SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In September, 1936, a proud group of 33 students enrolled in the Freshman class under Mr. Newlin with high hopes and ambitions looking forward to the four years of high school life. The class officers were; President, Alice Leach; Vice-President, Clyde Cooke; and Secretary and Treasurer, Frances Mills.

An English Club was organized which met once a week. Prizes were awarded to Jessie Mae Harvey and Graham Faucette. Jessie Mae and Frances Allen entered the Recitation Contest and the Thrift Essay Contest was won by Leatrice Thompson. The highest scholarship average was won by Alice Leach, and she was the representative from the Freshman class at the Junior-Senior Banquet.

Thirty-five people began our sophomore year. We organized with the following officers: President, Clyde Cooke; Vice-President, Alice Leach; Secretary and Treasurer, Frances Mills. At the close of the school year we had a class party at the home of Miss Thelma Cates, our home-room teacher. Again Alice Leach made the highest scholarship average and Clyde Cooke represented the class at the Junior-Senior Banquet.

We entered the Junior class with 31 members under the supervision of Miss Mary Sue Rawls. Graham Faucette was elected President; Fred Caldwell, Vice-President; Mary Ellen Hayes, Secretary; and Mildred Anderson, Treasurer. During that year our class sponsored an amateur program which was a great success. One of the most outstanding events of the year was the Junior-Senior Banquet.

Eighteen students entered the Senior Class in September, 1939, under the supervision of a new teacher, Miss La Verne Porterfield. Our grade-parents were Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Long and our mascots were Betty Sue Coble and Paige Stout. The class officers were: President, Graham Faucette; Vice-President, Mildred Terrell; Secretary, Alice Leach; Assistant Secretary, Mildred Anderson; and Treasurer, Mary Ellen Hayes.

During this year we took part in acquiring the new motion picture machine and the students and Mr. Barker started a student council.

On February 17, 1940 the Senior Class sponsored a amateur program. There were three prizes given: three dollars, two dollars, and one dollar. Joe Allen, Judith Keen, and Martha Tolleson won first, second, and third prizes respectively.

The outstanding event of the year was the Junior-Senior Banquet given on April 19th. Addison Coble was toastmaster.

Frances Allen was Editor-in-Chief of the annual and Mildred Anderson was class editor.

Now as Seniors we are beginning to realize that our high school days are drawing to a close. When we leave this school we will leave our classmates behind, but we will take memories with us and cherish them throughout our life.

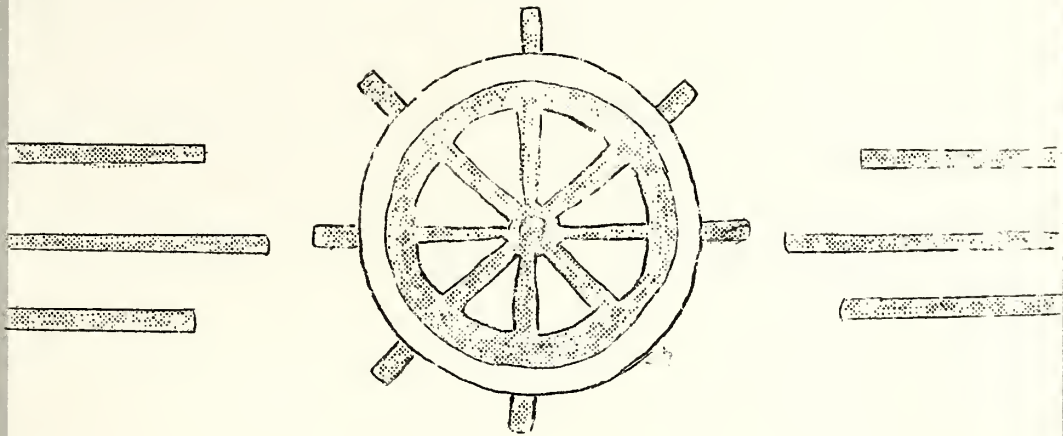
