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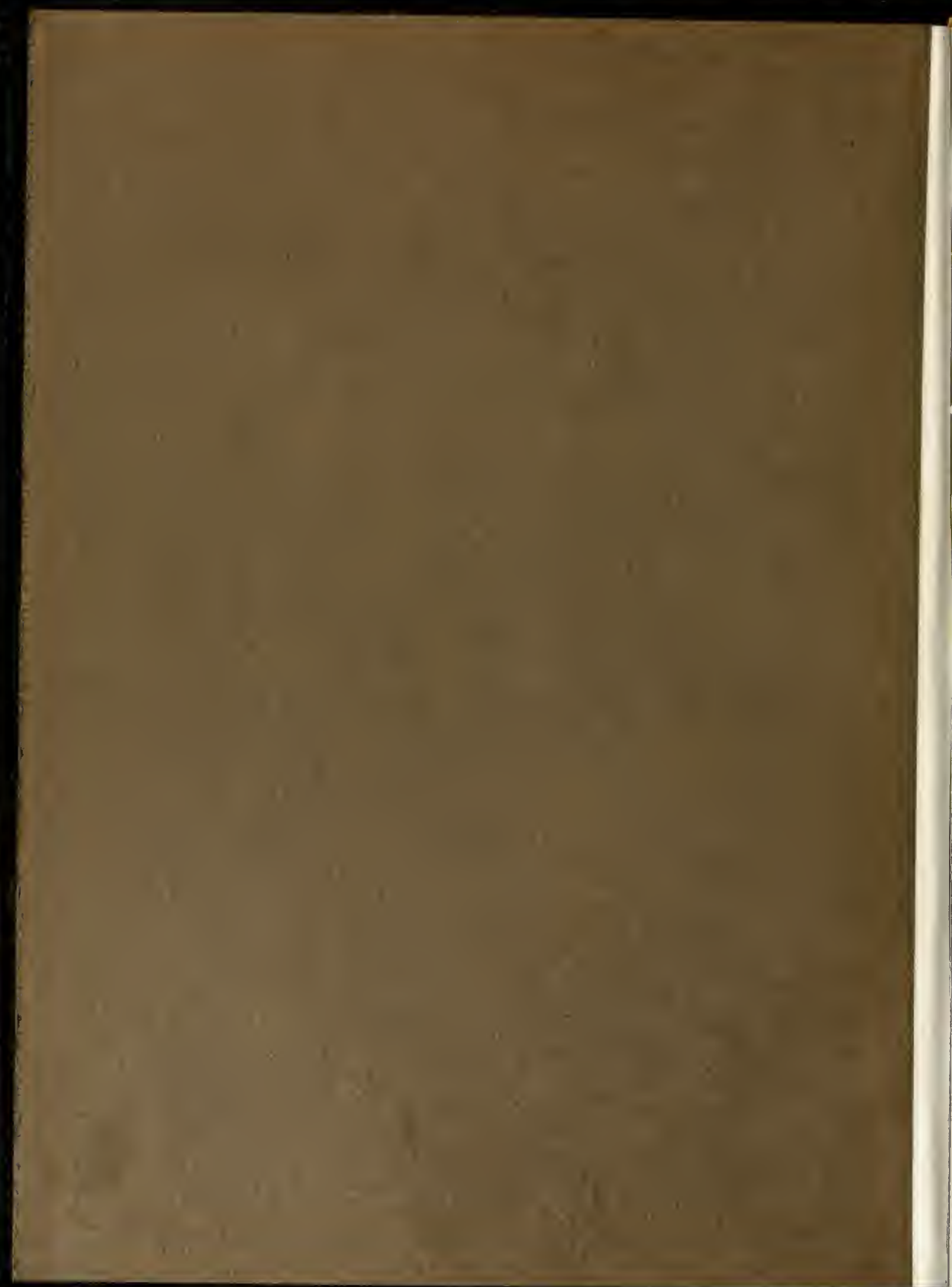

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The College Seal was recommended to the Board of Trustees by Dr. Charles E. Taylor and President Poteat, Committee, on December 11, 1907, and was adopted. It was drawn by Miss Ida B. Poteat, Professor of Art in the Baptist University for Women, and engraved by E. A. Wright, of Philadelphia. Very few of the students know the symbolism of the Seal so we will add a few words about it. On this shield in the center are a monogram of the first two letters (XP—Chi and Rho—it is possible to make out all the letters) of *Christos*, the Greek form of Christ, and the Greek Alpha and Omega. The rays of light issuing from the monogram suggest that Christ is the light of the world, and that Wake Forest College is an agent of its dissemination, "Pro Humanitate"—for the benefit of mankind.





## FOREWORD

## CLASS HISTORY

And the Three Great Fates, whose office it is to spin the threads of human destiny must have been mindful of this, when in September 1921, they directed a band of buxom youth toward Wake Forest College where they should take the first tottering steps of their educational career.

No sooner had we entered into our work, than each began to make himself manifest according to his own merits. Some believed that greatness must be achieved; others believed that greatness must be thrust upon them. The one acquired fame; the other received the scorn of the professors. The unearthly lamentations of some could be heard from beneath some magnolia tree when brooding darkness spreads its threatening wings. For experimental barbering and dexterous blacking have ever been the traditional inheritance of the Sophomores; and that year the scalps of twenty-five "Newish" were taken. But this only served to test the metal of the Class, and that year, under the presidency of L. A. Peacock, it proved itself to be a band of hard workers.

The next year marked a great improvement in the matter of college life, for, in 1922, Student Government was brought into effect here. The greatest honor which the college can bestow upon a man, that of the presidency of the Student Body, was placed upon John Thomas, who proved himself wholly capable of that great honor. The members of the Class gave their hearty support to the cause of Student Government, and the result was that hazing is almost a thing of the past. During this year each member of the Class took a definite stand against hazing. It is an honor to be a member of the first Class to do this. That year, D. H. Harris, a man of rare ability, was president of the Class.

During our Junior and Senior years we were under the leadership of R. H. Reitzel and R. H. McDowell, and these men proved themselves to be efficient leaders in every way, and they well deserve the high regard which the Class holds for them.

Not only in the classroom has the Class won distinction, but on the campus can be seen a number of our men, men who have won all-state honors, sporting the coveted "W." There are members of the Class who wore Old Gold and Black togs last fall when Wake Forest captured the FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP OF NORTH CAROLINA, an honor which any man would





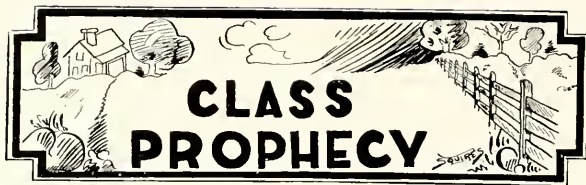
like to boast of. We are very proud to say that six members of the mighty pack of "Deacons," who walked rough shod over the other teams of the state, are members of our class. We had always looked forward to the winning of the championship while we were here, but few of us thought that our class would furnish over half the men who made up that mighty team. We hope that the record they have made will be an incentive to the others in the future, and that we may hold this high place in athletics indefinitely.

Some of our men have shown talented ability in literary fields. In our societies are men who have shown their worthy talents and ambitions as silver-toned orators. Some of the best debaters that have ever represented Wake Forest are going away with us this year. Last year we debated the College of Charleston, William and Mary, Oklahoma Baptist University, and Mercer University, winning the decision in two of the debates. Three of these debaters are members of our Class. We have some orators in our Class, and expect the best to claim honors in the contests of the State this year. In literature and writing we have men who have reached a high standard, giving us a chance to say that we have an all-round class.

The Glee Club this year was represented by a number of our jazz hounds. They made a trip over Western North Carolina this fall, and expect to make another in the spring. The Club was welcomed at every stopping place, and their program was interesting and entertaining. This organization is a great advertisement for the College and these men showed their ability in the capacity of an Orchestra and Glee Club.

In all phases of college activities the members of the Class have taken an active part, and we have enjoyed our association with each other. As we speak to each other in friendly tones and think that our paths will lead us far from the friends we have made here, we feel that it would be wonderful for the days to last awhile longer. But, as the sun, robed in rays of glory, sinks into the night, so has the sun of our college days set. So when clouds, dews, and dangers come, we must let our deeds so shine that they will ever keep illuminated with honor the holy name of our Alma Mater—Wake Forest.





**T**WAS the hour of midnight; the world was left to darkness and to me. I sat at my desk trying to adapt my weary brain to the experiments expected of a prophet. What a hopeless task it seemed. He worked for a while as general manager of Bush-Krebs Engraving Co., Louisville, Ky. and later became Art Editor of the *New York World*. He was surprised to find his old friend, Ennod Fanning, as one of the Advertising Managers.

Luther Vann succumbed to an attack of the heart soon after graduation, and they say that the wedding was one of the most magnificent in North Carolina. J. J. Tarlton, his private secretary, and former roommate was the best man. Vann is Associate Editor of the *News and Observer*.

In 1940 *Old Gold and Black* published the following news: "Friends of Wake Forest College are glad to know that Dr. D. D. Lewis has been elected to the Chair of Bible, of the Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Ky., while Dr. Hoyt Blackwell is now instructor in Greek. Dr. Sam Lamb, we must remember, is Assistant in Greek."

D. J. Robinson is Professor of Latin at Mars Hill College. M. M. Jones holds the Chair of English and Latin at Buie's Creek Academy. It is particularly interesting to hear about I. B. Lake. He has experimented for years on the best way to teach Mathematics. He has invented a method of teaching Mathematics to the feeble-minded and holds the Chair at Caswell Training School.

After graduation D. C. Lentz became U. S. Senator but he resigned to become Ambassador to England. His private secretary and adviser is Joe Beach, former professor of English at Wingate Junior College.

L. A. Peacock has succeeded in life as he has in College. He now holds the Chair of German at U. N. C.

The same can be said of Luke Barnhardt who is teaching Blackstone at that University. Pete Pagano is a prominent physician practicing in Baltimore, Md. What he did as an undertaker in College, he is doing as a doctor now. In the same town are his competitors: Drs. F. S. Peifitt, McBane, V. Case, and C. F. Jones.

Drs. M. C. Newton and R. L. Townsend in 1945 discovered the fountain of youth in the practical transmission of ape glands. Soon afterwards, Drs. C. L. Corbett, W. S. Chadwick, and

L. L. Anderson joined these two men in studying the science of rejuvenation and in 1950 these famous doctors founded the Ponce De Leon Hospital in New York City.

Dr. J. T. Love is Dean of the Medical College of Charleston, South Carolina. His excellent work is solving the malaria problem on the coast of the Palmetto State won for him the admiration of the trustees of the College and he was honored with the position he now holds. Dr. "Jack" Ellison is a successful physician in Danville, Va., the home of his father-in-law. Dr. M. Mullen is a surgeon in Rex Hospital, Raleigh, N. C. He wields a wicked knife having run a tonsorial parlor while in college. Dr. C. B. Whims and W. L. Barnes being partners at college, established the firm of "Whims and Barnes, Chiropactors" in the Cosmopolitan City of New York. They are doing a rushing business; in fact they are both rushing to see which can cure the most crooked spines and misplaced nerves. Dr. W. H. Powell is prosperous in his profession at Murfreesboro, N. C. Of course he was soon captivated and is living a life of happy captivity. Dr. E. C. Hartfield is Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Specialist in Richmond, Va. Associated with him is Dr. M. T. Foster. In 1945 Dr. G. O. Moss was elected to the Chair of Pathology at Wake Forest College. In the same year Dr. W. A. Moran, Jr. became head of the department of Anatomy at John Hopkins University. Drs. E. S. King and W. O. Brandon are situated in their own hospital near Asheville, N. C.

To the Centennial Celebration of Wake Forest College in 1934 came many of the '25 graduates. Among the gifted orators were Hon. M. G. Stamey, prominent lawyer of Asheville, and Dr. S. L. Blanton, Secretary of the Southern Baptist Sunday school Board. Professor K. E. Bryant, principal of Wake County Institute (established, 1930) presided over several of the meetings. Professor H. E. Lambert of Oxford College opened the Centennial occasion with a prayer. He brought his family with him.

E. D. Charles became mayor of Timmonsville, S. C., in 1934. He served two terms successfully, and afterwards became President of the Timmonsville Lumber Company. His treasurer and right hand man is J. P. Crumpler; and J. E. Cheves is foreman. Claude Ward is foreign representative.

W. B. Goebel, known better as the "Lady's Man," was soon captivated and captured. He has three daughters and one son, the only Wallace Goebel, Jr. in captivity. Goebel is principal of the China Grove High School. In his school are Bob Willford teaching Economics and History and J. B. Melvin instructing in Bible and English.

F. L. Paschal taught the youth of Siler City for a while after graduating, but finally went into the mercantile business. In several years he built up the Paschal Chain of Stores. His general business manager is A. J. Newton and his private secretary, John Gore. His buyers are J. H. Ware and R. B. Griffin, a man of no small experience in the business world.

W. F. Mitchell is a very successful farmer and large taxpayer. He is also president of the Board of Trustees of the schools of Youngsville, N. C. W. J. Early is a prominent banker of Aulander, N. C. B. C. Booe, due to his long study of, and proficiency in Economics at College, is a stock-broker in New York City. J. L. Dail is coaching athletics at Elizabeth City High School, while C. M. Preslar is coaching football at Carson and Newman College. M. Karlskint is Assistant Coach at Wake Forest College. Frank Armstrong is coaching athletics in the Durham Public Schools.

D. H. Harris is Professor of Mathematics at Furman University. J. B. Haney and J. A. Williams having decided to beat the boll weevil at his game, are in the truck garden business. R. T. Moore is traveling salesman for O. H. Berry Clothing Co. of Richmond, Va. H. B. Edwards has a jewelry store in Washington, D. C., and is prosperous in business. K. L. Mui is Ambassador to U. S. from China.

Among the prominent clergymen of '25 are Revs. L. W. Cain of White Oaks Baptist Church; W. W. Morgan of Asheville Baptist Church; W. C. Reid of Charlotte Baptist Church; C. L. Pearce of Colerain; R. L. Pugh, Newbern Baptist Church; H. C. McDowell being his Assistant; A. B. Alderman, Rose Hill Baptist Church; R. A. Gardner, Gaffney, S. C., Baptist Church.



**Autobiography**

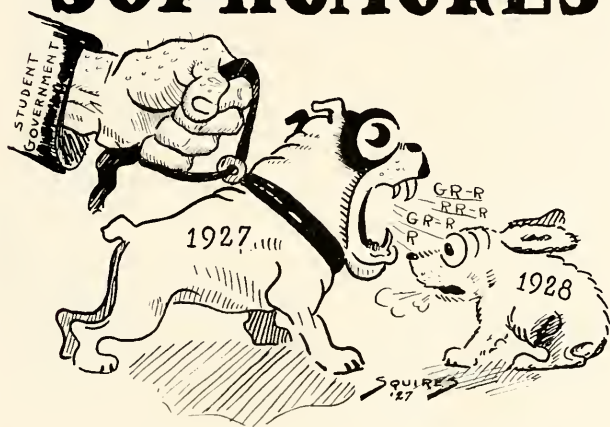

COACH HENRY M. GARRITY

When Henry M. Garrity came to Wake Forest two years ago as head coach, athletics at Wake Forest were at a very low ebb, especially in football. The end of each season on the gridiron found the Baptists in the sub-cellar with the smaller schools of the State. The record in basketball and baseball was better than the record in football.

In two years Garrity brought a complete change. The fruits of these years are: second place in football in North Carolina in 1923, first place in football in North Carolina in 1924, high place in baseball and basketball in North Carolina both years.

While teaching the Wake Forest students to play in such form as to win victories, Coach Garrity has at the same time told them to "play fair, play like gentlemen."

In 1919, 1920, 1921 Garrity played regular halfback for Princeton. It was during one of these years that Heywood Broun wrote of Garrity in the "New York World," "Princeton has four great backs, but the greatest of these is Garrity." Later Broun used this sentence in his book "The Boy Grew Older."

Garrity was All-American halfback in 1920. While at the famous University, he played full time in three Harvard and three Yale games in three successive years.



"PHIL" UTLEY is a son of Wake Forest. He finished this Institution in 1913, having been a star in his day. After completing his college career he became Coach of Football at Carson-Newman College. Later, he was chosen Director of Athletics at Lenoir College. He has attended several summer sessions at the University of Illinois, and in the fall of 1922 was made Director of Athletics at Wake Forest College, and with the coming of Garrity, in 1923, was made Director of Physical Education.

ROBERT S. HAYS is a graduate of the University of Missouri, having received his B.S. Degree there in 1924. In the spring of 1924 he accepted the position as Coach of the Freshman teams at Wake Forest College. While at Missouri Coach Hays was a star athlete, playing football, basketball and baseball. He has proved himself a Coach since at Wake Forest, taking charge of Freshman Football in fall of 1924, and getting into shape a machine that baffled all other teams it met. This team was the FRESHMAN CHAMPIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA.

JOHN C. CADDELL, JR., Coach of Freshman Baseball, was first connected with athletics at Wake Forest in 1889 when he was the Mascot of the Championship Baseball Team of the State. In 1900 he became a member of the varsity baseball team, and played catcher for three years. After his college days he played some semi-professional baseball, and since then has served as umpire for different teams in the state. This summer he became Secretary of Wake Forest Athletic Association.

# NORTH CAROLINA CHAMPIONS

## Football 1924

### SUMMARY

EXCITEMENT rose to a fever heat as the veterans of the season of 1923 gathered once again on the Gore Field, September 2, to begin anew their battle for honor on the gridiron. The appearance of Coach Henry Garrity and the familiar faces of his tried and trusty men gladdened the hearts of all those who so anxiously watched—and the stage seemed to be set for the best season imaginable. Only one Deacon of last year's eleven was missing—the boy from the plains of Kansas, Cowboy Emmerson, that massive tower of strength in the center of the line. In less than two weeks, however, even this cause for worry was overcome and the "Big-boy" was back in place, functioning even better than he had the year before. So, during the two weeks previous to the opening of the scholastic year, this squad, small but competent and determined, was whipped into shape in such a wonderful way, that both coaches and the small group of select spectators were forced to admit that they looked like a "Million dollars."

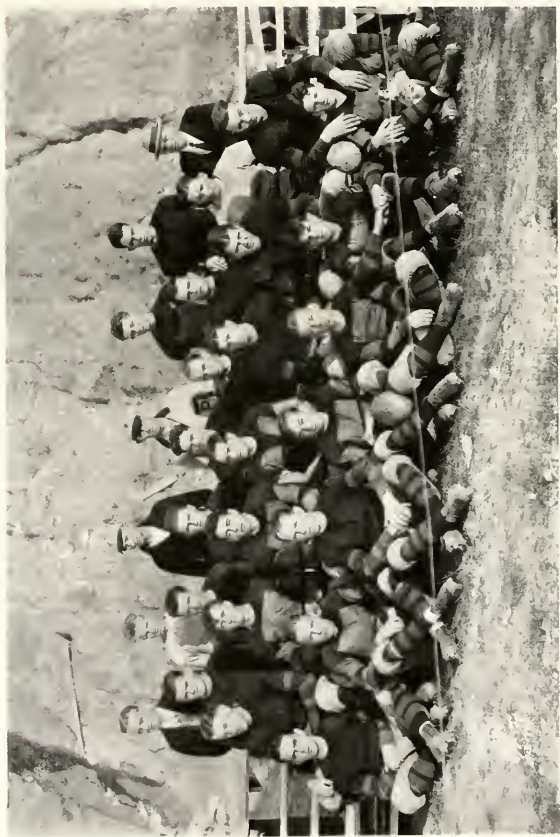
After the team, led by Captain Moran, had defeated the University of North Carolina, 7-6, on September 27, no one any longer had doubt as to who would win the laurels in the state. It was only a matter of the passing of a few Saturday's, each bringing a nearer realization of the goal; until November 22 the coveted honor rested on the shoulders of the Demon Deacons. Going forward at a high pace, this smoothly running machine passed over Trinity on Armistice Day and on through North Carolina State for the CHAMPIONSHIP on November 22. Even the well arranged and carefully prepared "Dope" regarding our certain defeat by Washington and Lee was upset and again Wake Forest was the victor 10-8. Our team ended the season with only two defeats, one at the hands of the Gators of Florida, the other by the Game Cocks of South Carolina.

Little need be said in praise of either this team or its coaches. Their record tells its own story in terms more forceful than any that can be written here. So at this; the end of the most successful year the College has ever witnessed on the gridiron, we, the students give to Coach Garrity and his assistants, Coaches Utley and Hays our great appreciation for the wonderful work they have done. We take off our hats in honor to them and to each member of the CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM OF 1924.

FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA—1921

W. A. MORAN, Jr., captain and tackle of the state championship team, hails from Ridgewood, New Jersey. "Bill" was one of the main factors in deciding Wake Forest's position at the top of football honors in North Carolina. He was unanimously picked for the mythical all-state eleven both last year and this, and is considered one of the greatest tackles in the South. He led his team through every game played in the successful season just past, and also played in all the games of the 1923 season.

FRED B. EMMERSON, all-state center, '23, '24, is a native of the Middle West. He claims Fort Scott, Kansas as his home. He is well known on the campus as "Cowboy" Emerson. As a defensive man in football he is perhaps not surpassed in the East. His specialty is "tacklin' 'em low" and he never misses. Playing in every game during the season he was at his best in the State College game. He was not taken out of a game during the season on account of injuries and was ready for the basketball season at the beginning of the year.

R. G. RACKLEY, quarterback, lives in Goldsboro, N. C., and is one of the coolest-headed quarterbacks North Carolina has ever produced. He played in every game of the 1924 season and was unanimously chosen as all-state quarterback by coaches and newspaper men of the state. He not only generated the team on the field but took his turo at carrying the ball. He rarely ever played in a game that he was not the fastest man on either team. His specialty was running plays that were least expected by the opposition, relying on the theory that the unexpected wins in athletics.

MURRAY GREASON, all-state halfback, didn't have to leave home to win fame. He lives in the town of Wake Forest. Murray is a three-letter man, playing baseball and basketball in addition to the gridiron sport. One of the lightest men that ever wore an Old Gold and Black uniform, also one of the fastest. His side-stepping is unsurpassable and if given a square foot of space he will go through any football line. He took the Carolina game single-handed when he ran seventy yards for a touchdown. He was then only repeating what he did against Trinity and Davidson in 1923.





D. C. LENTZ, guard. Lentz has been a regular on the Wake Forest football team for the past four years. He was at his best in the season just finished. His size and strength stopped many of the opposition's plays on the line of scrimmage and helped to open the way for his own backfield men.

C. F. JONES, guard. Clyde hails from Shelby, N. C. He was picked for all-state guard in the past season and deserved the place. He was perhaps the fastest man playing that position in the state and was one of the hardest fighters on the championship team. There was not a game in which he was caught losing and he was always one of the first men down under punts.

F. A. ARMSTRONG, JR., Halfback. N. C. halfback. Frank was considered one of the best defense men in the state during the past season. Although not in all the games, due to injuries, he was one of the most valuable men in the backfield on the championship team.

P. PAGANO, Halfback. N. J. Played end on the championship team and was always there with the goods. He was captain of the 1922 team and his experience and general knowledge of the game make him one of the chief factors in the successful season of 1923.

W. W. ELLERBE, tackle, hails from Rockingham, N. C. The 1924 season found "Bill" playing his second year as tackle on the Wake Forest varsity football team. In kicking placement kicks after touchdown Bill is there with the goods. It was this lone point that proved the margin of the victory over Carolina in the season just passed. One of the steadiest men on the team Bill can always be relied upon to do his part.

W. S. RILEY, end, is a Georgia youth and claims Albany as his home. "Bill" was a brilliant end, and was chosen by one sport writer as an all-state man. He can always be relied upon to be one of the first men down under punts. He was one of the main factors in the decisive defeat given Trinity on Armistice Day when he plungered through and broke up two of the opposing teams' punts, which resulted directly in two of Wake Forest's touchdowns. This is Bill's second year at Wake Forest.

M. KARLESKINT, fullback, comes from Fort Scott, Kansas. This is Karleskint's second year at Wake Forest and his second year as fullback on the football squad. He was an all-state man in 1923. When there was only a few feet required for a fire-down the ball was always given to Karleskint and it always went the required distance. He was one of the best line players in North Carolina both last year and this.

PAUL G. SYKES, Durham, N. C., was a utility backfield man during the 1924 season. He filled the gap left after the Carolina game when Frank Arkstrang was injured and also substituted many times at full back. He was one of the hardest working men on the squad and is expected to be a valuable asset to the team during the next two years.







R. A. COLLIER, tackle. Bob is a native of our next door neighbor state on the north. He is proof that Virginia sometimes turns our football players as well as presidents. Ennoria is his home. Though not a regular on the championship team, he perhaps substituted in the line more than any other man and always gave a good account of himself. As this is only his second year in college athletics he is expected to prove a power of strength in the line during the remainder of his stay here.

W. E. DANIELS, Jr., end, "Black Boy" comes from Weldon, N. C. and there is yet to be found a form of athletics in the college that he is not good in. He proved an able substitute for Frazee and Riky during the past football season and will in all probability be a regular on the team for the next two years. He has plenty of speed and can grab a forward pass in any position. He not only indulges in four sports but is considered one of the best students on the campus.

A. G. OBER, halfback, "Monk" was not eligible during the past year to play against conference teams as he had not spent a full year at the college; however in the games that he played against non-conference teams he exhibited a brand of speed and wrizzling that never failed to gain against any opposition. Monk is another Fort Scott, Kansas boy and has four years of football at Wake Forest ahead of him. He is one of the best athletes at Wake Forest.

J. Y. ELLINGTON, quarterback, Clayton, N. C. Joe proved an able substitute for Ruckley during the past season. He could always be relied upon to keep a cool head and run the plays that his chief had ordered put into execution. When forward passing was in order he could hurl the ball half the distance of the field as accurate as if it had been a baseball.



C. M. PRESLAR, Wingate, N. C. was a good substitute guard on the varsity squad both 1923 and 1924. Preslar could always be relied upon to fill in at his position any time there might be a vacancy from injury. Though not a regular in the first line-up he was a valuable man to the squad.

L. HARRIS, Wake Forest, N. C. was a utility line man during the 1924 season. He was used most of the time as substitute center and always filled that position in a nice manner when called upon. This is Harris' fourth year at the college. In 1922 he was first string center on the varsity football squad.

R. H. REITZEL, Siler City, N. C. finished his fourth year at Wake Forest this year and also his fourth year of football. His first three years at the college he played guard and center, being a regular at guard in 1922. This year he was shifted to the backfield, where he substituted in a number of games. He has always been one of the scrappiest players on the squad.

M. R. VICKERS, Durham, N. C. was a substitute backfield man in the season just finished. He substituted in a number of games during the year and always put all he had into the game when called upon. This is his second year at Wake Forest.





B. E. Hood, Goldsboro, N. C., end This is "Broadway's" third year at the college. He plays basketball and baseball as well as football. Though not a first stringer on the football team, he was on the squad during the entire year and played in several games. He could be relied upon to put what he had into the game when called upon.

J. H. Johnson, Raleigh, N. C., guard Johnson has the distinction of being the largest man on the football squad and usually used his size to advantage when in the football line. Though not a regular on the team, he made a valuable substitute in the season just passed.

T. I. CAUDLE, JR., Wadesboro, N. C. Caudle played in a number of games in the season just passed as guard. He made a valuable substitute and helped to constitute that wonderful reserve that made Garrity's team unbeatable in North Carolina.

M. W. MECKINS, Washington, N. C., backfield Meekins was a member of the championship squad during the entire year. He substituted in the backfield in several games.

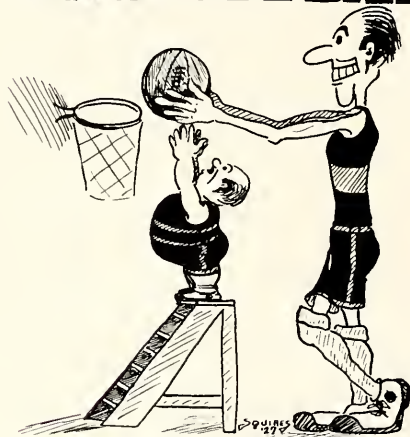


### Freshman Football Champions of N. C. 1924

### Freshman Basketball

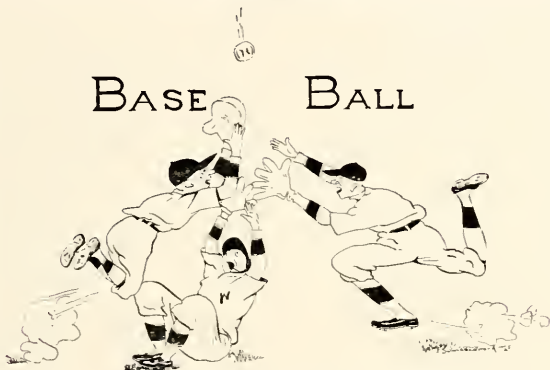
**W**HEN the football season was over, Coach Hays turned his attention to the mob that was out for basketball. If the number could have helped any, his supply was unlimited.

### Freshman Baseball Champions of N. C. 1924

**O**N March 15th, 1924, John C. Caddell, Jr., Coach of Freshman baseball called forth his veteran High School Pill-handlers for practice.
