Deeming it expedient to explain to my former patrons, I will say that in consequence of the railroads keeping in transit a large stock of seeds (that had been grown expressly for me) until after the planting season had passed or the planters had procured their stock, three years ago, I was forced to make an assignment. I then thought I would not again enter upon the sea of commercial pursuits, but the personal failures, and that of my neighbors, from poor seeds, and the continued entreaties of my former customers and friends, to again enter the seed business, by which they could procure reliable seeds, and being offered the necessary capital, I finally yielded to the demand, and last fall put in a small retail stock with a view to give to the truckers a strictly reliable business of their own, by stocking a company on the

Rochdale co-operative system, which has become so universally popular in Europe.

While many have subscribed to the stock,

yet, owing to the stingency in money and my inability to procure suitable canvassers, there is not yet a sufficient subscription to organize, but the subscription is sufficient to induce me to continue the work of organizing the company, with a good prospect for an early organization. In the meantime, I have arranged with the most reliable special growers ef the country for seed stock the coming season and will be prepared to furnish our planters with seeds unsurpassed in the United States; and while I have charge of the business, this character of stock will be maintained, notwithstanding the stock will be from the most reliable sources, yet I will pursue my former practice of testing each package for germination, and no seed will be sent out that I am not satisfied is of high germinating quality, and to protect my customers against the possibility of the contents of packages being changed and returned (which has been attempted on several occasions), no seeds will be taken back and placed in stock that have been taken from the store.

In re-entering the seed business I have done so at a sacrifice of my own interest. Owing to my physical and mental condition, the confinement and cares of business are too great for me to assume alone, but in doing so I anticipate the early organiza-tion of the company and the selection by the company of some one to assume the more responsible duties of the business. Hence I hope that every one into whose hands this circular may fall will consider him or herself personally interested in the success of the business and the early organization of the company, though you may not be a planter, your success depends, in a great measure if not wholly, upon the success of the farmer, and without good seeds the farmer must fail.

So, if you have received descriptive circulars and blanks, relative to the organization, send in your subscription for stock and insist on your neighbor doing likewise, if you have not already done so. If you have not received the circulars, write for them. If you buy seeds, make up your order and get your neighbors to join you, and send them in early. If there is anything you desire that is not catalogued it will be gotten for you from the most re-liable sources. If you will help this insti-tution by your subscription and patronage,

it will help you.

#### CREDIT.

This bane that is sapping the life-blood of our country and is the source of all our financial woes, has become so common that the poor do not hesitate to ask for it, and the rich demand it, and not unfre

quently either class become very indignant if refused. But it should be borne in mind that seeds are a farm product, and, when procured direct from the farmer, as I procure my stock, like all other farm products, they are spot cash, and there will be no deviation from this rule. Don't presume upon acquaintance, friendship or your good standing in the community.

#### REMITTANCES.

Remittance in full must accompany orders except when to be sent by express, C. O. D. In that case not less than 25 per cent. of the amount of the bill must accompany the order. Remittance must be by Bank Exchange on Ocala, Jackson-ville or New York, Postoffice Money Or-der, Registered Letter, or Express. Postage Stamps will be received only when coming in perfect order, if stuck together or without mucilage they will not be accepted. If private checks are sent, orders will be held until check is paid and cost of collecting will be charged, if any.

#### SEEDS BY MAIL.

Postage on packages and ounces will be paid by me, but on larger quantities post-age must be added to price list at the rate of 8c. per lb., 15c. per qt., on beans, peas and corn, and 10c. per qt. on onion sets.

All goods are at owner's risk after re-


