DIRECTIONS.—Select a good sandy loam, plow the ground as deep as possible, dig out 12 inches deep, put in a layer of 4 inches of good, strong stable manure, and press down; then fill in with good, rich, black loam to the top of the bed. Sow on top of bed 100 pounds kainit to 1000 square feet of bed; incorporate this thoroughly to depth of 3 inches. After leveling bed off even, stretch a line the length of bed 9 inches from the edge, and with a spade cut a furrow 8 inches deep, set a row of plants along the trench 9 inches apart, with the crowns of the roots 2 inches below the surface; then cover up, make even and plant other rows 9 inches apart.

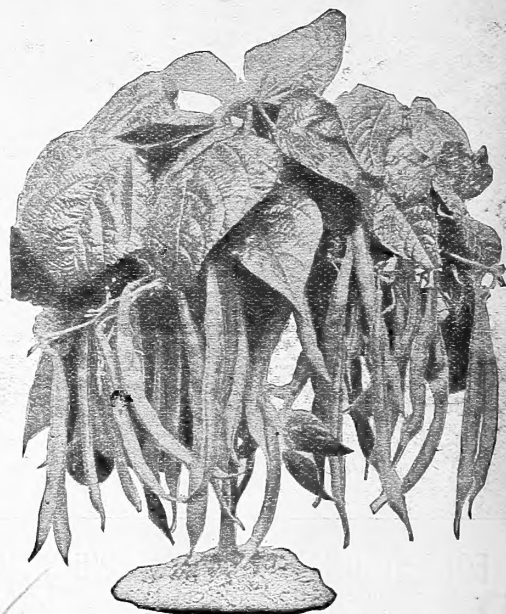

CULTURE OF DWARF BEANS.

To afford a regular succession of crops throughout the season, plant every two weeks, from the middle of Spring to the end of Summer; but not until the soil becomes warm, as they are very sensitive to both heat and cold. Plant in rows 18 inches apart, 2 inches deep; cultivate frequently, but only when dry, as the scattering of earth on the foliage or pods, when moist, will cause them to become damaged with rust. This crop will flourish between the ridges of Celery, rows of Corn or Cabbage, when they are first planted, as the beans would be ready for the table before the other crops attain any size.

CULTURE OF POLE AND LIMA BEANS.

THESE are usually planted in hills and trained to poles, which should be 8 to 10 feet long, and firmly set in the ground from 3½ to 4 feet apart each way. Draw around them a hill of earth, and plant 4 or 5 Beans to each hill, 1 inch deep, always observing to plant the eye of the Bean down. The Lima Bean is very delicate, and often fails to sprout from slight causes; they should not be planted until the ground is warm. 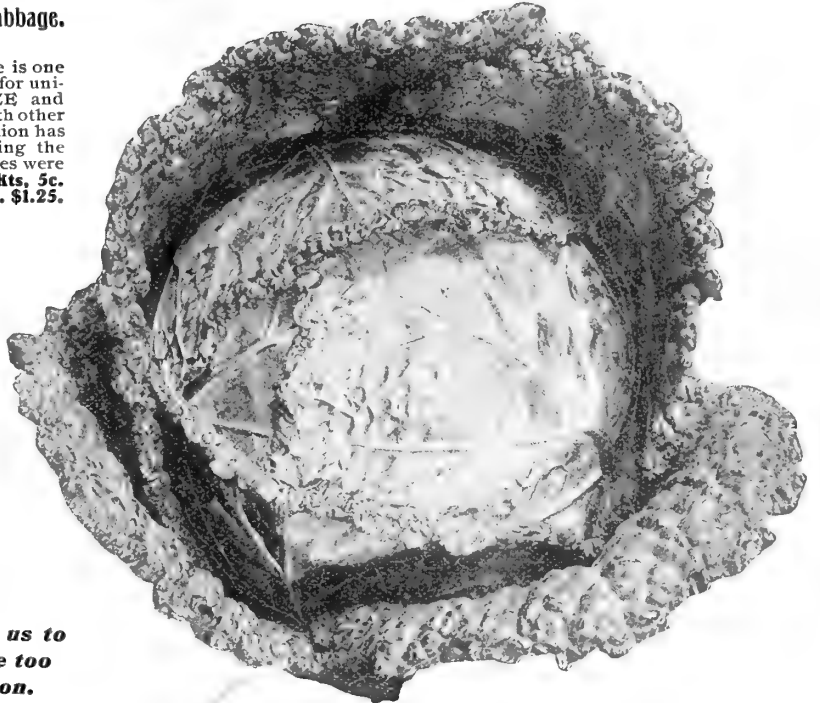

One ounce will produce about 2500 plants; quantity to transplant for one acre, 1/4 pound. For very early use sow in January or February in hot-beds; put out when the plants are strong enough into other hot-beds; or sow in cold frames in March; transplant when danger from killing frosts is past to the open ground, in rows 2 feet apart and 18 inches in the row.

For a succession sow in the open ground the last of March or early in April. Autumn and Winter varieties sow in April or early in May, in shallow drills, 3 or 4 inches apart; transplant early in July, in rows 2 1/2 feet apart and 2 feet in the row.

CULTURE OF CELERY

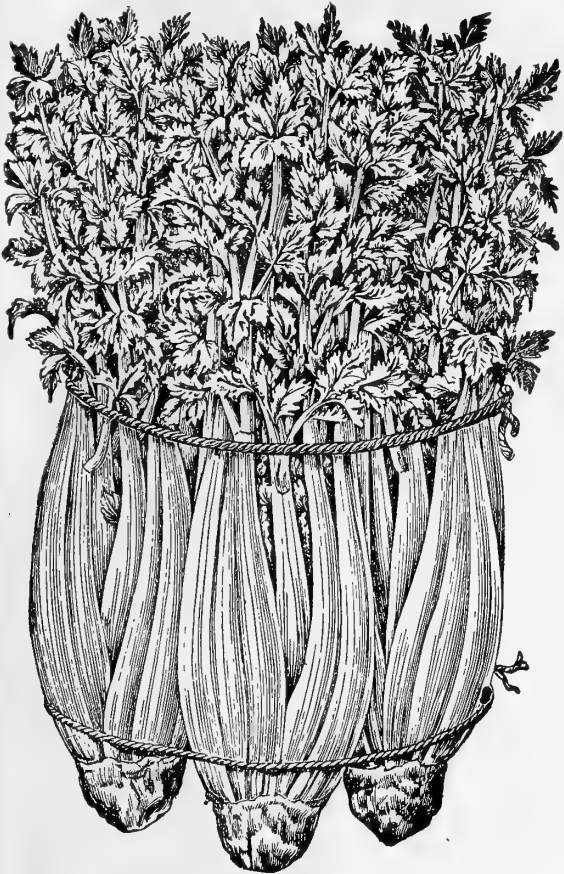
SOW the last of March or early in April, in an open border, in rich mellow ground in shallow drills, watering freely in dry weather. By rolling or pressing in the seed the result will be more satisfactory than when only covered. Cut the tops off once or twice before planting out, to make them stocky. When the plants are 5 or 6 inches high, transplant the dwarf varieties 3 feet and the taller sorts 4 feet between the rows; plant 6 inches apart in the rows. Cultivate well, and when large enough blanch by earthing up. The first operation is that of "handling," generally done the beginning of September. After the soil has been drawn up with the hoe, it is drawn around each plant by the hand to keep the leaves firm in an upright position and prevent spreading. When the plants have become "set" in an upright position and the Celery is wanted for early use, they should be "banked." This is done by throwing the soil up as close to the plants as possible with a plow and finishing it with a spade, bringing the earth up nearly to the tops of the plants. The method employed now for protecting is by covering the tops of the banks with waterproof felt paper.

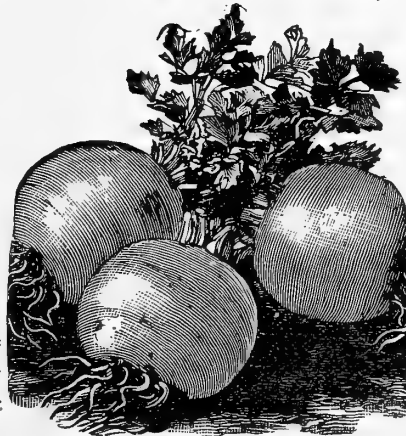

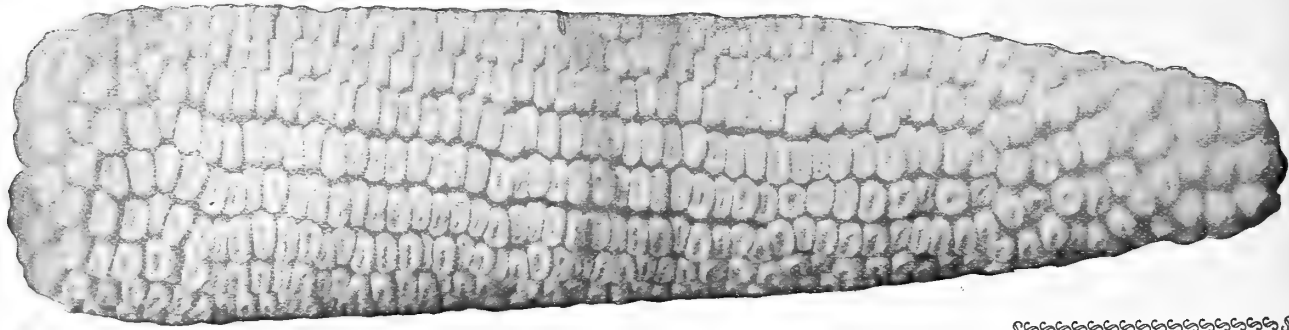

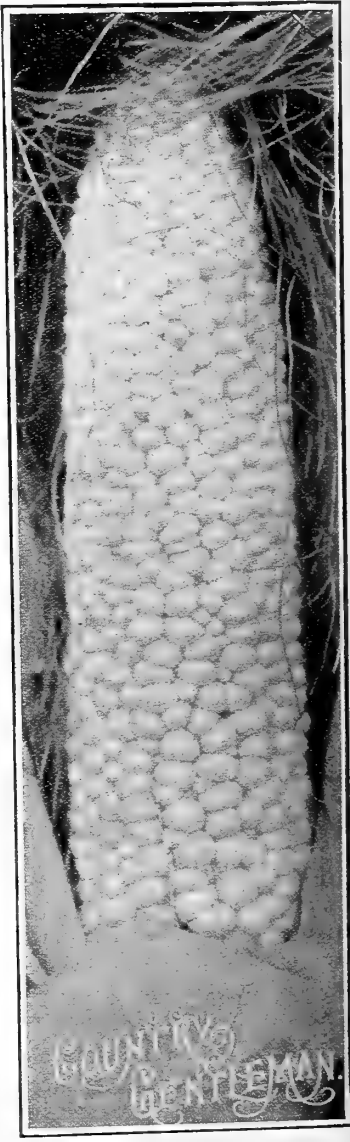

Culture of Corn.—The Sweet or Sugar varieties, being liable to rot in cold or wet ground, should not be planted before May, or until the ground has become warm; for a succession continued planting every two weeks until the middle of July, in rich, well-manured ground, in hills 3 feet apart each way, covering about half an inch, and thin out to 3 plants to a hill. For early use, plant if weather has become settled and warm. In hills about 4 feet apart each way; thin out to 4 of the strongest plants to each hill after all danger from insects is over. For pickles, plant from June until the middle of July.

CULTURE.

IN hills six feet apart each way for Musk-melons. When about one foot long, pinch off the tips to make them branch, as it strengthens the growth of the vines, and makes the fruit mature earlier. Give plenty of water, and feed liquid manure occasionally. A few hills, for early use, may be had by sowing on pieces of sod in a hot-bed, and when warm enough transplant to open ground.

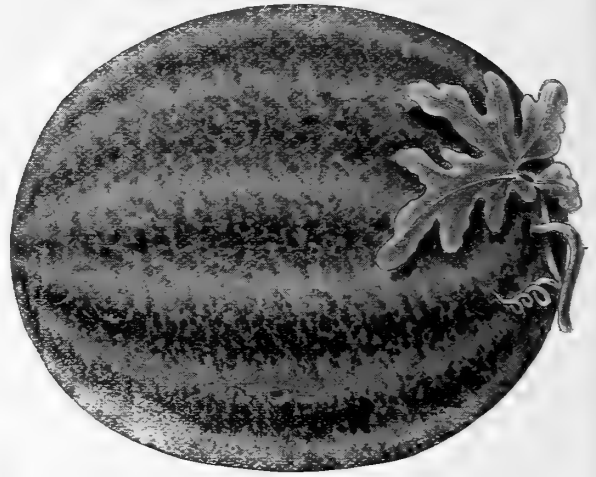

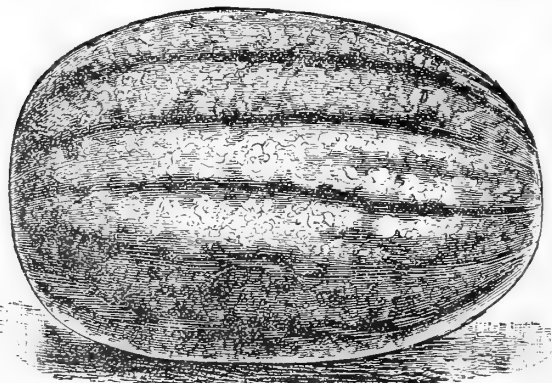
CULTURE OF WATERMELONS.

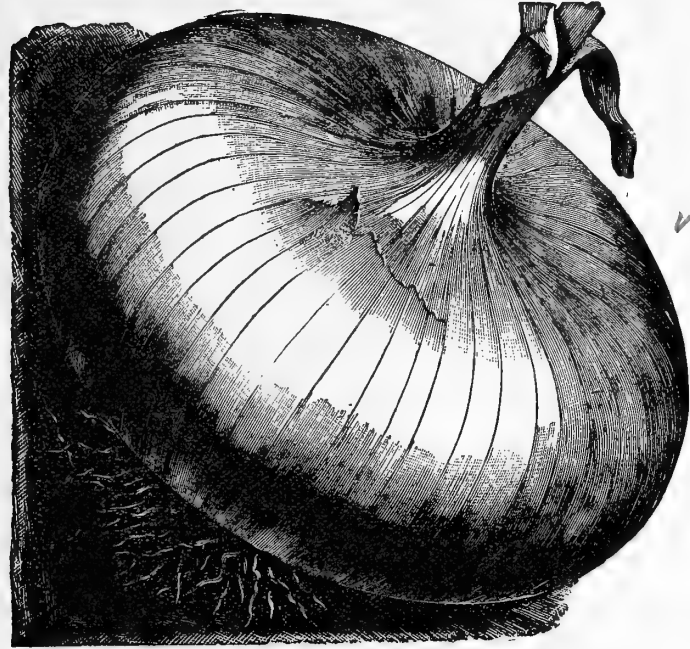

USE ANY good soil; preferably a rich sandy loam, previously cultivated. Fertilize liberally with rotted manure, or with artificial manures. Drill in seed to depth of 1/2 inch, at the rate of 4 or 5 pounds to the acre for large Onions; 60 to 80 pounds per acre for Sets, or use Sets at the rate of 4 to 10 bushels to the acre, or start Onion Seed in frames, under glass, and transplant to open ground, 3 inches apart in the row. This excellent plant is often referred to as the "new onion culture." Onions are quite hardy and may be planted early. The soil may be used year after year, without rotation of crops, if well fertilized annually. Winter storage demands dryness, coolness, good ventilation, and freedom from sudden changes. Spread 18 inches of straw on barn or garret floor, then 6 to 10 inches of Onions, then 2 feet of straw; or keep on shelves in a dry cool cellar. Set large Onions in open ground in September. Protect with litter during Winter.

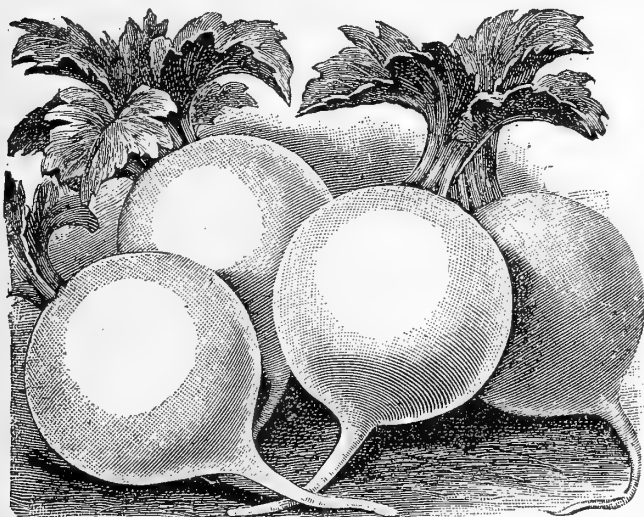

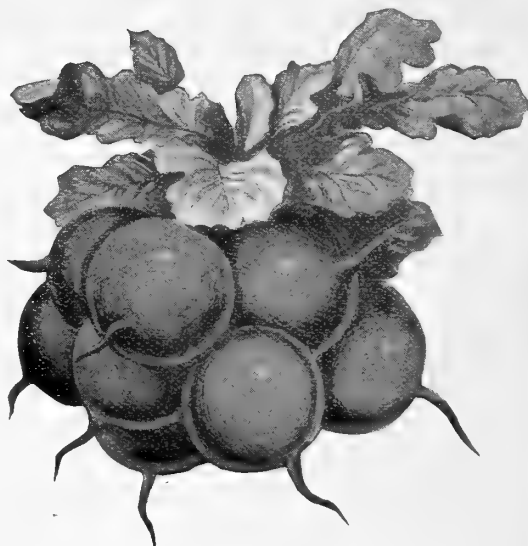

Culture of Radishes.—Thrive best in light, rich, mellow soil; to bring out their mild qualities must make quick and tender growth; sow for very early use in hot-beds during Winter and early Spring, in well-manured, deeply dug and finely raked soil, in drills 10 inches apart; thin to 2 inches in the rows. Sow Winter varieties in July and August. Like the Turnip, they make best growth in Autumn; must be taken out before severe frost, and stored away in a cool cellar in sand or a pit, where they will keep tender and crisp all Winter; before using put in cold water, which adds to their freshness.

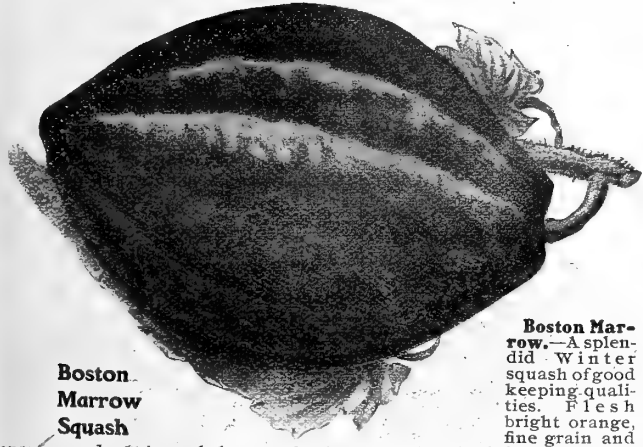

Cultivate well and top dress liberally twice a year—in early Spring and at the end of pulling season. Plants are easily grown from seed. Should be two years old before transplanting.

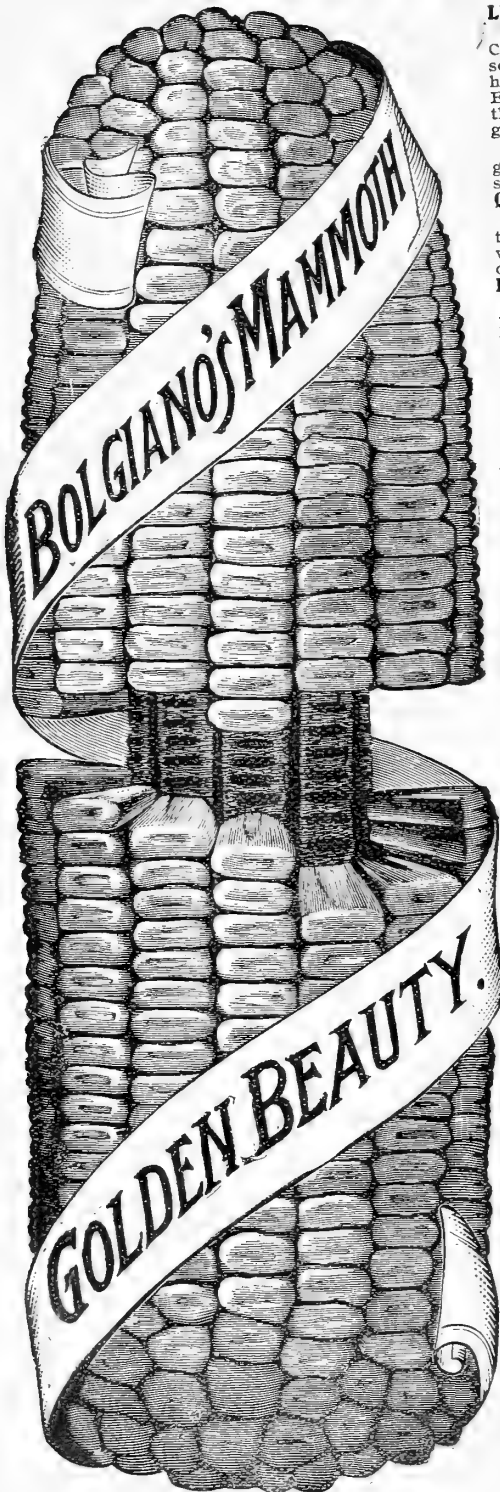

Provided the soil is in a proper state, flower seeds may be sown in the open border in the months of April and May, or as soon as the soil becomes dry and easily crumbled, after the Spring frost has disappeared. They may also be sown in prepared beds of light, rich soil, and transplanted into the garden. The former is the more simple method, but not always as satisfactory. The better plan is to sow all fine seeds under glass in a greenhouse, hot-bed or in the house. As to the depth to which seed should be covered, the best general rule is to cover fine seeds very lightly, just enough to protect them from the sun; and in extremely dry weather a sprinkling of damp moss is very useful. With very fine seeds it is best to sow on the surface, and press them slightly into the soil. We are convinced that one of the most frequent causes of failure is in sowing the seed too deep, and seedsmen are unjustly censured, when fault lies with the cultivator.

X. Giant Cyclamen.—Charming plants with beautiful foliage, rich, colored fragrant flowers, universal favorites for Winter and Spring blooming. The Giganteum varieties have large leaves and stout flower stalks, throwing the flowers well above the foliage. Seed may be sown any time during the Autumn or Spring in shallow boxes (3 inches deep) at a temperature of 60 degrees. As soon as the seedlings have made two leaves, transplant into 2-inch pots and place on shelf near the light, but shaded from direct sunlight, shift into 3-inch size, and into larger as the operation becomes necessary.

21. Carnation (Giant Margaret, or Malmaison).—Without exception these are most abundant bloomers of all Carnation Pinks. The flowers are of brilliant colors, ranging through many beautiful shades of red, pink, white, variegated, etc.; they are of perfect form and large size. Those sown in the Spring commence flowering in early Summer, and continue to bloom in lavish profusion until checked by frost. They can be potted and taken in the house and will flower abundantly throughout the Winter, though if intended specially for Winter flowering it will be better to sow later in the season. The plants are compact and robust in habit, supporting themselves without the use of unsightly stakes. **Pkts. 2c, 5c, 10c and 25c.**

22. Cockscomb, or Celosia. (Feathered Thompsoni).—The largest, most magnificent variety. Highly ornamental plants, producing crested heads of flowers, somewhat resembling a cock's comb. 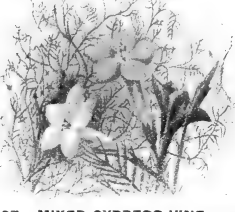

53. Imperial Japanese Morning Glory.—Where climber can be grown, these should have a prominent place. They are beyond question the handsomest of a handsome family, and well deserve their title of "Imperial" or "Emperor" Morning Glories. Of the easiest culture, can be sown in the open ground in a sunny situation when the weather has become warm and settled, they soon cover a large area, being of a strong, rapid growth, and even before flowering, are decidedly novel and interesting on account of the varied forms of the foliage and their markings. The flowers are of gigantic size, of good substance, remaining open the greater part of the day. The colorings are beyond description; the self or solid colors range from snow-white to black-purple, with all the possible intermediate shades, such as pink, rose, fiery red, coppered, carmine crimson, pale blue, deep blue, royal purple, maroon, indigo, bronze.

54. Northern Light Moon-Flower. (Ipomea Setosa.)—This new plant has blooms some 2 inches in diameter, of pink lavender color, which comes earlier in the season than any of the Ipomeas, which open in the evening. The foliage is large and handsome, and remarkable in its drought-resisting qualities, the plant remaining green and fresh when others are yellow and withered from lack of moisture. The plants are the most rampant growers from time of germination, exceeding all others. The stems of the vines are covered with thousands of hooked, greenish-white, projecting points, as thickly placed as the red, hairy spines on Ipomea Setosa. As a screen, there is no plant that will cover more space in the same time, and it will grow 50 feet or more. **Pkts. 2c, 5c, 10c, 25c.**

55. Large White Moon-Flower.—At night and during dull days, the plants are covered with an abundance of large, pure white, fragrant flowers, 5 to 6 inches in diameter. It grows very rapidly and will cover a large surface. Shell of all Ipomea seed should be cut a little at one point before planting, as it assures quicker germination. **Pkts. 2c, 5c, 10c, 25c.**

56. Lantana—Hybrida.—One of the most desirable half hardy perennial greenhouse or bedding plants, constantly in bloom; verbenalike heads of orange white, rose and other colored flowers; 2 to 5 feet.

57. Larkspur.—(Emperor Imperial Branching and Tall Branching, or Stock-flowered.) This is one of the best known of garden flowers. A vast improvement has been effected by careful selection and attentive cultivation in size and color of the blossoms and the general habit of the plant. For large gardens, shrubberies, etc., the branching varieties will be found peculiarly well fitted; hardy annuals. (For Perennial Larkspur, see Delphinium.)

58. Everlasting, or Hardy Sweet Pea.—(Lathyrus Latifolius.) Showy, free-flowering, hardy perennial climbers for covering old stumps, fences, etc., continually in bloom, fine for cutting.

59. Lobelia.—(Erinius. Finest Mixed.) The following dwarf and trailing varieties of this popular and beautiful flowering plant will be found most desirable for pot-culture, edgings, hanging baskets, etc., blooming profusely from June to November. The hardy perennial in our mixture is among the most attractive of our garden favorites, producing beautiful spikes of handsome flowers.
