Finally, in 1944, we reached our Senior year. For all of us, this was what we had been waiting for.

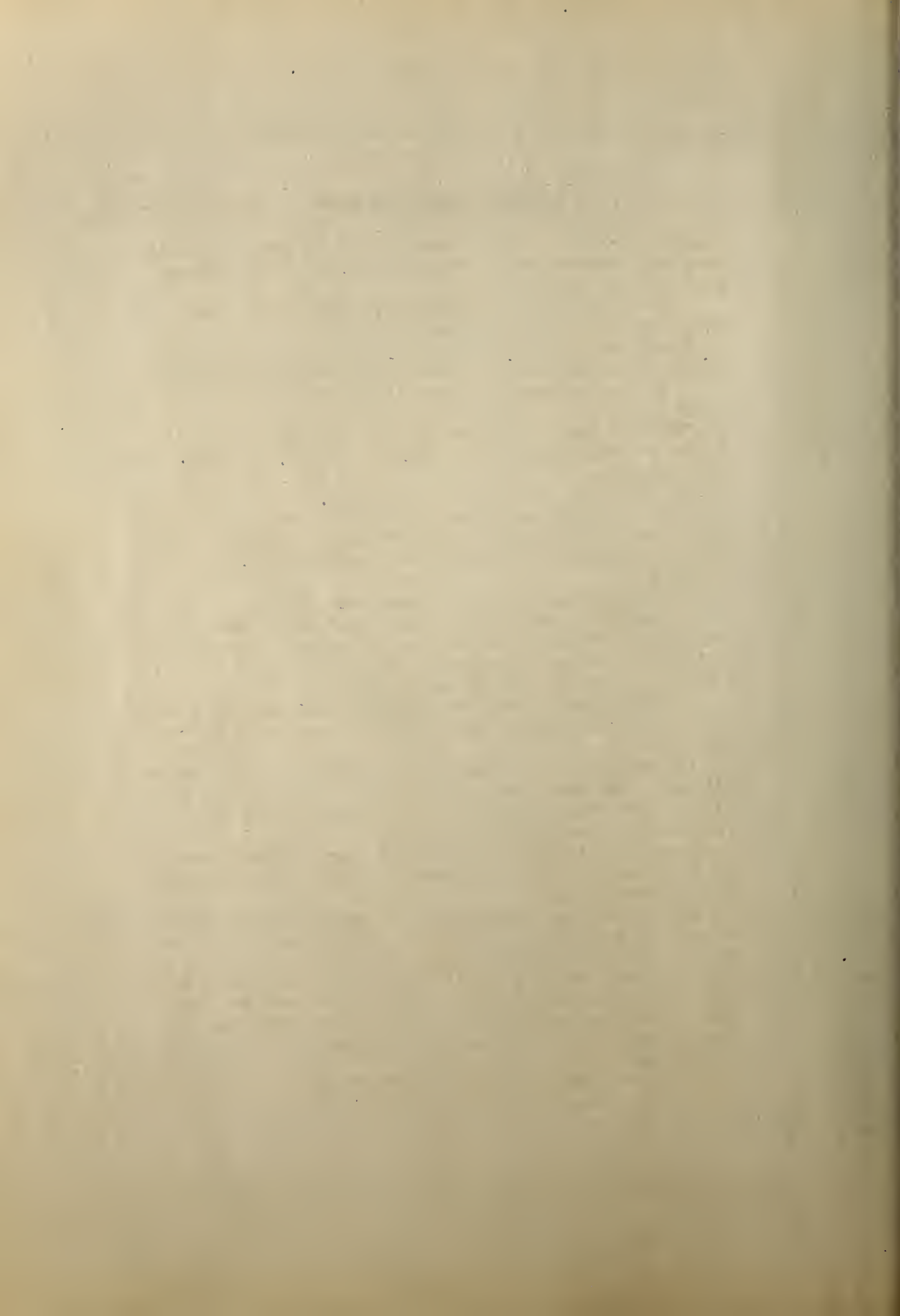
As Seniors, we took the lead in school activities. We started a series of high school parties. We took charge of the program and refreshments for the first party.

Next I saw an uptown section where Eleanor Swink was typing her daily report for the New York Trust Company.

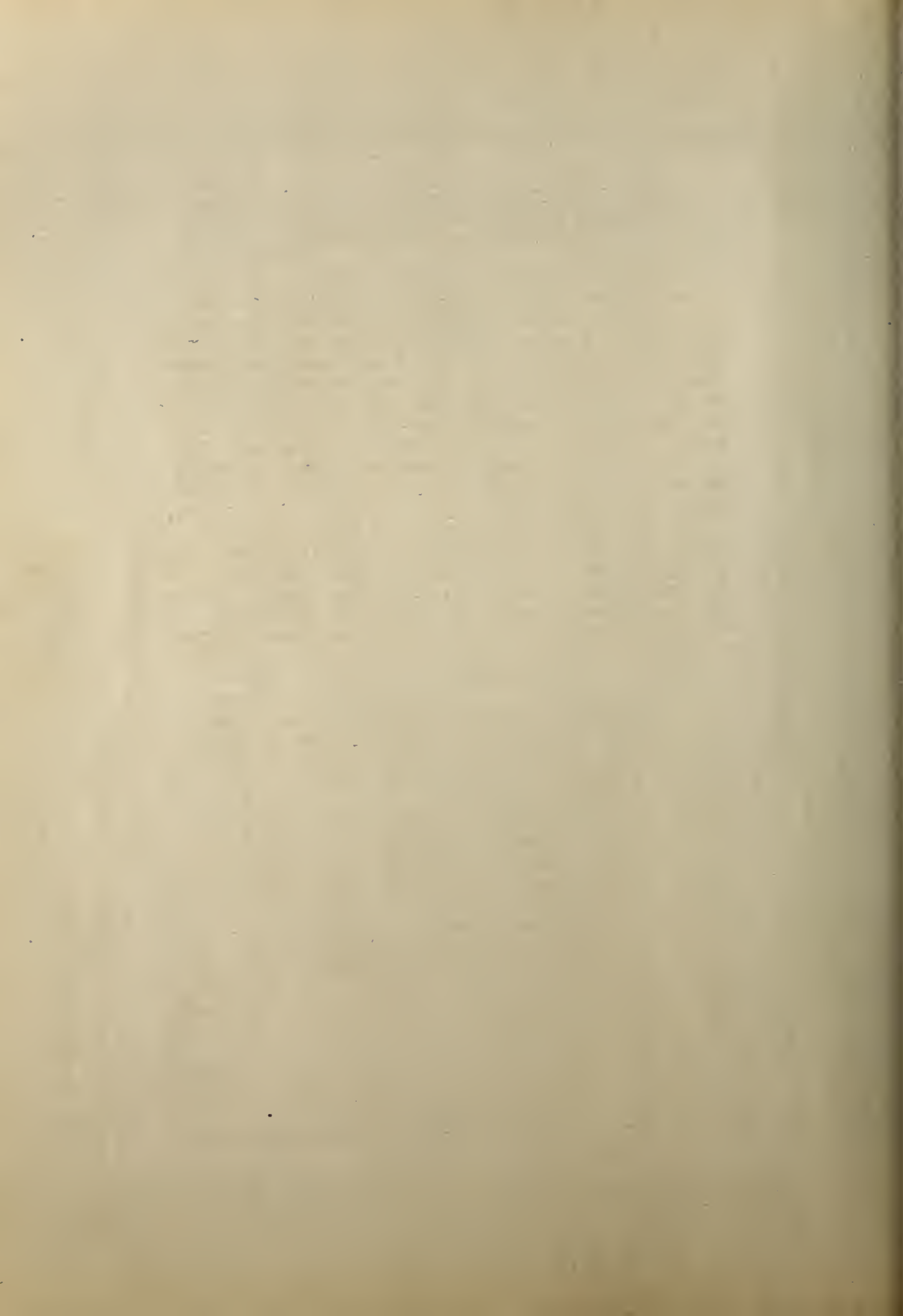

Item I: To the Principal of the school we leave, the unfailing good humor of the entire class; we are certain he will need this in dealing with the seniors who succeed us.

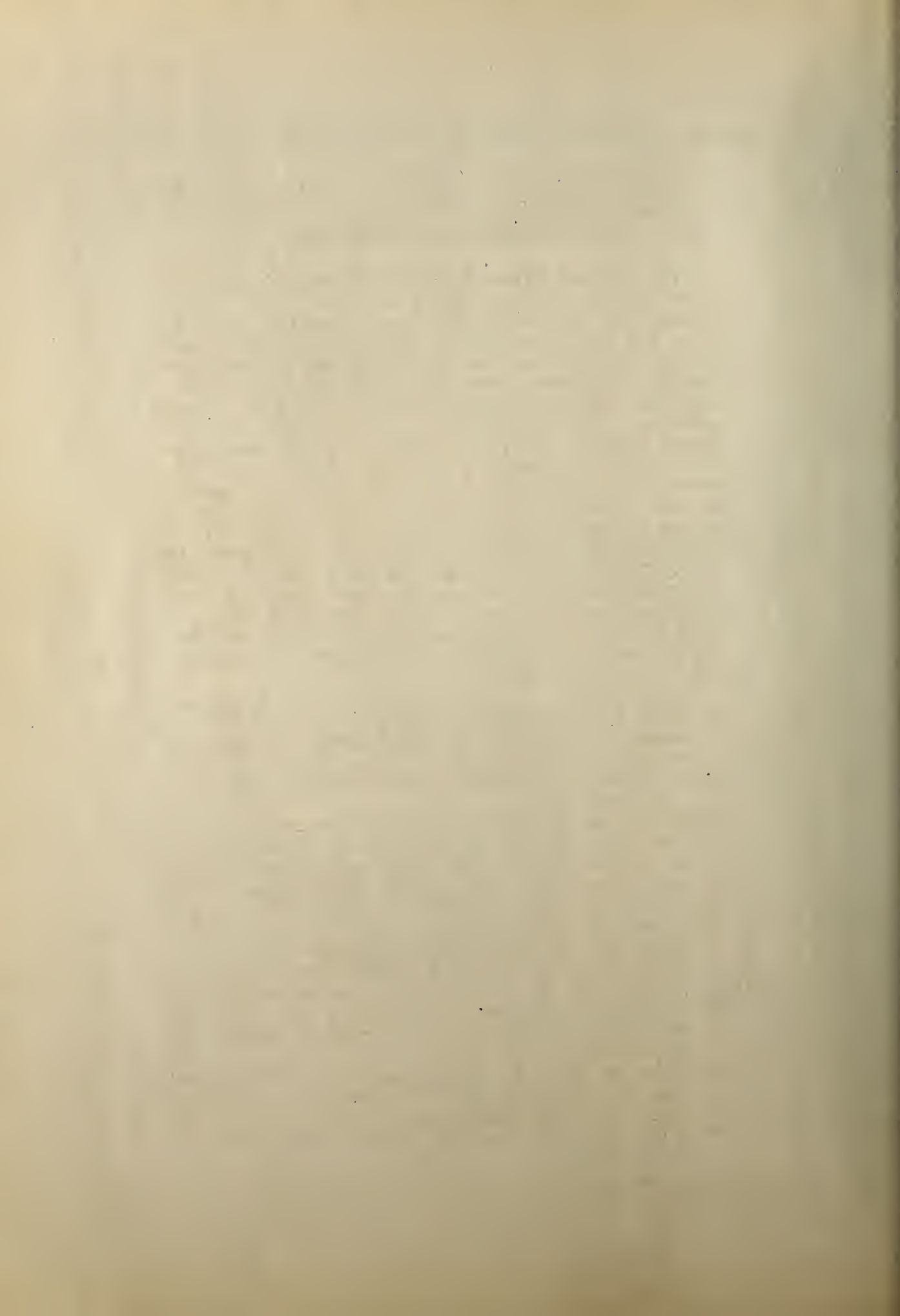

Item III: To Miss Cates, we leave a copy of Amateur Detective Suggestions, which we feel will be of great assistance in ferreting out the pranks of various students.

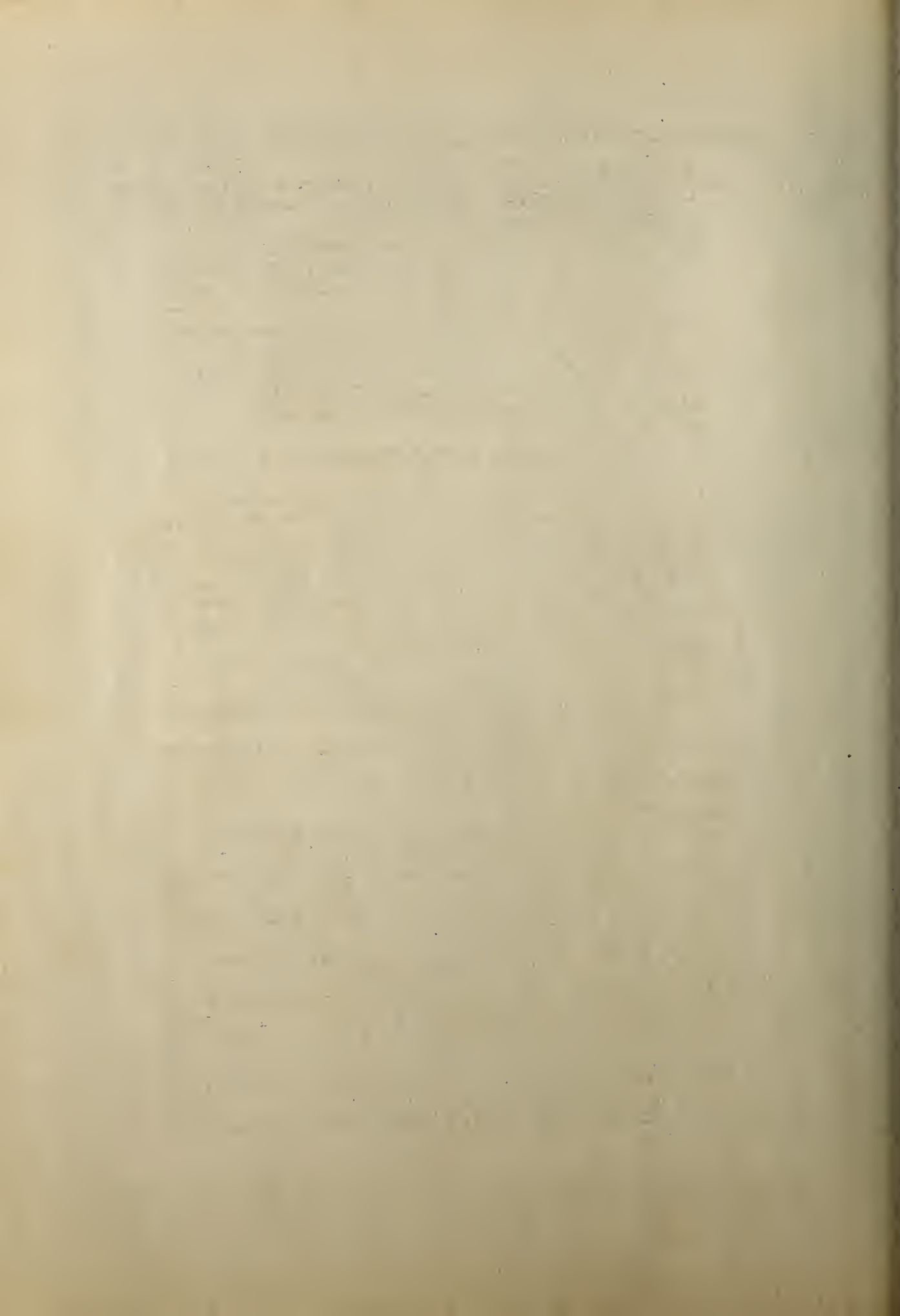
Item IV: To Miss Horne, we leave our consent to take her science class out to pitch horse-shoes.

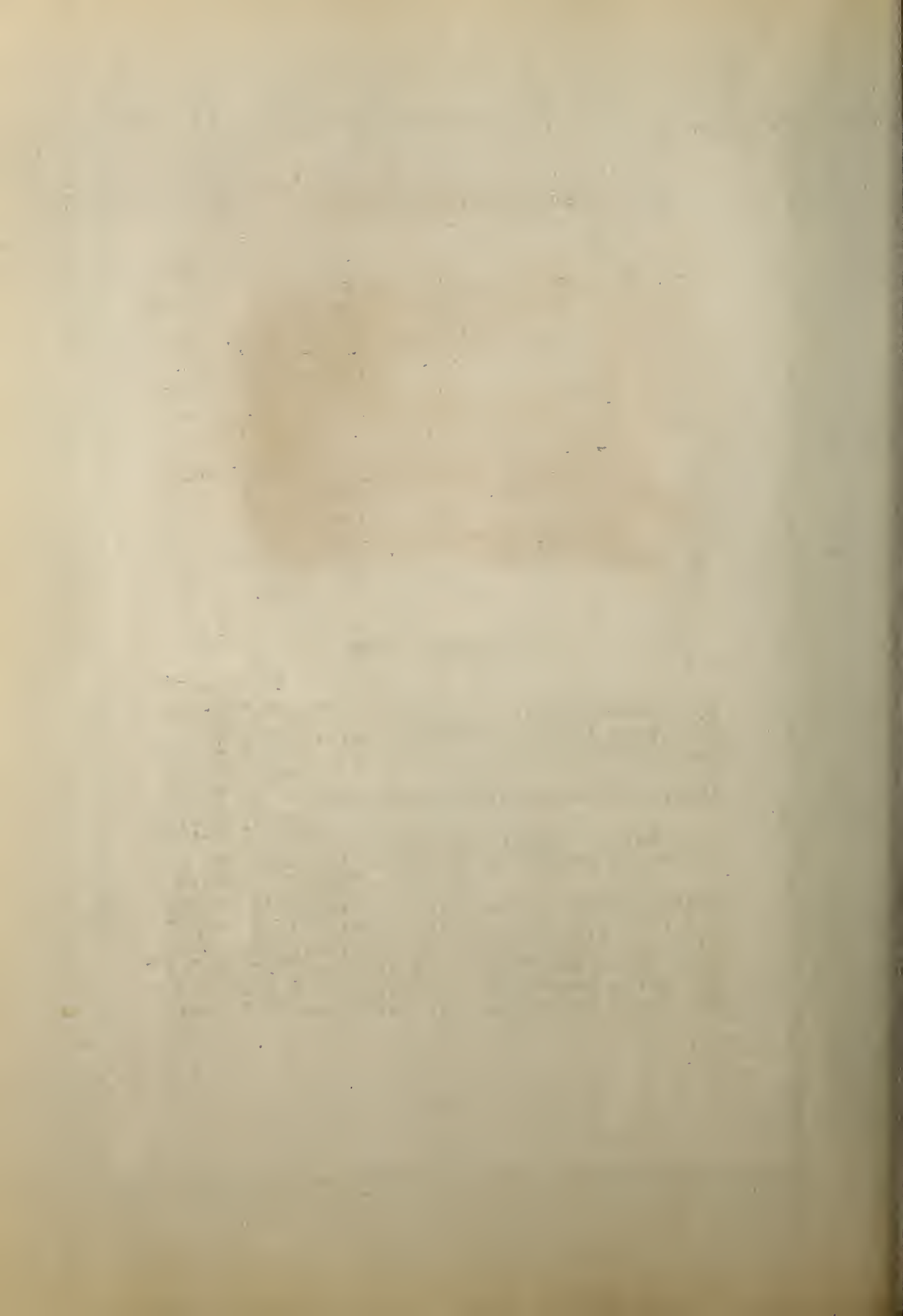

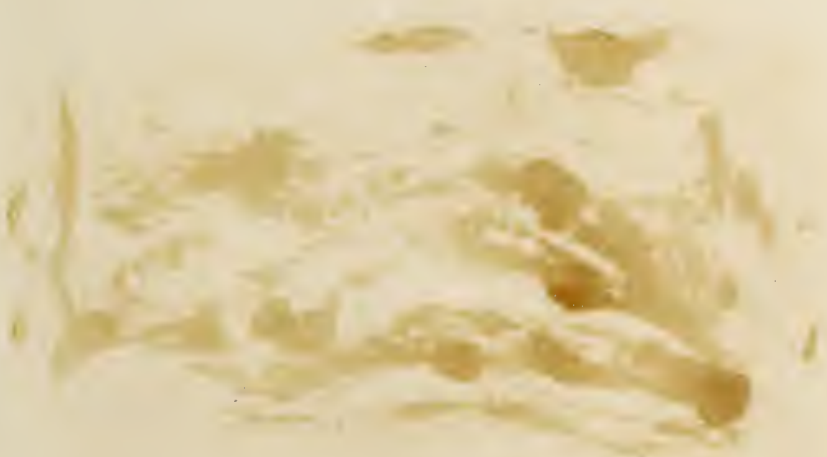
It was a most colorful evening. An attractive color scheme of green and white, the school colors, were carried throughout. The tables were decorated with running cedar and poinsettias.
