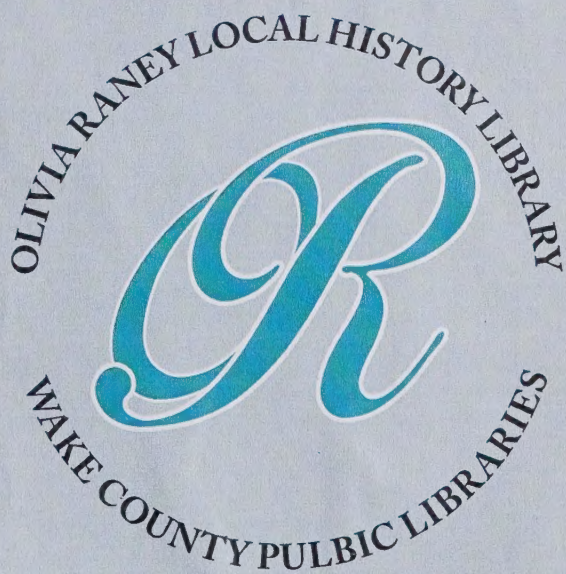

Foreword

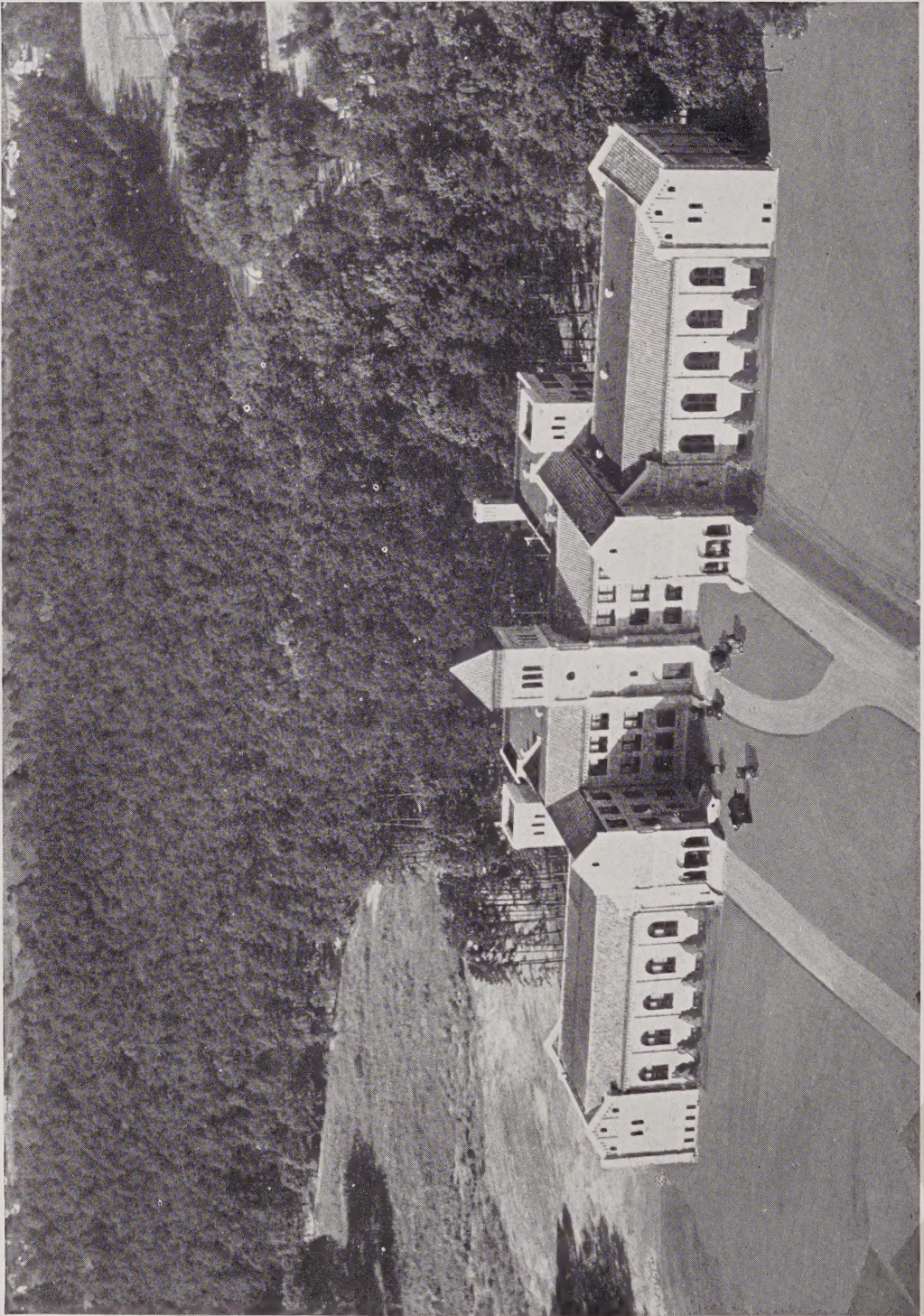

This first year was interesting though uneventful. Day by day we were becoming

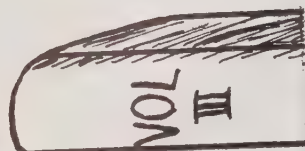
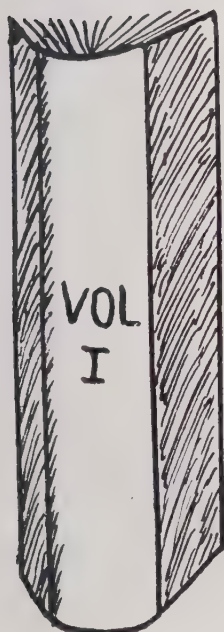

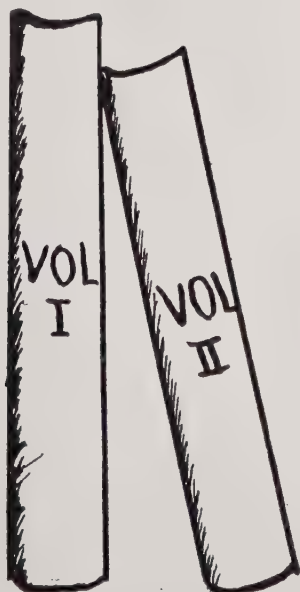


SENIOR HISTORY
