











Hickory High's Red Tornado football squad brought home glory that has never been won by a past HHS team. By clinching the conference championship, the high-stepping Tornadoes also copped fourth place in the state AA high school ratings.

The Tornadoes compiled a perfect 8-0 Northwestern Conference record and a perfect regular season record of 10-0. In their eleventh game of the season they displayed a powerful ground attack and a stingy defense against Shelby, winning the W.N.C.H.S.A.A. Championship. The only loss of the year was against the Asheboro Blue Comets in the state Championship tilt at Salisbury.

Outstanding running from All-State junior halfback Larry Rudisill, and fine hlocking and tackling on the part of All-State seniors, guard Richard Brittain and tackle Willard Black, contributed to the Tornadoes' hrilliant 11-1 record.

Richard Jackson and Co-captain Willard Black sparked the 41-12 win over Belmont.






Conference Champions Again!



Hiekory defeated its areh rival Newton by scores of 49-37 and 40-34, and outelassed Marion in both tilts, 58-42 and 43-37.






Grasping for a jump ball, Larry Poteat and Larry Phillips surround a Hudson player.








