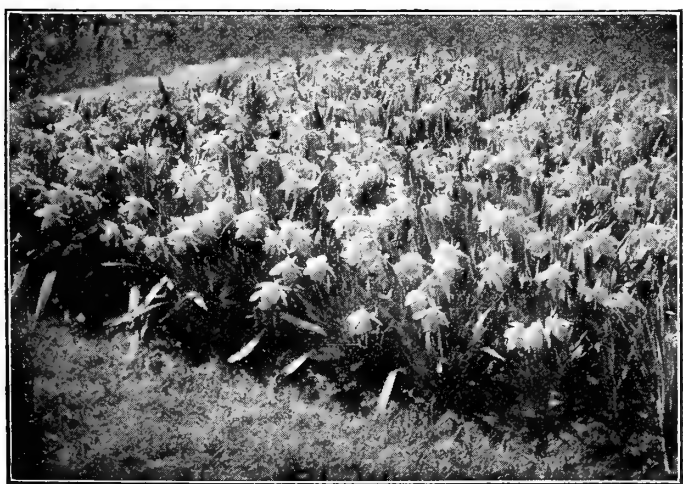
Narcissus and Daffodils thrive in all ordinary garden soils but grow and flower most luxuriantly in deep moist loam and if they can be grouped in the partial shade furnished in the hardy border of shrubs and herbaceous plants the conditions will be ideal. The bulbs should be planted as early as convenient in the autumn for the longer time they have to make root growth before winter sets in the better the flowers the succeeding spring—though we have planted bulbs as late as December with satisfactory results. The bulbs may be left undisturbed for several years on good loamy soils. The depth to plant varies according to the size of the bulbs—a covering of 2 to 3 inches of soil is about the average—a good rule is to cover the bulb once and half its own depth. On light sandy soils plant deeper than on heavy soil. The distance apart should be 3 to 6 inches according to the size of the variety.

But Narcissus and Daffodils are not only valuable for open ground cultivation they are equally as important for winter flowering in the green house or window being grown in pots, pans and flats of soil or in bowls of fibre. For winter flowering the bulbs should be potted as early as possible in the autumn (for all Narcissus are impatient to start root growth) then the pots should be plunged on a layer of ashes in a frame or trench in the open ground where water will not settle, cover with leaf mould, soil, tanbark or similar material. No watering will be required unless it should be an unusually dry fall, or the potted bulbs may be placed in a cool airy cellar or out house and be covered in the same way, but here an occasional watering may be required for the soil must not dry out after the roots have started. The potted bulbs of most Narcissus should remain in the plunge for not less than 12 weeks, though some of the earlier flowering sorts—those marked 1 and 2—may be well rooted a couple of weeks sooner. The Polyanthus varieties are usually ready in 8 weeks and the Paper White and Double Roman in 5 to 6 weeks. As long as left in the plunge the bulbs will make but little top growth, advantage is taken of this and by bringing into the house a few pots at intervals of 10 to 14 days a succession of blooming Narcissus may be enjoyed from Christmas throughout the winter.

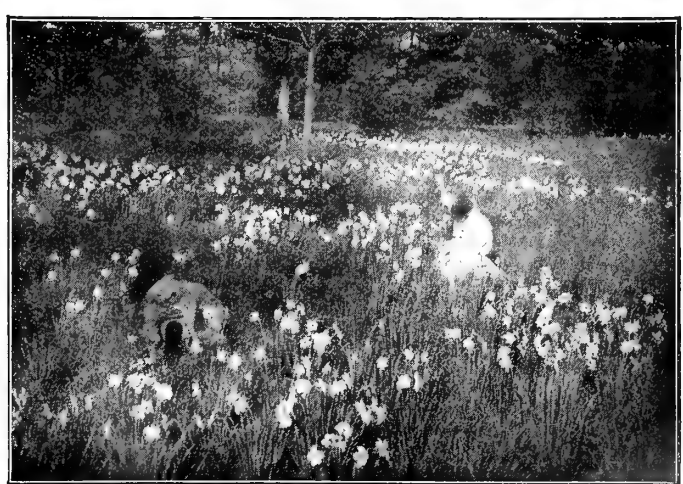
Always grow Narcissus cool for too much heat is detrimental. A light store room with a temperature not exceeding 50° is advised for a couple of weeks after the bulbs are taken from the plunge then remove to where they are to be flowered where 60° will be ideal and more than 70° is to be deplored.

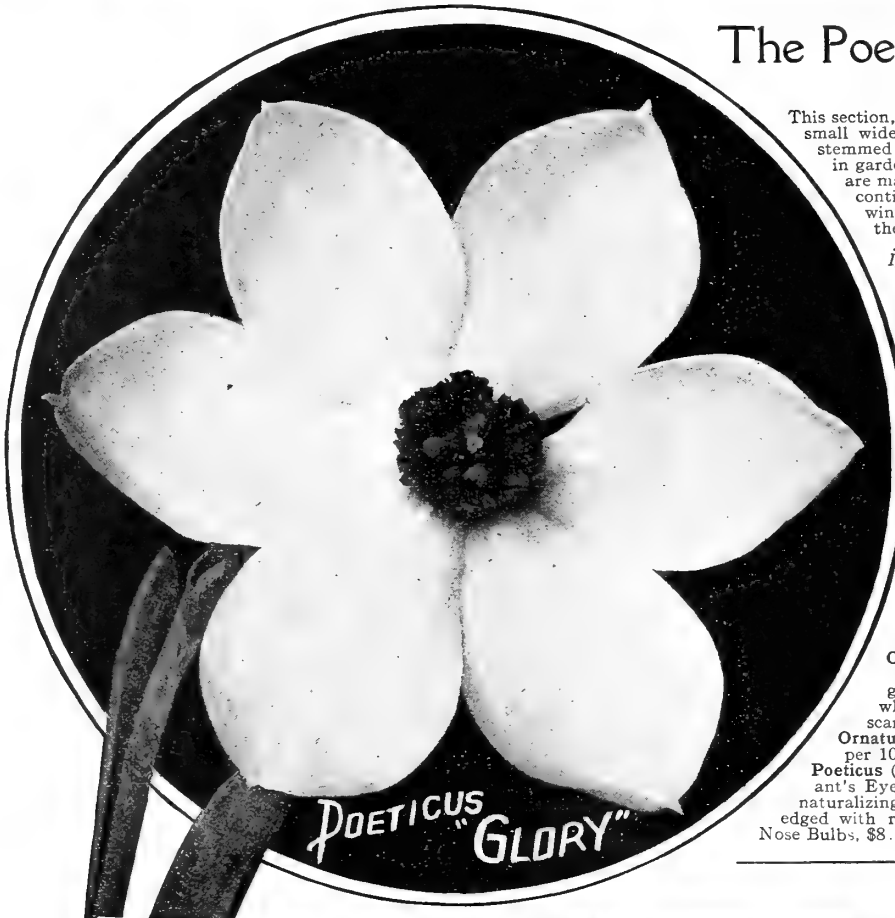

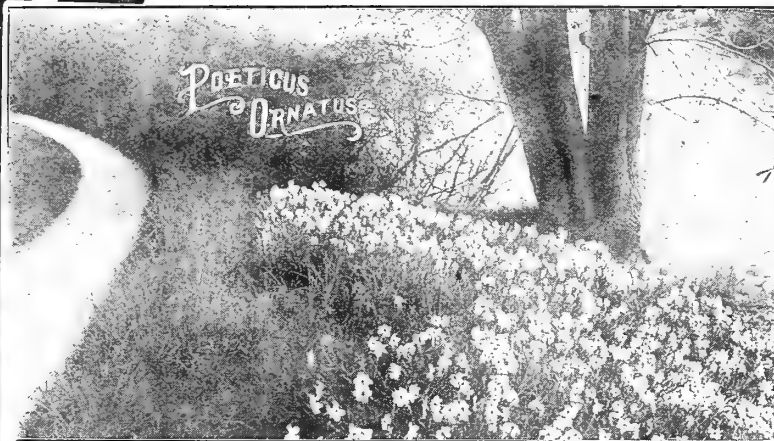
NARCISSUS POETICUS.

This section, *Narcissus Poeticus*, has instead of a trumpet or crown a small wide mouthed cup. All are hardy as rocks, producing long stemmed fragrant flowers that are prized for cutting. They thrive in gardens, and for naturalizing in grass or semi-wild places they are magnificent; by mixing the early and late flowering sorts a continuous display of bloom may be enjoyed for weeks. For winter flowering in pots or bowls of fibre (see page 5) select the earlier varieties and grow on cool and slow.

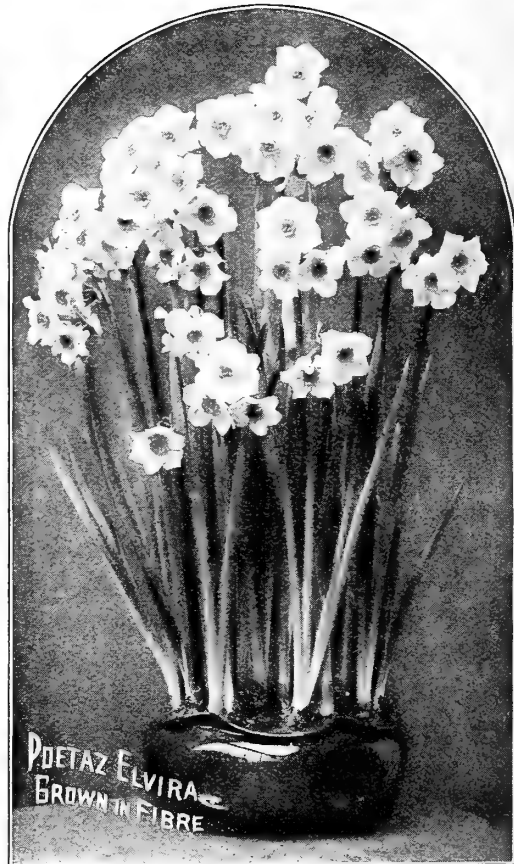

POLYANTHUS NARCISSUS.

The *Polyanthus* varieties of *Narcissus* are not only beautiful but deliciously sweet scented, and of the easiest culture, very free flowering and continuing in long bloom. Their tall spikes of bloom bear from six to one dozen flowers each. The pure white petals and gold cups of some varieties, the yellow with deep orange cups of others and the self whites and yellows render them great favorites. They are not quite so hardy as the other types of *Narcissus*, and therefore should be carefully protected in cold climate when grown in the garden. South of the freezing belt they are splendid for gardens and "naturalize" well.

For growing in pots or pans of soil or bowls of Henderson's Prepared Fibre (see page 50), they are especially adapted and can be had in flower in the house from Christmas throughout the winter by bringing the pots of rooted bulbs in from the frame or cellar every week or two.

The "Shui Sin Far" or Water Fairy Flower, Jos Flower or Flower of the Gods, etc., as it is called by the Celestials, is a variety of *Narcissus*, bearing in profusion chaste flowers of silvery-white, with golden-yellow cups. They are of exquisite beauty and entrancing perfume.

The bulbs, of large size and great vitality, are of luxuriant growth, producing several spikes of flowers; the incredibly short time required to bring bulbs into bloom (four to six weeks after planting) is one of the wonders of nature. "You can almost see them grow," succeeding almost everywhere and with everybody. They do well in pots of earth, but are more novel and beautiful grown in shallow bowls of water, with enough fancy pebbles to prevent them from toppling over when in bloom. A dozen bulbs started at intervals will give a succession of flowers throughout the winter.

Spring - Flowering CROCUS.

INCLUDING NEW HYBRID VARIETIES.

Crocus will always be popular on account of their earliness of bloom, hardiness and adaptability to most soils in sunny situations as in the sod, on grassy slopes in the lawn, garden border, stream side banks, etc. If planted with liberality their masses of color, white, blue, yellow, purple, striped etc. are very cheery and welcome—appearing as harbingers of spring almost before the snow has disappeared. When "naturalized" in grass the bulbs should be planted in irregular colonies or masses the bulbs being strewn by hand to fall thickly in some places then dibble them in where they fall when the turf is moist and soft.

As undergrowth among tulips, hyacinths, daffodils etc., they are very effective—the flowers being over when the other bulbs begin blooming, thus lengthening the floral display and then the crocus foliage forms a beautiful grass like setting for the later flowering bulbs.

As edgings to beds—and bordering walks—lines of different colored crocus are most effective. The bulbs should be planted about 1 inch apart and 2 inches deep. As a new bulb (corm) is formed each year above the old one, which withers away, the Crocus therefore eventually works to the surface of the ground and must be taken up and replanted every few years.

Crocus are also easily flowered in the house in winter, grown in pots and pans of soil or in dishes or shallow bowls of "Henderson's Prepared Fibre" (offered on page 50) plant the bulbs thickly, almost touching one another and plunge the pots or bowls in the open ground or in frames in ashes, soil or sand up to the rims only. When well rooted removed from the plunge, place in any airy situation, and give water very freely at the roots. They should be kept in any airy room without a fire, where gas is seldom burnt and where they can get plenty of light. When the bulbs are coming into bloom they may be brought into the sitting-room.

We have discontinued offering the cheap mixtures of Crocus as the larger bulbs—at but little higher price—produce more and larger flowers.

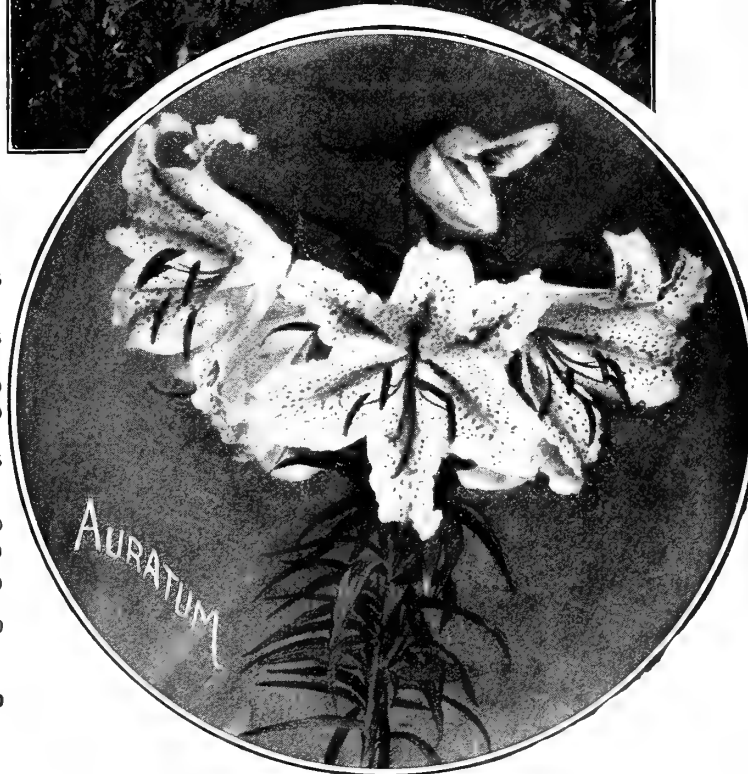
LILIES

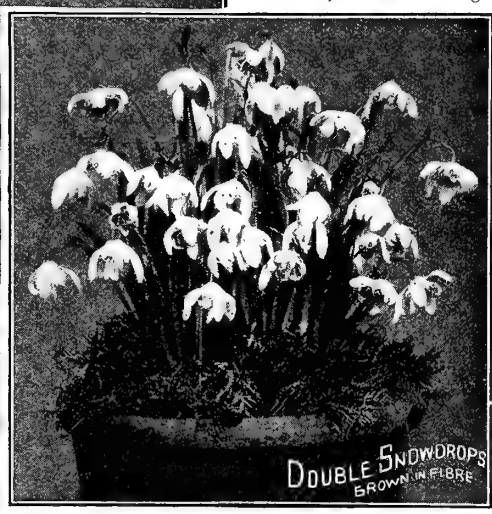

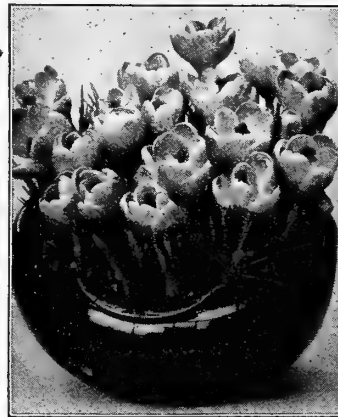

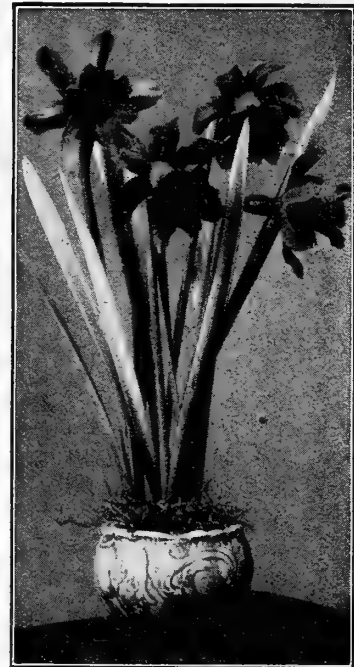

For fern dishes, hanging baskets, window boxes and most potted plants for house decoration during the winter it is a boon for it does not "dry out" as quickly as soil nor will it get water logged nor sour if too much water be given and it does not harbor insects nor worms. It is light, clean, nice to handle, odorless, always remains sweet and if used as directed it retains just the right amount of moisture to encourage healthy, luxuriant growth and perfection of bloom.

But perhaps the crowning merit of Henderson's Prepared Fibre is the charming effect produced by bulbs flowering in fancy bowls, fern dishes, small jardineres or other receptacles without drainage holes in the bottom so they can be placed anywhere without danger of soiling anything from drip. One lady sends us photographs, one showing "Paper white" narcissus fibre grown in a glass jar. She says "I like to watch the root development" the other photo shows a splendid hyacinth in a fancy teapot. Showing that almost anything may be utilized for the purpose though we can furnish special Bulb Bowls if desired as offered on the opposite page.

Almost any of the spring flowering bulbs may be grown in Henderson's Prepared Fibre but we specially recommend Roman, Dutch and Grape hyacinths. Early flowering tulips, narcissus, jonquils, lily of the valley pips after ripened by frost or cold storage. Crocus, chionodoxas, callas, freesias, spiraeas, scillas, snowdrops, allium neapolitanum, spanish iris, etc.

Success in flowering bulbs in fibre, however, as in soil, depends upon proper treatment, *i.e.*, fill the vase or bowl to a little below the rim with moistened fibre—not so wet that water can be squeezed out—plant the bulbs in it, the

tops just showing above the surface. Do not press the bulbs down too firmly or they may be forced up when they commence to throw out roots. The bulbs may be spaced so they almost touch. After planting, which should be done soon after the bulbs are received, they should be placed to make roots in a dark cool airy place as a cellar, outhouse or cool garret, not in a confined closet. It requires about 8 weeks to develop the root system sufficiently to produce best flowers. The fibre must be kept moist all the time, but not sodden, particularly before the bulbs have made enough root growth to absorb the moisture. If too much water by accident be given, tip the bowls on their side and drain it off.

Where garden space or cold frames are available the following method of caring for the bulbs while making roots is less troublesome and furnishes more desirable and uniform conditions, *i.e.*, place the potted bulbs in a trench or cold frame and cover them over 3 or 4 inches deep with soil, ashes, leaf mould or similar material. If exposed to the autumn rains no further attention need be given to the moisture problem, but if not exposed to the weather the bowls should be examined twice a week and the fibre kept uniformly damp.

When the bulbs have rooted and made some top growth they may be taken into the house to develop foliage and flowers; by taking them in at intervals of ten days or two weeks a succession of bloom may be enjoyed throughout the winter if a sufficient number be provided. When removed to the house place near the light in a cool room free from drying furnace heat. A temperature of 50° to 60° produces the best flowers.

Growing bulbs in Henderson's Prepared Fibre is an easy and most interesting method and the effect when in flower is charming.

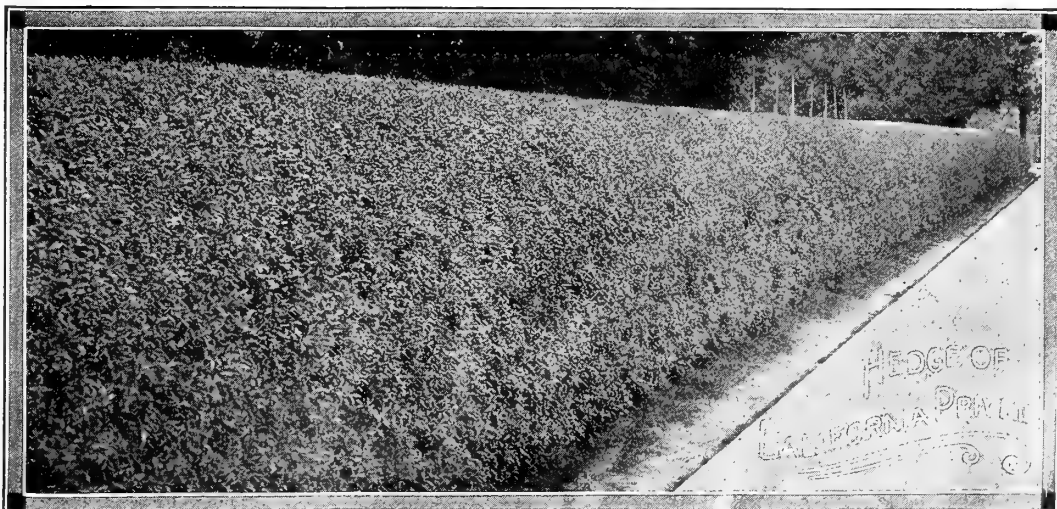

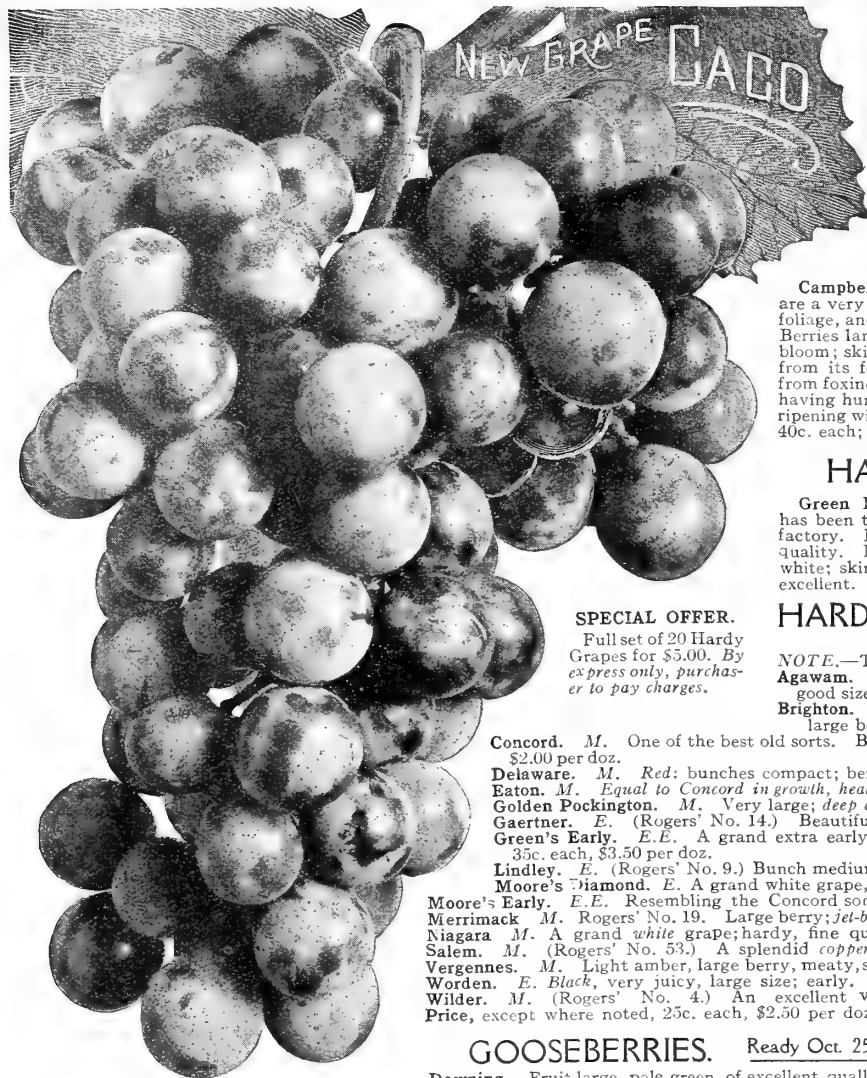

IN THE SOUTH AND WHERE WINTERS ARE MILD, SWEET PEAS DO BEST WHEN SOWN IN THE FALL.

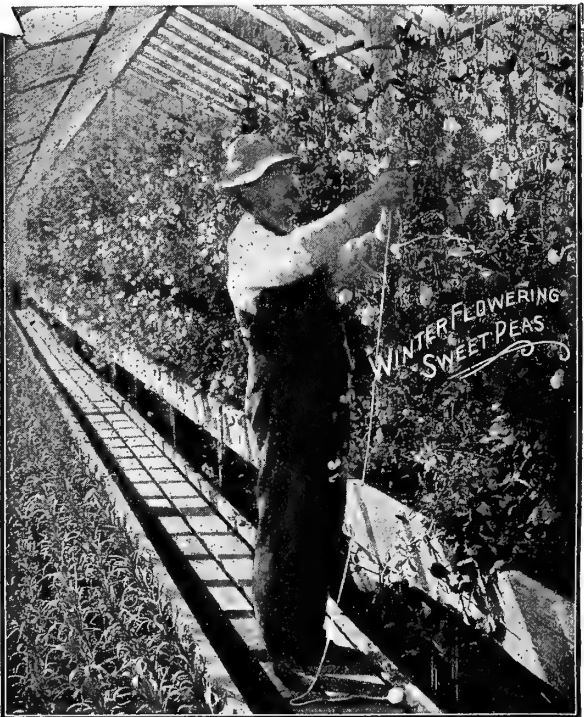
The sweet pea is a cool weather loving plant and therefore for best results in the South, on the Pacific Coast and in other mild winter localities, the seeds should be sown in the fall or early winter. Even in the North the sowing of Sweet Peas in the fall is growing in popularity. When they are successfully carried through the winter they commence flowering much earlier and are larger, finer and more continuous bloomers than from spring sown seeds particularly when summer weather turns out hot and dry. The reason is that the plants from fall sown seeds develop a much better root system and therefore are less susceptible to uncongential conditions. Sweet Peas sown in the fall should be in raised beds or banked up if in rows so water will not stagnate around them as it might cause them to rot and the seeds should be put in late enough so the seedlings will not get above ground—yet early enough so the seeds will germinate which will require about 2 weeks. After the ground has a thin frozen crust then protect with a 6-inch mulch of straw, hay, leaves or similar material.

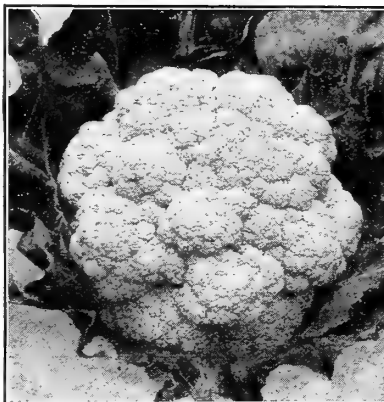

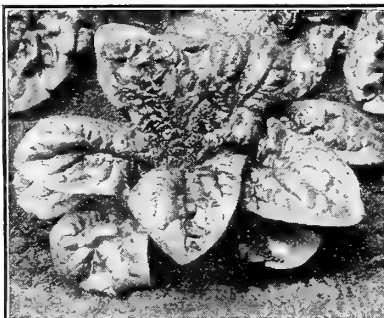

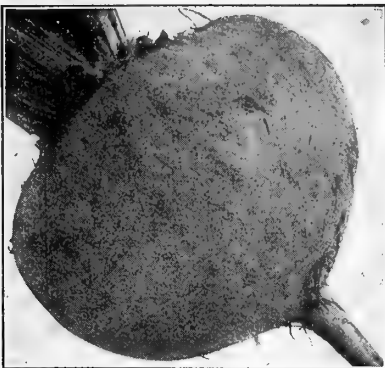

CLOVERS. FOR FALL SOWING.

CRIMSON OR SCARLET. (*Trifolium Incarnatum.*) The most valuable plant for restoring the fertility of worn-out soils. All lands from which crops have been harvested during the summer and fall should be sown with Scarlet Clover for plowing under the following spring. Plowing under a good crop of Scarlet Clover is equivalent to 20 tons of stable manure per acre, and even if the Clover be harvested or pastured, the benefits derived from the wonderful nitrogenous root formation will alone many times repay the cost. It is the cheapest source of nitrogen, and has restored to profitable cultivation thousands of acres of poor land. Its value as a winter soil mulch and for green manuring for orchards cannot be overestimated as it provides nitrogen in the best form. If intended for feeding, it should always be cut while in the young stage, and never fed to stock after the crop has ceased flowering, as serious results are apt to follow the feeding of *overripe* Crimson Clover. In the latitude of New York, time for sowing may extend from July 15th to September 15th, and further south up to October. The seed needs to be only lightly covered, and a good plan is to sow on fresh plowing and cover with a light harrow. (See *cul.*) Sow 15 lbs. per acre.

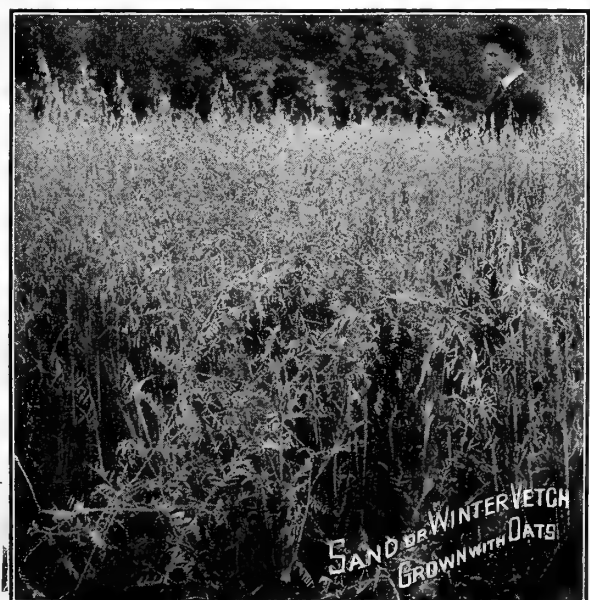
It is perfectly hardy throughout the United States, remaining in all winter. It should be sown during August and September, mixed with rye, which serves as a support for the plants, or in spring with oats or barley.

It succeeds and produces good crops on poor, sandy soils, though it is more vigorous on good land, and grows to a height of 4 to 5 feet. Being much harder than Scarlet Clover this is the forage plant to sow in the Northern States, where Scarlet Clover winter-kills, and it is equally valuable in the South. Every dairyman and stock-breeder in the United States should have a field of it.

It is exceedingly nutritious, much more so than Clover, is eaten with a relish and may be fed with safety to all kinds of stock.

It will also prove valuable for a Hay Crop in the South and dry Western regions, as it may be sown in the fall.

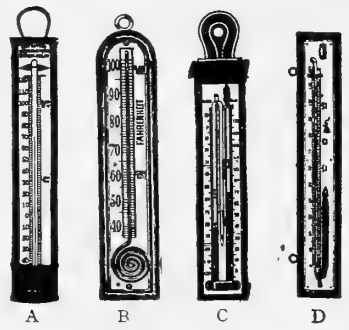


Dwarf Essex Rape.

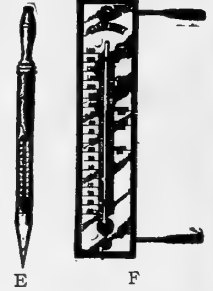
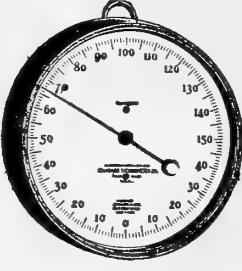
Valuable for Cattle, Sheep and Hogs.

Under favorable conditions Rape is ready for pasturing sheep or cattle within six weeks from time of sowing, and on an average one acre will carry twelve to fifteen sheep six weeks to two months. When on the Rape they should at all times have access to salt, but water is not necessary. In the Northern States, it should be sown from May to the end of August for fall pasturing, but as it thrives best in cool weather, it should not be sown in the Southern States until September or October for winter pasture. In the latitude of New York, July or August is the best time to sow. Its fattening properties are probably twice as good as those of Clover, and for sheep the feeding value of Rape excels all other plants we know of.

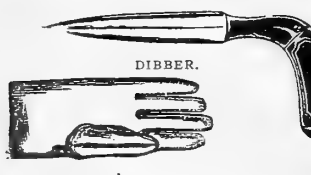
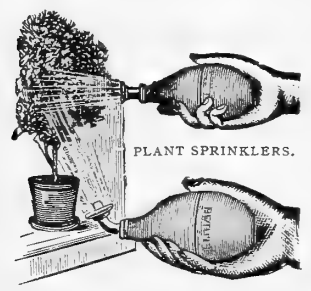
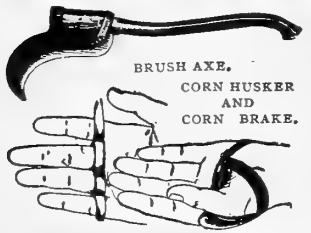
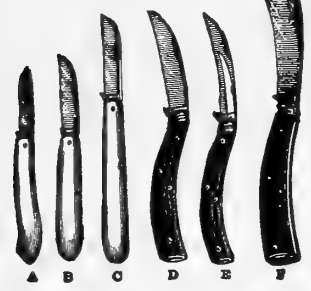

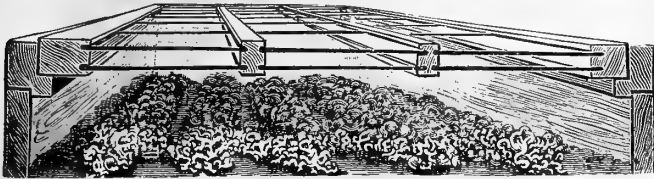

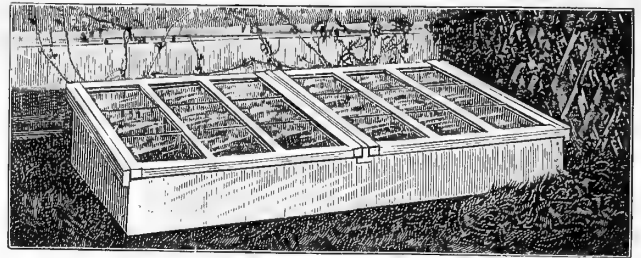
SECTIONAL VIEW OF "DOUBLE LIGHT" SASH.
