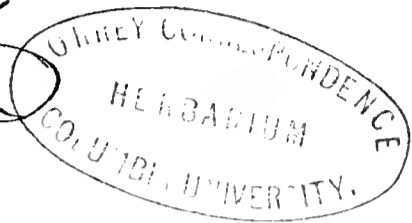


Washington, June 12<sup>th</sup>. 1852

Dear Sir,

I received yesterday, your letter of the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. and in reply I have to state that before leaving El Paso in December last, Major Emory requested me to take charge of two boxes of plants as far as San Antonio, which were intended for your examination & description. This I did, and delivered them as requested by him, and in accordance with the directions upon them, to Messrs. J. R. Sweet & Co. of San Antonio.

Knowing that you would very naturally wish to get these collections as soon as possible, I stated to Mr. Sweet that I would put them along with some packages of my own and

See them safe as far as New Orleans, and  
there ship them, if he desired it. Mr.  
Sweet however replied that his written  
orders from Major Emory were to retain  
them subject to his future orders.

These boxes were marked, I think,  
A and B. There was a third box  
directed to you, from Dr. Pejelow  
the physician of the Commission,  
which was also left with Messrs.

J. R. Sweet, & Co. at San Antonio. I  
presume if you were to write to  
them they would forward them to you.

I brought in a large collection of  
plants & seeds, gathered exclusively

under my own direction between July &  
November 1857, which were some time  
ago placed in the hands of Professor  
Asa Gray, for description. These  
were all made west of El Paso  
before I was relieved from duty on  
that Commission by Major Emory.
