SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In December our class entertained the Seniors at the Alamance Hotel with the Sophomore-Senior Banquet.

The commencement marshalls were Nancy Isley, Alice Blackmon, and Hayden Beatty.

School started again in 1945 with nineteen members in the Junior class. We were starting the third round on the ladder of our high school days. We chose for our officers for the year President: Larry Riddle; Vice-President: Louise Holmes; Secretary: Jean Gray Tate; Treasurer: Alice Blackmon. This was the year we started making plans for a trip to Washington. We sold stationery, everyday cards, and wrapping paper to make money for our trip. Since there were no Seniors we had charge of commencement. Remember the fun we had rehearsing and presenting the Junior class play, "One Minute of Pwe'ce". The commencement marshalls were: Alice Blackmon, Nancy Lou Flynt, and Jack Laughlin.

In 1946 we finally reached the last round of our high school days. Some of our class members fell along the way, many entered the armed services and some moved to other schools, but sixteen have remained to be called "dignified"

Seniors.

Our class officers for the year were: President: Nancy Lou Flynt; Vice-President: Jack Laughlin; Secretary: Pearl Lamb; Treasurer: Nancy Isley.

On September 28, our class attended the annual "Senior Day" at Chapel Hill. We were the guests at the football game between V.P.I. and U.N.C.

On December 18 our gradeparents gave us a Christmas party. In January the Junior and Senior classes made a tour of Raleigh. Later Mr. Wabers of Western Electric invited our class to go through the plant. We readily accepted the invitation, so in February we made a tour of Western Electric

On March 14 we were the guests of the Juniors at the Junior-Senior Banquet. We all had a delightful time at a Hawaiian style banquet held at the Alamance Hotel.

On April 18 our class presented the Senior Class play "A READY MADE FAMILY". It was a great success.

We are planning to leave on May 5 for Washington.

We are very fortunate to have in our class several contest winners. Elsie Hufstader, Geneva Foster (A former classmate) and Jean Riddle are winners of the Brook's Memorial Recitation Medal. Betty Williams and Nancy Lou Flynt are runners-up in these recitation contests. Glenn Hannah and Hayden Beatty are winners of the Wilkins Memorial Declamation medal. Alice Blackmon was the winner of the World Peace Contest. She was presented a medal by the Alamance Bar Association. Glenn Hannah was twice winner of the American Legion Contest. He was presented two medals and two savings bonds.

Yes, we have some very pleasant memories of our high school days-----Memories that we shall never forget.

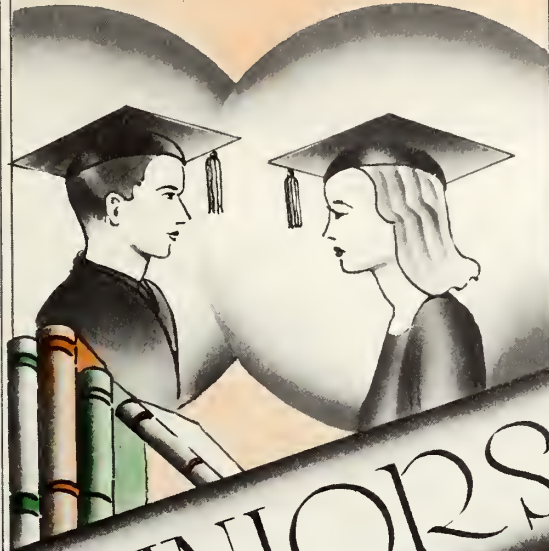

Treasurer- John Robert Watkins

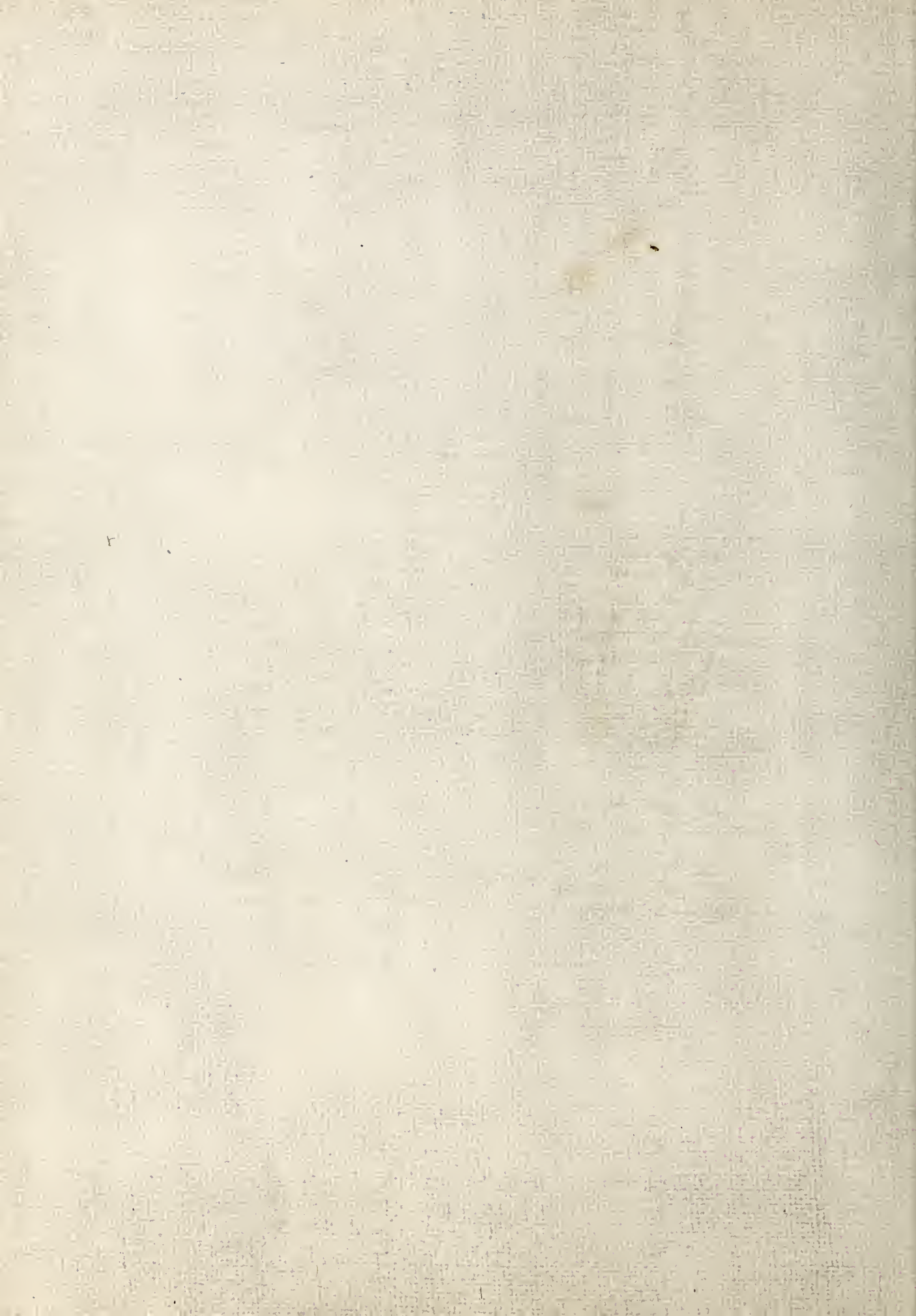

We had our first class party at the home of Miss Cates. Everyone enjoyed himself and left with a hope that we would have another one very soon.

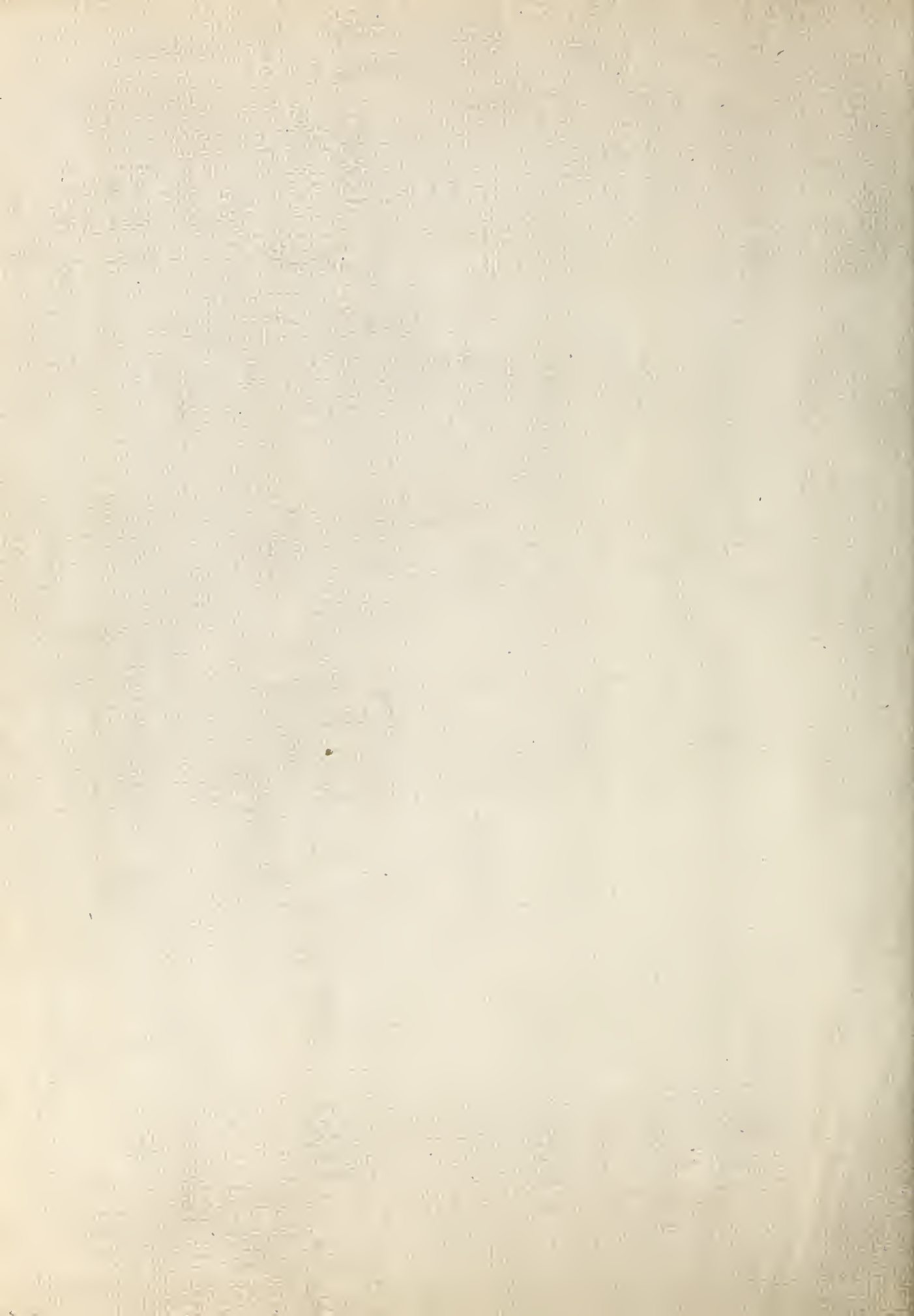

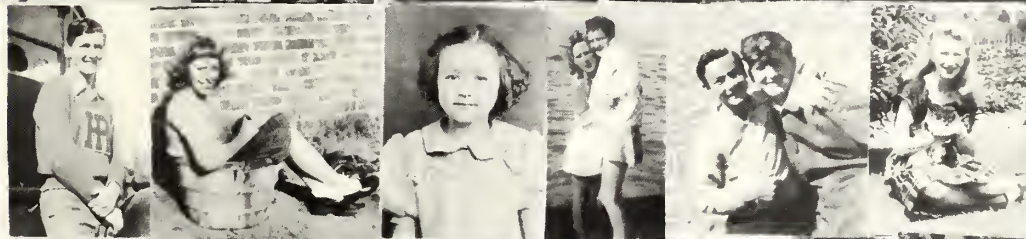

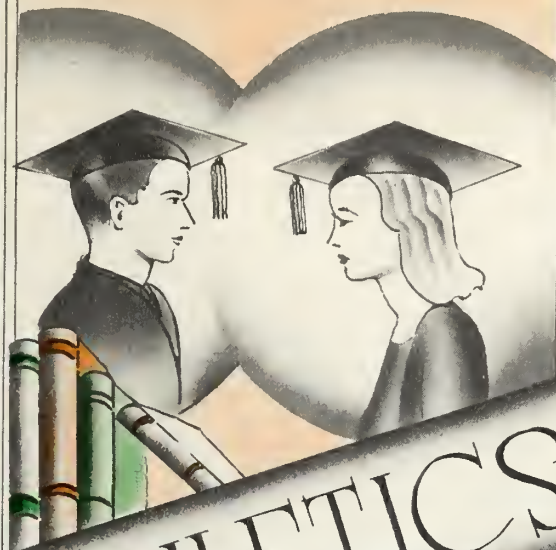

The high scorer for the year was Pearl Lamb with 125 points, followed up by Evelyn Terrell with 102.

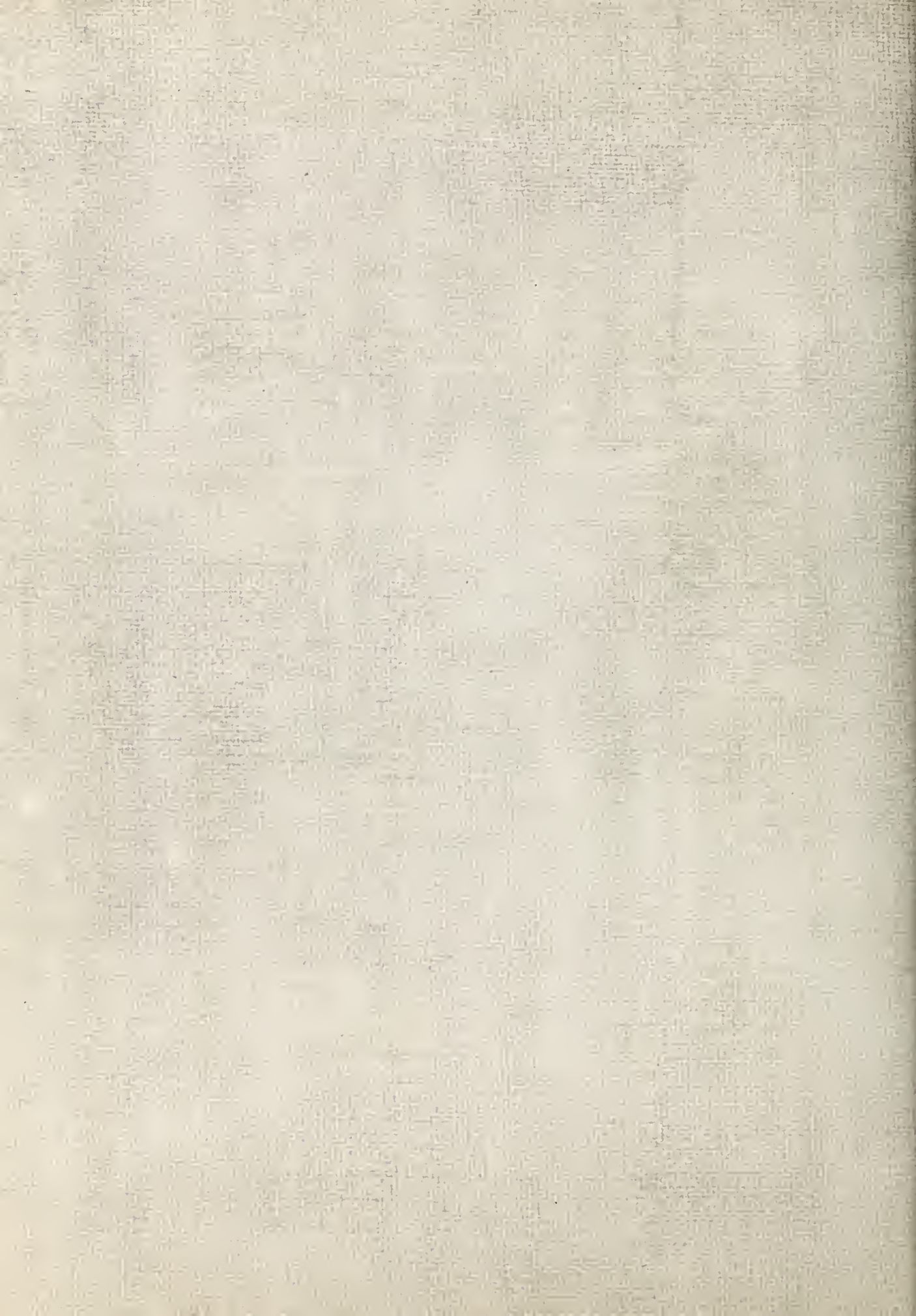

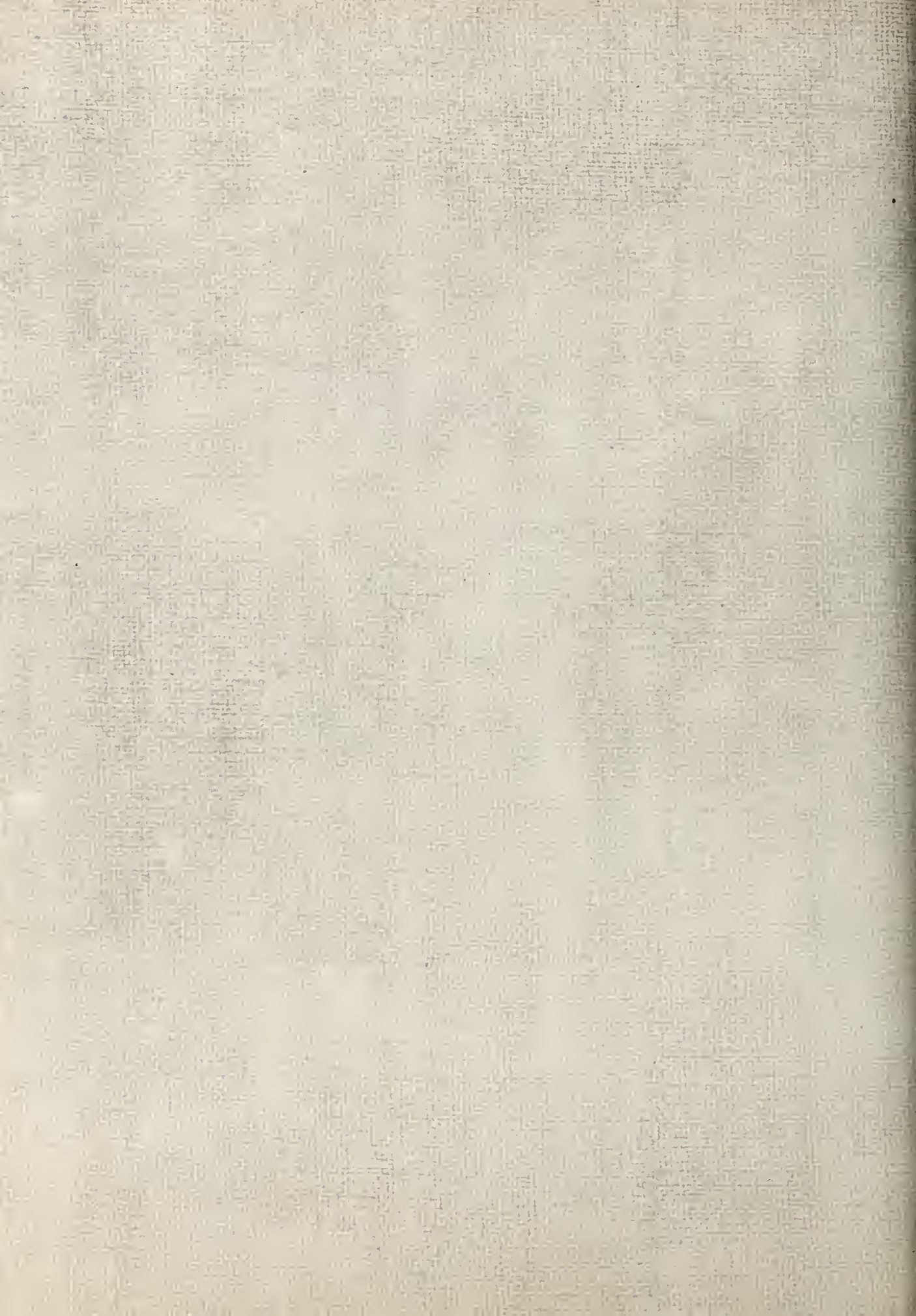

Jack Snotherly scored highest with 72 points and Jimmy Best was second with 52.

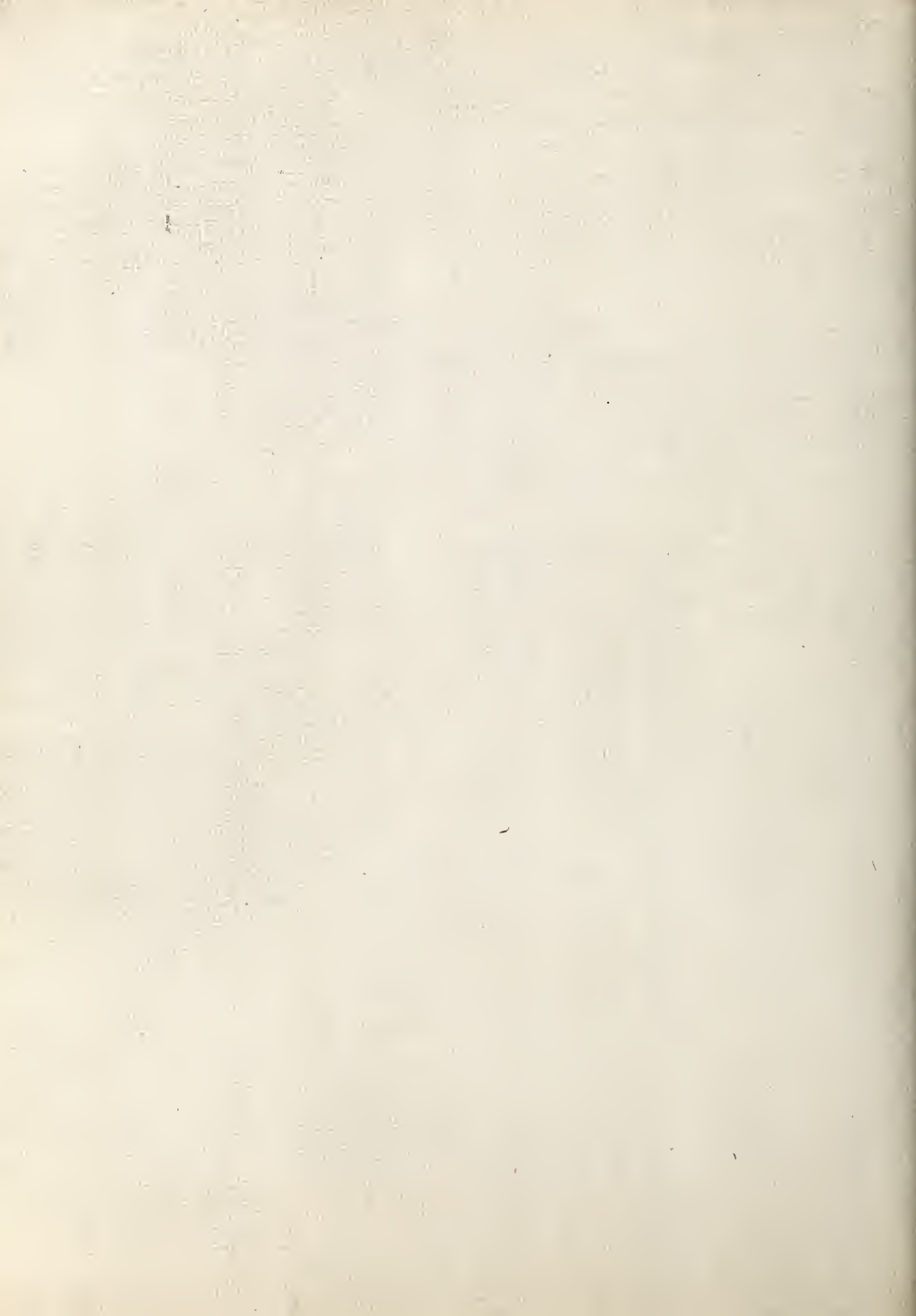
