There is very little
hunting of birds
in India + we saw many
cranes (Sarus) in
wheat field outside

of the park + in
farm areas.

Also saw painted +
white-necked storks,
stilts, etc. outside
park.

Presence of ditches
around agricultural
fields + irrigation canals
may have increased
available habitat for
certain waterfowl!

In AM we take
boat ride thru
Bharatpur + Then bird
walk. Jeff is an

amateur ornithologist
and carries binocs
everywhere.

Again we see huge
densities of waterfowl
especially painted
stork breeding
grounds, with thousands
of juveniles still hanging
around.

Also saw Nilgai,
Axis + Sambar.

The Sambar in a herd
of 6-8 animals.

The Axis - 2 males, one
hard ^{antlers} + one in shedding
velvet.

Nilgai dung heaps in
evidence along trail.

They apparently act as
communal sign posts
+ are visited by local
animals.

Apparently Axis have prolonged
breeding season here, ∴
antler cycle slightly
asynchronous.

Saw one jungle cat in the
evening sitting under tree,
2nd jungle cat in the
morning walking along
the road.

The habitat is
an open marsh land

with clumps of trees
at intervals, their
rocks above ground.
Ungulates in the heat
sit under the trees &
are almost invisible.

Tree cover probably
limited resources
for larger species.

BNHS has had numerous people
doing research, altho since
Park became a Sanctuary
ringing of birds had to
stop due to govt reqs.
Briefly met Park Director
who was recording bird
sounds for an audio
tape to go with a film of
Bharatpur birds.

Much of the water is
from artificial lake developed
by Prince of Bharatpur @
1900, primarily for duck
hunting. Presumably, he
created more habitat
for certain species &
there is a sculptured plaque
indicating bags of ducks
during various shoots.

employees, workers etc
+ a budget of
\$ 200,000 per year.

~~Then~~ Park developed
since it is in Central
India, near Khajuraho
+ is a large area.

[Most of park budget from
state - M.P.]

of unbroken forest -
However the forest
of oak, bamboo +
acacia (depending on
moisture) is ~ 20 years
mostly - had been
entirely cut.

Regeneration is occurring
well, but park will
take years to be
decent for wildlife
viewing, especially
since initial effect of
stopping grazing by
cattle is that grass
is growing very high +
impeding ~~grass~~ views of
angularities.

Park ~~is~~ has some
escarpments with deep
valleys + there is large
plateau area of
dry grass with few
trees scattered.

Park has nilgai,
Axis sambar, gazelle,
4-horned antelope.

Tiger, leopard, wild dog,
jungle cat, jackal
grey
langur, sloth bear
wild boar

There are caves set into
cliffs which are
apparently used by
carnivores during hot
summer for maintaining
cool temperature.

We saw tiger pug mark
+ ^{one of} Maharajah's cows
had apparently been
killed previous week by
tiger.

Along road there are
nilgai dung piles,

areas where wild boar

have been digging
for roots.

Also large deep holes
made by sloth bear

otherwise the camp has
no long term records.

[Later when speaking
with Kheranta, he
said that 2-3
of the elephants had

run away, Thus there was no one at camp.

Had lunch with mgr of Gando/Orido tourist camp - apparently one I had already been killed by a tiger since burning & grass cutting began. Another had been killed by rhino. Lodge mgr. complained @ govt. letting another group move into park both with elephants & camp.

Later heard that Upreti might be financially involved

At Sauraha, there are 32 elephants, 18 govt-owned, 5 ST another 10 owned by 2 tourist lodges. Elephants do all foraging within park which probably has quite an impact.

On leaving we found that we couldn't go all the way back since they had dismantled a bridge. We took roundabout route & had tea with Linda (?) (Cranfield) who hand-reared an infant leopard at the zoo & plans to try to release it.

Ex-head of SI camp is
working with her.
She had requested SI
gear, eq, receivers
but Challinor said
no. ~~She~~ The leopard
is almost a year
old and is already
a problem.

Appappa explained how many parks + sanctuaries, Project Tiger, resettling villages etc etc.

He is Director of Nagarhole Park,

but not of Bandipur
since Bandipur comes
under Project Tiger
Administration & is
∴ not responsible to
the State to any degree.

They indicate that
the tri-state park is
being discussed so that
Bandipur, Mudumalai,
& Wayand (?) (Kerala)
might become a single
national park under
central administration.

Since we cannot
leave, we do a short
tour of Bangalore
city.

11
st
Bangalore seems very
alive & exciting
but modern. Spacious
streets & only one sky-
scraper. However,
it is very dusty &
polluted, despite
lots of trees & flowers.

We visit temple, govt
bldg & botanical
gardens & pass
thru most of major part
of city. Govt buildings
(Bangalore capital
of state) are very
impressive as is
the amount of British
influence.

Food at hotel is excellent.
After lunch, visit natural
history museum; art
museum + Then shop

all the diets which resulted in many deaths of major species, eg gorilla.

Eventually Krishna Bonda brought back.

Zoo under forestry dept. but under control of zoo authority Dept.

Head of Zoo authority clearly a man who won't take a stand.

That Mysore Palace where current Maharajah lives in back wing & travel to Karapur

At Nagarhole there is a main sanctuary area with lots of wildlife & artificial salt licks for viewing, but it is only open for 1-2 hrs at dawn & dusk. This area is 35 km (short drive thru park) from Karapur (1 hr drive) when Park Director gives permission to go thru park. Otherwise, it is

70 km one way, & thus viewing game in there requires a 2 hr drive there & 2 hrs back with 1 hr in park.

Throughout park underbrush cleared for about 30 meters on either side of road, to enhance viewing. It has made for better grazing for gaur & Axis.

Park is full of
elephant sign
although we only
saw one herd
briefly.

Park also contains
an elephant camp
run by Karnataka
state where we
visited. They had
3 young ~~at~~ < 2 years
old + 1 one infant
just born (< 3 days
old — not seen)

Breeding done by

letting animals run
free at night. Wild
bulls seem to be
breeding ♀♀. And
they are encouraging
this.

About 20-30
elephants at camp.

No longer hold Keddah
which includes
rounding up + selling
wild elephants.
