GLADIOLUS CULTURE

Spade or plow your plot of ground rather deep, pulverizing it well. If it is a heavy clay soil or one having considerably insufficient fertility the use of fertilizer is advisable. We suggest manure or any good commercial fertilizer. This should be well spaded into the ground before planting. If your soil is good garden loam this application may not be necessary. However, we recommend that a quantity of either of the above fertilizers or Bone Meal be put in the furrow or hole where the bulb is to be placed and covered with 1 inch of soil before the bulb is planted.

The bulbs should be planted about 5 inches deep in rows two feet apart, being placed 3 inches apart in the row. In clump or group planting they should be placed about 6 inches apart each way. Small bulbs should not be planted quite so deep. Start cultivation as soon as the spikes begin to appear. Stir the surface frequently and keep fer from weeds. If the season is dry, water frequently and freely. A planting at intervals of 10 days up until July 1 will give a succession of bloom all summer. Cuttings should be made 8 inches above the ground when two complete blooms have appeared.

After the flowers are cut the bulbs should remain in the ground until the end of September or even into October, depending upon the time they were planted, so that they may attain their full growth. By all means remove them from the ground before freezing weather, cut off the tops and after curing, either out of doors or inside, store them in your basement or a place of moderate temperature for the winter.

How to Succeed with Flowers

For Success with Flowers Demand QUALITY SEED

Your success with flowers depends largely upon the quality of the seed you buy and the proper method of growing the plants. There is a difference in the germinating and productivity qualities of flower seeds. If the amount you invest in flower seeds is invested in quality rather than quantity, there is no doubt but that you will have better success.

We both know that seed cannot be exempt from all blame for poor results. The most common cause of failure with flowers is the lack of knowledge in properly growing and caring for seedlings. Being successful is

easy if you know a few fundamental principles.

Annuals bloom the same year and die and can usually be started from seed sown directly in the garden in the spring, although earlier bloom can be enjoyed by starting most of them inside. Biennials generally do not bloom until the second season, then die. Most of these can be sown directly in the garden. Some, if started early inside, will bloom the first year. Perennials, including most rock-plants, are hardy, endure winter weather for several seasons and start blooming the second season in the spring. They should be started in flats or boxes any time from late spring to September 1st and set out in the garden in the fall.

Throughout the flower seed section we have endeavored to give you enough information about each variety offered so that you may know whether it is an annual (a), biennial (b), perennial (p), etc. (See key to symbols on opposite page.) We also give its height, whether it prefers sun, partial shade or shade, blooming period in months, where it can be used to best advantage and its proper culture (see opposite page), including the depth to sow the seed.

Too much emphasis cannot be given to the depth to sow seed. Common advice usually given is "Sow seed shallow" and while this is good it is too general. Under each variety heading we are giving, in parts of inches, the depth to sow the seed.

Sowing Seed in the Garden

After frost is out of the ground it should be dug and broken up to a depth of at least 9 inches, mixing in plant food if necessary. Pulverize the top soil well and sow the seed evenly, covering as directed herein. Keep the soil at as even moisture as possible until the little plants appear. Thin or transplant as necessary to prevent crowding. Water thoroughly every few days instead of a light sprinkling every day and cultivate often to keep down weeds and to retain moisture in soil.

Growing Seedlings Inside

The ideal box for growing both flower and vegetable seedlings is a window flat about 3 to 4 inches deep. Where you do not want many plants, any shallow box (a cigar box is ideal) will do very well. In any event, place holes in the bottom for drainage. Fill to a depth of 1 inch with cinders or gravel, and the remainder with good, well sifted garden loam to within

1/4 inch of the top and firm down.

Follow directions given under each variety heading as to the depth to sow the seed. After it is sown, place the box in a pan of water and let the water be absorbed from the bottom until the top soil shows moist. Let the surplus water drain out of the bottom, after which place it in a window, preferably with southern exposure, and cover top with glass or heavy paper. Turn this cover several times a day to prevent moisture forming. As soon as the seeds have germinated, remove the cover. Give the seedlings as much air and sunshine as possible but shade them from the noon sun if it is extremely hot. After the plants are well up, keep them cool rather than warm, and grow them slowly. The soil should be kept moist but not wet. This should be done with bottom moisture as above. Before the plants are transplanted into the garden, they should be har-dened off. On mild days expose them to the outdoors and they will soon be able to stand the outside weather without injury.

All perennial flowers can be started in these same boxes, but with fresh soil, except that the box is placed

outdoors in a cool, shaded location.

The Cause of "Damping Off"
"Damping off" and Rots of seedlings are actually caused by living germs that live in the soil. When seeds are sown in soil containing germs, they become parasites and attack the young roots as soon as they have sprouted. If the seedlings are not killed before they emerge they are attacked again at the soil level and topple over and die. Attention to proper moisture, ventilation and transplanting to prevent overcrowding tends to decrease this disease. The most successful way of combating it is to sterilize the soil with Ansul Dust. (Offered on page 14.)

Transplanting Seedlings in the Garden

A few hours previous to transplanting, water both the seedling box and the soil outside. With a fork carefully loosen and remove the seedlings disturbing roots as little as possible and keeping them from the air. Transplant them a little deeper than they were before, firm down the soil and protect them against direct sun for a day or two until acclimated to conditions.

After germination, remove cover, supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. When large enough to handle, thin or transplant 2 inches apart in other boxes and gradually expose to outside conditions. pose to outside conditions. Plant outside after danger of frost. This seed may also be sown outside in the garden in well pulverized soil after frost.

Culture B.—Sow seed outside in well pulverized soil after the last killing frost. Cover to depth indicated under variety heading herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin or transplant as necessary. If earlier bloom is desired, sow seed inside in shallow box of light, well pulverized, moist soil in early spring. Cover to proper depth and firm soil. Cover box until germination, after which remove cover, supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. Thin or transplant to other boxes and plant outside after frost. after frost.

CD

Culture C.—Sow seed thinly outside in the garden in well pulverized soil after last killing frost. Cover to depth indicated under variety heading herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin out as necessary so that plants are not crowded. It is best to sow this seed where the plants are to remain as they do not transplant very successfully.

ulture D.—Sow seed outside in early spring as soon as the soil can be well pulverized. Cover to depth indicated under variety heading herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin or transplant as necessary. For very early bloom, sow outside in late fall just before freezing weather, or can be started quite early inside in box as in culture A and transplanted outside after frost.

Culture E.—Sow seed inside in shallow box of well pulverized moist soil, preferably during spring months. Cover to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm soil with board. Cover box and place in warm location until germination, after which remove cover, supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. Culture J.—Sow seed thinly in shallow box of well pulverized moist soil after frost and any time up to August or September 1st. Cover seed to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm soil with board. Place in cool, shaded outdoor location; after germination, supply bottom moisture. Thin as necessary and transplant to permanent location when large enough to handle. Give protection the first winter. This seed can also be sown in the fall as above, transplanted into coldframes where it is carried through the winter, and planted out in the spring.

Culture K.—Sow seed thinly outside in well pulverized soil in early spring and any time during summer. Cover seed to depth indicated under variety headings herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin out as necessary. Seed should be sown where plants are to remain as they do not transplant very successfully. Provide protection the first winter. Usually do not bloom until second season.



Culture—The soil best suited for the culture of the Beet is that which is rather light, well fertilized. If wanted very early, sow in hotbeds and transplant; but for main crop sow in the spring, as soon as the ground becomes fit to work, in drills 11/2 feet apart, 1/2 inch deep. For winter use, the turnip varieties may be sown as late as June and the seed covered 2 inches. When the plants are 3 to 4 inches in height, thin out so that they stand 3 to 4 inches apart. Keep free from weeds by frequent hoeing and hand-weeding if necessary. Before freezing weather sets in the roots may be stored in cellars or pits same as potatoes. Dry earth thrown over them before the straw is put on insures their keeping over winter.


Culture—To grow Lettuce outside, sow the seed very thinly in rows $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart, covering seed $\frac{1}{4}$ in. deep with fine soil. This can be done as soon as the cold wet days of spring are past. With loose leaf varieties, thin to about 2 inches apart when a few leaves have formed and normal use will further thin the row as plants develop. Heading varieties should be thinned to stand 12 inches apart in the row.

For fine Lettuce in early spring, sow seed in a seedbed in September or October and protect thru winter in a coldframe. It can also be sown in a hotbed or in a house box in early spring; covered with damp blotting paper and kept moist until germination. Gradually expose young plants to the light and set out when soil is dry and moist. Cultivate to keep down weeds and conserve moisture.

It is preferable to grow Pumpkins in the field, and not in the garden, as they mix with the squashes and other vines. You can sow some among the late corn, putting in a few seeds, say every third or fourth hill. This will give you plenty for the table, and your stock the coming winter.



Culture—Peas thrive best in a rich soil and moderate temperature. Smooth seeded varieties are extremely hardy and can be planted quite early about 2 to 3 inches deep. Wrinkled varieties are not so hardy but are of superior quality. They should be planted when the ground is warm and dry and if they are planted quite early they should be covered only 1 inch to prevent rotting in the ground.

For dwarf varieties make the rows 20 to 30 inches apart and for tall varieties make them 30 to 36 inches apart. The seed should be placed 1 to 2 inches apart in the row. Tomato Culture

In this locality, for very early fruit, the seed should be sown in a hotbed about the first week in March, in drills 5 inches apart and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch deep. Later sowings may be made until the last of April. You can approximate your sowing date from this according to your location. (Sufficient plants for a small garden can be started by sowing a few seeds in a shallow box or flowerpot and placing in a sunny window in the house.) When the young plants are about 2 inches high, they should be set 4 to 5 inches apart in another hotbed or coldframe, or transplanted into small pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. Expose to the air as much as possible to harden them for planting out. Water freely at the time of transplanting in the open ground and shelter from the sun a few days until the plants are thoroughly established. Cultivate as long as the vines will permit, but the last two or three workings of the soil should be very shallow. The use of fertilizer, high in potash, makes tomatoes more solid and tends to keep them from cracking.

Tomatoes grow splendidly trained to stakes or trellises. The fruits are of better quality and appearance and ripen earlier. This method is common with market gardeners and is practiced by private gardeners where neatness and conservation of space is desired. The usual method is to set one strong plant to a stake 5 to 7 feet high, tying the plant up with wool or other strong, soft twine, and pruning quite freely as the vine advances in growth. By this method plants may be set much closer than in the ordinary way. Ask for Tomato Booklet giving more detailed instructions. About 2,000 plants will be produced from one ounce of seed. 4 ounces will plant an acre. Maturities given are from the time plants are placed in the garden to first ripe fruits.

Culture.—Turnips serve the double purpose of summer greens and useful roots. Early varieties should be planted as soon as the ground is dry in spring. Sowings of these and other later ones can be made as late as August. Early sowing should be in rows 12 to 15 inches apart, covering seed ½ inch and thinning to 4 to 6 inches apart in the row. 
