Tribute to Dr. Billy Overton Wireman

The much-loved Billy O. Wireman entered into this world on October 7, 1932, in Jackson, Kentucky. In 1954, he graduated from Georgetown College in Kentucky, having earned both a degree in history and a degree in physical education. Three years later, "Billy O." earned his masters degree in educational administration from the University of Kentucky. Then, in 1960, he received his doctorate from Peabody College of Vanderbilt University. The incredible Dr. Wireman has also been presented with honorary degrees from Eckerd College, The University of Tampa, and Georgetown College.

Aside from his educational endeavors and achievements, Dr. Wireman is also very patriotic. He served in the Marine Corps for our very own Stars and Stripes during the Korean War.

Later, "Billy O." served as a registered representative with a stock brokerage firm and helped run a family business in the state of Florida. In 1968, he became president of Eckerd College in St. Petersburg, Florida, but in 1977 left to pursue a change of scenery and salary at the dean of the School of Finance and Business Administration at Rollins College in Winterpark, Florida.

So here's where our beloved college comes in...

In 1978, "Billy O." decided to take a chance and come to a tiny liberal arts college called Queens. Dr. Wireman accepted the position of President at this time. During his 24 year "reign" as the "King of Queens," the total enrollment at Queens (thanks to his work with the wonderful faculty and staff of the college) has increased a whopping three hundred percent, from the original 500 students, to 1700 in the year 2001. The endowment has reached a staggering \$33 million. What's more, over the course of nearly a quarter of a century of service, new programs such as Hayworth College, The Vail Program of Nursing, The Core Program in Liberal Arts, the John Belk International Program, the shift to a coeducational status, the McColl School of Business, and the Learning Society of Queens have all bloomed and blossomed under his care, giving our college its prestigious reputation both in the community and beyond.

With the construction of the Sykes Learning Center, an endowment for school scholarships, and a new front entrance to the library, begun in 1999 and made possible by a donation from the generous John H. Sykes, Queens has exploded onto the national scene of educational opportunities and excellence. For the past five consecutive years, Queens has been ranked in the top ten for Best Value and soared to the top tier of Southern Regional Universities in the annual *US News & World Report Survey*.

Aside from his experience within our college, Dr. Wireman has also worked tirelessly to promote education on a worldwide scale. "Billy O." has served as an educational consultant in India, Africa, South America, and Indonesia. He has visited South Korea, China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, and the Philippines to meet with both educators and government officials. He has gone to Russia and helped guide tours in Europe and the Far East.

Dr. Wireman is a true treasure to our community, publishing over 300 hundred articles on education, politics, religion, and international topics in Europe and Asia. Our own Drs. Goode and Whalen have co-authored three books with Dr. Wireman. A fourth book, entitled *Like Shooting Rapids in the Dark*, was edited by these two professors, and released in 2002 with book being written entirely by Wireman himself.

Finally, in addition to his many philanthropic, educational, and literary endeavors, Wireman is also married to the equally talented (but much prettier) former Katie Marie Coomer (BA Georgetown '57, MA Peabody '61). They have two grown children. On June 30, 2002, our great president retired. Before he left, though, he made it a priority to push Queens to formally recognize its university status. On June 1, 2002, Queens College became Queens University.

On top of all this, on April 26, 2002, Patrick McCrory (Mayor of Charlotte) declared the day "Billy O. Wireman Day" in recognition of our wonderful outgoing president's outstanding lifetime achievements in his community.

To be sure, in the years to come students who knew Dr. Wireman will celebrate the memory of his leadership and service, and remember the incredible Billy O. Wireman on this day. We'll miss you, "Billy O. and Katie.!" Come back and see us anytime!

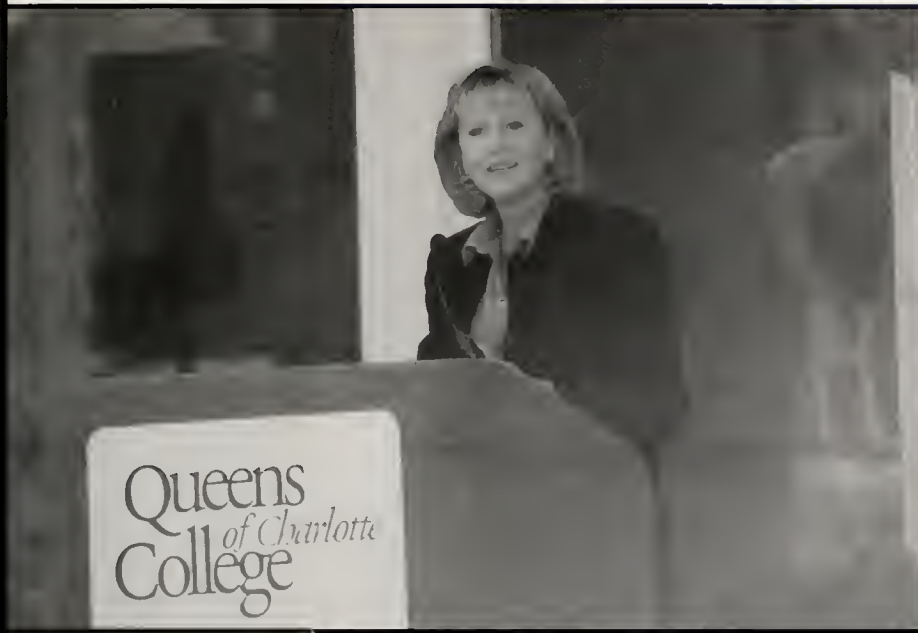

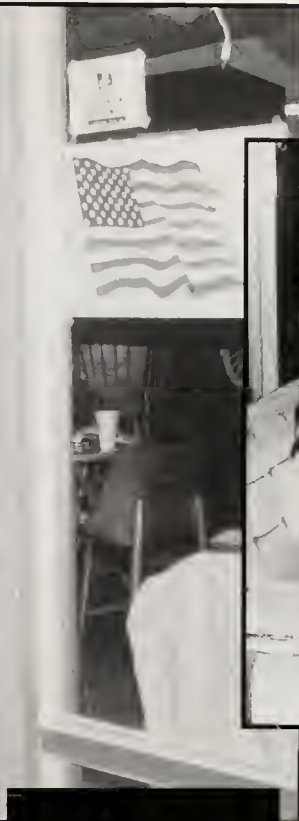


QC Fitness Center

Vital Speeches of the Day Publishes Speech by

Dr. Frances McClain

Vital Speeches of the Day published Music Therapy Professor Dr. Frances McClain's fall convocation speech in the November 1, 2001, issue.

Dr. Frances McClain, Livingstone Professor of Music, gave her speech, titled *The Music in Your Soul: A Celebration of Life* at the 2001 Fall Convocation at Queens College.

Every year, the winner of the Hunter-Hamilton Love of Teaching Award receives the honor of delivering the keynote address for Fall Convocation. McClain was awarded the 2001 Hunter-Hamilton Love of Teaching Award at the 142nd commencement convocation on Saturday, May 5, 2001.

The Hunter-Hamilton Love of Teaching Award seeks out and honors teachers whose way of life uniquely inspires the full potential of each student. This award is given to a Queens College faculty member judged by his or her peers to display an exemplary love of teaching.

A board certified music therapist, McClain has been a faculty member at Queens College since 1983. In addition to her responsibilities as a music therapy professor, she also directs the on-campus music therapy clinic and acts as advisor to the music therapy club and music therapy majors. Prior to joining the Queens faculty, McClain worked for Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools as a music therapist for the trainable mentally retarded. She holds a Ph.D. in psycho-educational processes and music therapy from Temple University. McClain is the past recipient of the Joseph W. Grier, Jr. Distinguished Professor Award at Queens.

Two honorary degrees awarded at Queens CAS Spring Convocation

Charlotte, N.C., January 29, 2002 – Queens College awarded two honorary degrees at its College of Arts and Sciences Spring Convocation, on Tuesday, January 29, 2002, in the Belk Chapel on the Queens campus.

The late renowned musician Loonis McGlohon, and Charlotte attorney and Queens trustee Joseph W. Grier, Jr., each received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Queens College. McGlohon's degree was accepted on behalf of his family by Queens College alumnus Jim Stack, one of McGlohon's musical colleagues.

A native of North Carolina, McGlohon was a well-known jazz pianist and composer. He held a business degree from East Carolina University in Greenville, N.C., where he also studied music. In the course of his career, McGlohon recorded 36 albums and worked with a variety of artists such as Rosemary Clooney, Tony Bennett and Benny Goodman. A Grammy nominee, he is probably best remembered for his song *North Carolina is My Home*, which he wrote with the journalist Charles Kuralt. In September 2001, McGlohon celebrated his 80th birthday by performing with the McGlohon trio at the theater that bears his name at Spirit Square in uptown Charlotte. McGlohon died on Saturday, January 26, 2002, after a nine-year battle with lymphoma.

In 1983, a trustee of the College that was serving on the Honorary Degree Committee of the Board of Trustees suggested that Joseph W. Grier, Jr., should receive an honorary degree. Grier declined, stating that because he was also on the Honorary Degree Committee and intended to remain very active as a trustee, he could not accept the nomination. Nineteen years later, though he is still a trustee, Grier will receive an honorary degree from the College to thank him for his service as an active trustee and valued member of the Queens community. Grier is Chairman Emeritus of the Board of Trustees at Queens and founded the law firm Grier and Grier (now Grier & Furr, P.A.) with his son, Joseph Grier, III, in 1984.

In addition to the honorary degrees, Queens also awarded two J.B. Fuqua Distinguished Educator Awards, to professors Cherie Clark and Karen Shearer. These awards are presented to faculty members who are selected by the two most recent graduating classes at Queens, from the McColl School of Business, the Graduate School, the Pauline Lewis Hayworth College and the College of Arts and Sciences. The J.B. Fuqua Foundation, based in Atlanta, has selected Queens College as one of a number of elite colleges which recognizes outstanding professors through an awards program funded by the Fuqua Foundation.

Dr. Charles Reed, William S. Lee Professor of History and the 2000 N.C. Professor of the Year, delivered the convocation address "Reading as if for Life," published in the November 15, 2001, edition of *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

Queens College is a private, coed, Presbyterian-affiliated liberal arts college in the heart of historic Charlotte serving approximately 1,700 undergraduate and graduate students through its College of Arts and Sciences, The Pauline Lewis Hayworth College and McColl School of Business.

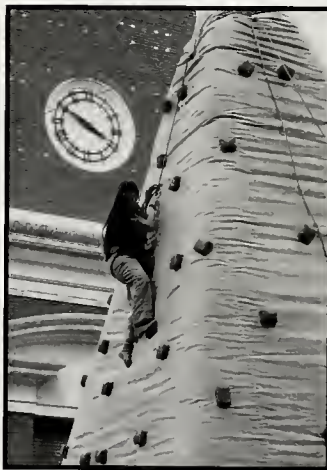

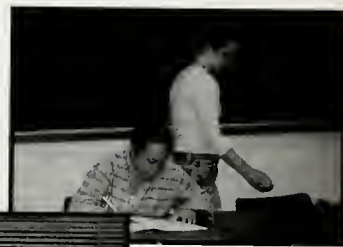

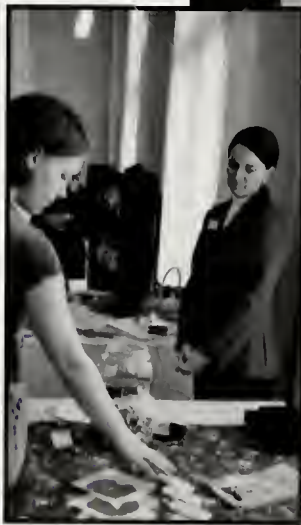

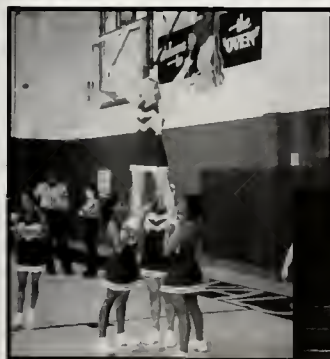

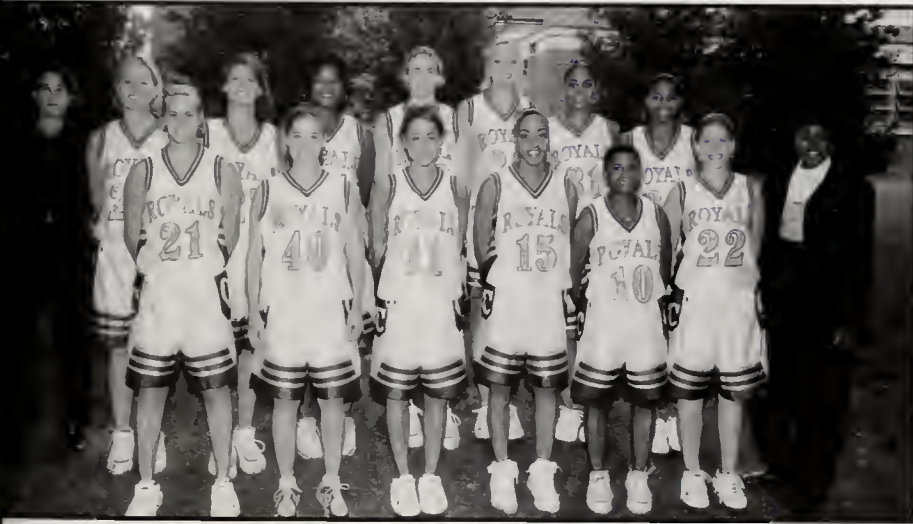

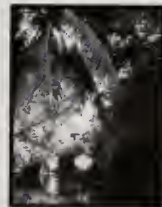


Yap Tour



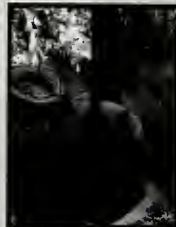

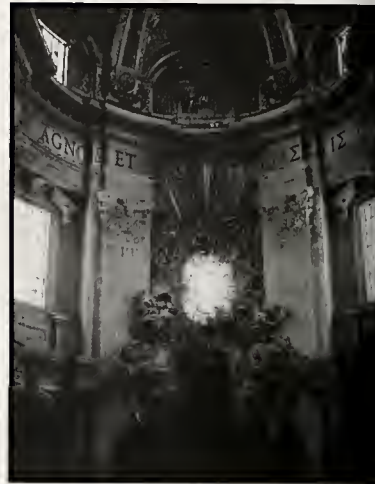


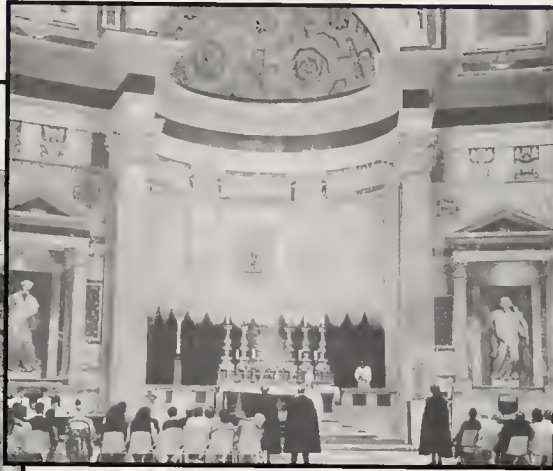


Italy Tour

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College life is like no other.

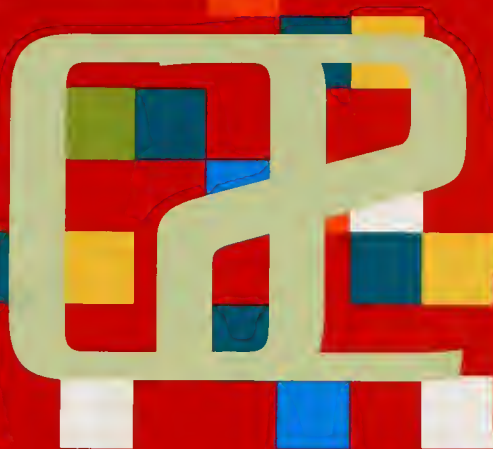

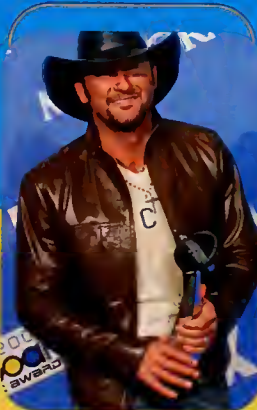

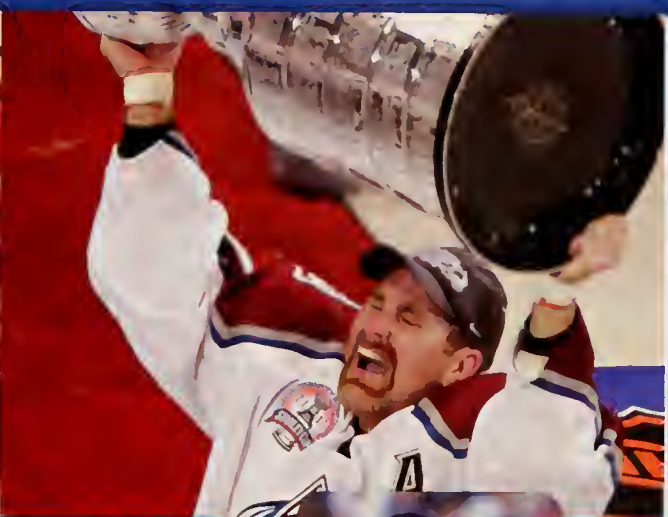
