

ful cultivation of almost all crops, which may be followed with confidence. A few changes in the time of sowing and planting, necessitated by peculiar climatic conditions, being left, of course, to the good judgment of the cultivator. In the case of flower seeds, partly to economize space, but particularly to make it more convenient for the gardener, we give instructions on each seed packet.

TESTED SEEDS.—Our seeds are all tested, a precautionary measure of great value to our customers and to ourselves, and none are allowed to leave our establishment until we are satisfied that they are absolutely of the best quality, possess the greatest possible vitality and are certain to grow under favorable conditions. That under favorable conditions they do grow and give entire satisfaction, is fully testified to by the many flattering testimonials we annually receive from our customers. We, however, give no warranty express or implied, or hold ourselves responsible in any way for the crops. If the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these conditions they must be returned at once and the money paid for same will be refunded.

FARM SEEDS.—We make a specialty of the handling of clean and reliable ds. On our pages 30 to 41 will be found a complete list of Cereals, Grasses, Clovers, and other forage plants of great value to the farmer.

We Guarantee the Safe Arrival of Seeds .- In the event of the arrival of packages in bad condition, notice should be sent us at once and we will cheerfully replace the same free of charge. When customers do not receive their goods in a reasonable time, they should inform us and at the same time send a copy of their order, so we can trace order.

Low Prices.—We grow and handle seeds in large quantities. Our business, both wholesale and retail, is ever and rapidly on the increase. And our facilities for handling seeds, receiving and filling orders, packing and shipping are being improved where possible. With all of these advantages we are enabled to make very low prices. We are confident they compare favorably with those of any reliable seedman in the United States. Our motto is first-class goods at reasonable prices.

FREE DELIVERY.—At the prices quoted in this Guide, we deliver all Vegetable and Flower Seeds in packets, ounces, 1/4 pounds and pounds. Free to any post-office in the United States; except Peas. Beans, Sweet Corn, Field Corn and Farm Seeds offered on pages 30 to 41, on which, if wanted by mail, add to Farm Seeds, 8c per lb.; to Peas, Field Corn and Beans, 8c per pint, 15c per quart; and Sweet Corn, 5c per pint, 10c per quart, to cover cost of mailing.

Purchasers of Seeds in bulk (pecks, bushels, barrels, etc.), will have their orders shipped by freight or express at their expense.

Parties ordering enough seeds for a freight shipment, may deduct Sc per pound from all seeds quoted by the pound or less, except on Farm Seeds.

Postage to Canada on Seeds, Bulbs and Plants being double that of the United States, customers will please add 8 cents per pound, 15 cents per pint and 30 cents per quart on Beans, Peas and Field Corn; 10 cents per pint and 20 cents per quart on Sweet Corn to our prices.

Purchasers will also pay shipping charges on all Tools, Fertilizers, Insecticides, etc., unless otherwise noted.

We make no charge for packing cases, or barrels or delivery to freight depots. We, however, charge for Cloth Bags at cost, 1 peck, 5 cts.; 1/2 bushel, 10 cts.; 2 bushel, 15 cts. Grass seed bags furnished free, except for Timothy and Clover.

#### Instructions to Customers.

Orders from New Customers.—Persons unknown to us, to avoid delay, please send a remittance, or satisfactory city reference with their orders. We cline to ship C. O. D. to unknown customers unless sufficient money is sent to g antee acceptance.

How to Remit.—Money may be sent at our risk and expense, in the follow manner: P. O. Money Order, Bank Drafts on New York, Chicago or Milwau Express Money Order or Registered Letter. Money sent in any other way that specified above, is entirely at the risk of the sender. We accept Postage Star for small amounts, same as cash.

When to Order Seeds.—Order early, is our invariable advice to custom We plan to have our catalogue reach them at what we believe to be a proper to give seed orders consideration. To avoid a rush and perhaps delays in the v busy months of spring near seed time, it is a great convenience to ourselves, very often an advantage to purchasers, if orders are sent to us early. If the go are not wanted immediately, we will get them ready and ship at any date desi.

N. B.—We fill all orders in the rotation in which they are received.

How to Order Seeds, etc.—Purchasers will greatly oblige us by writing their orders on the sheet we enclose for that purpose with each catalogue; it greatly facilitates our work. It is most important that the full name and address given, and plainly written. Often we receive orders with neither name nor additatached, and delays which we are powerless to avoid occur in consequence. I shipping directions should be given us, stating distinctly whether large quantitare to be sent by express or freight, otherwise we must use our own judgment garding the best route. Give name of Express Co. or Railroad running to yellace, or Stage Route.



The heads are from six to eight inches in diameter, and are rarely more than six or seven inches from the ground. Owing to the habit of compact growth they may be planted as close as ten inches apart in the row, and the rows need not be more than two feet apart. In comparison with Early Jersey Wakefield sown and transplanted at the same time, it produces heads fit for marketing several days before that famous early cabbage. In solidity it compares with the Danish Ball Head."

#### ASPARAGUS.

German, Spargel.

French, Asparge

As early in the spring as the ground can be worked, sow the seeds, previously soaked in water for about twenty-four hours, in rows about a foot apart. During the first season the young plants must be carefully attended to. Cultivate between the rows frequently, to keep the soil loose and weeds down. Remove all weeds in the rows by hand-picking. The second year the plants will be ready for planting in permanent beds. Prepare these beds by trenching to a depth of at least two feet and working in a liberal quantity of barn-yard manure. The beds should be about two feet apart and three feet wide, and three rows only should be planted in each, the plants being placed from 15 to 18 inches apart in the rows, or when large quantities are grown for market, the plants should be set in rows three feet apart, and the plants about one foot apart. This plan admits of horse cultivators being used. In planting, spread out the roots'carefully and cover with about six or eight inches of soil. A rather sandy soil suits this plant best. Sow 1 oz. to 60 feet of drill.

A sandy soil suits them best, but the hills should have a liberal quantity of manure worked in previous to planting the seed.


Although a few gardeners continue to cultivate this vegetable on the old plau, the only one practiced years ago, its cultivation has undergone a great reformation of late years. Very little of the seed is now sown in hot-beds, but instead, is sown in a cold frame, or even out in the open air, early in April, and in Juue and July is transplanted where it is intended to mature. On the surface of the ground, thoroughly enriched and cultivated beforehand, lay out lines three feet apart, not trenches, as was formerly the custom. 

## HOW TO MAKE A LAWN.

Many inquiries reach us concerning the best and cheapest method of obtaining a nice, smooth, velvety lawn. We will here describe, as well as our space will permit, the method that gives almost universal satisfaction. The turfing of large lawns is seldom resorted to now; it is too expensive, and good, clean turf is almost unobtainable. Seeding is the plan usually adopted, and the one recommended by all good landscape gardeners. When practicable, the soil of the proposed lawn should be thoroughly prepared in the fall. After the necessary grading has been accomplished and the general formation of the surface established, let it all be again thoroughly plowed, harrowed and well pulverized, and finely raked to a smooth, even sur ace—as smooth as possible, and firm; not only that, but alike compact in ev ry spot, to prevent unequal settling. This may be accomplished by treading down and again filling up to grade where necessary. Scatter over the surface of the ground, if somewhat poor, a coating of rich, well-retted manure, and let it remain all winter. In the spring remove the manure, and again rake the ground smooth and even and sow on the seed. Finish off by rolling with a moderately heavy roller, or by patting to an even surface with the back of a spade. This firms your seedbed and helps greatly to retain the surface moisture, thereby helping along the germination of the seeds. There is much diversity of opinion regarding the proper quantity of seed required for a given area. We are always disposed to

advocate a liberal quantity, for the simple reason that as the seed is but a small item of the expense of making a lawn and as it is always desiral have a thick, close turf as soon as possible, it is advisable to sow thickly. thick sowing we can accomplish in one season what with thin sowing may two or three seasons, or even longer, to the bitter disappointment of theorem we have had a very extensive experience in the seeding of lawns. Grad we have increased the quantity of seed until now we use at the rate of a four bushels to the acre, or a little over one bushel to every 100 feet square with the most satisfactory results.

It occasionally happens that lawns, the first season, appear patchy it will be necessary to re-sow the spots or patches. This can be most cessfully done during the fall months of September and the earlier ps October, or at the first break of spring weather. A top dressing of Cun Complete Fertilizer for Lawns sown broadcast at the rate of 400 lbs. per or 10 lbs. on a space 25 by 25 feet, applied in spring, if possible before rain greatly improve their growth.












