



THE FIRST WOMAN TO CHAIR THE CHATHAM COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

As Commissioner for Chatham Country, Uva Holland is an advocate for improving the quality of life for the citizens of Chatham. She has assisted in recruiting industry for new and better paying jobs for our county. She also lobbied for extended calling areas to Raleigh and Apex, North Carolina. She was instrumental in getting 150,000 dollars in matching funds for the Chatham Country Hospital Emergency Room. In addition, she helped bring in 2,000,000 dollars to assist the Chatham Country Smart Start Program.

Uva, the daughter of parents who believed in striving for the better way of life, had instilled in her a desire to always be concerned for her fellow people. She has been involved in political, civic and religious activities for the majority of her life. She grew up in a family where welcoming and opening your front door for others was not just expected but was a standard practice. Margaret has also received numerous awards and recognition for her commitment and contributions in Chatham County, North Carolina and other states.

Margaret is currently a member on the Board of County Commissioners where she also served as Chairperson.

Margaret enjoys sharing her knowledge and skills in her church as she serves on numerous boards and committees.

ERNEST H. DARK, JR. Chatham County Board of Education



Ernest H. Dark, Jr. was born in Chatham County on September 4, 1947, to Ernest and Clara Dark. He finished his education at then Horton High School and later at A&T State University. In 1971, he returned home to work for the University of North Carolina, at Chapel Hill, and later for Burroughs Wellcome, presently Glaxo Wellcome, where he has been currently employed for the past twenty-six years as a Research Specialist. In 1971 he married Helen Leach and they have two daughters, Kia age 26 and Kamille, age 18.

Ernest is a member of Mt. Sinai, A.M.E. Church. At Mt. Sinai, Ernest is President of the Lay Organization, a Trustee, and a member of the finance committee. In addition, he also served on the committee to establish the first library in the church. Ernest also gives the youth message every 4th Sunday focusing on Black History, in which he gives the youth the messages and inspiration of the modern day heroes and the ancestors upon whose shoulders we stand.

Being true to his unyielding belief that one must give back a portion of that which is given to him, Ernest established the Annual Black History Quiz Bowl for Chatham County. This Quiz Bowl has been held for the past three years, and it has given Black youth a foundation upon which to stand. This foundation is rooted firmly in Black history, culture, and tradition.

In the community, he was elected to the Chatham County Board of Education, and has served in that capacity for the past nine years. He is currently serving as its Vice-Chairman. As a member of the Board, Ernest has represented the community on both the State and National levels. Ernest is President of the Leach Educational Fund, Inc., a family oriented (now includes family and friends) organization that was established 20 years ago to financially help students in the family further their education. The Organization also provides educational counseling, tutoring, and mentoring services. To date, the Organization has helped over 35 young people go to college.

Ernest is a member of the Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, St. Mark Masonic Lodge, G. Wesley Allen Consistory, Khalif Shrine Temple, and the NAACP. When not busy, he enjoys spending time with his family, reading, and is an avid sportsman-enjoys, fishing and practicing karate.

HISTORY

According to information handed down by "old timers," what is now Horton Middle School, commenced with a framed building shaped like "a rabbit box." Dr. John C. Stanton was principal, and Miss Rebecca Womack was the assistant. He taught the upper grades in the northern end of the building where the stage was located and she taught the lower grades in the southern end. In the afternoon, before school closed for the day, he would open the partition and everybody would participate in singing and praying. Dr. Stanton, a strict and compelling man, would sing, preach and pray. He kept a bunch of switches in the corner, and if one stepped out of line, he would give that person a sound whipping. The next principal was Mr. William Benjamin Markham. He, too, was a strong disciplinarian. His wife and a Miss Wilson taught with him.

Several years later, the Pittsboro High School was built. The old famed building that the white children once used was torn down and hauled to the site of the "rabbit box school." They took the old lumber and built what was called the "Pittsboro Colored School." It had four classrooms, a stage and several closets. Students attended classes in this building until 1934. The building was then destroyed by fire. The principals of that school were Henry Reaves, Ralph Lowe, Bud Hunter (who later named the school after George Moses Horton), and W. B. Easterling. Mr. B. J. Lee, the next principal, worked hard to develop a high school for black children. In 1934, under the direction of the superintendent, Mr. Reid Thompson, Chatham County erected a brick building. This brick building became known as Horton Consolidated School, named for the Negro poet, George Moses Horton. In the same year, it also became a high school. Horton High School was born. The first graduates of Horton High School were in the Class of 1935.

In the fall of 1946, the Board of Education decided to consolidate several small schools in Chatham County. The idea behind the move was to get rid of the one teacher schools. At one time, there were 118 black schools in the county, 79 of these were one teacher schools, 25 were 2 teacher, 6 were 3 teachers and 3 had more than 3 teachers. Horton fell in the over 3 bracket. Schools in Eastern Chatham were consolidated with Horton. The schools and principals were: Buck Mountain-Mae D. Cotton, Mitchell Chapel-Lois Alston, St. Matthews-Jeanette Richardson, Gum Springs-Beulah Clegg, Hanks Chapel-Cassie Ridley, Haw River-Ethel Clark, Haywood-Owen Foster, Horton-B.J. Lee, Hinton Beckwith-Joe Shaw, Terrells-Lecila Avent, Shiloh, Stroud Mountain, and Wilson Schools.

In 1948, four new classrooms were built to the eastern side of the brick building. Soon they were overflowing with students, and in 1950, eleven more rooms were added, making a total of fifteen rooms. Consolidation caused the school to grow, so the Board of Education purchased land across the street to build more classrooms. In 1956, twelve classrooms were built and these rooms were designated for the lower grades. Shortly thereafter, four additional rooms were added to accommodate the overflowing crowd. The I. E. Taylor Gymnasium was built in 1958.

During the latter part of the fifties and early sixties, Horton High School had around 1400 students and 50 or more faculty members. The principals of Horton High School from the mid-forties to the end of the era were: Mr. Benjamin J. Lee succeeded by Mr. Carl Powell , followed by Mr. I. E. Taylor, who served as principal from 1946 to 1970. In the fall of 1970, Horton High School became Horton Middle School and housed all races under the direction of Mr. I. E. Taylor until 1976 when he retired. The three-day retirement celebration planted the seed of how Horton School Alumni could work together to keep the memories alive. Thus, the Horton High School Alumni Association was born.

GEORGE MOSES HORTON

George Moses Horton (1787-1883) was a slave in Chatham County who taught himself to read and write. He eventually gravitated to Chapel Hill where he composed love poems which undergraduates would purchase for up to 75 cents and send to their girlfriends. He specialized in acrostics, which spelled out the name of the girl by putting together the first letter of each line.

Several efforts were made to buy Horton's freedom through the sale of his collection of Poems. The first volume was a 22-page, 50-cent effort entitled "The Hope of Liberty" (1829). He also published "Poetical Works (1845) and "Naked Genius" (1865), but they only established his reputation as a literary curiosity who had overcome unusual obstacles to garner the tools of the literate. Sales were not large enough to procure his freedom.


His freedom finally arrived in the aftermath of what in some quarters was known as "The War for Southern Independence" or the Civil War. Horton settled in Philadelphia while in his 70's and received a warm welcome initially. His literary star eventually faded and he died in 1883 virtually unknown.

PRINCIPAL BENJAMIN LEE



Benjamin Lee, the son of Lizzie Thompson Lee and William Lee was born in Chatham County. His educational training began in Chatham County school systems and continued at Berry O'Kelly School in Raleigh in order to prepare for college where he earned a teaching degree at Livingston College in Salisbury, North Carolina. His first job was a teacher in a one-room school setting. In 1935 several small one-room schools were consolidated, one of which was Horton High School. Benjamin Lee was the first person who was appointed principal at Horton High School. He died in 1944.


PRINCIPAL CARLIE LARENT POWELL



Carlie (Carl) Larent Powell, a Chatham County native, graduated from Hillside High School and received his BS Degree in Math and Science from North Carolina College in Durham, North Carolina.

Mr. Powell, a well-known mentor and educator, spent forty-two years as a teacher and principal in various schools across the state including Horton High School, Pittsboro, North Carolina. His philosophy is that all African Americans have a right to a good and decent education. He firmly believes that many avenues of employment are open to the student who has a strong academic background in Math and Science.

Currently, "Professor Powell" and his wife, Mary, reside in Warrenton, North Carolina. They have three sons Carlie, Leon and Reginald. He is an avid gardener, photographer, and rancher. Although he is ninety years old, he remains active in his community and wishes to be remembered as a humane trailblazer who sought to bring knowledge, light and wisdom to all he chanced to meet.



ISAIAH EUGENE TAYLOR, SR.

Principal

Isaiah Eugene Taylor, Sr., the son of Inda Taylor, was born on April 17, 1911, in Chatham County. He lived with his grandfather, William 'Billy' Taylor in a one-room log cabin near Pittsboro until age 10. After his grandfather, who was an ex-slave died, he lived with an aunt, Martha Taylor. As a youngster, he worked for Arthur London, where he got his first chance to drive a car at the age of 12. During this time, Blacks could only receive a seventh grade education in Pittsboro. Isaiah, called 'Ike' by family and friends, attended high school in Raleigh, NC, while living with his cousin Frances Jackson.

Because his grandfather had instilled in Isaiah a love of learning, Isaiah continued his education at Shaw University, majoring in English and History. While at Shaw, he worked as an elevator operator at Sir Walter Raleigh Hotel during the evenings. He used the elevator as a study hall, when the elevator was idle. He also joined the Phi Beta Sigma fraternity while attending Shaw. While at Shaw, he developed a love of the Bible that remained with him throughout the rest of his life.

Isaiah was twenty-six years old when he graduated from Shaw University. He returned to Pittsboro to teach at Horton High School under the leadership of Benjamin Lee. He left Horton five years later to become interim principal at J. S. Waters School in Goldston, NC, while the school's principal, Walter McLaughlin, served in the military. After Mr. McLaughlin's return, Isaiah was appointed principal to Horton High School upon the death of Benjamin Lee who was principal at the time. During his tenure at Horton High School, Isaiah saw the campus emerge from a one-building facility to a campus of three buildings. A gymtorium bearing his name and an agricultural building were constructed. The school population benefited from a very active Parent Teacher Association, headed by Mrs. Roxie Small. Homecoming activities brought back former students, parents and teachers. Isaiah was a dedicated organizer. He safely and efficiently directed the students as they arrived and departed on the school buses. One of the highlights of each week was a Thursday assembly program, with students being exposed to the prominent and not so prominent, in an effort to broaden their horizons and to encourage them to become productive citizens. He once had the pleasure of introducing the Honorable Terry Sanford, who was the governor of North Carolina at the time. Horton High School was the first school in the county to purchase its own activity bus through the efforts of a very active PTA. The school population exceeded 1300 students before integration. After integration in 1970, Horton became a middle school. Having worked over thirty-three years in the public schools, Mr. Taylor retired in 1976. When he retired, the community rewarded his dedicated leadership of Horton High School with a three-day celebration. At the retirement celebration, "High John the Conqueror" was retired also. Many former students who represented the communities of Bynum, Farrington, Hickory Mountain, Hinton Beckwith, Apex and other surrounding townships attended the celebration.

Mr. Taylor was also dedicated to his church. He served many years as Mt. Sinai AME Church's Sunday School superintendent, Sunday School teacher and a member of the Trustee Board. He was also instrumental in organizing annual Sunday School recreational outings for the children of the church family and community. He was extremely proud of his efforts to care and maintain the church cemetery.

After retirement, Mr. Taylor remained active in the community. He was appointed to the town board in 1976 to fill a vacancy, and was elected to a full term in 1979. After completing one full term, he declined to run for re-election, however write-in votes on his behalf nearly won him another full term.

Mr. Taylor died peacefully, after a period of declining health, in his home on September 3, 1983. Including his wife and children, he was also survived by six grandchildren: Isaiah E. Taylor, III, Christopher Dion Taylor, Milton Armand Taylor, Nicole Elizabeth Alexandria Henry, Malcolm Eugene Alexander Henry and Don Mims; and a sister, Sarah Taylor Williams, who resides in Miami, Florida. His wife, Laura, died in June 1988.



BISHOP LEACH

Bishop Leach was born in Pittsboro, North Carolina on September 17, 1924 to the late Bishop and Margaret Leach. He was married to the former Myrtle Alston and had two sons, Bernard and Jimmy.

He graduated from Horton Public School in 1940. The fact that he graduated at the top of his class and at the youthful age of 15 made his graduation quite unique.

He served in the army from 1944 to 1946, and was a proud soldier in the European Theater World War II.

After service time in the army, Bishop attended North Carolina College, which is now known as North Carolina Central University. He received a B. S. Degree in Social Studies in 1952. He accomplished this in only three years. He later pursued a Master's Degree at North Carolina Central University and The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

His career in the Chatham County School System began as teacher at Horton High School. He taught there for 18 years before advancing to Assistant Principal at Northwood High School in 1971. He retired in 1985 after 33 years of service.

Retirement from the school system afforded him time to better serve Chatham-Lee Credit Union. The Credit Union was organized in 1956. He became Secretary-Manager in 1958 and continued that position until his "Home Going" in 1997.

Although his professional career was quite busy, Bishop found time for "extra curricular activities." For example, he helped organize the Leach Educational Fund, Inc., which is a scholarship program designed to provide financial assistance to students who desire to continue their education beyond high school. He was also a member of the Executive Board for the Leach Educational Fund. Additional civic and community involvements provided him the opportunity to serve as Vice-President and Board Member of the North Carolina Minority Support Center, which provides numerous types of assistance to Minority Credit Unions. Bishop, a respected community leader, was a member of the Town Planning Board and worked with various political and community groups. He was the proud author of Chapter 13, *The Negro* which was published in the book Chatham County 1771-1971 for the Bicentennial Celebration. In addition, he was a dedicated and loyal member of Mt. Sinai A.M.E. Church and served on the Trustee Board and as a Class Leader.



REFLECTIONS

Growing up as a child, I knew what I wanted to do in life - coach and teach. If you teach good fundamentals in any sport, you will get good results.

After graduating from Shaw University in 1949, I was eager to go to work. I soon had an interview with Mr. Taylor about teaching at Horton High. From the very beginning, Mr. Taylor made me feel at home.

During the interview, Mr. Taylor told me that football would be new to Horton High School. Believe it or not, I was glad to hear that. I knew that I would not have to reteach anything that may have been taught incorrectly.

Before the opening of school, we had to find uniforms for the team. I called my football coach at Shaw University and asked him to give us some old practice uniforms. He told me to come down to get the uniforms. I told Mr. Taylor the good news. He asked Mrs. O. A. Harris and Miss A. B. Harris to ride to Raleigh where we received three trunk loads of old uniforms. We were very happy to get the outfits.

Mr. Taylor assigned Mr. Dark to work with me. When school began, the first day of practice was more of getting to know the team. We issued light garments. In fact, we did not put on anything heavy for two weeks or more. We did a lot of running – trying to get in shape. To my surprise, most of the players were in fairly good shape. We did a lot of demonstrating, kicking, passing drills and lots of exercising. I did not want to run anyone off, so I made sure we had a good time. I could see early on that we were going to become a good team. Everyone was eager to learn and interested in everything we showed them. There was no playing around at all. We were serious about becoming a winning team.

We spent several hours on fundamentals before passing out the heavy stuff. When we issued the heavy stuff, we really had fun. I could see early on that there were some smart players out there. I was very pleased. It takes "smarts" to play football. I really enjoyed working with the team from day one.

I am not saying that every day was easy. Sometimes, I knew the team thought I was crazy or mad. Football isn't easy. It can be hard. We worked through the rough times, the soreness, the bumps and long period of running.

Later on some of the players told me that I was too light on them. That was what I wanted to hear. From that day on, we really started hitting. To my surprise, no one quit.

During that year, my coach from Shaw brought some of his football players down to scrimmage with us. They hit us hard and we hit hard. I was very pleased with our performance. Afterwards, my coach mailed a written report about the plays that needed extra work.

The players experienced what real football was all about and we really started getting serious about the game. We had two more practices that year. The next year we had a full schedule. The team played very well in several games, however, we were not winning. I was very pleased with our progress. I could see lots of improvement even in defeat.

The last game was the turning point for the football program at Horton High School. We played W. B. Wicker High School in Sanford. On the way to Sanford, our bus caught on fire. Many of our uniforms were burned. When we arrived in Sanford, I asked the players to have a meeting to decide who would be willing to give up parts of their uniforms in order for us to suit up enough players to play. They did just that and we defeated W. B. Wicker, 32-0. I was really proud of the team that night, first because of the unselfishness of the players who gave up their uniforms and lastly because we won the game – our first.

The next year Horton High defeated all opponents with little difficulty. We surprised many people at home and elsewhere. I regret that no records were kept of our games. However, I do know that Horton High defeated all opponents except Lincoln High School in Chapel Hill during the decade 1951 – 1960.

I really wanted to talk about a few outstanding football players. However, since I cannot talk about all the players, I decided not to talk about individual players. I am sorry fellows.

She, the principal, students and faculty saw the need for a vocational department at Horton High School. Mrs. Dark visited several companies to solicit assistance with equipment. The school purchased twenty-five typewriters.

With the approval of the superintendent and the State Department for a Business Program, classes were begun. Everyone supported the program wholeheartedly. Needless to say, it was a success.

Mrs. Dark retired from 48 years of teaching. It was the second longest tenure in Chatham County History with only Virginia Cross of Siler City surpassing her with 50 years.




I served in the Chatham County School system from 1951 to 1988, a total of 37 years.

She thoroughly enjoyed planning nutritional meals for everyone who passed through the lunch lines during this time.

Mrs. Thelma G. Turner, Home Economics Instructor served as her mentor.

During the summers she attended nutritional workshops at A&T State University, Greensboro, North Carolina, in order, to heighten her skills as a nutritionist.

The students and staff of whom she dearly loved affectionately called her "Miss Edna".

During her tenure, the staff included the following loyal and dedicated ladies: Mrs. Rena Phillips Bland, Mrs. Alene Headen Brooks, Mrs. Moleta Kirby Freeman, Mrs. Mary "Polly" Alston Headen, Mrs. Margaret Reaves Leach, Mrs. Joyce Hadley McKissick, Mrs. Sadie Horton Pattisall, Mrs. Laura Lee Taylor.

Mrs. Laura Elizabeth Lee Taylor



Affectionately known as "Babe" by her family and friends, and "Laura" only by her husband and Aunt Katie, Laura Elizabeth Lee Taylor was born to Richard and Lucy Dowd Lee on November 16, 1919, in Chatham County. Laura had two younger siblings, George Richard Lee and Patience Doretha Geroski, both of are now deceased. The oldest of three children, her father, having been the first born of the union of Richard and Lucy Lee lovingly called her "Son". She attended Horton School in Pittsboro, graduating in 1937, when the school's highest grade was eleventh. In January of 1938, Laura married Isaiah Eugene Taylor. To this union were born four children: Isaiah Jr. (1938), Richard Edward (1942), Phyllis Ann (1943) and Martha Patience (1944).

After all of her children began public school, Laura worked at various jobs in the Pittsboro. She sat with the elderly, housecleaned, performed dry cleaning, washed and ironed to help supplement her husband's salary. She eventually began supporting her husband's school lunch program by working as a substitute in Horton School's cafeteria. Laura was soon elevated to the position of school cafeteria manager. Because Laura loved to cook and see people eat well, she operated the school cafeteria that was second to none in Chatham County. Superintendents of the school system visited the school's cafeteria just to eat her famous yeast rolls. Former students can attest to their popularity as they recall the pans of extra rolls placed on the counter, free for the taking. Former teachers can also remember teacher workdays when they were treated to special lunches compliments of the school administration and cafeteria workers. For medical reasons, Laura retired from the school's cafeteria in 1968.

After retiring, Laura continued to serve her family, community, and her church with her excellent cooking skills and her ability to grow state-of-the-art vegetable gardens. Both she and her husband planted enough vegetables to supply a neighborhood. And each year, she filled two large freezers with bounty from the gardens to give to family and friends. She and her husband enjoyed dispensing the frozen peas, corns, okra, and limas, etc. to family and friends as much as they enjoyed seeing them grow! Laura was also an expert cake maker! Her famous cold oven pound cake was a hit with everyone who tasted it. She and her good friend and cousin, Florence Bland, perfected the cake recipe. She tried selling her cakes (pineapple, black walnut, pound chocolate, caramel), but did not profit from the venture because should would only charge \$5.00 for the cakes.

Laura loved her church and was one of its most faithful supporters. For many years, she taught the Beginner's Sunday school Class at Mt. Sinai AME Church. For several years, she helped organize the feeding of workers who annually cleaned the church's cemetery. She kept children around her all of the time. In fact, Bennie Bland, a cousin moved in with her when he returned to Pittsboro from serving in the US Marines. Those who knew her will remember her fondly as "Miss Babe." Laura died on June 8, 1988 at NC Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill, NC.


Fulton Headen

REFLECTIONS

From Horton High to Horton Middle

In August of 1988, I was appointed principal of Horton Middle School. On the opening day of school that year, it had been almost thirty-six years since I entered Horton as a scared little first grader.

My life had been influenced by some wonderful teachers in my twelve years at Horton and I returned as a proud alumnus of my alma mater. However, things had changed. The old building that housed the auditorium had been replaced. Only, the old cafeteria stood as a reminder of the old building, and it was being used for classrooms. The high school building that we called "the new building" was now being called "the old building", and only two of the teachers who were on the staff when I graduated were still there.

The question that I have been asked most frequently is, "Did you think you would become principal of Horton when you wee a student here?" The answer is, "I never thought about it." When I graduated from high school 1 had remotely thought about teaching, but becoming an educator was not my primary career goal. However, circumstances and events in my life led me down this pathway. I do not regret becoming a teacher. For me, there is no grater reward than having a former student to come to you, years later, and express their appreciation for some small way in which you influenced their life. On the other hand, there are unpleasant moments. Many times I have heard parent say, "my child wouldn't do that" or "you are picking on my child." I have learned that the best way to determine the true character of a person is to deal with their children and/or their money.

There is no doubt that violence and crime are prevalent in our schools today, but the majority of the students in any school are great young people. Most of them will become good productive citizens only day. Unfortunately, far too many of them lack the respect and pride it takes to become good citizens.

The most heartbreaking thing about my job is to see youngsters headed down the wrong road and realize that there is very little that 1 can do to turn them around. A large percentage of these students are black, especially black males.


When I was a student at Horton, the black male students took pride in their dress and their grades. Today, many of them take pride in being sloppy. They come to school with their hair uncombed wearing expensive baggy jeans without a belt and expensive, untied sneakers The sad truth is that some parents have substituted money for love and discipline.

I appeal to you to help bring back the pride in our young people, especially the black male. I realize that the sons and daughters of most of you, the Horton High alumni, have reached adulthood, but you have grandchildren, and young nieces, nephews, cousins, and neighbors that need your guidance. Remember that children are our future.

During my senior year in high school, I met a member of the junior class named Anne Thomas. She turned out to be a loving wife and other. We have two wonderful children, Vaneka and Kevin.

I thank the album committee for giving me the opportunity to express some of my thoughts in this album, and for their commitment to keeping the legacy of Horton High School alive. Let's continue to invest in our future.



BIOGRAPHY CHIEF MASTER SERGEANT HATTIE ALSTON PARKER, USAF, RETIRED

Chief Master Sergeant Hattie Alston Parker, a native of Pittsboro, North Carolina, graduated from Horton High School in 1965. She is the daughter of George Allen Alston and the late Annie Octavia Alston. She entered the Air Force on 23 August 1974. Her first permanent assignment was to the 351st Strategic Missile Wing, Whiteman AFB, Missouri, as Base Administrative Clerk, Base Operations. During this assignment she also served as Operations and Training Administrative Specialist. Chief Parker was transferred to the 354 Tactical Fighter Wing at Myrtle Beach AFB, South Carolina, November 1978. While there she carried out duties as Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of Technical Administration.

She then moved to Izmir, Turkey, in January 1981 and was assigned to the Sixth Allied Tactical Air Force (SIXATAF) as the Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of the Classified Documentation Branch. As one of the first female noncommissioned officers assigned in this capacity, Chief Parker planned and participated in the largest field exercises in NATO. The Chief also served as a member of the Joint SIXATAF Honor Guard.

Chief Parker returned to the United States January 1983 to the Tactical Air Command at Langley Air Force Base, Virginia. She was initially assigned to the 480th Reconnaissance Technical Group as Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of Administrative Services. In this position, she also provided career guidance for over 200 junior enlisted personnel.

In May 1985, Chief Parker progressed to the position of Executive Officer to the Director of Intelligence Systems. Chief Parker masterfully managed a myriad of programs to include budgetary issues, travel expenditures, administration, personnel, training, and security matters. In addition to these tasks, Chief Parker inspected, reviewed, and revised subordinate division information management procedures to improve administrative support.

In November 1987, Chief Parker was chosen to become an inspector with the HQ Tactical Air Command Inspector General's Office. During this period of her career, she evaluated over 150 personnel related and administrative functions. In addition, she served as Superintendent, Complaints, Review and Oversight. While in this position she responded to Congressional Inquiries, Fraud Waste and Abuse Disclosures and complaints forwarded to the Inspector General pertaining to equal opportunity, family advocacy, and affirmative actions.

Chief Parker was posted to the Pentagon in 1994 with duty at the United States Mission to the United Nations in New York with the Office of the Military Advisor. She served as a principal liaison of the U. S. Joint Chief of Staff and primary point of contact between the U. S. Military and the United Nations Secretary General. She also provided the Ambassador, the Secretary General and the Joint Staff with assistance and advice concerning items of military interest that involved the United Nations.

Chief Parker retired December 1, 1996. Her decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal with 1 Cluster, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal with 3 Clusters, Air Force Achievement Medal, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award, Air Force Organizational Excellence Award with 2 Clusters, Air Force Good Conduct Medal with Silver Cluster, National Defense Service Medal, Air Force Overseas Ribbon-Short Tour, Air Force Longevity Service Award Ribbon with 4 Clusters, USAF NCO Professional Military Graduate Ribbon with 1 Cluster, and Air Force Training Ribbon.

BIOGRAPHY CHIEF MASTER SERGEANT HATTIE ALSTON PARKER, USAF, RETIRED

In addition to the Chiefs numerous achievements and contributions to the military, she volunteered in her local community to assist with the Laubach Literacy Council, Special Olympics, Meals on Wheels, and providing homeless. She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Human Resources Administration from Saint Leo College, an Associates Degree from the Community College of the Air Force, and she has attended seminars at Troy State University with emphasis on Human Resources management.

Chief Parker married Ernest T. Parker, also a graduate of Horton High School. She is the mother of two sons, Ernest who resides in Desoto, Texas, and Leighton who resides in Hill Air Force Base, Utah. ~n June 1997, she was blessed with a granddaughter, Sydney Ashten Parker, who lives in Utah. Mr. and Mrs. Isaiah Hadley are Chief Parker's godparents.



BIOGRAPHY OF CHAPIN HORTON

Chapin Horton is a graduate of Horton High School Class of 1956. He entered North Carolina A&T State University, Greensboro, North Carolina in 1957, graduating with honors in 1962 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering and a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army. Chapin entered active duty with the Army immediately upon graduation, retiring in 1989 as a full Colonel after completing a career spanning 27 years. During his Army career he served in many high level command and staff positions involving the research, development, and operation of army radar and missile systems. His assignments took him to a number of stateside and overseas assignments, including Germany, Panama, Vietnam, St. Louis, Missouri, Philadelphia, PA, Mountain View, CA, and Washington, DC. Jennifer is currently employed as an Elementary School teacher in Waldolf, MD.



BIOGRAPHY OF VERNON W. HATLEY

Vernon W. Hatley, born in Raleigh, North Carolina on June 8, 1948, was reared and attended secondary school in Chatham County where he graduated class valedictorian at Horton High School in 1966. He entered North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University in Greensboro, North Carolina and enrolled in Army ROTC. While studying at North Carolina A&T University, he also founded the nationally recognized North Carolina A&T State University Fellowship Gospel Choir. In June 1971, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering Mathematics and was recognized a Distinguished Military Graduate of the Army ROCC program while he simultaneously accepting a Regular Army commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army's Air Defense Artillery Branch.

During his initial tour, young Lieutenant Hatley served as a platoon leader and later commanded a HAWK missile battery located fifteen miles from the West Germany - Czechoslovakian border which had the responsibility for keeping enemy aircraft from crossing the border into Germany. He also earned the honor of "TOP TACTICAL CONTROL OFFICER" in Europe for being the best officer at setting up a HAWK missile site and accurately engaging targets in record time. Throughout his illustrious 23-year military career, Colonel Hatley made many phenomenal contributions such as commanding an 820-person HAWK missile battalion which deployed from Tacoma, Washington to Korea for two weeks of field training traveling more than 150,000 miles over Korean roadways without an accident. Toward the end of the training, the unit prepared its equipment for live missile firings and used data transmitted electronically from an Air Force aircraft to hit targets flying twenty miles away (a first by an United States unit). The Battalion then redeployed to the United States without accident or injury.

Other assignments took him to graduate school at North Carolina Central University where he earned a Master of Arts degree in Psychology then to Fort Bliss, Texas as a Senior Instructor in Tactics followed by attendance at the Armed Forces Staff College, Norfolk, Virginia. Colonel Hately next served in several challenging positions at Fort Lewis, Washington culminating as a Battalion Commander (Chief Executive Of ficer). He was assigned as an Assistant Professor of Military Science at Howard University, Washington, DC, subsequently attended the Army War College (the Army's most prestigious School) followed by appointment as Personnel Branch Chief, managing over 3,500 officers in the Army's Air Defense Artillery Branch in Alexandria, Virginia during OPERATION DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM. In this capacity he made critical decisions about which of ficers would serve as replacements if key leaders were disabled in battle. To culminate a remarkable career, he returned to his alma mater, North Carolina A&T State University as Professor Military Science to give something back to the great institution which imbued him with the skills to guarantee success. Perhaps most people who came in contact with him will remember his love of life, unswerving discipline, zest for learning, and his ability to motivate others toward excellence.

His awards include the Meritorious Service Medal (with five oak leaf clusters), Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Humanitarian Service Medal, and Parachutist Badge.

God blessed him with a charming wife, the former Willie Mae Smaw of Chocowinity, North Carolina and from this angelic union produced two wonderful children; a son, Jermaine (attending the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and a daughter, Cherie (a tenth grader at Millbrook High School, Raleigh, North Carolina).

The colonel flew more than 133 combat missions over North and South Vietnam in 1966 and 1967. Returning from Da Nang Air Base, Vietnam, he was assigned to Suffolk County Air Force Base, NY, flying the F-101 Voodoo for the Air Defense Command.

In January 1970, Colonel Reaves was assigned as a T-38 instructor at Williams Air Force Base, AZ. Two years later he was selected as the social actions officer at the 12th Flying Training Wing, Randolph Air Force Base, TX, as well as continuing with his T-38 instructor duties.

From June 1973 to August 1975, he was assigned to the U. S. Air Force Academy as an air officer commanding and military training instructor. While serving on an Air Force improvement group in the summer of 1975, he was selected to be aide-de-camp to the commander in chief of the North American Air Defense Command/Air Defense Command, General Daniel "Chappie" James, Jr.

Colonel Reaves remained General James' aide-de-camp from August 1975 until the general's retirement in January 1978. In October 1978, he was assigned to the 48th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, Langley Air Force Base, VA, flying F-106 aircraft. After two years, he was assigned to Headquarters Tactical Air Command as an action of ficer in the Directorate of Requirements for Ammament and Avionics as chief of aerial targets for the command.

In June 1982, the colonel was assigned to the Republic of Korea as the fighter liaison of ficer to the Combined Field Army Camp, Red Cloud, Korea. He departed Korea in June 1983. He spent the next four years at Fort Hood, TX, as the 2nd Armored Division's air liaison officer and the commander of Detachment 1, 602nd Tactical Air Control Wing. He was also the 3rd Corps air liaison officer. He became the director for Air Land Forces Application (ALFA) Agency in December 1987 after serving five months as the deputy director. He assumed his present position in August 1989.

Colonel Reaves is a command pilot with approximately 3,000 flying hours in F-106, T-39, F-101, F-102, F-4, T-38, and T-37 aircraft.

His military decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with 10 oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation with one oak leaf cluster, and the Army Commendation Medal.

He was promoted to colonel July 1, 1985, with same date of rank.

Colonel Reaves is married to the former Elaine Crawley of South Boston, VA. They have two sons, Cato "Larry", Jr., and Brian Keith.

As a freshman, she was part of the sit-in demonstrations and arrested for sitting in at the Carolina Theatre in Greensboro. This arrest would be a part of her permanent record, which would become an issue when she would apply for a job requiring high-level security clearance. She was a member of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority Inc., Zeta Alpha Chapter. She came in second place her senior year for Miss A&T. She was listed in the "Who's Who" in American Colleges and Universities with an overall grade point average of 3.4, and 3.79 in her major, which was Electrical Engineering. She was the first female to graduate in Electrical Engineering from NC A & T. She was hired by McDonald Douglas Aircraft in Los Angeles, California. When she walked into the office on the first day of work, they were expecting a man, making her the first female Electrical Engineer ever at that site. She worked for McDonald Douglas Aircraft for nearly four years as a senior engineer on the Super Sonic Transport Plane project.

Kay married Conrad Lattimore, who was a football star at A&T and was drafted to the San Francisco 49ers. Being wounded in Vietnam, he was unable to play pro football. From this union they had two children, Monique and Kiesha.

Kay moved back to North Carolina and was a senior engineer at the Sharon Harris Nuclear Plant. She also ran a successful catering business, giving the proceeds to her church as a measure of her service. She departed this life on March 27, 1996. During her illness, she only missed two church services and ushered with a walker until she was unable to walk. To God be the glory for the life of one so dear.







A graduate of Horton High School in 1956, I feel tremendously blessed to have been claimed as one of her sons who was most impressed with the difference that schooling could make in the life of others. After my graduation from Horton High, I immediately enrolled in Shaw University, from which I received the Bachelor of Science degree in Science Education in 1960. Of course, my teachers at every level played significant roles in my development, and I applaud each of them for their efforts and dedication. Taking this fact into account, there is one teacher, more than any other, who gave me the inspiration to become a public school teacher and later a school administrator. She was, and still remains, an excellent role model and a master teacher, although she retired in 1972, after teaching 38 years in Chatham County. I will not deny the fact that there might be a slight bit of bias here, since she is my mother, Mrs. Bertha Herndon. We are most grateful to God that she still remains with us today, and still receives commendations from students that she taught more than three-fourths a century ago. She and my father remain tops among the list of persons who have made the greatest contributions to any measure of success that I have enjoyed to date and any that I will experience in the future. Both of my parents believed that family was

second only to God. The values that they instilled in me remain with me today and serve as a model as I too have been blessed with a family of my own. My wife, Shirley, and I were joined together in holy matrimony in 1963. Since that time we have been blessed with three children: Lisa, Leon Jr., and Linwood. In addition, we currently have three grandchildren-Brandon, Jalen and Jordan Nicole.

Finally, as an institution, I will always be indebted to Horton High School and all of the people there who impacted so positively on the accomplishment of my career objectives. May Horton High School spirit continue to abide in the hearts and minds of all her sons and daughters forever.

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
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A MESSAGE



Long-time teacher retires after almost half century

"Clara Dark has genuine caring and feeling for young people," Northwood High School Principal Wade Lehman said of the retiring business teacher.

I've never seen her upset with student. She is a very consistent

'She has the same demeanor now and later."

Dark retired this spring from 48 years of teaching. It is the second longest tenure in Chatham County history, with only Virginia Cross of Siler City surpassing her with 50 years of teaching.

"I made up my mind it was time for a change," she said. "It was not

an easy decision to retire.

'If I had pondered through it, I might not have done it. I really liked working with students. It was a learning process for them and

She admits retirement will be bittersweet.

"I have a bit of sadness along with the happiness," Clara said. "It will be different to be away from students and faculty."

Her family cannot remember children.

when she did not teach.

"She taught all of my life," son Ernest Jr. said. "She always encouraged me to do things.

"The teaching process didn't stop (for any of the three children) at

home."

Ernest Jr. remembers once he ran afoul of his mother's rules at school. She played no favorites.

'In the seventh grade, my future wife and I were cutting up in my mother's class," Ernest Jr. said. Both of us got sent to the office at the same time."

Dr. Larry Mabe, now Superintendent of the Chatham County Schools, was principal at Northwood in the 1970's. He remembers Clara's dedication to children.

"In this day and time, it is difficult to find an individual who will teach for 48 years," Mabe said. "That is a tremendous length of ser-

"Between Clara Dark and her husband, Ernest, Sr., they have over a long lifetime of teaching devotion."

Among the many highlights of her career, she said seeing many of

her students become successful in school - and afterward - was her greatest reward.

"That makes me feel good," she said. "I know I touched them in

some ways,'

Clara does not feel the average student today has greater native intelligence than half a century ago.

"They are exposed to more." she said. "So many students have a computer at home. It is so easy to correct on a computer that they may look smarter than before.'

Her advice to students?

"Stay in school. Don't be afraid to ask questions. Do the best you can do," the former teacher urged.














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
