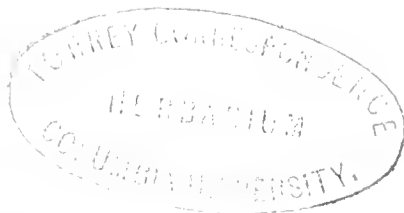
The sendings which I forwarded to you since your last letter consisted in:

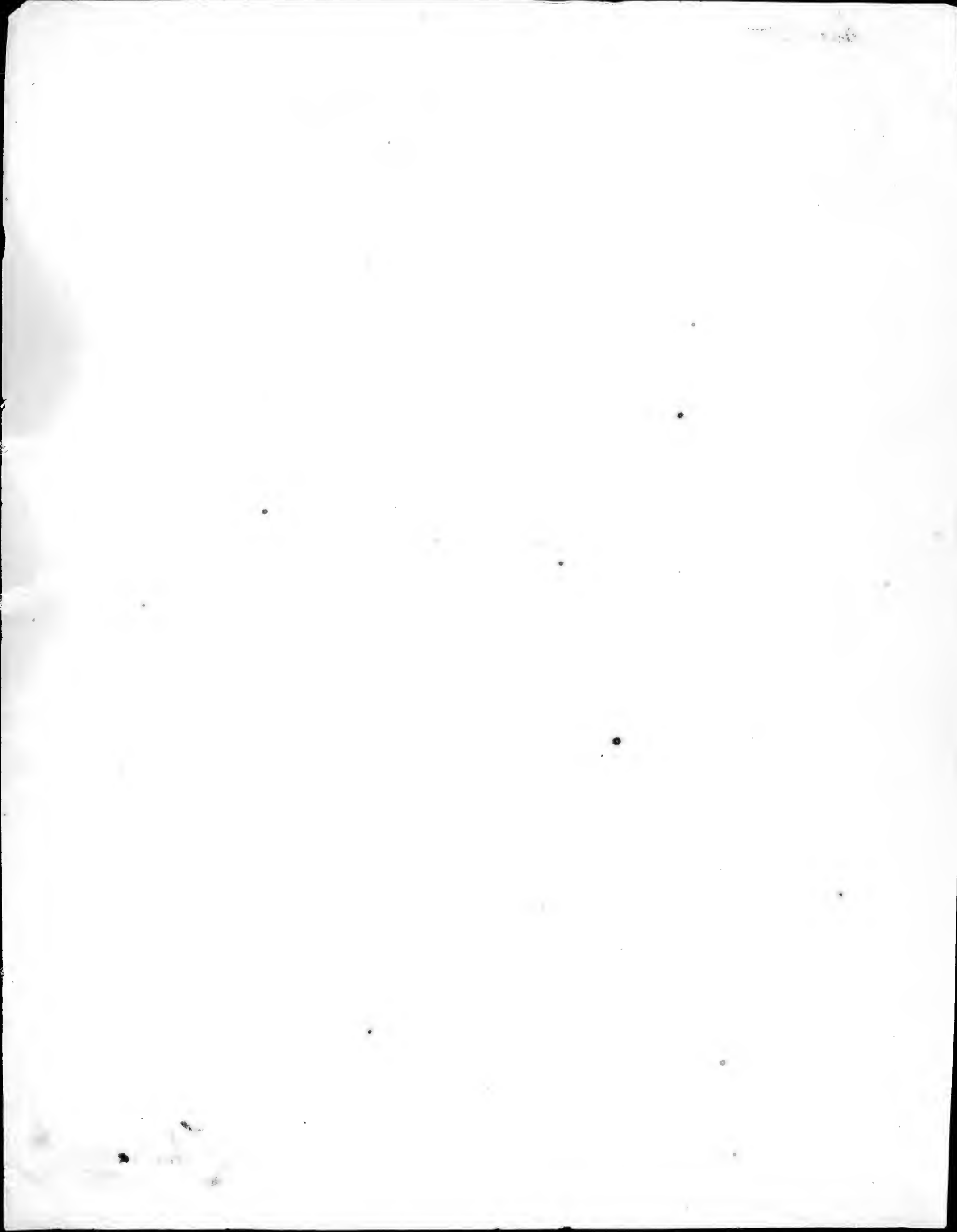
All which I trust will have safely reached you.

Dear Sir!

Excuse kindly my having not already long before this answered to your letter dated 25th October 1836 with postscript of the 15th March 1837, and that it was only by Dr A. Gray, that I returned my thanks for the interesting pamphlets and dried plants, which you had forwarded to me together with the mentioned letter, though they did not reach me but a long time afterwards.

The chief reason of my retarded answer is, that I was quite unwilling to appear with void hands, and even to day I can not yet, what I hoped to do, send the South African Cyperaceae. I send however other plants of that country, partly new ones, and hope them to be welcome.

I should be very glad to learn, that the package containing the 6 to 10th Volumes of the *Linnaea*, the receipt of which had been acknowledged by the Custom House of New York, had been found out again and delivered to you, not even with regard to the Volumes of the *Linnaea*, but chiefly in concern of a collection of maritime Algae accompanying them, because I would not been able to complete them at far a second time.

The wanting parts of the *Annals of the Museum of Nat. History*, which you had the kindness to promise me by Dr Gray, came not yet to hand, and Dr Gray tells me in a

Letter dated 26th of November last (but received in the month of March) that the said Annals would be sent by the Society itself. Pray have the kindness to remember of this object. At the same time I beg leave to request that for my Herbarium any plants You have to dispose of will be very acceptable, that however the Algae, as well the fresh water ones as those of the coasts form a darling object of my wishes.

All what I have received from You, to be forwarded has met due attention. I have also on receipt of Your Letter informed the Royal bot. Society of Regensburg (having had the pleasure to propose You their member) that their Diploma had safely reached You.

I guess that Dr Gray has already begun his interesting tour to the South Sea. If, opportunity offering, You should write to him, then pray let him know that his letter of the 26th of November did not reach me but in the month of March last, and that I omitted answer only because according to that letter I could not but suppose, that my answer would not find him home. All objects which his letter refers to, I have received and forwarded as mentioned above.

I take the liberty to transmit You several copies of my 7th Enquiry for distribution, desiring You to retain one of them for Dr Gray.

A young promising botanist Mr Peisp has been sent

by

me to the West-coast of New South Wales in order to collect during a residence of upwards five years the plants of that country, and to send them successively over to me. Half a year ago he departed via the Cape of good Hope, and if he lives I dare hope to receive many and interesting plants from that part.

Pray continue to remember friendly. Dear Sir

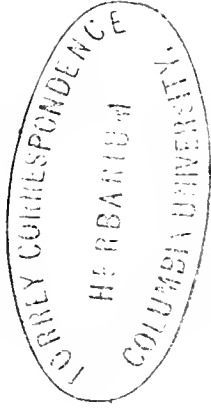
