




AN INSPIRATION TO TEACHING

QUALIFIED INSTRUCTORS TEACH BUT FIND TIME

"Given a good school board and strong leadership by the superintendent and principal, an excellent group of teachers will be recruited, and it is hardly necessary to emphasize that on the quality of the teachers (assuming wise leadership) the quality of the education must ultimately depend."* Ten HHS teachers have received advanced degrees in teaching, while others are attending Saturday classes and summer school in order to obtain these degrees. THE THREE MAIN OBJECTIVES OF A HIGH SCHOOL ARE . . .

Among the many studies that have been made concerning the American high school, that of Dr. James B. Conant is one of the most outstanding. In the following pages the academic standing of Hickory High will be compared to that of the ideal school possessing these three requisites stated by Dr. Conant: "First, to provide a general education for all the future citizens; second, to provide good elective programs for those who wish to use their acquired skills immediately on graduation; third, to provide satisfactory programs for those whose vocations will depend on their subsequent education in a college or university."

A regular English class teaches practical grammar and literature. Through the biology and health courses, a student may learn useful information about plants and animals, especially the human body. In order to be well-informed on important events in the past and to keep up-to-date on the news, the future citizen should take advantage of the history and geography courses offered. The school library is a source of information on all subjects, and every student is well acquainted with it.

Students seeking the cultural benefits and specialized training for a future vocation which a college education provides find the HHS curriculum well-balanced and adequate. All solid, basic subjects required for entrance by colleges and universities are offered. Advanced English raises requirements above those of regular English classes and thus it is presented on a correspondingly higher plane. College-bound students engaged in studying French, Latin, or Spanish at HHS obtain the necessary foundation needed for future foreign language study. To help students make those all-important decisions about their future college plans, experienced guidance counselors are on hand.

Physics and chemistry are two basic sciences taught at HHS. A thorough knowledge of both is essential to all science majors as a background for tackling more advanced scientific studies. Algebra and solid geometry, indispensable aids to future scientists as well as mathematicians, are also taught at HHS. Mechanical drawing teaches students the fine points of accuracy and design. Never to be avoided, however, no matter what the subject, are those fairly recent additions to 1111S—semester exams.


STUDENT COUNCIL







WESTERN N. C. CHAMPS WIN RATING OF NO. 1 IN STATE

Opening the season, the Tornadoes slashed Asheville 20-12. Key blocking and exclusive ground play helped Eugene Isenhour pick up 140 yards for the newly organized, closely knit Tornado team.

In the following week Jimmy Sweezy led the HHS gridders in routing a highly rated Hudson team 27-7 in the closing half of play.

Halfback Richard Jackson, averaging 14 yards per carry, led the Tornadoes in crushing an enthusiastic Lenoir team 35-7 to maintain a perfect record.

Marion went down 35-0 by tremendous line play—led by Gene Moser—which stunned the Marion Rippers into defeat.

Spirited Tornadoes held the Newton team scoreless in their fifth game, winning 47-0. Larry Rudisill stood out on offense.

A troubled Taylorsville team forfeited to the Tornadoes 1-0 in the following week. This brought the Tornadoes closer to the state title.

Offensively, the best game for HHS was Homecoming against Belmont. Hard driving tackle, Co-Captain Danny Lonon wreeked Belmont's forward wall to lead Hickory to a 60-7 win.

For the eighth consecutive win Sam Fowler sparked the Tornadoes to a 26-6 romp over the Wilkes Central Eagles.

As before, Tornado teamwork, led by Co-Captain Marion Kirby, downed their biggest conference rival, Morganton, 35-6.

Linebacker Cecil Duncan helped squelch an unexpectedly stubborn Valdese offense 25-7, as Hickory finished the conference with a perfect 10-0 record, becoming conference champions.


As predicted, the Tornadoes followed Charles Bock to a 38-7 victory over Shelby to obtain the WNCHSAA title for the second time in a row.
















