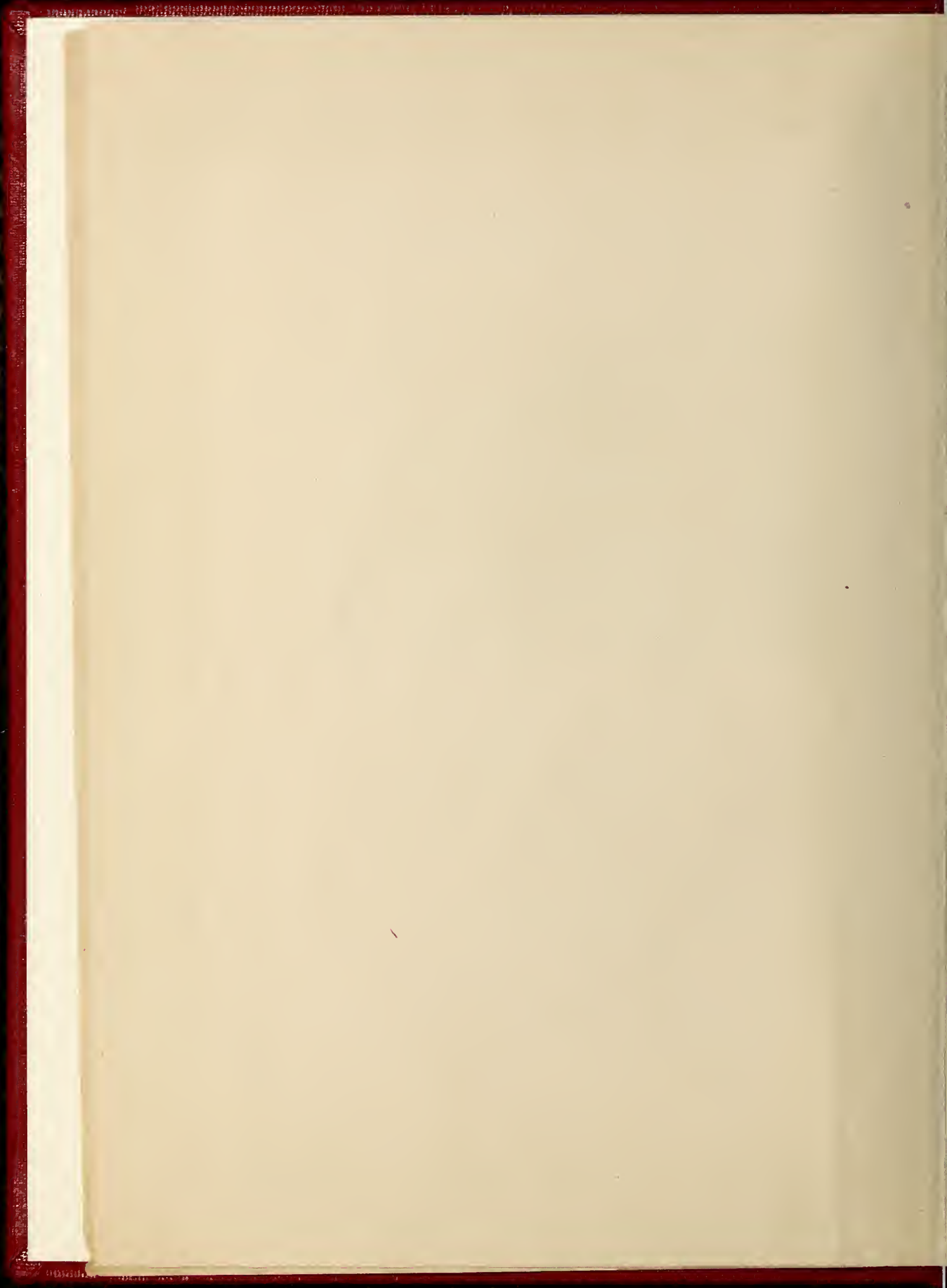

Our dear old Training School.



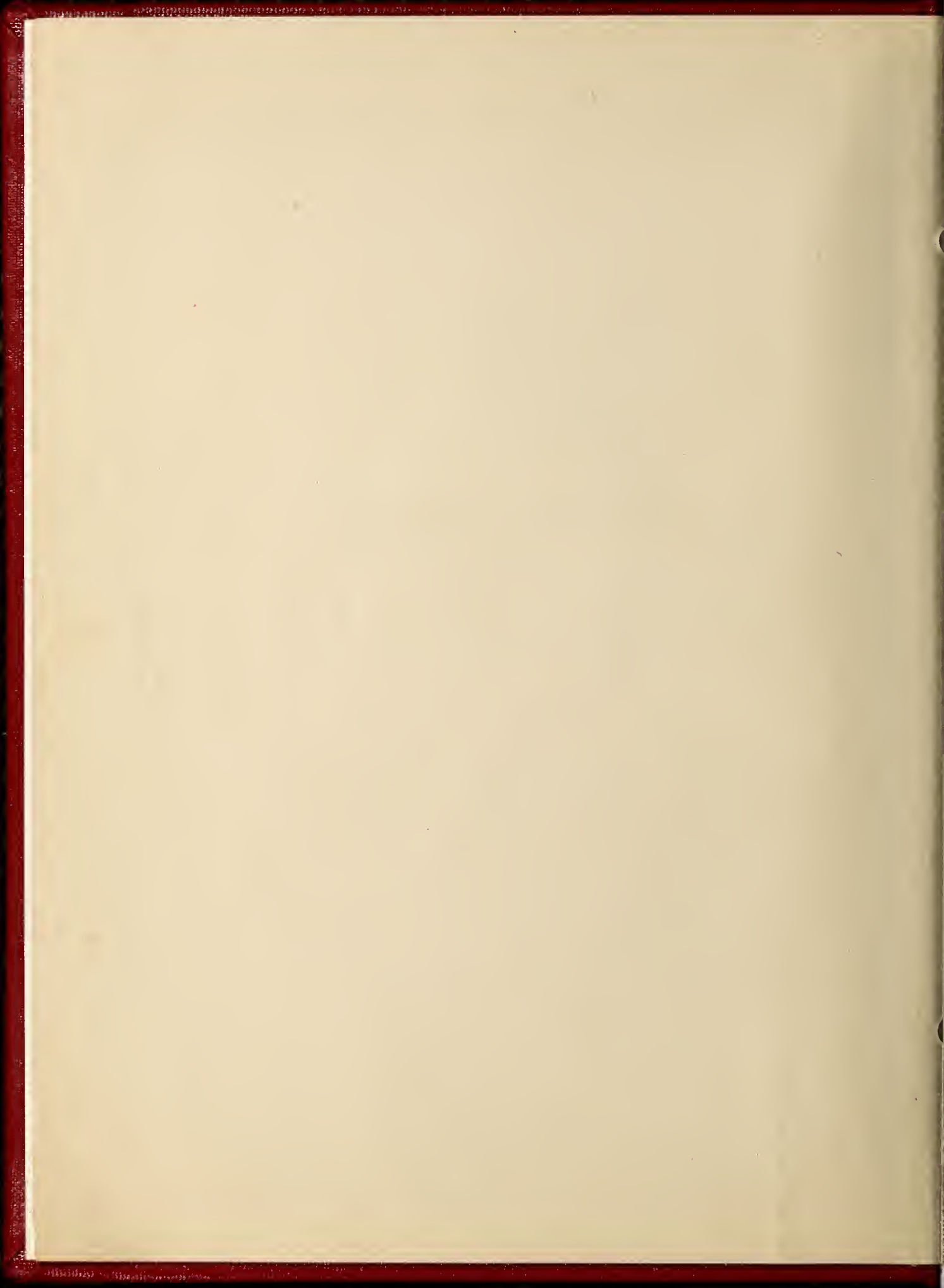


Dear Seniors,

SCHOOL PROGRAM

SCHOOL BUILT ON A SOLID FOUNDATION

A foundation has been laid for the school through the very strong work and support of the P. T. A., Grade Mother's Council, Music Clubs, Dramatic Clubs for the school, and the Alumni Association.

The P. T. A. has rendered outstanding service to the school since it's organization and under the present leadership of it's president, Mr. W. J. Mitchner. Through this organization the school has benefitted through the group meetings in different sections of the county. It was through these organizations that the students have received prizes, scholarships, and individual classroom prizes for attendance, and many other important things that were so very helpful to the school.

Another helpful organization that has strengthened the foundation on which the school is built and will be able to stand, is the Grade Mother's Council. They took the responsibility of the Home Economics Department and played a vital part in seeing that it was up to par. They also worked with the school where ever possible.

In the school, to help strengthen this foundation, the Musical Activities from the first grades through the high school have been great nails to help hold the school together.

Prizes have been won at different times by the mixed Glee Clubs, 4-H Choral Clubs, and Male Chorus. The Primary Department played it's part with the Rhythm Band, and primary glee club.

To drive the other nail in this foundation was the Dramatic club which has been a great help to the school in its art of entertaining its audience, and also creating within the actors a strong confidence in themselves.

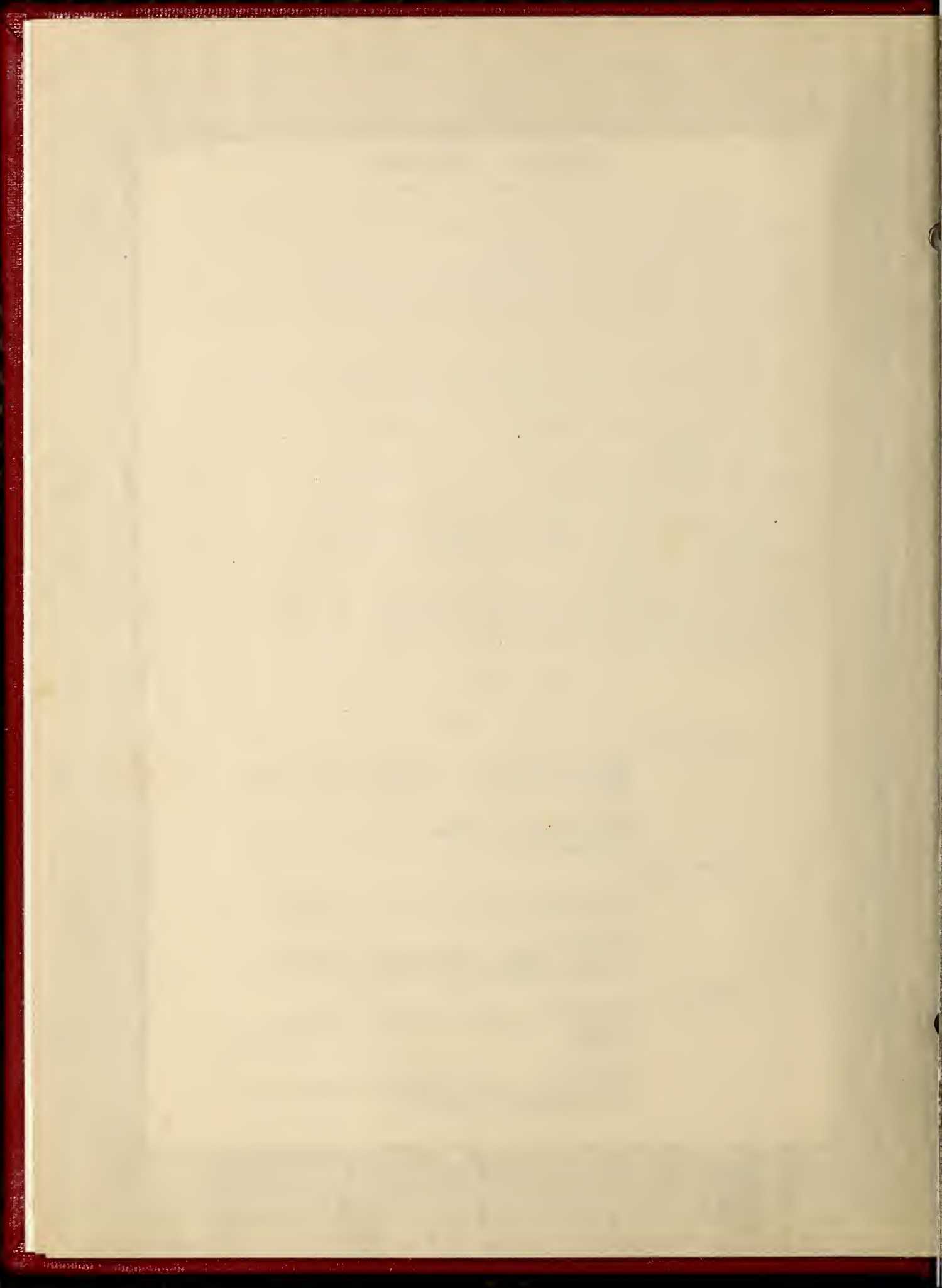

THE LIBRARY

Our well equipped and attractive Library, consists of more than 1800 books, 22 periodicals and pamphlets, and 8 newspapers. Books have been carefully selected with a view to facilitating instruction and research. All students are entitled to full reference use of the Library. Subject to certain necessary Library rules and regulations, students may withdraw books for home use.

GUIDANCE PROGRAM

Our guidance program provides a careful follow-up system, including a study of the needs and capacities of each child, so that training may be offered which will bring about as complete an adjustment of the pupil to all

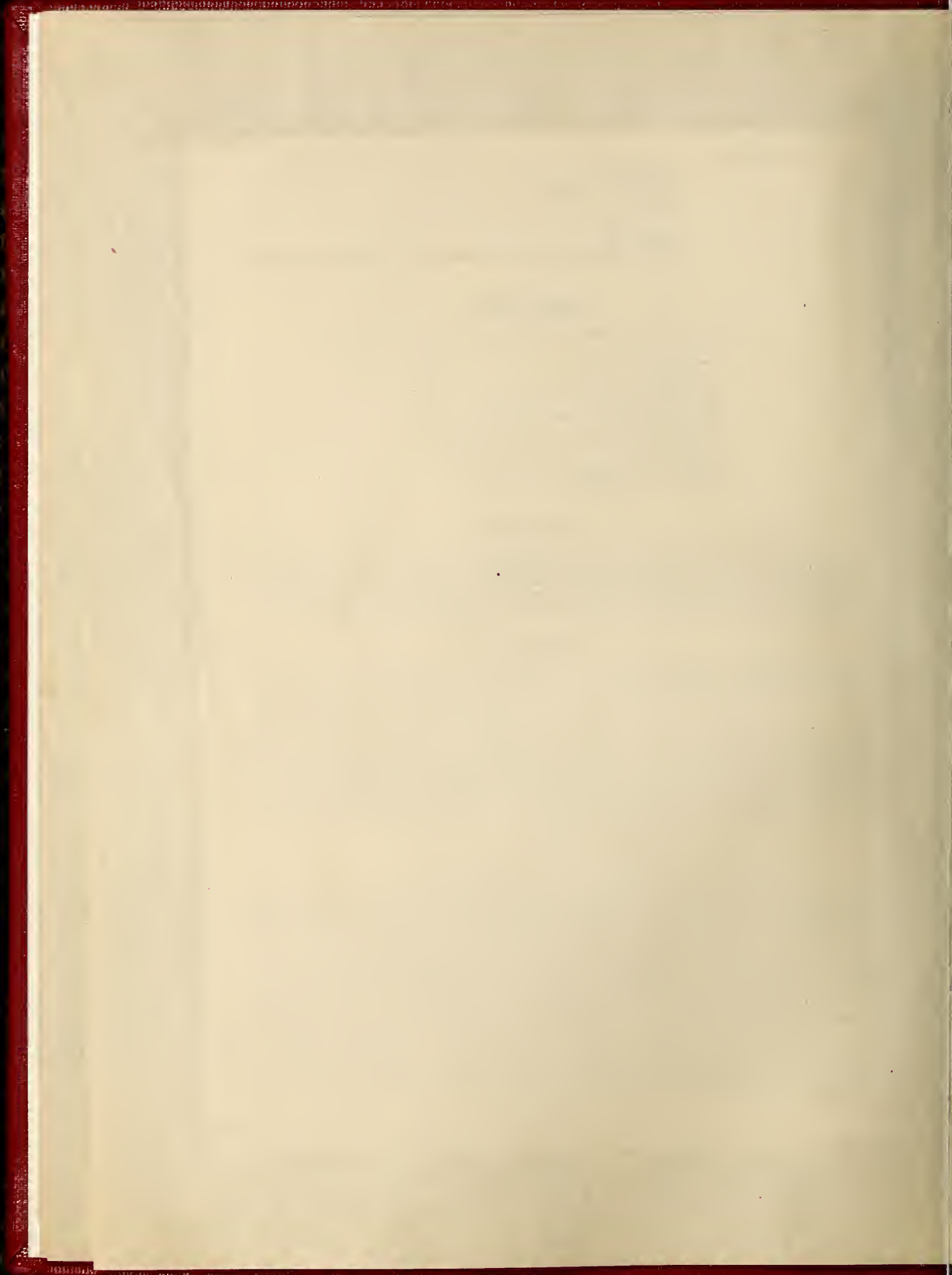
phases of his environment as his native endowments will permit, from the standpoint of his intellectual life, culture, future vocation, citizenship, moral problems, recreation, social behavior, cooperative ability, and the like. Attempt to so organize our educational guidance program that pupils are able to choose, or prepare themselves for and find that place in society where he can best serve and at the same time obtain his own best development. Our Home-room is the key to our guidance program.

THE HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

This department, which consists of a model home unit kitchen, and sewing room, is designed to train girls in the fundamental principles of caring for and beautifying the home, improving personal appearance through good grooming, and acquiring a knowledge of the nutritional values of foods.

With the financial assistance of the Grade Mother's Council the Johnston County Training School Alumni, and other interested organizations and individuals, the department, under the leadership of Miss Evelyn B. McNeill, has at last been successful in partially equipping the Model Home Unit, and is gradually acquiring materials to make the department a complete home-training unit. Home projects carried out by each girl is an important part of the program. These projects are visited by the Home Economics teacher whenever possible.

As a fitting climax to opening the Model Home Unit, several goodwill dinners were served to invited guests, representing the various organizations of the community. All persons attending these dinners were greatly impressed with the improvements made and were interested in seeing the department completed, so that our girls can receive the best possible training in economical and wholesome family life.



ATHLETIC ACTIVITIES OF THE SCHOOL

Athletic participation is an important part of our school program. It provides a stimulating and invigorating phase of the mental and physical development of our boys and girls.

In our Athletic program, we place emphasis upon good sportsmanship, team work, cooperation and school pride.

Basket ball has been our principal sport. We have played in the State tournaments and have won trophies for team work and for individual playing.

Many graduates of our school have been outstanding athletes in various colleges and are now filling responsible positions as coaches and instructors in physical education. For example, Miss Carol Frierson, a graduate of the class of 1939 is basket ball coach at Dunn, N. C. Mr. Romie Avery, a 1942 graduate, coaches athletics at Hamlet, N. C. Mr. Reginald Ennis, who graduated 1938, is now Head Coach and Physical Education Instructor at Johnston County Training School. Mr. Theodore Vines graduated in 1939, and is assistant Coach Johnston County Training School. Mr. Junius Holden, a 1934 graduate, has charge of athletics at the William M. Cooper High School, Clayton, N. C.

The inter-mural basket ball games are the high light of basket ball season. The winning teams play in the final tournament and the class winning out in the finals, receives a trophy.

In our expanded program of athletic activity we are providing more and varied sports, such as volley ball, base ball, and foot ball. We believe that participation in some type of physical training helps the student develop into well rounded personalities.

CLUB ACTIVITIES

Extra-curricular activities play an important role in the general program of a well rounded school. Realizing that, we have provided a variety of clubs that will include the majority of the pupils. Members of the faculty act as advisors for these clubs.

The S.S.S. or Student Scholarship Society has as its objective, to promote scholarship among the high school students. This organization is open to any high school student who maintains an average of 2 or above and whose conduct is 2 or above. Students who receive 1's in conduct and class work are placed on the Principal's list. This type of organization serves as an incentive to inspire students to do their best work. Mr. Collins is the club advisor.

The Varsity Club is an all boys organization that assists the Athletic Committee of the school. The club has sponsored affairs to raise money for baseball and football uniforms for the school teams. To be a member, each boy must do passing work in his classes and must carry himself in a manly way. Miss B. L. Wilson and Mr. Ennis are club advisors.

The 4-H Club is a very active and helpful club in the school. The work of the club is to develop and improve the head, heart, health and hands. Girls learn such things as beautifying the home and ground, sewing, and canning. Boys learn more effective ways of raising domestic animals and gardening. The 4-H club teaches the boys and girls to make the most of what they have. There is also a recreational side of this club. The advisors for this club are Miss F. K. McNeill, Mrs. S. Smith, Miss W. E. Joyner, Miss R. Saunders, and Miss A. O. Smith. The Cosmopolitan Club is an organization for high school girls. The purpose of the club is to make better girls today which will mean better women tomorrow. Manners, lady-likeness, character, and best behavior at all times and places are the type of things the club is developing and improving among its members. Miss E. E. Moore is club advisor.

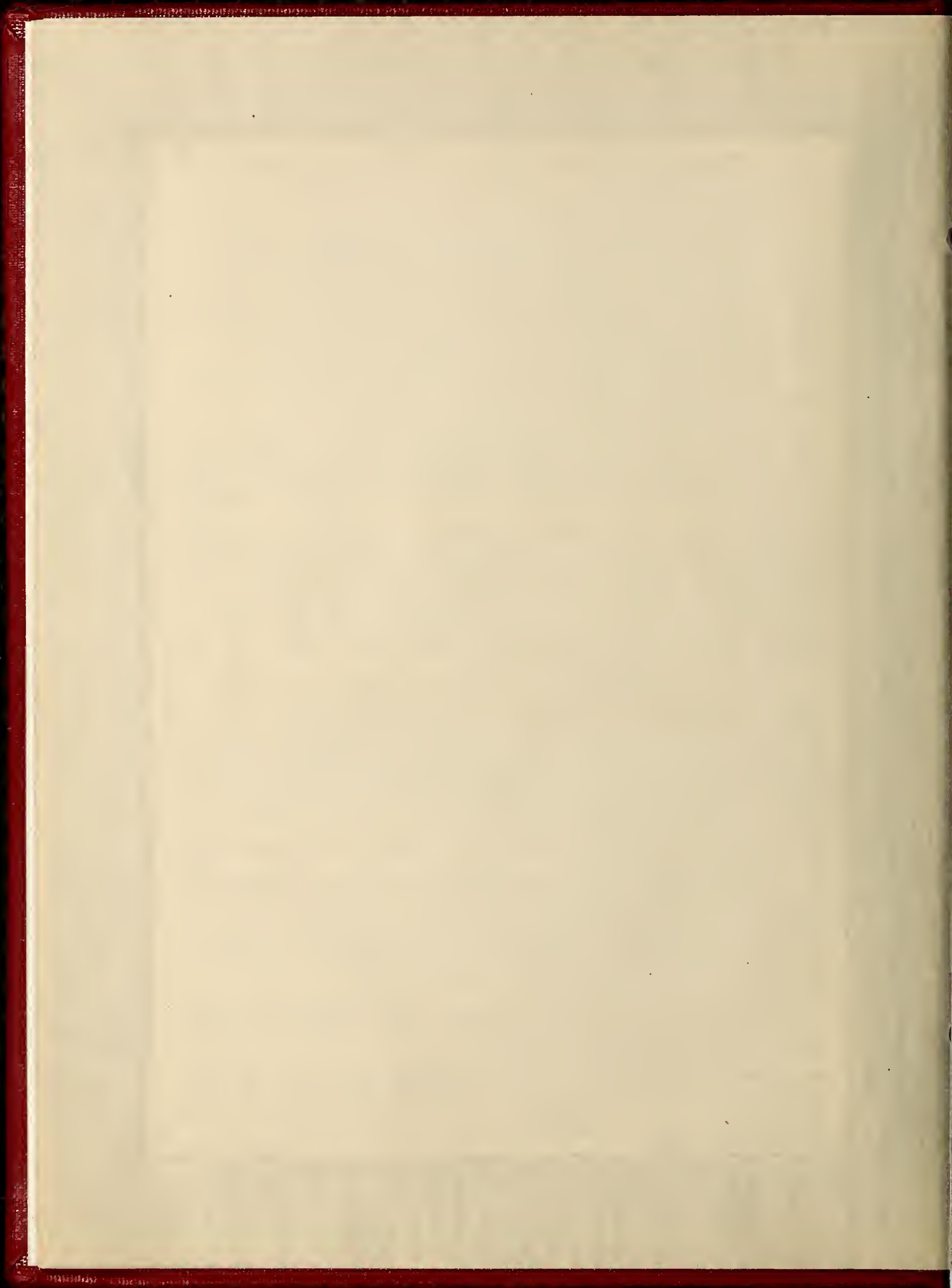
The W.I.C. (What I Can) is an organization for 6th, 7th, and 8th grade girls. The club works toward developing handwork, and improving social manners at home, at school, and on the streets.

The Junior Workers Club is an organization for the 4th and 5th grade girls. The girls are developing art appreciation. They are now engaged in making booklets in which each girl has the opportunity to exhibit her artistic ability. Miss E. Watson is club advisor.

The Student Council is a recent organization. The purpose of the organization is to promote greater participation in school activities on the part of the pupils, to promote greater participation in school activities, to promote fair play and democracy, and to improve the general welfare of the school. Mrs. A. A. Brown is faculty advisor.

The J.C.T.S. Boys Club is an organization for 6th, 7th and 8th grade boys. These boys work toward better conduct and grades, and are interested in developing physical education. They also expect to do craft work—making use of their hands. Mrs. G. R. Williams is club advisor.

The Health and Citizenship Boys Club is sponsored by Miss R. L. Saunders and is made up of 4th and 5th grade boys. Two purposes of this club are: to give life in all its fullness, one that will flow back into the home, the church, and give greater meaning to every thing that happens from hour to hour, and make every silence and rest more significant. To teach each boy to honor his parents, attend church, develop his body, play fair, work hard, and do his best to be a good American Citizen.
