

Remittances should be made either in the form of an Express Money Order or a P. O. Money Order, Bank Draft or Registered Letter.

Customers can also shop by express, as all express com panies have purchasing departments in all their offices. If you wish to order goods from us to be sent by express, ask for a Purchasing Order Blank at any express office, and it will be supplied and forwarded without charge, other than the usual rate for returning goods.

If goods are wanted C. O. D., 25 per cent. of the amount must accompany the order.

Orders from unknown correspondents, without remittance, should be accompanied by New York City references, to save delay.

We do not offer a long list of varieties in Strawberries, but only such as may be considered the best of existing sorts.

F Send in your orders at once, as we will fill orders in the rotation they are received. Our first crop of plants will be ready about July 25th. Small lots of plants can be mailed if 10c, per dozen is added to the prices to cover postage, but as we have to wash the ball of earth from the roots to reduce the weight and postage it is advisable to have larger quantities go by express, so the earth may not be disturbed. (Purchaser pays transit charges on express shipments.)

PERFECT—versus—IMPERFECT FLOWERING STRAWBERRIES.

The blossoms of strawberries are either staminate (perfect flowering) or are destitute of stamens and are termed pistillate (imperfect flowering). Pistillate varieties must have a row of a perfect flowered sort, planted every nine or twelve feet apart among them, or better yet, every third or fourth plant in the row, to pollenize their blossoms. When properly pollenized the pistillate varieties are usually the most prolific.

BRIEF DIRECTIONS FOR CULTURE.

PISTILLATE OR

Strawberries require rich, well-tilled soil; the plants should be set 15 inches apart, in rows 2 feet apart; 100 plants will t 4 rows, 30 feet long; an acre requires 14.520 plants if set at the above distance but for the straightful feet apart; 100 plants will Strawbernes require rich, well-tilled soil; the plants should be set 15 inches apart, in rows 2 feet apart; 100 plants will plant 4 rows, 30 feet long; an acre requires 14,520 plants if set at the above distance, but for horse cultivation they should be set 2 feet apart, in rows 3 feet apart, requiring 7,260 plants for an acre. Firm the plants well in the soil, keep thoroughly cultivated and cut off all runners. In the middle of December cover the beds to a depth of 3 inches with salt meadow hay, staw or leaves. In April as soon as the plants show an indication of growth, push the covering away from the plants to allow them to come up through. This "mulching" protects the plants from the cold in winter and the heat in summer, keeps the fruit clean, and prevents the growth of weeds.



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New Strawberry "Commonwealth."

(Very Late-Perfect Flowering.)

This most valuable very late strawberry was raised by a gentleman in Massachusetts, and is the result of his effort to produce a berry which would perceptibly lengthen the strawberry season. In the "Commonwealth" we have a berry as large as the largest as productive as any of the large fruiting varieties, and as fine flavored and juicy and as dark colored as any strawberry grown. The berries of the largest size are broadly cone shaped and quite smooth; moreover it is very late. On the 17th of July as good berries were picked from it as earlier in the season; the last berries were picked July 22 (Marshall, McKinley and Glen Mary grown side by side with it being gone). The plant is a good strong grower—hardy. shows no sign of rust, and bears a strong staminate blossom. It is exceedingly productive. Valuable for Cattle, Sheep and Hogs.

In the United States we have millions of acres of good land that annually lie idle or run to weeds the latter part of the season, after the grain, potato and hay crops have been harvested, a large portion of which might be made to produce one of the finest feeds imaginable, and in the greatest abundance, at a time when cattle, sheep and hogs are roaming through time when cattle, sheep and hogs are roaming through bare pastures in search of a scanty living. At the Michigan Experiment Station, 128 lambs were pastured for eight weeks on 15 acres of Rape sown in July and showed a gain of 2.890 lbs., or at the rate of 3 lbs. per lamb each week.
