the Sophomores.


April 6th we presented the play, "Girl Shy". We had a wonderful time rehearsing and immense-

Item I: To the Principal of the school we leave, the unfailing good humor of the entire class; we are certain he will need this in dealing with the seniors who succeed us.







We have enjoyed our first year in high school very much, and are looking forward to more happy and successful years in the future.



During the month of November our class had a chapel program. It was scene from "The Courtship of Miles Standish". We are now working on another to be given in a few weeks.


