

You need not be deterred from having one on account of expense, as you may make a beginning with only a few stones gathered, if need be, here and there along the roadside or stream, when out diving. The waterfall effect may be easily accomplished by secreting the open end of the garden hose at the top of the rockery and allowing the water to run a part of the day. PARCEL POST RATES. Below we give a table showing Parcel Post rates of the different zones. Ask your postman what zone you are in from Columbus and you can then figure the necessary postage on your order. You will note that each zone is so much for the first pound and so much for each additional pound. Example: 4th zone .08 and .04. If you live in the 4th zone and want to order 10 pounds of seed, the first pound would be 8 cents and the remainder would be at 4 cents per pound, the 4th zone rate for each additional pound, or 44 cents postage for the 10 pounds. 
Flower Seed Department

Our list of flower seeds will be found to contain all sorts of real merit. Many times varieties are listed which are of no value and so difficult to grow that unless one has every facility for propagation, disappointment is sure to follow. We want our seeds to give satisfaction and prefer not to have a very extended list, rather than to cause disappointment in any of the varieties procured. Cultural directions will be found on most of our seed packets. We will also give free to customers, on application, a very instructive and helpful leaflet "Annuals from Seeds."

Annuals bloom and ripen their seed the first year, then die. Among these are Asters, Balsams, Mignonette, Sweet Peas, Nasturtiums, Morning-Glories, and many other very brilliant and fragrant sorts.

Biennials from seed generally bloom the second year, then die. Some varieties, if planted early, bloom the first season and therefore are treated as annuals.

Perennials endure northern winters with little or no protection and live and bloom several years. Most of the perennials will bloom the first year if started early in the spring. Hollyhocks, Columbines, Larkspurs, Foxgloves, Poppies, etc., are in this class.

They are, perhaps, the most popular annual flower grown, and justly so on account of their ease of culture, season of bloom, and lasting qualities, both in the garden and as cut-flowers. To be able to cut Asters abundantly and over the longest possible period, you should make several sowings of the early-midseason and late-flowering types. Sow the seed in shallow boxes in the house or in the hotbed in March; transplant the seedlings 2 inches apart in boxes, when they are large enough to handle; and plant to permanent beds in May. The second sowing can be made in the coldframe the latter part of April. The third sowing should be made the latter part of May. Set the plants of early varieties 10 inches apart in the row, and those of the later varieties 15 to 18 inches apart. The richer the ground the better your flowers will be, and water is very necessary. Our extensive trials and personal inspection of hundreds of acres each season has given us the opportunity to select what we believe to be the cream of all Asters. In the following list you will find not only the standard varieties of merit, but many of the newer sorts which are sure to please. 

Beets for Table Use

The soil best suited for the culture of the Beet is that which is rather light, provided it is thoroughly mixed with manure. If wanted very early, sow in hotbeds and transplant; but for main crop sow in the spring, as soon as the ground becomes fit to work, in drills 1½ feet apart, ½ inch deep. For winter use, the turnip varieties may be sown as late as June and the seed covered 2 inches. When the plants are 3 to 4 inches in height, thin out so that they stand 3 to 4 inches apart. Keep free from weeds by frequent hoeing and hand-weeding if necessary. Before freezing weather sets in the roots may be stored in cellars or pits, same as potatoes. Dry earth thrown over them before the straw is put on insures their keeping over winter. Do not bruise them in handling.



Cabbage requires deep, rich, mellow soil, high manuring, and good culture to obtain fine, solid heads. For early use, sow seeds of the early kinds in the hotbeds or in a box in the house the last of January or early in February; transplant into the open ground in April in rows 2 feet apart and 1½ feet apart in the row; or sow a bed of seed outside as soon as the soil can be worked; transplant in about four weeks. For second early Cabbage, sow in April and transplant in May. For late Cabbage, sow in May and transplant in July in rows 3 feet apart and 2 feet apart in the row. In transplanting, it is important that plant be set down to the first leaf, so that the stem may not be injured in case of frost. Be careful not to cover the heart of the plant. Hoe every week and stirsoil deeply. As they advance in growth draw a little earth to the plants until they begin to head. To prevent splitting or bursting, go frequently over the ground and push every cabbage that appears about to mature over sideways, which will break some of the roots and check its growth. To prevent attacks of the cabbage fly on small plants, dust thoroughly with plaster, air-slaked lime, or wood ashes.


How to Grow Eggplant.—Sow seeds in hotbed or warm greenhouse in March or early in April. If no hotbed is at hand, they may be grown in any light room where the temperature will average 75 degrees. When plants are 2 inches high, or have formed two rough leaves, transplant them into beds and set 3 to 4 inches apart. Keep beds closed and very warm, shading from direct rays of the sun and giving an occasional watering until the weather is warm and all danger from frost and cold nights is past; then harden the plants by gradual exposure to the sun and air, and transplant to the open ground late in May or June, into warm, rich soil, 2 to 3 feet apart each way. When about a foot high, draw the earth up to the stem.





CULTURE.—For early spring use, sow in a seedbed in September or October, and protect through the winter in coldframes, or in the South with leaves or litter, or sow in a hotbed in early spring. Lettuce plants may also be started very successfully in the house in boxes which are about 5 inches deep. Make soil very fine and deep. Make soil very fine and firm. Mark off into rows 2 inches apart and ¼inch deep, into which sow the seed quite thinly; cover with blotting or brown paper fitted into the top of the box. First saturate the paper with water and keep moist until the seed germinates, then remove. Expose the young plants gradually to the light. As soon as the ground outside is dry and warm, so that it can be well worked, set out the plants 8 inches apart in the rows. For outside sow very thinly in rows 1½ feet apart, covering seed ¼ inch deep with fine soil, and when well up thin to 1 foot apart in the rows. In order to have crisp, tender Lettuce, it should be grown as rapidly as possible, therefore the soil should be made very rich by liberal manuring.



Peas thrive better if the ground has been manured for a previous crop, but if the ground is poor and requires enriching, use well-rotted manure, and for the dwarf varieties you can hardly make the soil too rich. 

Tomato Culture

For very early fruit, the seed should be sown in a hotbed about the first week in March, in drills 5 inches apart and ½ inch deep. Later sowings may be made until the last of April. (Sufficient plants for a small garden can be started by sowing a few seeds in a shallow box or flower-pot and placing in a sunny window in the house.) When the young plants are 3 to 4 inches high, they should be set 4 to 5 inches apart in another, hotbed or coldframe, or transplanted into small pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. Expose to the air as much as possible to harden them for planting out. Water freely at the time of transplanting into the open ground and shelter from the sun a few days until the plants are thoroughly established. Cultivate as long as the vines will permit, but the last two or three workings of the soil should be very shallow.

Tomatoes grow splendidly trained to stakes or trellises. The fruit is much improved, not only in appearance, but in quality, and is a week or more earlier. This mode of cultivation is quite common among gardeners who grow for the early market, and at private places throughout the country; especially is this desirable where neatness and at the same time economy of space in the home-garden is desired. The usual method is to set one strong plant to a stake 5 to 7 feet high, tying the plant up with wool or other strong, soft twine, and pruning quite freely as the vine advances in growth. By this method plants may be set much closer than in the ordinary way. For fine, large specimens of high color and attractive appearance generally, grow the clusters of the fruit in paper sacks, as is commonly practiced by grape-growers. These paper sacks or bags should be put on when the Tomatoes are about three-fourths grown. Ask for Tomato Booklet giving more detailed instructions. About 2,000 plants will be produced from one ounce of seed.


