



ELECTRONICS, SHOP, TV HISTORY. The newest class at HHS, instituted this year on an experimental basis, is the U. S. History TV class. Originating at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, the class is taught by Miss Lois Edinger. The two first period classes participate in the program, taking notes and making field trips through the eyes of the TV camera.

Shop and Electronics are two of the improved

and expanded classes. From fashioning unique tables and bedroom suites with a professional look to face masks—sometimes they venture to mold the likenesses of fellow students—the boys in shop gain much experience and knowledge.

Electronics students study the phases of the AM radio. They build radio receivers and work with amplifiers, earphones, and flame measurers. This gives advanced students the opportunity to further study in the vocational field.

A most interesting and helpful phase of Hickory High's curriculum this past year has been the introduction of new classes to meet the individual needs and talents of the student. One of the larger classes is College English. This class provides the more advanced students and those preparing for college with accelerated English. Dramatics has been added for those students interested in dramatic work, acting, and the history of the theater. Each section of the band has a separate rehearsal once a week, and members may receive private lessons. The guidance counselor gives special aid in the testing program and also helps students with personal problems or in planning for the future.




Honors at state contest





The crack of bat against ball significs the opening of the last sport in the HHS year. Although baseball is not primarily a spectator sport at HHS, the team is always top-flight.






Once again playing a non-conference foe, Hickory defeated Belmont, 19 to 7. Jerry Huffman, HHS Quarterback, sparkplugged his team.


Although the Tornadoettes were short in height they grabbed 200 more rebounds than their opposition.







Some of the subscribers in the 1933 Log have disappeared but these have remained loyal throughout the past twenty-five years: Lenoir Rhyne, Spainhour's, Bumbarger's, Hickory Funeral Home, Hickory Chair Manufacturing, Inc., Bisanar's, Southern Desk, Ninth Avenue Pharmacy, Hickory Printing Co., Belk-Broome Co., Lutz's Drug Store, Clay Printing Co., Coca-Cola Bottling Co., West-Deal's, Todd's Florist, Hotel Hickory, and Crouch Lumber Co.

The Hickory High School Log has been published annually since 1917. The publishing of the Log, as well as many other activities at Hickory High School, is made possible by business establishments in Hickory and other members of the community.

Depression and war years meant the disappearance of subscribers and the shrinking of the book. But some businesses remained subscribers during these hard years, and as more prosperous years advanced, these firms increased their ads.
