



#### **DEDICATION**

Two hundred and nineteen strong was this band of marked men; marked at the very entrance because we were freshmen—that peculiar specimen of humanity—a college necessity. The upper-classmen at once termed us "green." And we were green, the green that characterizes the new spring sapling—fresh and "sapling green." the shade which tells to the world that we were progressive and growing, full of vitality and vim.

The first two days we spent in orientating ourselves to the new environment. Then the "Kings of the Campus" arrived and entered upon their duty of imparting the "college spirit" into us freshmen. Those keen-eyed sophomores found us where even a telescope could not locate us, and we were taken on our first outing in the form of a warm "shirt-tail parade." We organized ourselves into a class with T. A. Hauser as our first leader. Under his guidance we became a homogeneous group filled with loyalty for Wake Forest.

In reviewing the activities of the first year of the Class of '31, we find that in collegiate debate, in the publications, in athletics, and in all branches of the campus organizations, we took our places willingly and with the Wake Forest spirit surging in our veins. Our football team brought a successful season to a close by beating the varsity who early in the season had defeated the strong Carolina eleven. The band which was organized in the Fall was made up chiefly of freshmen.

The Class of '31 is unique in two ways. We entered here just as the beloved Dr. W. L. Poteat retired from the college presidency after successfully leading Wake Forest faithfully and wisely to great achievements. Thus, we were the first class to register under the new president, Dr. F. P. Gaines, whom we came to love and respect because of his pleasing personality and daring leadership. Then, again, for the first time in history we had the honor and privilege of having our pictures put in the Howler in individual form instead of group form as had been the practice, It was satisfaction indeed for us freshmen to open the Howler and find our individual pictures, and murmur cestatically. "Gosh, that's me!"

Returning in the Fall of '28 we elected the popular and efficient Arthur Myers to guide the destinies of the Class of '31 through its sophomore year. It was a fascinating task—introducing our innocent charges, the Class of '32 to the time-honored customs and traditions of this institution. A fine feeling of coöperation and good will sprang up between the hitherto hostile classes. The freshmen cap thurning, followed by a free show, was the climax in the formation of many friendships that made our college life a happy one.



We were distinctive that year in that we were the first class to lawfully paint our class numeral in large Gold and Black letters on the Meredith College water tank. A closer relationship was established with our "sister institution" when we were delightfully entertained at a sophomore party.

On the dawning of our third and Junior year, the Class of '31 with Paul Hotchins for president, began to settle down and think more seriously of the opportunities and advantages our College was offering to us. A transition took place within us as we awoke to realize that the college stage is ours for only a short time, that we must prepare and equip ourselves for life in the world outside. It was then that we did the hardest work of our college career, with nightly study the big event on our program.

In the scholastic and athletic fields we juniors produced outstanding men who made brilliant records bringing honor and glory to Wake Forest. A great love for our fellow students and for every one connected with this institution found an everlasting place in our hearts.

Entering the sacred portals of Wake Forest for the Senior and final year, the members of the Class of '31 experienced a mixed feeling of sorrow and of joy. Sorrowfol we were to think that soon our various pathways in life would lead us far from the comradeship of many friends made here, and now as we speak to each other in friendly tones we wish our college days could last awhile longer. But every beginning must have an end and, so with joy in our hearts, the last days have become days of hard work and eager anticipation—work to make certain of attaining the final goal, anticipation of the June day when we should reach that goal.

Arthor Myers was again selected to hold the chief office of the Class. The "Senior Smoker" under his direction will often be recalled in memory as our greatest social affair.

Again the Class of '31 is unique. We are the first to gradoate under our new president, Dr. Thurman D. Kitchin, who is leading Wake Forest on to greater fame and glory. Also, and for the first time at a spring graduation, two co-eds of the Class, Misses Sarah Cullom and Catherine Paschal, are to receive the Bachelor degree from Wake Forest College.

Our classmates have taken prominent parts in athletics, the band, the glee club, the literary fields, and in all other campus organizations. The power and influence of the representatives of the class in college activities show that ours has been a well-rounded class, participating fully in the life of the College.

To those who for from years have patiently guided our footsteps along the pathway of knowledge, who have tolerated our mistakes, and rejoiced in our successes, we would pay a farewell tribute. The success of their labor in our hehalf, berhaps shows but faintly at present. Foture years alone will reveal the many lives inspired by them to nobler heights of service, directed by them along the road to success and honor.

And now as the sun clothed in rays of glory sinks low into western skies, so has the sun of our college days set. Tomorrow we respond to the call of the world, and may our deeds so shine that they will ever keep illuminated with honor the holy name of our Alma Mater—Wake Forest.



### Freshmen Class History

SEPTEMBER 15, 1930, saw a horde of green Newish descend on Wake's revered campus and, by conquest of loud noise, proclaim that the class of '34 was present to assume possession. The days that followed brought a sense of surprise, excitement, and perhaps, not a little loneliness; but these days bound unorganized men together in a mutual bond of fellowship and led them to know that it is also well to serve.

Thus, it came to pass, by official and unofficial means, the freshman class was orientated to a new life. Their Majesties, the Sophs, did their invaluable part by keeping obstreperous young men bobbing beneath the new black caps constantly. The men who bobbed deepest saw campus life from new angles. Poignant impressions were given and received.

Contacts that were to make the succeeding months worthwhile resulted in the informal meetings at night in the college chapel. With Dean Bryan as toastmaster, a three ring circus was initiated wherein each freshman could gaily ride the high horse of his past achievements. Those nights were moments of high promise, and the fact that asperations soured into thin air shouldn't, perhaps, make them appear less worthy.

With the help, as days passed, of three-fourths of the student body, the freshmen finally got adjusted. Being welcomed, from the beginning, by a friendly spirit, the new men entered into the activities of the campus. They made early attempts in the scholastic, literary, and journalistic world about them. From the large class of 226, only six failed to pass required work, the first semester. As the half-year term rolled to completion, the class sported seventeen of its members on the Honor Roll. In the realm of sports, the freshman teams in football, basketball, tennis, baseball, and track seemed to provide a nucleus from which players of ability would develop later. Abetted by flexible vocal cords and crooning horns, several Newish filled places in the Glec Club and College Band. The men after their introduction to every phase of activity rounded out their first year of development by organizing into a class body. Harry Sells was elected president. His aides in the offices of vice president and secretary were Wallace Temples and Herbert Baucom.

The unfolding of the mysteries of initiation reached completion late in March. The mighty Soph, endgel in hand, led the long parade to the old athletic field. Here with a bonfire roaring, the freshmen cut capers under direction, sang unintelligible ditties, professed incurable greenness, rivaled Cam Morrison's oratory, and generally went through the paces. Nothing was done incompletely. The effigy of serfdom (the black cap) was duly encased in its coffin, prayed over, and consigned to the flames. It was a tearless funeral, but a glorious night.

As the first year closes on this new adventure—college, there stands forth in the class of 34 many distinctive features. It is the first freshman class inaugurated in the administration of Wake Forest's new president. There is no little pride in this fact; for between executive and student exists the feeling that they have taken the road together. Again, this class, drawing it representatives from many states, is one of the largest to be enrolled on the student roster. Finally, this group of men meets the challenge of the college's Jubilee Year. To produce a worth name on the Alma Mater's one hundredth anniversary is not an inglorious mission. Such a goal beckons the class of '34.

#### Law Class History

No history of the present law class would be complete without first giving a brief sketch of the struggles and achievements of the law school in the past. For thirty-seven years the law school has been an active and vital part of our dear Ahma Mater. Throughout this period of useful existence the department has had at its head a remarkable man; an attempt to describe him to those who have sat at his feet could add nothing, and to those who have not known him personally all the describite powers of the great masters of the past ages could not accurately portray his appreciation of the higher things of life, his never failing sense of humor, and his supreme desire for justice to humanity. As the work grew heavier and the opportunities became greater Professor E. W. Timherlake in 1906 was made associate professor of law to assist Dr. Gulley. In 1916 the need of more help was felt and Professor R. B. White was added to this group. These three great men have served most unselfishly to the present time.

"By their fruits shall ye know them?" During the thirty-seven years of the activities of the law school, fourteen hundred and twenty-six licensed attorneys have been sent forth into the world to proclaim the "Law of the hand." The great number of judges, solicitors, and others holding high offices of honor and trust who claim Wake Wake Forest College as their Alma Mater is only an outward indication of the lives of those whose destinies have been shaped while studying law at "Dear 'Ole Wake."

The Law Library, under the direction of Mr. Donald Gulley, is increasing its usefulness and expanding its scope continually. Some two thousand volumes have already been added this year and eight thousand more are to be added before the beginning of the next school year.

Many of the leading students of the campus this year have been from the law class of 1931. The "Demon Deacon" football, baskethall, baseball, tennis, and track teams have had generous representation from our group. High offices of the student body have been admirably filled by members of our class. Every member of the class of 31 is a licensed attorney, many of them having secured their license while yet in their junior year.

The moot court has been a marked success throughout this year. Cases of interest representing various types and classes of litigation both eivil and criminal are tried at the weekly meeting of our court. Wake Forest opened her 1930 season against Carolina and with a steady line and a flashing backfield handed out surprise after surprise to the thousands of fans present in Kenan Stadium. For the past two seasons the Tar Heels had "walloped" the Deacons by large scores but when the score stood 7-7 at the half and 13-7 at the end of the game, no one present doubted the fact that the greatest Deacon team since the days of Garrity had played that day, although the Tar Heels had won. Praise was heard far and near and Deacon stock rose several points.

#### DEACONS PERSECUTE THE QUAKERS FOR FOUR QUARTERS

On October 1 the Guilford "Quakers" journeyed down to Wake Forest to try their strength against the Demon Deacons. The Deacons had quite a reputation to live up to as their praise had been sung far and near as a result of the Carolina game. For the first half the score was 0-0. The Deacons came back the second half and ran rough-shod over the Quakers. The backfield was as flashy as ever and the line strong and steady. Quillin darted here and there and Mills got away for several long and sensational runs, and when the game ended the score stood 20-0 with the Deacons on top.

#### FOOTBALL "TRACK-MEET" STAGED AGAINST BALTIMORE

Baltimore University came down to Wake Forest on October 10. This game furnished the Deacons with plenty of practice resembling a track-meet. The Deacons gained yard after yard, they continually had the ball in Baltimore's territory, they were never satisfied with less than a touchdown, and when the game ended the score stood 44-0 in their favor. This game was featured by sensational runs by Mills, Quillin, Hipps, and Covington. The work of Benton at quarter was excellent and the linemen held Baltimore from gaining ground time and time again and opened huge holes in the opposing line for the Deacon backs. Hipps favored the fans with a sensational run of seventy yards without any interference while returning a punt. Needless to say the goal line was his stopping place. Hutchins, at quarter, also made a nervee-racking, plunging, hard carned thirty-yard run for a touchdown. Every Deacon on the squad saw action in this game.

#### DEACONS AVENGE THE '29 SCORE IN FAIR-WEEK GAME

The Annual Fair Week Game between Wake Forest and N. C. State was played on Riddick Field October 16. State won the '29 game by a two-point margin, although outplayed by





Wake Forest in every phase of the game. On this day, however, the Deacons were determined to avenge that score. In the preceding games this team had built up a reputation such as it had not known since Garrity had coached a Deacon team to victory. The line, strongest in the state, and the backfield combined all their efforts and gave an exhibition of snappy, flashy, heads-up football, and even a Wolfpack could not withstand the Deacons as they rushed onward, heards and all. The line was much strengthened by the return of Gregson, and as usual he played a game as only Gregson could. The flashing backs seemed to "breeze" along and Wake Forest came out on top. The Deacons seemed to place a jinx on all animals during the season of 1930. Not only did the Wolfpack go down under their attack, but the very next game the Mercer Bears were shown that Baptist Deacons are pretty obstinate fellows sometimes. This game was played in Wilmington. As usual the line, a veritable tower of strength, opened wide holes for the swift, flect, nimble backs who got away for eye-opening runs. Brogden, end, featured in the work of the line. Every man was playing a game that brought credit and home to his Alma Mater. Each man was doing his part to add another victory to those already won by the men of Coach "Pat." When the dust cleared the Bears were found completely wiped out by a score of 21-0.

#### TOO MUCH DARKNESS FOR THE BAPTISTS

On November 1 the Deacons took a trip up to Philadelphia to meet Temple University, This was the only night game played this year and the darkness proved a hindrance to the Demon Deacons. Such a hindrance, in fact, that Temple had the pleasure of seeing Wake Forest lose by a 36-0 score. This may be partially explained by the fact that eleven Deacons were not quite enough to destroy a pretty good sized Temple.

#### PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE PROVES TOO MUCH

On November 8 Coach Pat's boys took a little trip up to Asheville to meet an old acquaintance. This old acquaintance, not satisfied with holding Wake Forest to a scoreless tie in '29, was determined to take home the bacon. Of course, not wanting to disappoint the boys from P, C, the Deacons let them have the large end of the score. This was somewhat the situation of the year before when the Demon Deacons went North to play the Navy and played P, C, upon their return, the score being 0-0. In view of this situation of two successive years it would seem that after going North the Deacons need at least a game in which to get warmed up again.





#### DEACONS AND DEVILS FIGHT FOR VICTORY

On November 22 the Blue Devils from across the way came over to Wake Forest to shave the Deacons. However, the Blue Devils were more black than blue when the game ended. Too much praise cannot be given the Wake Forest team for their wonderful playing in this game. The Deacon team worked like a million-dollar machine. Every part coordinated perfectly, The plays were perfectly timed. Each man was "Johnnie on the spot," The true Deacon spirit was shown-a never dying spirit! One man played the entire game with a broken rib, and another, in the words of Mr. Bost, played "with his eyes entirely gouged out." The line lived up to its reputation of being the strongest in the state and piled on more glory by holding the Devils on the one-yard line for eight plays. Not only did it hold against the attacks of Brewer and Murray and the Devils, but it opened up holes for the Deacon backs. The Duke line was like paper against the slaughtering, slithering, slashing, plunging attack of Gregson, Webb, Williams, Parker, Dupree, Levine, and Brogden. These men paved the way for Mills, Quillen, Covington, and Bradley. Over all was the veteran, Jit Benton, driving the Deacons to a flashing, shining, brilliant attack. Fighting like Devils the Dukemen came back and after a scorching attack from the one-yard line, Bill Murray ran around the end for a touchdown and a tied score. For further events of that game one is referred to the Greensboro Daily News of November 23.

#### DAVIDSON GOES DOWN UNDER DEACON ROLLER

On Thanksgiving Day the Deacons, still sore and wounded from their encounter with the Devils, traveled up to Charlotte to mix with the Wildeats. Surely these Cats would prove too much for a tired, sore, and wounded Deacon. But no! the Deacon spirit arose and commanded a victory and a victory was won! The Deacon machine worked so perfectly throughout the game that to pick out outstanding players would be a difficult task. Each man played his hest and this game was the last for many Deacon players. Captain Parker, Mills, Quillin, Levine, Gregson, Benton and many others saw their last action under the Old Gold and Black banner. When the game was over Wake Forest had added another victory to those already won and the team had rivaled that Championship Team of Garrity's.

A survey of the season shows that out of nine games Wake Forest won five, fied one, and lost three. Coach Pat Miller certainly gave Wake Forest a team that any school would be proud to honor and a team that would be an honor to any school. No cleaner, squarer team ever played football on a North Carolina gridfron. Wake Forest placed four men on the first All-State team and three on the second All-State team. Mills, flashy halfback, Williams, hefty guard, received honorable mention for the All-American. No Wake Forest team was ever better supported by the Alumni and Students and friends. A great team—here's to 'en!

### 1930-31 Basketball Results

The 1930 basketball season was not one of an unusually amount of high honors. The apparent lack of success was partially due to the introduction of a new system under a new coach with practically all new men.

Carolina gave the Deacons one of the most severe trouncings of the season by snowing them under with a 30-13 score.

On a northern trip two games each were played with the Temple Owls and the Atlantic States champions of Rider College. Although the Deacons staged some marvelous fights in these games they lost them all. The most thrilling game of the trip was with George Washington University in which the Southerners were at the height of form and kept the score ahead until the last few minutes of the game. They lost gamely with the final score being 32-28.

V. P. I. furnished Wake Forest with one-half its wins of the season in a hotly contested fray at the local gym. The Gobblers were unable to withstand the powerful attack of Webb, center, Joyner and Barnes, forwards. The first win of the season gave the fans a thrill with a 10-19 score.

Exulting in their victory over V. P. I. the Deacons put up such a fight against State College in the next game that they surprised themselves by winning in the last minute of the game by a 1 point margin, the score being 20-21.

Meeting Duke soon after the State game resulted in the usual defeat, but with the experience gained in the previous two wins the Deacons gave the Devils a surprise by running them a close race for winning honors.

The last two games of the season were played against two other Big Five teams—Carolina and Davidson. These two games were hard fought affairs, but the Deacons were no match for the powerful Carolina five, and the Davidsonians by dent of their traditional wins managed to get the last laugh by a short margin.

Playing in most of the games of the season Webh, Barnes, and Joyner were easily the stars. Also, Earp, flashy forward, showed good form in several of the games.

Although the season can not be said to have been a decided success, it is hoped that with the new coach and the experience gained this season that next year the Deacons will enjoy a more profitable experience.



### 1930 Varsity Baseball

The Demon Deacon Nine had a very successful season during 1930. Twenty-one games were played during the spring. Of these the Deacons were victorious ten times while the opponents gave us the small end of the score eleven times. In spite of this the Deacon machine's total score was fifteen points higher than the total score of their opponents. The score stood 108 for the Deacon machine and 123 for the Deacons. Capt. After getting home and getting warmed up the Deacs went over to Chapel Hill and doubled the score on the Tar Heels. Not being satisfied with this they went over to the Wolfpack den and completely "whitewashed" all Wolves in sight.

This ended the season and the Deaes came home just as fresh as ever and each and every one looking forward to the Season of '34 when they could find "New Worlds to Conquer."





### Frosh Baseball 1930

The 1930 Deaclet Basehall team had a very successful season. They made their debut by winning games and when the season closed they were still winning. It was perhaps the flashiest, hardest hitting and hardest playing Freshman team that has struck Wake Forest in many years. They played a brand of ball seldom seen in these parts except in a seasoned and experienced college nine.

### 1930 Track

Although Wake Forest did not win the majority of its meets last year, it had several rather outstanding men to its credit, Kinsey, Duprec, "Ty" Jones, Enller and Byrd. Kinsey would be easily the "high point" man in the state with a total of 119 points to his credit. He is also holder of the State Broadjump record of 23 fect one-half inch. Duprec is second high score man in the college with an aggregate of 56 points. He is also a State Record holder with the javelin throw of 186 fect 5 and one-half inches. The other men of note on the squad are "Ty" Jones, Flemming Fuller, Elsie Webb, "Dong" Byrd, who made over 30 points each for the season. Cox, Hutchins and Edwards all came in with a score of above 20 points.

The first meet of the season was a dual with Elon College, at Wake Forest. Wake Forest easily came out on the big end a 107½ to 18½ score. Kinsey, as usual, was the high scorer for "Old Gold and Black" with three first and two second and one third place.


Guilford invaded the territory of the "Deacons" and was sent back home on the weak end of a 107-19 point win for the fourth meet of the season. Kinsey was high point man.

The team made a journey to Richmond and won the meet for the first time since it had been meeting the Richmond "Spiders." It was a hard-earned victory for the Deacons with a score of  $66\frac{1}{2}$  to  $59\frac{1}{2}$ . Kinsey again was high point man with four first places.

From Richmond the team journeyed on to Washington D. C., and met Catholic University. This time the score was against Wake Forest 71-52. "Ty" Jones," our star pole vaulter, soared to a new school record for the University at the height of eleven feet six inches.

At the hands of the Davidson "Wildcats" the Deacons suffered its worst defeat of the season by a score of 98½-27½. The strength of the team was severely taxed by this powerful team of Davidson. Wake Forest seems to have never been able to defeat the "Wildcats" in Track and thus this year they keep up the tradition. However to be defeated by a team of that calibre is no signal disgrace.

The end of the Track Season was a trip to the State Meet at Greensboro where Kinsey and Dupree defended and won again their usual first places. These records have been standing for three years. So ended for the Deacon Track Team a very successful season.









### 1931 Varsity Tennis

The outstanding events of the year in tennis for 1930-31 were the completion of three new tennis courts on the corner of Highways No. 50 and No. 55, and the participation of a Freshman tennis team in intercollegiate matches for the first time. The varsity was built around three letter men from last year, Jim Vernon, Frank Fletcher and Delmont Griffin. The new men who completed the varsity last fall were William Glenn, Dan Smith, and Carl Brown. The team lost its best player by the failure of Captain Vernon to return to school the second semester. This loss was partially offset by the addition of Darmin Cobb for the Spring Semester.

The annual fall tournament brought to light hitherto unknown talent, especially among the Freshmen. This tournament was won for the third consecutive time by Captain John Vernon, of Burlington, N. C. The runner-up was Delmont Griffin of Rocky Mount, N. C. The final match of this tournament went full five sets and the ontcome was in doubt until the last game. This tournament also brought to the front Freshmen Buxton, Bryan, Robeson, Hutchins, Collins and Wyche, who composed this year's freshman team.

The annual Spring tournament for Varsity and Freshmen brought out some of the best tennis that has been seen on Wake Forest Campus in many years. The varsity tournament was won for the first time by Darwin "Lefty" Cobb of Atlanta, Georgia. The runner-up was Manager and Acting-Captain Frank Fletcher of Raleigh, N. C. The freshmen tournament was won by D. B. Bryan, Jr., of Wake Forest, N. C. The runner-up was Bart Robeson of Red Springs, N. C.

The varsity schedule included at least two matches with all the Big Five Colleges (of N. C.). One match with the Raleigh Tennis Club, one with the Wake Forest Faculty, and one with Wake Forest Freshmen. Of all matches played the varsity won three and lost seven. A more detailed result of the matches follows below.

Two members of the varsity entered the State Collegiate Temis Tournament at Chapel Hill, April 23, 24, and 25, namely, Delmont Griffin and Frank Fletcher. Both met up with stiff opposition in the first round singles, and were eliminated in spite of a creditable showing. They paired together in doubles and defeated the No. 1 doubles team from State College in the first round, only to lose to Hines and Grant, the No. 1 doubles team of U. N. C., in the second round.



The freshman team played seven matches and won four of them. Their worst defeat was at the hands of the U. N. C., freshman team. On May 6, 1931, a five-man team and Manager Frank Fletcher went on a four-day trip embracing Charlotte High, Wingate Janior College, Burlington High, and Oak Ridge. Rain blocked all of match one and part of two other matches, but the freshman eame out on the winning side in the long rnn. The membership of the freshman team in the order of their ranking is as follows: D. B. Bryan, Jr., Wake Forest, N. C.; Bart Robeson, Red Springs, N. C.; Sam Buxton, Newport News, Va.; Robert Hutchins, Spencer, N. C.; Andrew Collins, Nashville, N. C.; and Henry Wyche, Whiteville, N. C.

The membership of the varsity of necessity changed quite a bit during the spring season. 
