## INTRODUCTION.

The principal object of the present Catalogue has been to give a complete list of the specimens of Dipterous Insects contained in the collection of the British Museum, indicating at the same time the peculiarities of each, as regards variations of character, locality, and the source from whence it has been derived. With this view, the different individuals of each species contained in the collection are indicated by the letters $a, b, c, \& c$., following the name of the species and its synonymes, and the description, if it appeared to have been before undescribed.

This part of the Catalogue of Dipterous Insects has been prepared and the new species described, by Mr. Francis Walker, so well known for his attention to this order of Insects.

The remaining parts, containing the other families, are in hand, and will follow as soon as they can be completed.

## Sabethes, Desvoidy.

Sabethes scintillans, n. s., mas. Nigra, iridescens, argenteo micans, antennis subalbis, pedibus pilosis, alis subfuscis.
Body black, hairy, with iridescent and silvery reflections: feelers about half the length of the body, dull white. adorned with whorls of long dark reddish-brown hairs, and clothed towards their tips with sltort down : palpi nearly as long as the body, brown; the
two last joints black and hairy: a large silvery spot on each side of the chest: mouth as long as the feelers: legs very thickly clothed with hairs, excepting the fore-legs and the shanks and feet of the middle legs, where the hairs are short and more thin : wings slightly tinged with brown, fringed; veins hrown; poisers dull red, with black tips. Length of the body 3 lines; of the wings 6 lines.

Body black: mouth full half the length of the body: feelers shorter than the mouth : sides of the chest with silvery spots: legs black, very long; a silvery spot on each thigh, near the tip, which is also silvery, as are those of the shanks and of the joints of the feet: wings slightly tinged with brown; their fore borders black; veins dark brown, thickly fringed with black hairs; poisers dark brown. Length of the body $2 \frac{1}{2}$ lines; of the wings 5 lines.

Head and chest brown, clothed with yellow hairs, and adorned with silvery spangles: disk of the head green : chest with three gray stripes: abdomen pale tawny, brown towards the tip, and having a brown line along each side, where it is adorned with large white spots: mouth tawny : feelers and palpi brown: legs tawny; tips of thighs brown; knees white; feet with alternate rings of white, tawny and brown: wings colourless; veins brown, much fringed; poisers yellow, with brown knobs. Length of the body 2 lines; of the wings $3 \frac{1}{2}$ lines.

Body pale yellowish brown, adorned with silvery lustre on each side : feelers and mouth dark brown; tip of the latter black: chest clothed with white hairs : abdomen with a band of white hairs on the fore-border of each segment: legs dark brown; base of the first and of the second joints of the feet white; knees also white; thighs yellow, with brown tips: wings colourless; veins brown; poisers yellow. Body brownish red: head and chest clothed with yellow hairs: mouth and feelers dark brown: each segment of the abdomen with a band of yellow hairs on the fore border, and with a few longer yellow hairs on the hind border: thighs pale brown, with black tips; shanks darker brown ; feet black, base of each joint pale yellow: wings colourless; veins tawny; poisers pale yellow, with tawny tips. Body long and narrow : head white, hoary behind, with a few black bristles along the hind borders of the eyes, clothed beneath with white hairs: eyes green and red: feelers black; first joint clothed wlth black hairs; second joint and base of the third tawny : mouth piceous: chest hoary, clothed with hoary down, and with a few black bristles on each side, where there is a white stripe, and it has also a broad yellowish brown stripe in the middle: breast white and clothed with white hairs : abdomen brown, covered with silvery glance, yellowish brown towards the tip, where it is clothed with dark tawny hairs; hind borders of the segments pale tawny and adorned with fringes of white hairs: legs gray; hips white: wings slightly gray, tawny along the fore border; brands brown and narrow: veins piceous, slightly bordered with dark tawny; poisers piceous, with dark tawny knobs. tawny, very narrow; veins tawny along the fore borders, piceous along the hind borders; poisers tawny, piceous towards the tips of the stalks; knobs yellow. Length of the body 5 lines; of the wings 8 lines.

Thereva tricolor, n. s., fem. Fulva, capite pectoreque albis, abdomine cano nigro fasciato, antennis cinereis, pedibus canis, tibiis fulvis, tarsis piceis, alis limpidis.
Head white, pale tawny between the eyes, having a few black bristles above, and more thickly clothed beneath with white hairs : eyes, feelers, and mouth gray: chest tawny, which colour passes into gray and thence into hoary on each side; it is very thinly clothed with short black hairs, and has a few long black bristles on each side; there are five very narrow and indistinct brown stripes on the back: breast white and clothed with white hairs: abdomen hoary, clothed with white hairs, almost white beneath ; every segment with a large black band, whose hind border is convex, and occupies nearly the whole of the middle of the segment: hips and thighs hoary, and clothed with white down, the former having also a few long black bristles; shanks tawny, with piceous tips, furnished with long black bristles; feet piceous, beset with short stout black hairs and long black bristles; first joint tawny till near the tip: wings quite colourless ; fore border beset with a row of very small black bristles; veins and poisers tawny, the latter somewhat brown at the base of the knobs. eyes, thickly clothed with black hairs above, and more thinly with white hairs beneath : mouth and feelers black : palpi tawny : eyes red : chest-tawny gray, with a few black bristles on each side, having also three indistinct brown stripes on the back; breast and sides of the chest hoary : abdomen brown above, and thinly clothed with yellow hairs: first segment gray; the following segments having each a gray band along the hind border, which is yellow, these bands are widened on the sides; there is a tawny spot on the side of each segment, and the segments beneath are tawny, with yellow hind borders : legs tawny; hips and trochanters gray, the former furnished with yellow hairs and long black bristles; thighs beset with yellow hairs and short black bristles, and having each a piceous stripe along the upper side; shanks and feet furnished with long and short black bristles, the latter are piceous: wings tawny, especially at the base and along the fore border; brands darker tawny; veins piceons; poisers tawny, their knobs mostly brown. Length of the body 4 lines; of the wings 8 lines.

Head tawny, piceous above between the eyes, which are red: mouth and feelers bright tawny ; first and second joints of the latter short; third joint longer, compressed, nearly oval ; fourth joint lanceolate, small, slightly curved: chest and breast bright purple, smooth, shining, thinly clothed with short black hairs, and having a few black bristles on each side : abdomen blue, smooth, shining, with a green tint here and there, sparingly furnished with black hairs, which are most thick towards the tip; the seven or eight segments successively decrease in length from the base to the tip; first segment tinged with purple: legs black; thighs and shanks clothed with short black hairs, and the latter also beset with black bristles; knees tawny; feet yellow, furnished with short tawny hairs and longer tawny bristles: wings yellow from the base to the middle, brown thence to the tips; veins agreeing in colour with the part of the wing through which they pass; poisers yellow. Body black: head piceous, clothed with yellow hairs, ferruginous in front : eyes black : mouth tawny: feelers black, as long as the chest; first joint ferruginous; second joint very long; third joint dilated: chest thinly clothed with yellow hairs; scutcheon tawny: abdomen piceous towards the tip, where it is clothed with yellow hairs; segments from the first to the third with broad yellow bands, which are entire beneath, but interrupted on the back and on each side: legs tawny : hind thighs ferruginous, yellow towards the base, armed beneath with numerous black spines; hind shanks also yellow towards the base : wings tawny ; wing-ribs and veins ferruginous; poisers yellow, their knobs piceous above. Length of the body 9-10 lines; of the wings $15-16$ lines.
