Gene Miller intercepted an enemy pass on the 14: Parks picked up a first down, and "Bud" Lail fipped the line for a second touchdown and victory. Hamby Camp, G. Miller, Walker, Parks, E. Miller, "Bud" Láil and Arndt starred.

OCTOBER 18. HICKORY US. KANNAPOLIS (There)

Outplayed and outmanenvered, the Tornadoes suffered a whitewashing at the hands of the Little Wonders of Kannapolis, 18-0. The passing combination of B. Lait and Walker, the defensive work of Hamby, the tackling of Esne Miller, and the spectacular run by Jake Parks featured Hickory's attack.

OCTOBER 25. HICKORY US. LENOIR (Here)

OCTOBER 25. HICKORY vs. LEMOIR (Here) Passing, blocking, running, "Bud" Lail, stellar back, led an inspired Hickory team to its third successive victory over Lenoir. He passed to Led Walker for the first touchdown and extra point, then intercepted a pass on his own 30 and raced 70 yards down the left side, behind brainful blocking, to score the second standing up. F. Lail converted. Playing of the intire team thrilled a large homeconing crowd, but especially outstanding were B. Lail, Pakks, Don/Stafford, Eslie Miller, and John Gregory, in the lineup for the first time after a pre-season injury. Score: Hickory 14. Lenoir 0,

NOVEMBER 21 HICKORY vs. NEWTON (Here) The Tornadoes nosed out their erstwhile foes, Newton, 600 when "Bud" Lail blocked a punt deep in Newton territory and Eslie Miller and Don Staffold caught the ball in the air, carrying it over the coal line together. Martin, the Devils quarterback, was sensational in the nip-and-tuck content because of his amazing punts. For Hickory, "Bud" and For Lail Don Stafford Eslie Miller, and Gregory were commended.

NOVEMBER 9. HICKORY US. STATESVILLE (Here

Close, fiercely contested every inch of the way, the game with Statesville proved the best of the season, with the undereated Greyhounds winning 13-12. Aerial attacks staged by Gregory and B. Lail to F. Lail and Stafford netted Hickory's twelve points. Penalties at crucial moments marred play of both teams. Starring for the Tornadoes were Stafford, Walker F. Lair, and Parks.

NOVEMBER 18. HICKORY US. LINCOLNTON (Here)

Evenly matched, the Tornadoes and Wolves staged a mid-field classic, muther eleven getting closer than the 20 rard marker. Gregory's passing was good, and the line-play of Stafford, Walker, G. Miller, and Eslie Miller was commendable. This game upset Dincolnton's chances of sharing the conference roown, Hickory 0, Lincolnton 0.

NOVEMBER 22. HICKORY vs. N. C. S. D. (Here) The Tornadoes closed the home season with an easy 13-6 victory over a spirited N. C. S. D. team. "Bud" Lail scored both touchdowns, plunging for one and taking a short lateral from Stafford after Gregory had passed for the other. Parks scored the extra point. Gregory's passing to Walker bigh-lighted the rather slow contest. In addition, B. Lail and Parks tooled best in the backfield; Eslie Miller and Stafford, in the line. Substitutes were used freek.

NOVEMBER 26. HICKORY US. FOREST CITY (There)

The battlescarred Tornadoes bowed to a speedy Forest City squad in the final game of 1940 to the tune of 13-0. Parks and Gregory starred for Higkory in the backfield, while Camp displayed fine blocking and tackling in the line.



Basketball Resume

- December 12—The Red Tornadoes opened their season, suffering a defeat at the hands of the Lenoir Rhyne freshmen. 21-17.
- December 13—Salisbury romped on Hickory for the Tornadoes' second straight defeat. Stafford scored 14 of Hickory's points. Score 52-24.
- January 7—Hickory divided with the Red Devils from Newton: boys winning 24-21; girls losing 39-5. Stafford led the boys with 12.
- January 10-Stafford made 11 points in defeating Morganton 34-22. Although Betty Foster hit 21, the Tornadettes lost 57-31.
- January 14—Both teams defeated Lenoir. Tornadettes, led by Foster's 15 points, won 32-16. Six-foot seven center, Whitener, got 15 in piling up a 38-4 win.

January 17-Tornadettes were defeated 29-16 by Lincolnton, but boys won 35-10.

January 23-At Cliffside both boys and girls won. Boys' score 25-15; girls' 33-21.

- January 28—Another double victory was scored over N. C. S. D. Boys won 31-24. Girls, led by Giles with 17 and Frye with 8, won 31-20.
- January 31—The Tornadettes lost, 41-22, at the hands of Shelby; while the boys, led by Stafford's 21 points, won over the previously undefeated Shelby quintet, 41-29.

February 4—Giles and Freeman led the Hickory sextet to a 22-19 triumph over Lenoir. The Tornadoes. with 18 different men playing, won easily, 38-27.

- February 7—Hickory took two more from N. C. S. D., girls winning 29-19 behind Freeman and Foster; and the boys downing a scrappy team, 38-27.
- February 11—The girls dropped behind 34-20, while the Tornadoes handed Bessemer City their first defeat, 35-20. Stafford made 14.
- February 12—The Faculty game was a riot. Foster scored 15 for the girls in setting back the teachers, who were led by Fritz with 10; score 27-18. Scarborough and Hernandez with 14 and 12 respectively, led the men to a close win over the Tornado B squad, 44-42. Sigmon had 14 for B team.
- February 14—In games with Morganton, Tornadoes took another easily, 33-14. Tornadettes were defeated decisively, 42-19.

February 17—The Tornadoes defeated the Conference defending champions, Marion, 44-36. Stafford had 19, Whitener 14. Girls also won. 29-18.

February 18-Girls bowed to Lincolnton, 51-18. Boys won, 38-28, to extend their conference rating to 13 wins against no losses.

February 20—Bessemer City was defeated in an exciting double-header. Tornadoes 34— Bessemer City 25; Tornadettes 35—Bessemer City 29.

- February 21—Hickory divided games with Newton. Tornadoes 33—Newton 22; Newton 41— Tornadettes 17.
- February 28—First conference loss for boys in 16 starts. Marion 40—Tornadoes 38; Tornadettes 28—Marion 15.

March 4-Tornadoes won over Cliffside, 39-26; Girls lost 22-20.

March 7—Two fighting Hickory teams closed their conference season with two disheartening defeats at the hands of Shelby. Shelby 36—Tornadoes 32; Shelby 34—Tornadettes 25.

The Red Tornadoes, with a total of 16 wins against 2 losses. claimed the Western Conference championship. In the Valdese Gold Medal Basketball Tournament, the Hickory boys won out by defeating Old Fort, Piedmont, Fallston, and Hollis. Everyone on the team played well, and Hay, Whitener, and Walker were selected for the All-Tournament team.
