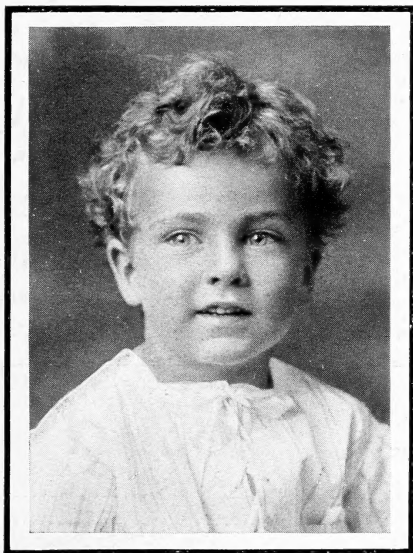

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

ERRORS

The most diligent care will not prevent errors, and I ask that you keep a record of your order and check the goods when received; should any omission occur, please write me at once and I will make satisfactory corrections, but do not return goods unless so advised.

QUANTITY OF SEEDS IN A PACKET

Customers will please note that I state number of seeds in a packet, which will enable those wishing to plant borders and beds of a certain length or size to determine the number of packages required. FULL COUNT GUARANTEED. **No less quantity than a package can be sold.**

FREE PREMIUM

30 cents' worth of seeds extra allowed on all orders for seeds amounting to \$1.00; 15 cents' worth on all orders amounting to 50 cents. This liberal premium is the same as 30 per cent. discount, but must be selected in seeds, and the order for the premium must accompany the original order for the seeds. This seed premium cannot be allowed where you select a sprayer on your \$3.00 order for seeds in packets.

BEAR IN MIND

I cannot allow plants to be selected as premiums on seeds, neither can I allow premiums to be selected on plants or rose orders; I am offering them at such extremely low price to introduce them to my patrons, to add a premium is simply impossible. Plants and roses will be shipped as soon as weather will permit.

MAKE OUT A LIST

of Free Packet Seeds, and remember that only seeds in packages can be selected FREE—not by the ounce, one-fourth pound, or collections. No FREE seeds with Grass Seed, Fertilizer, Tobacco, Soap or Plants. Neither can I allow grass seed and vegetable seed in bulk to be selected as a premium.

HOW TO REMIT MONEY

Send money by Postoffice Money Order, Express Money Order, Registered Letter or Bank Draft, thus insuring its reaching me safely. I especially request that you remit money by any of the above safe methods. Please do not send stamps unless you have no other way of remitting, as they stick together; positively no Canadian postage stamps accepted. If money is sent in any other way than specified above it must be at your own risk. If you send personal check, please include 10 cents to cover exchange.

Please make sure your Name and Address is written plainly on all orders.

NOVELTIES FOR 1918

NEW ASTER, AMERICAN BEAUTY

Similar in type of flower and growth to the well-known Late Branching Asters, but differs in that all the large blossoms are produced on much longer and heavier stems. It is the first of a new strain of late branching habit, and of robust growth. Plants will average two and one-half to three feet in height, according to location, while the immense flowers, usually four to five inches in diameter, are often borne on heavy stems which may be cut two feet in length. The flowers are fully double to the last and are a most lovely shade of bright carmine-rose, almost identical with the American Beauty Rose. **Pkt., 100 seeds, 10 cts.**

CHINESE WOOLFLOWER

Plants grow two to three feet high, the blooms starting early with a central globular head which often reaches the immense size of two feet in circumference. Scores of branches are thrown out, each bearing a ball of scarlet wool. All these branches support numerous laterals with small heads of bloom mixed with fresh green foliage so that a plant looks like an immense bouquet splendidly arranged and set in the ground. None of the blooms fade in any way until hit by frost, but all continue to expand and glow with a deepening richness of color, a deep crimson-scarlet. Flowers when cut in a fresh state and carefully dried retain their shape and brilliant color and are useful for winter decorating, like everlastings.

Start seed if convenient under glass about four weeks before time to transplant to the garden. If the little plants remain too long in pots or seed beds they will begin to set bloom, which is not desirable. Transplant to the garden as soon as danger of frost is passed. **Seed—Per pkt., 75 seeds, 10 cts; 3 for 25 cts.**

SALPIGLOSSIS, NEW EMPEROR

Magnificent large blossoms, borne in graceful tall panicles, rich and varied coloring. For rich and charming penciling, no flower can excel it. Its velvety texture, with deeply sunken veins, penciled and shaded with the richest tracings on a ground-work of the most pleasing colors. Mixed colors. **Per pkt., 10 cts.**

THE CARDINAL CLIMBER

A graceful annual climber growing readily from seed. The flowers are star-shaped in tube form, and a fiery scarlet borne in clusters. The foliage is deeply lacinated, heavier than those of the Cypress Vine, to which it is related. Should be sown in a warm, sunny situation and in good soil. May be started indoors and planted outside after all danger of frost is over. **Pkt., 20 seeds, 10 cts.**

RAINBOW HIBISCUS GRANDIFLORA

One of the greatest novelties of recent production comprises scores of shades from pure White through Pink and Rose, some with dark centers and others with solid colors. Flowers 8 to 12 inches in diameter which remain open practically all day, whereas Mallow Marvels often close by noon,—height 4 to 6 ft. This wonderful strain of many shades is the results of crossing two colors, a White and a Pink variety, and continual breeding up from the product.

RAINBOW HYBRID SUNFLOWERS

Our wonderful Rainbow Hybrids are the results of bringing together the blood of three distinct types of Hybrids and amalgamating the good points of all.

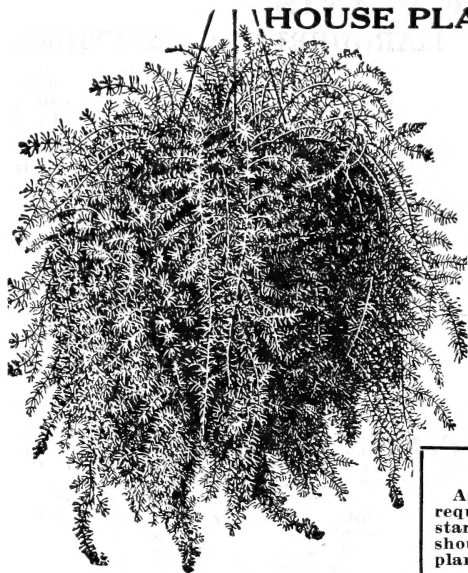

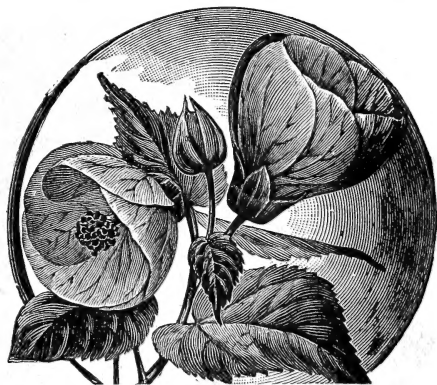

SPRENGERI—Highly praised everywhere; handsomest seen drooping from a pot or basket. Sprays 4 to 6 feet long, of fresh, green, feathery foliage; useful for bouquets, wreaths or sprays, remaining perfect for weeks after cutting. Grows freely the whole year round; extremely valuable for all purposes. Flowers white, followed by red berries. Pkt., 15 seeds, 8 cts.

PLUMOSUS MANUS—This graceful climbing Asparagus has foliage finer than that of the most delicate fern, and will last for weeks after being cut. It is an excellent house plant, succeeding under almost any condition. Pkt., 10 seeds, 10 cts.

NOTICE

Asparagus is very slow to germinate, requiring from 60 to 90 days, but once started is a very rapid grower. Seed should be soaked in warm water before planting.

ABUTILON, FLOWERING

HOW TO GROW PETUNIAS**PETUNIA CULTURE**

Take a small box or pot small enough to set in a pan or basin. Cover drain-holes to prevent clogging.

Use garden soil 2 parts and sand 1 part. Sift until fine and well mixed.

Fill box or pot with the soil, leaving one-half inch space at the top and shake to settle the soil well.

Mix seed with a little dry sand to prevent planting in spots.

Scatter evenly over the surface and press lightly into the soil with a little piece of board or pasteboard.

Set in a pan of water until thoroughly saturated. Lift out and cover the seed with a thin veil of dry sand. Cover the pot or box with glass and set in a warm, light place.

Lift the glass every day for ventilation and to prevent mould. NEVER let the seed box dry out. ALWAYS water from the bottom.

When the plants appear, prop up the glass and give morning sunshine every day. When they are a month old the glass can be taken away and they can have the sun all day.

Transplant into larger boxes when they have four leaves. When they have six or eight leaves, they may be put into the open ground, if the plants are strong and sturdy.

THE CULTURE OF ASTERS

The cultivation of the Aster is simple. Do not sow the seed too early; the middle of March indoors is a very good time. Successive sowings should be made, if a constant supply of flowers is desired from July until frost. For early use sow the seed in shallow boxes, covering with one-fourth inch of soil. Later sowings may be made in hot-beds or cold frames; or in the open ground, when all danger of frost is past. Never use the same ground or location twice in succession. The soil should be rich and moist. Use wood ashes and phosphates as fertilizers. Allow plants plenty of room; rows should be 3 feet apart and 15 inches between the plants in the row, but the distance may be less according to the habit or growth of the variety.

The aster beetle or fly is one of the worst pests but there seems to be only one crop of them, and these if caught and killed, are not usually followed by others. Dusting the plants with air-slacked lime or dry ashes will be found beneficial. Root lice and cut worms are also troublesome. Applications of kerosene emulsion or tobacco water around the roots are effective. Aster blight or "yellows" can usually be traced to the work of the above pests. The plants should be pulled and burned if they should become badly diseased. Good cultivation and the timely use of the remedies suggested should produce healthy, vigorous plants.
