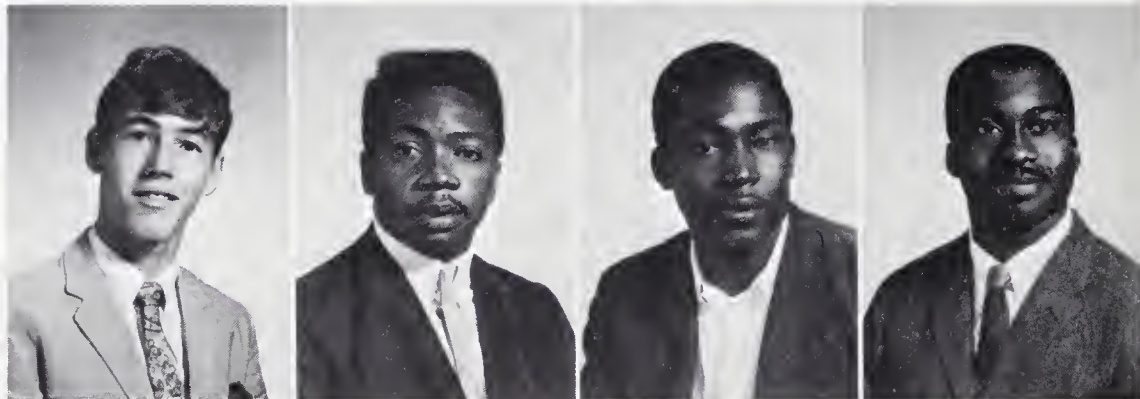
MECHANICAL VOCATIONS DIVISION
