## ELECTRONICS, SHOP, TV HISTORY.

 The newest class at HHS, instituted this year on an experimental basis, is the U. S. History TV class. Originating at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, the class is taught by Miss Lois Edinger. The two first period classes participate in the program, taking notes and making field trips through the eyes of the TV camera.Shop and Electronics are two of the improved
and expanded classes. From fashioning unique tables and bedroom suites with a professional look to face mask-sometimes they venture to mold the likenesses of fellow students-the boys in shop gain much experience and knowledge.

One of the larger classes is College English. This class provides the more advanced students and those preparing for college with accelerated English. Dramatics has been added for those students interested in dramatic work, acting, and the history of the theater. Each section of the band has a separate rehearsal once a week, and members may receive private lessons. The guidance counselor gives special aid in the testing program and also helps students with personal problems or in planning for the future.
