


### AND INTELLIGENT COUNSEL













It was a young and largely inexperienced team that represented the 1954 Tornadoes in gridiron wars. Despite a mediocre 5-5 record the team displayed a spirit and determination which were indicative of a good brand of football at HHS in the coming years.

The Tornadoes combated the greater weight of many foes by the use of both offensive and defensive teams with frequent substitutions used for both platoons. This depth proved a blessing early in the season when Jerry Prescott and Carroll Bolick both quarterbacks were the first of many injuries to

plague the squad for the entire year. Another asset of the squad was the overall team balance. No one player or group of players stood out or had to cover for weaker teammates.

Playing host to a strong Wilkes Central eleven in their first encounter, HHS showed a terrific defense in spots but could muster no offense in losing 13-6. In their next two games the Tornadoes displayed both air and ground attacks as they rolled over a weak Newton squad, 27-0 and a tougher Lincolnton team 19-7.




Left: With a twist and a turn "Doodle" Watts, HHS forward, racks up another two points.










Showing excellent form first baseman Dickie James stretches for the late throw.




