SEPTEMBER 17: HICKORY vs. SHELBY (here)

The Hickory High Red Tornadoes opened their 1943 season with a 25-0 victory over Shelby. The Tornadoes scored early in the first period on a pass from Parker to Brady who ran the remaining 10 yards. Late in the second quarter, Parker threw a 50-yard pass to Buff, stellar right end, for another score. In the fourth period Parker went around end for 21 yards, and another score, Camp intercepted a pass and ran the ball back for the final touchdown. The entire line, led by Wilson, Setzer, Murphy, and Winkler, showed up well.

SEPTEMBER 24: HICKORY vs. HARDING (here)

The Tornadoes went out of the Conference to play the strong Harding High team from Charlotte. It was a see-saw battle all through the opening quarter with Buff's toe keeping the home team out of their own territory. In the last seconds of the ball game, Murphy managed to break through the strong line to nail Cook, Harding back, behind his own goal line for two big points. Bost, Brady, and Camp were the mainstays in the backfield while Wilson and Murphy held things down up front.

OCTOBER 1: HICKORY vs. MARION (there)

Through gaping holes opened by the line, the Tornado backfield aces were able to score two touchdowns in the second quarter to start the ball rolling. Bost darted around right end from the 3 for the first score and after Bolick intercepted a Ripper pass, carried it

all the way to the 5, Camp bucked the line for the second tally. Bost again scored around right end for his second tally of the night. Late in the game the backs started another drive which went to the 2 yard line where Huffman bucked the line for the last score. With a whole host of reserves in the game, the Rippers passed for their tally, but the last attempts were in vain. Bost, Huffman, Brady, and Camp did a commendable bit of running in the backfield, while Bolick. Buff, Wilson, Murphy, Winkler, Setzer, and Wakefield opened big holes and held the Rippers to only two first downs.

Bost ran 55 yards for the second touchdown after Camp had, only a moment before. bucked the line for the opening tally. In the third quarter Brady was called on to throw his special pass and placed it perfectly in Paul Buff's waiting hands. Buff ran the remaining 35 yards for the next score. Brady made the score 25-0 on the familiar "Statue of Liberty" play, and Buff placed the kick through the up-rights to finish the scoring 26-0.

could not squeeze out a touchdown to beat the powerful Bearcat team. Buff's punting was superb and kept the Hickory team out of danger most of the game, but once the Lenoir team drove deep into Hickory territory, just to be thrown back by the powerful Tornado line.

OCTOBER 22: HICKORY vs. FOREST CITY (here)

Forest City drew first blood by shaking Shuford loose for 60 yards which resulted in the first score. In the closing minutes of the second quarter, Murphy broke through the line to block a Forest City punt; he immediately fell on the ball to tie the score 6-6. The try for the extra point was blocked. Parker, injured in the Harding game, came into the game to pass to Miller, substitute end, for the second score. Buff's kick was good and the score stood at 13-6 until 'Bird-legs' Brady got loose for 15 yards. The score was 19-6 after the try for the point was blocked. Bost, Brady, and Camp were stand-outs on the offense while the entire line stood out on the defense.

OCTOBER 29: HICKORY vs. NEWTON (there)

The Tornadoes, seeking revenge from their 7-6 defeat the year before, ran over a touchdown in the early minutes of play. Murphy rushed in to block a punt and Buff picked it up and ran 30 yards for the last score; Wilson converted the extra point. Camp and Bost kept the backfield moving while Wakefield, Wilson, Murphy, and Winkler could not be stopped by the Red Devil's line.

NOVEMBER 5: HICKORY vs. LINCOLNTON (there)

Hickory High Red Tornadoes, driving toward the Western Conference Championship, were hard put to beat the Lincolnton Wolves. The Wolves took the lead in the first quarter and took a punt on their 40yard line and ran all the way for a touchdown. Camp bucked the line for the extra point and as the half ended the score stood 7-7. It was late in the fourth period when the Tornadoes made another threat to score. After a pass from Parker to Brady, the ball rested on the 1-yard line. Camp bucked the line for the touchdown. Big "Jug" Wilson converted the extra point, and the game ended 14-7 in favor of the Tornadoes. The whole line played a great defensive game and the backfield held its own.

NOVEMBER 12: HICKORY vs. MORGANTON (here)

With but one game between them and the Conference Championship, the Tornadoes went into the game slightly on the jittery side. The first score came easy, in the opening minutes of the game. Parker caught a punt on his own 12-yard line, side stepped a couple would-be tacklers, picked up his interference, and raced 88 yards for the score. Later in the same quarter Parker passed 15 yards to Brady for the second score, Wilson made the score 13-6. The line was holding the Morganton "Aces" down for little gains, but couldn't seem to shake their own backs loose. Parker and Brady played a nice offensive game with Murphy, Buff, Wilson, Setzer, and Winkler showing up *well* on defense.
