














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

















SENIOR CLASS HISTORY


In December our class entertained the Seniors at the Alamance Hotel with the Sophomore-Senior Banquet.

We sold stationery, everyday cards, and wrapping power to make money for our trip. Since there were no Seniors we had charge of commencement. Remember the fun we had rehearsing and presenting the Junior class play. The Minute of Iwelson The commencement marshals were: Alice Blackmon, Mancy Lou Flynt, and Jack Laughlin.

In 1946 we finally reached the last round of our high school days. Some of our class members fell along the way, many entered the armed services and some moved to other schools, but sixteen have remained to be caused "dignified"

On September 28, our class attended the annual "Senior Day" at Chapel Hill. We were the guests at the football game between V.P.I. and U.N.C.



entire store of knowledge.


Itom III: To Miss Cator to bequeath our vory kindest regards and our sincere gratitude for hor unfailing aid and kindness.

Itom XXIV: Mancy Islot wills her smartness to Betty Allon.



Stewardess Lamb called, "Alice Blackmon."





"Is there a second to Mr. Hannah's motion?"


The roaring noise of a plane was heard and Henry May

jumped up and said, "I second the motion."


"All in favor of adjourning will rise and go to the dining salon for refreshments," The Captain ordered and immediately all members of the class of '47 left the lounge.




We presented two chapel programs this year . "It's All Greek To Me", and "The Wedding In Skunk Hollow"


The boys that were on the team were: Jim Wood, John Robert Watkins, and Robert Swink.

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
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Sophomoro Class History

The Home Economics girls of the Sophomore class gave a tea to mothers and friends of the girls and all teachers of the school.



The Sophomore Boys won the basketball tournament between the grades,


When the Juniors and Seniors had their banquet at the Alamance Hotel, eight of the Sophorore girls were waitresses.

We had our first class party at the home of Miss Cates. Everyone enjoyed himself and left with a hope that we would


have another one very soon.

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
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
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
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














GIRLS BASKETBALL TEAM



Boys Basketball Team



Mr. Pfisterer and Elwoof Johnson were pur coaches.


Hack Snotherly scored highest with 72 points and
