By order of the Montana Fish and Game Commission the legal descriptions for the 1974 deer, elk and the bear hunting districts are adopted. State Fish and Game Commission Wesley R. Woodgerd, Secretary February 1, 1974

100. KOOTENAI: Those portions of Lincoln and Flathead Counties lying within the following described boundary: Beginning where the Sanders-Lincoln County Line meets the Idaho Border, thence northerly along said border to the Canadian Border, thence easterly along said border to the east shore of Lake Koocanusa, thence southerly along said shore to Cripple Horse Creek, thence easterly up said creek to the South Fork Cripple Horse Creek road, thence northwesterly along said road to the Cripple Horse Creek road, thence easterly on said road to U. S. Forest Service Trail 280, thence easterly along Forest Service Trails 280 and 279 to Davis Mountain, thence southerly along the divide to Elk Mountain, Tepe Mountain, Sanders Mountain, Grubb Mountain, Pleasant Valley Mountain, and Herrig Creek Road, thence southerly along said road to the Little Bitterroot Lake Road, thence southerly along said road to the Little Bitterroot Lake Road, thence southerly along said road to u. S. Highway 2, thence westerly along said highway to the Lincoln County Line, thence westerly along said county line to the Idaho Border, the point of beginning.

Highway 93, thence in a southerly and westerly direction along said boundary to the divide between Sunday and Martin Creeks, thence in a southerly direction along said divide to Elk Mountain, Tepee Mouriain, Sanders Mountain, Grubb Mountain, Pleasant Valley Mountain and Herrig Creek Road, thence southerly along said road to the Little Birterroot Lake Road, thence southerly along said road to W. S. Highway 2, thence easterly along said road to the Flathead River, thence up said river to State Highway 40, thence westerly on said highway to U. S. Highway 93, thence northerly on said highway to the Flathead Forest Boundary, the point of beginning.

120. BLACKTAIL: Those portions of Flathead and Lake Counties lying within the following described boundary: Beginning where the Thompson River County Road meets U. S. Highway 2, thence southerly along the Thompson River County Road to Shroder Creer road and U. S. Forest Service Trail 137, thence easterly along said road and trail to Trail 132, thence southeasterly to Trail 290, thence along said trail to the Flathead Indian Reservation Boundary to Flathead Lake, thence northerly and easterly along said boundary to Flathead Lake, thence northerly along said ones of the Shrow of Said lake to the Flathead River, thence northerly along said river to U. 
