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## PREFACE

This Genealogy has quite a history. About the year 1850 a Boston bookseller and publisher, James Speare Loring, began to gather items of interest about Lorings, and in process of time built up a history of the descendants of Deacon Thomas Loring, who came from England to America in 1634, writing out the records of each of the deacon's four sons and carrying down the lines separately. Not completing it as he wished, at his death in 1888 he bequeathed his manuscript to the New England Historic Genealogical Society, by whose permission we have published it. Some time later Justice William Caleb Loring, of Boston, borrowed the manuscript and had it typewritten and bound in book form; and it resumed its place on the shelves of the Society. Afterward John Arthur Loring, master printer, of Springfield, borrowed one of the copies Justice Loring had made and indexed it very fully - typewritten and gave the volume back again for those interested to peruse. But he went further; taking names of Lorings from advertisements, letterheads and public prints, in addition to his own very wide circle of relations of the blood, he revised the work of James Speare Loring and did a very fine piece of compilation, extending the records very much. When he found his health failing he hastened eagerly to complete the work, and left it in what seemed to him a stage very near the point of publication. self-denying labors for the family came to an end in 1906, and a decade passed before his dreams came true. Charles Henry Pope was informed of the state of the Book of the Lorings and was asked to take hold of the enterprise. Mrs. John Arthur Loring was satisfied that all would be properly done, when Miss Katharine Peabody Loring came forward with a proposition to purchase the manuscript, and guaranteed its suitable publication under the editorship of Mr. Pope.

The latter copied all Loring births, marriages and deaths found in the office of the Secretary of State of Massachusetts, the transcripts of town and city records since 1840, obtained addresses of Lorings in some five hundred cities and towns from directories (in the library of Sampson & Murdock Company, Boston), sent out circulars to the persons thus found and carried on an extensive correspondence to get the largest practicable roll of the family. This work has been done at the charges and in accord with the ideas of Miss Loring above mentioned, whose large experience in library and other matters has made her service to the genealogy very valuable. Thus the work has grown and rounded out and gained in substance, till the latest returns from Spain and additions to the "cradle-roll" have been included, and the book is issued.

No one will ever know its limitations and imperfections as painfully as the editor, who has done his best to make it perfect; some errors have crept in through other avenues: in some cases the date of an occurrence has been stated in two or three ways by members of a family and found different from that in the public record; in others successive letters of a correspondent have shown difference. either with apology or in simple carelessness. Worse than that, perhaps, have been the neglect and failure of some of the family to reply to letters, circulars or verbal requests for information. Such causes have left certain groups of the family imperfectly described. But we believe the genealogy as a whole is well up to the average of such works, and in certain parts has definite excellence. The method of the work is that called "the Register plan"; in the Introduction the subject of English Lorings is treated by Miss Loring; then the story of Deacon Thomas Loring, of Axminster, England, and Hingham and Hull, Massachusetts, is presented, and after that his children in the order of their birth, with their family lists; daughters with whatever is known about them and their issue are given, but each son who married is numbered and his story carried forward, and then follow these grandsons of Deacon Thomas in the order of their fathers' birth and their own. So through the book, each generation is treated as a whole and not in four groups as the earlier compilers arranged them.

The substance of these earlier compilations has been edited in the interest of fair treatment for the whole family and restatement of many matters in the light of later study. In one case a hundred and fifty typewritten pages upon one man have been condensed into a single page of print; in others extensive discourses on various subjects have been omitted as not germane to this work. Yet very many records have been copied and great honor is due to the able and self-denying efforts of those who laid the foundations of Loring Genealogy. It has not been practicable to give separate credit to the authors of the successive paragraphs; but all articles have been subjected to the closest scrutiny and repeated examination. If definite errors are discovered in the book please communicate them to Miss Katharine Peabody Loring. Pride's Crossing, Massachusetts.



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### INTRODUCTION

It is pleasant and desirable to know about our ancestors, and, sooner or later, every one has the wish to do so; for membership in patriotic societies, careful investigation is necessary, as family legends and unverified discoveries are misleading. It is to provide a solid foundation for enlarged study of families of Loring that this book is made. It deals only with the descendants of Thomas who migrated from Axminster, Devonshire, in 1634. Although its scope is strictly limited we record in this introduction all that has been learned of Lorings in England before the time of Thomas, in order to save trouble for future students and to suggest directions for research.

Extracts from parish registers and probate records in England show us the Founder of the Family as a farmer and church warden, but fail to establish his parentage or ancestry.

For the origin of the name and for notices of early Lorings, the reader is referred to the volumes of manuscript by James Speare Loring and those of John Arthur Loring in the library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society.


The first Loring seems to have been Robert, a poet, mathematician and architect, who built the Cathedral of Hereford and was made bishop of that see in 1279. The next Loring of importance mentioned is Sir Pers (Piers or Petrus), a very active citizen, knighted in the reign of Henry III, and granted a coat of arms described: "Quarterly argent et goules, et bend sable." He married Jane Morteyn and had a son Roger, also knighted, who married Cassandra, daughter of Reginald Perth. His son was Sir Neell (Nele, Neale or Nigel) Loring, who is the hero of Conan Doyle's historic novels,


"The White Company" and "Sir Nigel." A great deal is known of him, the principal facts only are given here, quoted from "The Stall Plates of the Knights of the Order of the Garter," by Sir W. H. St. John Hope, Arnold Coustable and Company, Ld., London, 1901, from which the stall plate is copied.

Sir Neell was one of the first twenty-six knights of the order founded by Edward III in 1348. His plate is to be found in the twentieth stall on the north side of St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle. "A cut out plate representing the shield, which is quarterly silver and gules, a bend engrailed sable, with silver helm covered with red mantling, lined ermine, and surmounted by the crest, a fine brush of feathers sable, encircled by a gold band. On a scroll affixed to the lower edge of the plate is inscribed:

Mons: Neell: Loryng: p<sup>r</sup>m: fund<sup>m</sup>" (Monsieur Neell Loryng primus fundatorum).

"Sir Neel Lorying was son and heir of Roger Loryng of Chalgrave in Bedfordshire, and was knighted for his gallant conduct in the battle off Sluvs in 1340. After a life of great activity and devotion to his King and Country, Sir Neell Loryng retired to his estate at Chalgrave, and on his death in March, 1385-6, was buried in the priory church of Dunstable. He married Margaret, daughter and heir of Sir Ralph Beauple of Cnubeston, County Devon, by whom he left two daughters." It is known also that he was at the battle of Poictiers, 1356, with the Black Prince, and afterwards at Bordeaux in Gascony. In a book, title unknown, written to show the claim of the Warren family to the earldom of Warren, Sussex and Surrey, mention is made of arms and the following inscription on the lowest pillar of the north aisle of the church at Oundle. The arms are very complicated and do not resemble the other arms of the Lorings, except that there are red quarterings and a "bend sable."

No connection has been established between these Bedfordshire Lorings and those of Devonshire, whence Thomas came, though James Speare Loring remarks about heraldry (page 389): "That the Lorings of New England were descendants of the race of Bedfordshire is very probable for the reason that the arms of Sir Nele

Loryng have been hung up in their dwellings from the time of their ancestor of Hingham to the present period."

"America Heraldica" gives the following crest for the Chalgrave Lorings, "Out of a bowl or, five quills erect, argent. Motto, Faire sans dire." This crest was used by the late Admiral Sir John Wentworth Loring of Southampton and the motto is added to the shield of Sir Petrus, borne as coat of arms of the Lorings of Spain. "In the case of the Marqués de Casa Loring and the Conde de Mieres, a coronet is added. According to Spanish heraldry, the arms of the Marqués Amalia de Silvela, which were granted to Amalia Loring, will be those of the Loring family, even if the title goes to some one who does not bear the Loring name." (From a letter from the Conde de Allriz, giving the information of the family in Spain July, 1917.)

The extracts from parish records printed herewith

do not show anything of value as regards Thomas, but, by following these clues, something may be found.

# RECORDS OF LORINGS FROM AXMINSTER PARISH, ENGLAND\*

COPIED FOR MISSES KATHARINE PEABODY LORING AND LOUISA PUTNAM LORING BY MR. CORNISH, OF CEDAR HOUSE, AXMINSTER

Note. The registers of Axminster parish begin in 1559 and extend to 1580; then there is a gap to 1648 for baptisms and burials and to 1695 for marriages. Clerks were required to send copies of all records to the office of the bishop of each diocese, and these transcripts may exist at Exeter for the missing years. All that Mr. Cornish obtained affords very slight material for ascertaining the history of the Loring family, and gives nothing that is certainly connected with the New England pioneer family.

The name is spelled Loring, Loreing, Loringe,

LOREN, LOWRING, LORYNG, etc.

Richard, son of John and Alice, buried Feb. 21, 1559-1560.

Alice, wife of John, of Tolsais, buried April 24, 1560.

Agnes, daughter of Elizabeth and William, buried March 1, 1562-3.

Alice, daughter of John and Agnes, baptized Feb. 23, 1566-7.

Alice, daughter of John (smith by trade) bapt. Oct. 10, 1568.

Joane, daughter of John of Tolsais, bapt. Oct. 18, 1568. Gertrude, daughter of John of Tolsais, bapt. Mar. 24, 1570-1.

Ellen, daughter of John of Tolsais, baptized April 10, 1575.

Joane, daughter of Thomas, tailor, by trade, bapt. May 12, 1575.

Alexander, son of Thomas, tailor, bapt. July 15, 1576. John, son of Gyles and Agnes, bapt. Nov. 1, 1577.

Mr. Cornish copied many other records of the years long after Deacon Thomas Loring and his family had come to New England, which afford no light whatever on the origin of the American family.

We know that Deacon Thomas' son Thomas was born about 1629; by that token we may estimate that Thomas, the father, was born not far from 1600. His father may have been born thirty years earlier, or about 1570. Roger, son of John of Tolsaiss, baptized September 7, 1577, would have been old enough to have been father of the father of Deacon Thomas, and may have died before the commencement of extant records in 1648. Or John, son of Gyles and Agnes, baptized November 1, 1577, may have been the person. Or, again, Alexander, son of Thomas, the tailor, may have been that grandfather of the American immigrant.

It is well to study the registers of adjacent or neighboring parishes in Devonshire and Dorsetshire; since Axminster may have been the residence of our Deacon Thomas for only a short time before coming across the Atlantic, while he and his wife may have been born some distance from that parish.

The early transcripts of Devonshire have been printed since the above research was made. In the Axminster items we find several of interest.

William Lorynge, Thatcher, buried July 24, 1606-7.

(See administration, page xix.)

John, son of Edward Lorynge, Smyth, baptized June 25, 1614. The same, buried . . . July 13, 1614.

Thomas, son of Thomas Loringe, baptized Mar. 27, 1624-5; buried Mar. 30, 1624-5.

Thomas, son of Thomas Loring, baptized Mar. 5, 1625-6. John, son of Thomas Loren, baptized Dec. 27, 1629-1630.

Thomas Lorin was one of the church wardens who signed the register-transcript for the year 1629-1630. (Evidence of his full accord with the church at that time.)

Edward, son of Edward Loring, baptized July 30, 1625. Giles, son of Richard Loring, baptized Apr. 1, 1626.

Thomas, son of Nichollas Loering, baptized Nov. 26, 1634.

Christian, daughter of John Loringe, baptized Oct. 18, 1635.

These complete the records of the parish of Axminster relating to the Loring family, now extant. They fail to show the parentage of Deacon Thomas Loring, the founder of the American family. That can be discovered only by search of the registers of a number of adjacent parishes in Devonshire and the neighboring counties of Dorset and Somerset, and by wills of persons of the name, and related families, Newtons, and others. Deliberate study on the ground is very likely to result in much of interest. The following have been obtained by a scion of the family, Mr. Conant, and are given here as a contribution to the full study which may be made.

Philip Lorynge was a witness to a will at Woodland Abbots, 20 June, 1412. (Somerset Record Society, vol. 16, Mediaeval Wills.)

John Loryng had a bequest of "a blew gowne furred," and his wife Sybil one of 3 silver spoons, in the will of Thomas Ashcombe, of St. Clement Danes, London, Oct. 6, 1460.

John Lorijng, rector of St. Andrews, Hereford Hundred, in 1524. (Herts, ii: p. 169.)



# LORING GENEALOGY

### FIRST GENERATION

1. Deacon Thomas Loring, founder of the American family, was born at Axminster, Devonshire, England. So much his grandson, Rev. Israel Loring, learned from his father and left on record. But neither the name of his father, mother or any ancestor has come down to us. As we have seen on previous pages, the parish registers of Axminster are sadly defective and wills thus far examined fail to show the origin of the pioneer. It is matter of great satisfaction that the fragmentary records exhibit the man as one of the wardens of the parish, and so dispel any notion that he came here in any quarrel with the mother church as so many of the colonists did; from a life of fellowship with the congregation where he had lived he came to a new country and joined with the Congregational church, the only organization of Christian people here, so continuing in brotherly love with good people everywhere.


Thomas Loring married, in England, Jane Newton; her grandson, already quoted from, says "she was a woman of a lively spirit, . . . skilled in the practise of physick," which shows that she was above the average in the community and useful to her neighbors. Her ancestry is thus far unknown to her descendants. There were other persons of the name in Axminster, as the registers show, but no token of relationship. Mr. Loring came here, Rev. Israel affirms, "December 23, 1634," and joined the church colony at Hingham, which had come from Hingham, Norfolkshire, under the lead of an Independent minister, Rev. Robert Peck. Admitted "freeman" or citizen of the colony March 3, 1635-6, he was already

established on a home lot near what is now the corner of Town and Ship Streets. He became the proprietor of other lots at later times. He was a farmer. As the fish that abounded along the shore furnished a large part of the food of the inhabitants, and were also "set" with the corn to enrich the soil, Deacon Loring and his neighbors, by permission of the town in 1637, built a weir to catch this floating wealth; and the stream is called today Weir River. He was an innkeeper, too, perhaps the first in the plantation, licensed by the General Court along with some from other towns in March, 1637. To show how careful the people were to have proper persons to entertain man and beast, especially when intoxicating drinks were sold in the inns, an extract from the records of the General Court may be given:

William Clark, who lived on the border of Salem and Lynn, kept public house. After his death his widow applied for renewal of the license; the court licensed her to "keep the inn and sell wine, if she provide a fit man that is godly for the business." Such sentiment surrounding "the business" makes it in a sense a compliment to an ancestor that he was entrusted with a

hostelry.

The church chose him one of its deacons and he was respected and influential in the town. From some cause fire robbed him of his dwelling, March 15, 1645-6, and he did not choose to rebuild. Instead, however, he bought property in the adjoining plantation of Hull, and took a prominent place there; was constable (which then meant court officer, tax collector, etc., and demanded a good business education as well as efficiency). He joined with some of his neighbors and others in taking stock in a new plantation, "Sickonke," afterward called Seakonk and Rehoboth; but he did not remove to the place or continue his ownership of land there. bought "for a valuable consideration," May 30, 1660, of Thomas Chaffee "all that my house Housing orchard & two home lotts, lying in the town of Hull, Conteigning fower acres more or lesse as they were measured

This extensive property was the subject of careful appraisal and division by the sons after their father's decease.

Deacon Loring died April 4, 1661, leaving no will. Administration was granted to his widow Jane and eldest son Thomas, April 18, following, and the required inventory was presented June 27, 1661. The document is well worth presenting verbatim et literatim. It shows the style of life among our pioneer ancestors in many particulars.

So much property was involved in the estate the brothers made an itemized agreement of division; each retained what the father had given him and the rest of the property was estimated and assigned in a fine, brotherly fashion. Thomas and John had lands in Hull, Josiah the Hingham homestead and Benjamin that in Hull. A later division had to be made; "the 24 of the 2d month [April] 1672," Thomas Dyer and John Holbrook reaffirmed the former inventory and added some items: "The small devisions at Slow Island & Bruisters Island wthye Comons at Hingham & eight Cow Comons at Hull and one divicon not yet laid out at hingam not yet aprised. More in money then left betwixt 30 and 40 £ wch some of the Brethren have declared ymselves willing yt mother shall continue to keepe it." "Mrs Jane Lorin and Tho:

Lorin & John Lorin her sons made oath to this in Court this 1st of ye 3 mo. 1672."

The widow came to the end of her care of the money a short time after. She died August 25, 1672. She left a will which adds much to our acquaintance with her own nature and the fashions and conditions of the day.

#### THE WILL OF MRS. JANE LORING

In the Nam and fear of god Amen: 10 July. 1672. I Janne Loring of Hull in the county of Suffolke in New England: widow. having great reason to consider the uncertainty & momentariness of this present life & knowing that his decree is certain; in whose hands are all my times: & therefore according to his mind & will & my duty: 1 being in my good & sound understanding & memory though weak in body; and willing to dispose of my world [ly] estate & set my house in order; doe therefore make & declare this writing to be my last will & testament

Imprimis 1 give & bequeath my soul into the hands of him y' gave it, my blessed god & mercifull father in Christ Jesus; & my body to the dust; to be decently buried in the hope of a glorious resurrection unto an immortal inheritance amongst all they that are sanctified: in & by Christ Jesus: alsoe my just debts which 1 shall owe to any person to be justly & duly payed.

2. Thomas<sup>2</sup> Loring (*Thomas*<sup>1</sup>), born at Axminster, England, baptized March 5, 1625-6; married at Hingham, December 16, 1657, Hannah, daughter of Nicholas and Mary Jacob. Her father "came from old Hingham in England in 1633, with his wife and two children and their cosen Thomas Lincoln, weaver," according to Cushing, the local annalist. Hannah was baptized at Hingham February 23, 1639-40; she survived Mr. Loring and married second Captain Stephen French, of Weymouth; she died October 20, 1720.

Thomas Loring, Jr., was a worthy successor of his father in Hull; was a selectman of the town in 1671, 1674 and 1675.

He died at his residence in Hull in the year 1678; the date is not on record, but it was between December 24 when he made his will, and February 25 when the inventory of his estate was made, in what they then called the "twelfth month" of the year; the will was proved March 12, or on the "twelfth day of the first month," so called, though they kept the old year number till the twenty-fifth of March, the Day of the Annunciation of the Virgin, which was New Year's Day.

#### THE WILL OF THOMAS LORING Hull this 24th of December 1678

After the widow had married her second husband, Stephen French, and the children had come to lawful age or had been married, a division was made according to the provisions of the will, namely, certain lands to Mrs. French; money portions to the daughters, Hannah, wife of Jeremiah Cushing, and Deborah, wife of John Cushing, Jr.; and the lands in Hull, Hingham, Conehasset and Boston were apportioned to the sons Thomas, David and Caleb, February 9, 1691-2.

- 3. John<sup>2</sup> Loring (*Thomas*<sup>1</sup>), born at Axminster, England, as his son, Rev. Israel Loring tells us, December 22, 1630, baptized December 27, 1630; married first, December 16, 1657, Mary, only child of Nathaniel and Sarah (Lane) Baker, who was baptized at Hingham in August, 1639, and died July 13, 1679, "a pious woman of whose conversion her husband was the instrument." He married second, September 22, 1679, Mrs. Rachel Buckland, widow of Mr. Benjamin Buckland of Rehoboth, and daughter of Mr. John Wheatly, of Braintree; she died September 20, 1713, aged seventy years.

He resided in Hull; was town clerk seventeen years, one of the selectmen nine terms, representative in 1692. His son Israel became a minister and wrote a very affectionate and particular obituary upon his father, which is preserved in the archives of the Massachusetts Historical Society, and in the copy of that document in Mr. James Spear Loring's manuscript volume in the New England Historic Genealogical Society. Several items of interest are worth quoting:

"Mr. John Loring while a boy of five years definitely determined to be a good child of his heavenly Father

and was earnestly religious all through his life. His wife attributed her own conversion to his influence. He was very solicitous to secure the conversion of his children. He began with them when they were young, tender and flexible, to put them in mind of God their Creator, and the things that belong to their everlasting peace. . . . He was a great reader. . . . His was a religious family; the morning and evening sacrifice were duly offered up and on the Lord's Day evenings the sermons, which at meeting he took down in characters, were repeated." He cut his foot at one time, and the wound developed into a malignant sore, which gave him extreme pain. After a famous physician of Boston had treated the foot and failed to cure it or relieve the agony, a friend of Mrs. Loring, "Mrs. Whitmore of Medford, a doctress," came to visit the family and "applying her balsom to his angry wounds he presently had rest and ease and slept soundly the night following; and, with the blessing of heaven upon her endeavors, she effected a cure." He recovered his health, and lived some time thereafter.

He died Lord's Day morning, September 19, 1714.

#### THE WILL OF JOHN LORING

I John Loring of Hull in ye County of Suffolk within Their majesties Province of the Massachusetts Bay in new England, haveing Arived to those Dayes & years which cannot but mind me of my mortality. and that approaching dissolution which is advancing upon me. and not knowing how soon or suddenly it may please that God who gave my breath & being, to a period to ye number of ye months & moments of my aboad here. The which are alone with himselfe. And that I may prevent any uncomfortable differences which may arise (when I am gone from hence) by the omission of that known duty of setting my house in order, and disposeing and settling of the things of this life which the Lord has graciously given me. I do make and constitute this my Last will and Testament in manner & form following -I commit my soul into the hands of that God who gave it me. whom I hope I have had communion with and soul refreshment from in Life. And trust that he will not forsake me at Death, hopeing for pardon acceptance and salvation only & alone through the meer mercy of God and merrits of ye Lord Jesus my Body I commit that to ye earth to be decently buried at ye discression of my executors hereafter named.

And as to the things of this life which ye Lord has lent me I give and bequeath as followeth:

Imprimis I give to my beloved wife Rachell Loring all that estate which was her former husbands to give & bequeath among her children as she shall please. I also give unto her ye use & improvement of one end of my now dwelling house which end she pleases to choose. with ye use of my best bed and furniture belonging to it, as also ye use of so much of my household stuff as she shall as she shall have necessity for Dureing her widowhood. And further I give unto her Twelve Pounds in money to be Annually well and truely paid her (whilst she bares my name) in such manner as is hereafter expressed. Viz: That my sons, Thomas, Nathaniel, Daniel, Jacob, Israel, John & Caleb Loring, pay her, Twenty shillings a piece in money, and my son Thomas Joans Ten shillings money p. Annum, as also that my sons to witt. John and Caleb Loring. Pay her four pounds and ten shillings more in money yearly. And for theire so doing I give to them their Heirs & asign<sup>8</sup>, Peter my negro man servant for ever, not preventing my said wife the command of my said negro as to things in & about ye house - fetching of her in wood water &c -. but if my said negro shall dye or be disenabled from service. that they because there of cannot pay ye Rent of ye af resaid four pounds & ten shillings as abovesaid, then my will is that each and every of my sons before mentioned (excepting my son Thomas Joans) shall pay yearly Ten shillings a piece more to their mother, over & above ye afore mentioned twenty shillings, and my son Thomas Joans to pay her yearly five shillings more. and my will is that if any of my above named sons shall neglect or refuse paying their said sums as aforesaid to their said mother, that then any Two of them shall have (and by this my will I give them) full power to demand sue for and recover ve same, by Law or otherwise. And in case my wife change her condition by marriage, then my will is that she leave what I have above given her ye use and improvement of dureing her bareing of my name, and have then but six pounds p Annum paid her. And for as much as my Father in Law Nathaniel Baker of Hingham deceased, did give portions to the children which I had by my first wife. and I also have given to most of them out of my Estate to some more, to some less, therefore I shall now give ve less to them that have had the most allready.

Item I give to my son Joseph Lorings four children, twelve pence, per piece, to be paid to them upon demand by my executors hereafter named. And for as much as my son Nathaniel Loring has had a considerable portion in lands & medow more then ye rest of his Brethren therefore I give him but halfe as much as one of them now, and for as much as I have been at considerable expence, to bring up my son Israel to Learning, therefore I give him also but halfe as much as one of his Brethren. And as for my only surviving Daughter

Mary Jones my will also is that she likewise shall have but half so much as her brethren. and as for my son Isaac Loring Deceased, who has left four children my will is that they shall have as much as one of their Fathers Brethren. that is to say his son to have a double portion of that share to be paid unto them by my son John and Caleb Loring. when they shall come of Age, or five years after my Decease.

And further my will is that my Three sons Jacob John and Caleb Loring having been with me and a help to me in my old Age. they haveing no Trades. I therefore give to my son Jacob a lot of salt medow by strait Pond mill, moreover a piece of salt medow bought of Samuel Baker lyeing in partnership with Brother Benjamin Loring, further I give him all my right title interest of in & unto the biggest of Brusters Islands. The which I give him not as part of his portion.

but as a free gift to him his heirs & assigns for ever.

Item I further give to my son Jacob Loring all my right of & unto, lands lyeing at Sagamore Hill, as also at white head, and Straberry Hill, all lyeing in ye Township of Hull. all which lands I give to him his heirs & assigns for ever, with this reserve that he sell it not away from his Brothers John and Caleb (if they will buy it) He not

exceeding Ten pounds an acre.

Item All the rest of my lands in ye Township of Hull (not before given away) with all my rights in Pettuks Island, together with my interest in Ransfords Island now in partnership with Brother Benjamin Loring I give to my two sons John & Caleb Loring their Heirs & assigns forever, with this exception that if it amount to more than their just & equal proportion of my estate according to ye rules which I have before and shall hereafter express, then they shall pay out thereof to each of my children as have not theire proportion. and that in ye space of Three yeare's after my decease, and if not paid in that time then to pay five shillings an acre for ye rent of ye land untill ye principal be paid. And my will is that all ye last lands given away to my three sons shall come to a Division with my personal estate. & shall be at such apprisement as is expressed in my Book, reference whereunto had may more fully appeare. And further my will is That

what ever I have allready or hereafter may & shall give to any of my children and shall so appeare upon my Book, shall be accounted as part of their portions, and that what part of my estate that shall not be apprised by my self, and set in said Book shall be apprised by such indifferent men, as my executors shall se cause to choose; And whereas my son Jacob has allready laid out Considerably in repairing one of my houseing. and He being removed out of ye Town, my will is that He be paid what cost & charges shall appeare he has laid out thereon, and my will is that my two sons John & Caleb Loring keep all my houseings in repaire, both for themselves & mother dureing her widowhood, and that if it should so happen that any of them be consumed by fire during my wives widowhood that then every of my children shall each of them bare his own loss. And after my wives decease, all my houseings to be my said sons John & Caleb Lorings with the beding & household stuff ye my wife shall then leave. the which I Give to them Their Heirs Executors Administrators And Assignes for ever: they paying out as followeth viz. To my son Thomas Loring Ten pounds. To my Son Nathaniel Five Pounds. To my son Daniel Ten pounds. To my son Israel Five pounds. To my Daughter Mary Joans Five pounds. To my grandson Isaac Loring Five pounds, all to be paid within Three years after my wives widowhood or Decease, and it is to be understood that ye sums so set with the lands & other estate shall be valued at fifteen pennyweight, and my will is that my sons John & Caleb shall not fence in their lands neither at home nor hempland hill so as to debar one or other from full & free ingress & regress into upon & from their lands either at one end or the other nor sell it to any that shall so Doe. but live in love & peace, That ve God of love & peace may live with each and every of them And I do appoint my Two sons Thomas & John Loring to be executors of this my last will & Testament: And in Testimony that this is my last will & Testament I have hereunto set my hand & affixed my seale, this seventh Day of February Anno Domini seventeen hundred & eight in ye sixth year of their Majesties Reign

I say in my will I give to my son Jacob all my land at Sagamore hill at whithead and at Strabery hill but as I sayd money being mor sutabel for him he shall have his part in money and if I do not give him so much as his share comes to befor my deses then to be mad up out of my estat equall with the rest of his brothers besides the forty pound above expressed.

3. Wharas I sayd in my will that if my soons John and Caleb shall not pay the legeses with in the spaice of three yer then to pay five shillings an acer but now I say it shall be twelve pence upon the pound yerly till the principal be payd.

4. that beding and household stuf given to my wife shall com in with the rest of my estat and be devided among my children.

5. my will is that John & Caleb shall injoy my negro man as thare own

6. I give to my soons John & Caleb the present possession of all my housing in hull reserving so much to myselfe as I shall have occashon for during my life.

7. my will is that my funeral expenses and just debts be payd. and in testimony that this an addishon to my last will & Testamt I have heer unto set my hand and seel this ninth day of february one thousand seven hundred and fourteen.

He remained on the Hingham homestead, where his father had lived before removing to Hull; the house and lands were assigned to him in the division of the estate by the sons after their father's death.

He was a juror in October, 1679. Was a member of the local company of foot soldiers that year; signed several petitions regarding town matters with his neighbors.

He died February 14, 1712-13. In his will, dated July 26, 1712, proved March 7, 1712-13, he provided comfortable maintenance for his wife; confirmed a deed of land, "which was my son Josiah's," he had made to his son Job; gave to his daughter, Jane Gifford, and her son Josiah; and gave the residue to his son Jonathan.

Mrs. Loring, called "Madame Loring" in the community, was a member of the church with her husband.

Caleb Loring learned the trade of weaver, and was so called in lawsuit in 1698. He later became a physician, by what process of education records do not show. He made his home first at Plymouth. Bought a tract of land in 1697. Was chosen constable, that is tax collector and court officer, March 6, 1698-9. Had a grant of land from the town July 31, 1699,— "Eastward of the Road Neer New Streete and by the fence side which was sometime Mr Nath: Clarks fence: to dig a well Not to exceed 5 foot into the lane from sd fence." This was in partner-ship with Mr. Little.

He was member of a town committee the same year; a member of the Grand Jury in 1701-2 and in 1703 mem-

ber of another jury.

He bought a farm of Stephen Bryant in the part of Plymouth which was set off and formed the town of Plympton four years later. This estate was on the east side of Jones River Brook, where that stream crosses the highway in the north part of Plympton.

He was on a committee to recommend a plan for the disposition of the cedar swamp lands in 1704; one of the selectmen 1704-7, and constable again in 1706. December 31, 1707, one of a committee to build a new bridge over Jones River. In 1725 he, with Dea. Isaac Cushman, petitioned the General Court of Plymouth colony protesting against the sale of certain lands by the town of Plymouth in which Plympton had a share; asking that their share might be paid over to Plympton for the support of a grammar school; but the petition was not granted.

Dr. Loring was one of the proprietors of a forge for the reduction of bog iron ore and a foundry; a local poet, with kind thoughts of the doctor but with different opinions of other members of the company, perpetrated this rhyme:

> "Freeheart and Gripehard And Cunning and Catch Built them a forge To make themselves rich."

The forge continued in operation a long time. Dr. Loring continued the same prominence in Plympton affairs he had had at Plymouth, being selectman, assessor, moderator, surveyor of lands and captain of militia at various times. He had considerable medical practice and was never secure from calls; so that he had a door cut in the wall of the meetinghouse close by his pew, so that he could come in and go out without disturbing the congregation in meeting time.

Captain Nathaniel Loring was a "coaster," plying between Boston and Hartford and other Connecticut ports. His vessel in 1703 was the *Unity* and in 1704 the *Dolphin*. He was foreman of a jury in Boston in 1722. Was one of the active members of the North Brick Church, chairman of its building committee. Had formerly been in the church of which Rev. Cotton Mather was minister.

He died December 16, 1744, leaving a will dated July 12, 1723, in which he devised sums of money to the poor and to the ministers of both the churches with which he had been connected, making special request that "Doctor Cotton Mather and his family" be well looked after. The widow Susanna died February 23, 1745.

ISRAEL<sup>3</sup> LORING (John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>), born at Hull April 15, 1682; married at Hull May 25, 1709, Mary, daughter of Nathan and Elizabeth (Allen) Hayman, of Charlestown, born in June, "baptized the 18th day of the 4th month," 1682; she was a woman of remarkable vitality and efficiency; a Boston paper said of her at the time of her decease that for forty-five years past she had eaten but one meal in twenty-four hours and that was ordinarily a little bread and cheese at night. a little before she went to bed; yet her health was such that she was at the head of her family affairs and business till about ten days before her death. (Her husband. however, speaks in his diary of her invalid condition for years.) "Respecting her offspring, a child of her great granddaughter was baptized by its great grandfather on the Sabbath that she lay dead, and it was called after her name." She died December 24, 1769, in her eightyeighth year.

Mr. Loring was graduated from Harvard College in 1701, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts; he took his degree of Master of Arts in 1704. Meantime he had studied divinity and was called to the ministry of the church of Sudbury; was ordained November 20, 1706, and continued in office and performing its duties sixty-six years; he had no colleague or assistant.

He was tall and slender, energetic and forcible, yet affectionate. He was a preacher of more than ordinary eloquence, and a writer whose productions found willing

readers. He preached on various stirring themes, strongly Calvinistic and serious, warning men of the dreadful results of wrongdoing and the unspeakable delights and rewards of following the right way. "Serious Thoughts on the Miseries of Hell"; "The Glories of the Heavenly World"; a sermon to young men; an appeal to the General Court in his election sermon, to provide for the children of those who had been unjustly punished or executed in the witchcraft madness; "Remarks on the Necessity of Legal Restraints in the Vending of Ardent Spirits," etc."; such were some of the fruits of his active, earnest, philanthropic soul. He kept a journal which has been preserved at Sudbury, in the public library and elsewhere, together with a great many letters and other manuscript notes. The journal extends over many years, and tells many items of a strictly personal nature, describes his own feelings at various times but gives little that is quotable for the reading of the public or of the Loring family at large. This is also true of the letters.

Mr. Loring speaks with deep emotion of the sickness and death of "Simeon," remarking that he was much attached to him because he had been born and brought up in his house and had showed so many fine traits of character, and had just attained his freedom (twenty-one years old the month previous). Nothing in the journal suggests that this was a negro boy,—and, plainly, color and servitude did not cause any separation between the souls of "master" and "slave." Simeon died May 10, 1755.

Mr. Loring preached twice on the Sabbath but one before his death, and made the prayer at town meeting the next day, but was taken ill there and carried home in

a sleigh; he steadily failed till his system yielded.

He died March 9, 1772, aged ninety years. In his will, dated October 10, 1770, he gave his estate to his sons, Jonathan and Nathan, his daughters, Elizabeth Manson, Mary Wheeler, Sarah Browne and Susannah Moulton, and his grandchildren, John and Mary Loring, children \*A negro slave.

of his deceased son, John Loring. He had lands in Rutland and Princeton beside his homestead in Sudbury; he ordered his library to be "equally divided" between his heirs.

17. CALEB<sup>3</sup> LORING (John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>), born at Hull January 2, 1688-9; married first, June 24, 1714, Elizabeth Baker, who died September 9, 1715, aged twenty-three years. He married second, January 15, 1718-19, Susanna, probably daughter of Nicholas and Sarah Cocks (also spelled Cocke and Cox), who was born in Boston March 23, 1693-4, baptized at the Second Church three days later. She was certainly a child of Sarah, daughter of Rev. Zechariah Whitman, who married first a man by the name of Cocke and second Captain Robert Gould, by whom she was called "my daughter Sarah Goold" in a deed of land in 1722 (Suffolk Deeds 81:162) which was sold by Susanna (Cocke) Loring's daughters, Susanna and Sarah (Suffolk Deeds 95:27 and 130), thus proving their descent from the Whitmans. Rev. Zechariah Whitman presented a Bible "to my grandson Caleb Loring" in consequence of this relation; the child who received it was the second Caleb in the family; he died soon and the Bible became the inheritance of the father, Caleb; and when he had a third child to whom he gave the name of Caleb, the Bible naturally went to him; he lived to be a father and the book descended in his family till it was inherited by Hon. William Caleb Loring, who holds it now.

Mrs. Susanna (Cocke) Loring died April 8, 1723, "in her 30th year"; Caleb married third, January 6, 1731-2, Rebecca, daughter of Captain Joseph and Elizabeth Lobdell, born November 10, 1704; she survived him and administered on his estate; she died March 14, 1766. Her tombstone is in King's Chapel burying ground. Her father was a son of Isaac Lobdell and his wife Martha, daughter of Samuel Ward, a pioneer at Hingham and Charlestown. (Hull Records, and Charlestown Genealogies.)

Captain Caleb Loring was a town officer, selectman, and held other positions; was a justice of the peace. He owned much land,—sixty-nine and one-half acres altogether, including a part of Nantasket Neck; one African slave, two horses, four oxen, five cows, sixty sheep.

He met with some reverses; Rev. Nehemiah Hobart's record states that "The barn of Capt. Caleb Loring was burnt by the lightning July 13, 1735. About eleven load of hay and barley consumed in it." He was one

of the subscribers to "Prince's Chronology."

He died September 15, 1756. His brother, Rev. Israel Loring, records this event with much feeling. Caleb had been kicked by a horse four years before, and had recovered from the injury, to all appearance. But on the morning of the 14th he was attacked with a violent pain in the breast, "in the place where the horse had kicked him"; remedies were used which gave him temporary relief, but the next day the pain returned with increased sharpness and he died suddenly. Israel speaks in his diary of his brother Caleb with much love and respect.

Was constable, assessor, selectman at various times; a trusted member of the Old South Church; one of the committee to raise money for last bills on their meetinghouse in 1730. His negro slave Margaret was baptized in 1737, and he "engaged for her education," a humane provision of Puritan slaveholders. He died October 15, 1752. There is no evidence that either of his children lived to marry or inherit his estate. So the line of Josiah<sup>2</sup> came to an end (in the Loring name).

Jonathan made his will in 1752; it was proved November 3, 1752; gave life use of his estate to his wife; made bequests to "her relations by blood" of the Austin family, and to the following "relations by blood of his own," namely: his nephew, Josiah Gifford, of Sandwich; Rev. Israel Loring, of Sudbury, and his son, Jonathan Loring, of Marlborough; to the children of kinsman Daniel Loring, late of Boston, Isaac Loring and his daughter, Priscilla Patten; to cousin Sarah Blanchard, widow of Joshua Blanchard, and her sister, Ruth Loring, of Boston, single woman; to kinsman Rev. Thomas Prince, of Boston; to Capt. Joseph Prince, his son Joseph ("having lost his eyesight"), and his daughter, Mary Ballard; to Ruth Soper, daughter of uncle Isaac Prince, late of Boston, and to the children of Dr. Moses Prince.

The widow, in her will, March 2, 1754, proved May 28, 1756, ordered the executor to complete payment of the legacies her husband had made; and gave the residue of her estate to her Austin relations, specified.

She died in 1775: her will, dated March 31, was proved April 17, 1775; directed her "two sons," William Watkins and Joseph Loring, to pay all debts; a bond she had given to her son Watkins was to be adjusted; she bequeathed a house with land adioining to Zeruiah Loring, wife of her son Joseph; gave a silver spoon to granddaughter Deborah Loring; directed that provision be made for the support of Ichabod Lewis, whom she appointed executor and directed that the residue of the estate be divided between "my five children William Watkins, Joseph Loring, Anne Patterson, Sarah Hawley and Deborah Seeley." If her stepson, Joshua Loring, were living, he must have been living at a distance and had had his portion when he came of age. The town records give no statement of his death; so far as local evidence goes there is no proof that he was not alive except the omission of his name by the stepmother in her will. Thomas Loring, of Duxbury; so that the families were brought into close relations.

Nicholas Loring was graduated at Harvard College in 1732; began to preach at Hull, Sudbury and other places in 1735; was settled at North Yarmouth in the district of Maine. The township, his parish, covered a territory which now includes the towns of Yarmouth, North Yarmouth, Cumberland, Freeport, Pownal and Harpswell. Though the population was not large, the distances to be traversed and the poor roads or trails made the pastor's duties very heavy. During his ministry of twenty-seven years he baptized 640 persons (chiefly in infancy) and received 164 to the church, beside ministering much to people of adjacent parishes. While he was

always concerned for his people, his mind and heart were active in world cares; when King George II was successful in the defeat of the French at Dettingen, Germany, in 1743 he preached a sermon on the occasion, as the Boston News Letter of October 20 narrates. When the stirring, somewhat revolutionary in method, Rev. George Whitefield, came to America Mr. Loring was one of those who welcomed him to Maine and co-operated in his revival work. The Indian attacks made it necessary for every able-bodied man to help in defending the settlement, and Mr. Loring was enrolled as a "centinel" in the company of Captain Benjamin in 1746 and 1749. He was not remarkably vigorous in body; his descendant, Rev. Amasa Loring, writes of him, "In his person he was tall and slim, of a spare countenance, and rather feeble in strength. He ever found it necessary to eat a few raisins while the choir was singing, to strengthen him for the delivery of his discourse." Rev. David Shepley says of him, "His voice and manners were winning and his feelings of a most affectionate character." His salary was very small, not always paid well, and the family life frugal and simple.

He died July 31, 1763, at the age of fifty-two, doubtless worn out by the burdens and hardships of that service to God and his people. There is much to interest a descendant, as well as students of those times, in the action of the town after his decease: A committee was appointed "for providing such things as the town may order for the Rev. Mr. Loring's funeral. Fans, gloves, shoes, ribbons, buckles, buttons, vails and hoods for the four daughters; hatbands, buckles and gloves for the three oldest sons; a fan, gloves and handkerchief for Bezaleel Loring's wife; the widow to be put in decent mourning at the discretion of the committee; crape gowns for the four daughters; the three youngest sons to be clothed in mourning at the discretion of the committee; rings and gloves for the pall bearers, and what other things are necessary." For all this, which was faithfully carried out, the widow wrote her thanks in a note to the town.

He learned the trade of blacksmith at Pembroke; became also a farmer and an inn-holder. Settled at North Yarmouth, Me. He and his wife joined the church at Pembroke and were received by letter from that church by the Yarmouth congregation. His house was near the old "Ledge meetinghouse." Town meeting was held in it in 1773, when he was one of the selectmen. He was a member of the committee appointed that day to answer the letter from the selectmen of Boston, assuring them of the town's agreement with their views on the subject of relations with Great Britain; and a member of the Committee of Correspondence and Safety. At an earlier date, in 1757-67, he was a captain in the colonial army in defense against the Indians and French.

He dropped dead while coming home from the field August 2, 1788. His large estate was divided between his children September 25, 1782.

His opposition to one of the ministers of the church led to his being suspended from membership for two years, but he modified his expressions of criticism and was restored to fellowship. In the absence of the minister he was often accustomed to officiate at funerals and expound at public worship; his religious life was very earnest. So great was his admiration for the first chapter of the Gospel of John that he would often repeat the whole from memory. He was ardently devoted to the orthodox faith, and followed it consistently. A neighbor, Capt. Daniel Souther, formerly of the Royal Navy, who died on the estate adjoining that of Deacon Loring, frequently remarked that no man ever so forcibly convinced him of the reality of religion as his neighbor Loring.

When the British fleet rallied in Nantasket Roads in 1775 he removed to the Matthew Hawk mansion at Hingham. There he died July 20, 1775.

He resided at Lexington. He purchased a farm in that part of Lancaster which became the town of Sterling, and

conveyed it to his son John November 20, 1764.

He was a member of the Middlesex County Convention held in 1774, to consider how British oppression could be resisted.

He was a deacon of the church of Lexington and a selectman. At the battle, April 19, 1775, his house was one of those wantonly burned by the British. His report of his losses is very vivid:

"An Account of the Real and Personal Estate belonging to Joseph Loring of Lexington, destroyed and carried off by the British troops

in their ravages in said town on the 19th of April, 1775.

A large Mansion House and a barn seventy feet long and a Corn House, all burnt, £ 350. Household Goods and Furniture viz; eight good Feather Beds and bedding, a large quantity of Pewter and Brass ware, 3 cases of draws; two Mahogany Tables with the furniture of eight rooms; all the wearing apparel of my family con-

sisting of nine persons, £ 290. All my Husbandry Tools and utensils with a Cider Mill Press, with about five tons of Hay, and two Calves £ 72. About 200 Rods of Stone Wall thrown down, £ 15, and £ 3 in specie. Total £ 720. The above-mentioned buildings were the first that were destroyed in the town, near the ground where the Brigade commanded by Lord Percy met the detachment retreating under Col. Smith. It does not appear that any of the militia were in or near these buildings, neither could they any ways expose or retard the British Troops in their operations; therefore the destruction must be considered brutal, barbarous and wanton. Joseph Loring."

This statement was sent to the provincial Assembly, but no action was taken, as was natural under all the pressure of the hour; but the provincial Congress ordered the Committee of Supplies, May 1, 1775, to furnish a barrel of pork to Dea. Joseph Loring, his son Joseph and

two others whose property had been destroyed.



Joshua<sup>5</sup> Loring (Nehemiah<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>), born at Stratford, Conn., June 25, 1722; his mother died and his father married again before he was six years of age, the new mother having two children by a former husband and two by Mr. Loring, who himself passed away when Joshua was less than nine years old. Rev. Samuel Johnson, rector, was appointed the boy's guardian, but removed to New York city within a few years, making no report of his guardianship to the Con-

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necticut Probate Court. The widow took full control of all real estate and lived till 1775, when she died, bequeathing her property to her own four children and one of Mr. Loring's children by his first wife, but making no allusion to Joshua or his family. The Stratford town records and deeds contain no item respecting Joshua beyond his birth and guardianship, leaving us to suppose that he removed in childhood or youth to some other place.

Over against this stands the record of Joshua Loring, of Boston, a tailor by trade, who was admitted to the Old South Church, January 31, 1741-2, and married, July 26, 1744, Elizabeth, daughter of Dea. Thomas and Sarah (Story) Dawes, born February 28, 1722-3, admitted to the Old South Church December 7, 1740; she survived Mr. Loring, and died at Marlborough January 18, 1776, in her fifty-third year; she was buried there and a stone bears the record that she was "widow of Joshua Loring of Boston."

Not a word has been found regarding any business transactions or land conveyances to or from this Joshua Loring, tailor. But in the *Boston Gazette* of December 11, 1750, appeared the following notice:

"These are to desire any who have any demands on the estate of Joshua Loring late of Boston, Taylor, deceased, to bring in their Accompts to Eliz. Loring his widow."

Elizabeth Loring, widow of Joshua, above, had deed of a house and land near Hawkins Street, Boston, from her brothers and sisters January 1, 1760, as they divided the estate of their late father according to the provisions of his will. Her sons and daughter sold this property; son Thomas and daughter Sarah sold their shares in this after their mother's death to their brother Joshua; and he sold it to an outsider October 15, 1787.



He learned the trade of tanner; when of age went to sea. Was master of a privateer in 1744. Bought a large estate in Roxbury. Built a fine house at Jamaica Plain, which is still standing at the corner of Centre Street and Greenough Avenue. Became a lieutenant in naval service in 1745, a captain in 1757, later commodore. Was very efficient in the French and Indian War, having charge of the fleet in Lake Champlain and Lake George. Later did good service at Quebec. On the opening of the Revolutionary War he chose the side of the king and served as heartily as he had before. He accepted an appointment as one of Governor Gage's "Mandamus Counsellors." His estates were necessarily confiscated and his whole family went to Halifax, N.S., and later to England. He was the only man of importance in Roxbury who adhered to the Royalist party. He decided after serious consideration and consultation with friends, "the whole night through." In the morning he took his horse, rode to Boston and joined the English commander.

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He died at Highgate, London, in September, 1781. His widow died some years later, having passed her eightieth birthday, and is said to have regretted that they had left their native country.

Was promoted to the rank of colonel during the war. Did valorous work in defense of Nantasket in 1775. Major Loring and Major Vose, with a few men, harvested one thousand bushels of barley and brought it home safely; they then impressed three fishing boats, removed three casks of oil and about fifty pounds of powder from the Boston lighthouse and burned that structure: then burned a barn and lot of hay on Brewster's Island, and retired with but two men wounded, although the British men-ofwar and tenders were all the time firing at them. Made a name for himself at Crown Point in 1777 and at Danbury.

After 1786 he removed to Duxbury.

He died September 28, 1820.

He was an apothecary, having his shop at the corner of Cornhill and the avenue to Brattle Street, called at the time Loring's Corner. A rival in business once said of him that like Roderic Random's master he would put up prescriptions without giving a single article that was ordered in them. His shop was the resort of the wits of the town, and it was said that his laugh could be heard as far as Faneuil Hall. During the Revolution he acted as a surgeon. He made an important deposition regarding the treatment of citizens by British soldiers in Boston in the period before the Revolution. It was sworn to in the presence of Justice Richard Dana, July 28, 1769.

I, John Loring of Boston, Physician, of lawful age, testify and declare that being on the 14th day of July current near his dwelling house in Cornhill, about 3 P.M. observing a number of the Grenadiers of the 14th Regiment following and insulting a country butcher as he was riding on his cart, which, stopping a few rods from said house, the deponent went near the eart, and heard the butcher talking to the soldiers, desiring them to let him go about his business, when Col. Dalrymple came by, and asked what was the matter. The butcher got off his cart, and with his hat in his hand, told him he was insulted by the soldiers, who hindered him from going about his business. and that one of the Regiment yesterday knocked him down. The Col. said to him "You are a vile scoundrel, you was saucy and they served you right, and I do not care if they knock you down again," and directly walked away. The soldiers took off their hats and exultingly said "There's a noble gentleman. Do you hear what the noble gentleman says?" There was quite a riot following and blood was shed.

Such occurrences did much to irritate the Americans and bring on the Revolution.

He seems to be the John Loring of the Boston militia who did guard duty at Hull in Colonel Crafts' artillery, July 26 to September 11, 1777.

Doctor Loring was on committees of the citizens in several cases. During the occupation of Boston by the British his furniture was mostly destroyed, but he left a handsome estate.

He was one of a company of people in Boston who introduced innoculation for smallpox.

He died suddenly on State Street while on his way to a civic feast in honor of the French Revolution, February 15, 1793.

Rufus Putnam, Agent."

In 1790 he and other settlers lived some time in a great block house called familiarly "Farmer's Castle." After the conditions were settled he carried on his farm. He was appointed one of the associate judges of the county in 1792. Letters from Judge Loring to his father-in-law, Mr. Ezekiel Howe of Sudbury, are extant, giving many items of interest to descendants, regarding the journey west, the Indian troubles, etc.

5, 1769, and died August 2, 1819. He married second, in 1821, Jane Tyler, daughter of Rev. John and Mary (Wheatly) Lothrop, of Boston, born February 5, 1777, died October 31, 1850.

He was of the firm of Loring & Curtis, merchants. His autograph may be found on the record of the United States Bank in 1796. He became a member of the Boston Marine Society in 1797, and of the Massachusetts Humane Society in 1810.

In 1813 he testified before a committee of the Legislature concerning the impressment of seamen by the British. He had previously known of but one case except where his ships were captured by French as well as English. He stated that he took care to ship "only American sailors who had protections" or Danes or Swedes. He employed about forty seamen annually in foreign trade. six men to a hundred tons of shipping being the allowance.

He was a man of strong patriotism, "with a love of truth to which no bond on earth could add any feeling of obligation, and a stern and uncompromising sense of justice." Was much respected and honored. He was a State senator in 1828. He died October 31, 1850.

So, after cutting the bridles and girths of the horses so that they could not be used, they let the prisoners go and "rode on a smart trot to Boston." The troops arrived at Lexington in force soon afterward, and the day of strife began openly, with the shedding of blood and the awakening of the whole country.

Jonathan Loring was also in the battle of Ticonderoga and in other service. He received a pension. He settled

George<sup>6</sup> Loring (Joseph<sup>5</sup>, Benjamin<sup>4</sup>, Thomas<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>), born at Hingham November 18, 1771; married at the church of El Sagrario in Malaga, Spain, July 31, 1817, Maria del Rosario, daughter of Mr. Ignatius Anthony Oyarzabal and Mrs. Josephine Herera, his wife, of the city of Cadiz.

He entered Harvard College but, disliking a literary career, left, and was apprenticed to a cooper. Followed the sea a few years and became a captain. Settled at Malaga, Spain, where he became one of the most prominent and wealthy merchants, dealing in wines and fruits. Was the pioneer of American commerce with Malaga, the first shipper of raisins from that port to this country. He was also a banker, agent of Baring Brothers, of London. Was honored especially by the poor, to whom he was very benevolent. He died August 14, 1843, leaving an estate of more than \$300,000 to his family and to charities.

His will was proved in Suffolk County, Massachusetts, as Mr. Loring always maintained his standing in Spain as a foreign resident, and a copy is on file (a translation from the original Spanish). It was dated June 20, 1842, and proved in Malaga the day after his decease; presented here September 16, 1844. The will narrates that he was a native of Hingham, Massachusetts; mentions his parents: tells his wife's full name and those of her parents; gives the names of three children who had died in infancy and the seven then surviving. A certain sum of money settled upon his wife before their marriage. Sons educated in the United States, the cost of their education not to be deducted from their portions. Bequeaths to his wife: to her mother; to his brother-in-law, Mr. John Oyarzabal; to his sister, Mrs. Lydia Loring Walker; to his clerk, Mr. John Astula; to the overseer of his stores, Mr. John Herera and John's brother, Francis Herera: to his children, his wife being guardian of those in their minority. His wife, his brother-in-law, Mr. John Oyarzabal, and Mr. Emanuel Enriquez executors. The will was presented here by his son, Joseph George Loring, and his brother-in-law, John Ovarzabal, they being partners in the business which Mr. George Loring had placed in their hands as his successors. The will contains many expressions of religious sentiment, and bequests to churches and ecclesiastics and the poor.

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of women, and in the work of the Sanitary Commission during the Civil War. She died in Florence, Italy, May 13, 1875, and was buried there. Mr. Loring was a medal scholar at the Boston Latin School; was graduated at Harvard College in 1812; was fourth in his class, had a detur, and was a  $\Phi$  BK man; studied in the only law school then in the country, at Litchfield, Conn.; was admitted to the Suffolk bar in 1815, and was for a time in the office of Justice Charles Jackson, in Boston, then established his own office.

"From 1825 to 1855 the published reports show that no other man in Boston had so large a number of cases in court, and of the cases of no other was the proportion of cases so large which by the novelty of the questions they raised . . . may be considered as establishing new law or giving more scope to recognized law." (Theoph. Parsons.)

He defended the fugitive slave, Thomas Sims, in 1851. In 1854 he gave up most of his law practice to become actuary of the Massachusetts Hospital Life Insurance Company. From 1835 to 1857 he was a Fellow of Harvard College; LL.D. in 1851; State senator in 1862. He was commander of the New England Guards in 1824 at the time of Lafayette's visit to Boston. He was a member of the Massachusetts Historical Society, the American Antiquarian Society, American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the New England Historic Genealogical Society. He was a member of the West Church and for fifteen years superintendent of the Sunday School.

"He was a cool, deliberate speaker, with great concentration and logical argumentation." His principal orations were "the Fourth of July, 1821"; at the Republican mass meeting in 1862; the citizens' meeting after the assassination of Lincoln, and at the Harvard commemoration of her soldiers in the Civil War. His most notable writings, a pamphlet on neutral relations between the United States and England, 1863, an answer to Lord Hartington ("Historicus"), and one on Reconstruction.

He built a summer house at Beverly in the region now

known as Pride's Crossing, in 1846; had a fine farm and raised high-bred swine, cattle and poultry, with which he improved the stock of the neighboring farmers. Here he died October 8, 1867.

He was graduated at Harvard College in 1821; studied at the Law School at Litchfield, Conn., and entered the office of his cousin, Charles Greely Loring, in Boston; was admitted to Suffolk bar in 1824. He then opened an office of his own and became a master in Chancery. As was the custom of the day, he joined the New England Guards; was made commander of the company in 1829. He was a member of the school committee in 1846-7 and wrote some remarkable reports pointing out mistakes in administration and instruction, suggesting reforms that have since been adopted. (See quotations in MS. of J. A. Loring.) In 1840 he was appointed commissioner of the United States Circuit Court, and in 1847 judge of probate for Suffolk County, lecturer at Harvard School.

The Fugitive Slave Law was enacted by Congress in September, 1850. The jurisdiction in all cases of runaway slaves was given to the United States commissioners, and United States marshals were charged with the execution of their decrees. April 12, 1851, Thomas Sims, who had escaped from slavery in the south, was arrested in Boston and taken before the commissioner for trial, as to whether he should be returned to his master. Mr. Charles Greely Loring, a double cousin of the commissioner, defended him. He was ordered to be taken back to New Orleans and was sold to a Vicksburg brick mason. May 27, 1854, Anthony Burns, another escaped slave, was brought before Commissioner Loring, by whom, in accordance with the law, he was ordered to be returned to his master. This caused great excitement in Boston; the judge was threatened and badly treated, and the legislature made an attempt to remove him from his office "by address"; Governor Gardner refused to comply, on which account he lost his re-election. In the next legislature, 1858, a new "address" was passed, as well as a law consolidating the courts of probate and insolvency in all the counties,

requiring the dismissal of all judges and the appointment of new ones. Governor Banks signed both measures and Judge Loring — with twenty-six other judges—went out of office. President Buchanan, however, appointed him a justice of the United States Court of Claims at Washington, D. C., which office he filled with distinction until 1877, after he passed the age limit.

He died at his seaside home at Winthrop June 19, 1890.

His chief literary work was gathering materials from public and private sources for a family genealogy, which he arranged in a manuscript for publication, calling it "CHRONICLES OR ANCES-TRAL RECORDS of the LORING FAMILY of MASSA-CHUSETTS BAY: In four parts, exhibiting the genealogy of the four sons of Dea. Thomas Loringe of Devonshire, England, 1634." He included some very lengthy accounts of some matters which would interest very few present-day readers, but accumulated a large fund of valuable information about the family down to the close of his active life. This manuscript was copied at the expense of Hon. Caleb William Loring, and indexed by Mr. John Arthur Loring, forming a handy volume. typewritten. This was given to the New England Historic Genealogical Society, of Boston, of which Mr. Loring was the first elected member (February 8, 1845), and its contents have formed the basis of the present

volume. It was a very fine contribution to the family, and the name of James Speare Loring should be passed with loving remembrance from generation to generation of the Loring family in perpetuo.

Mr. Loring spent the latter part of his life with his son at Brooklyn, N. Y., and died there April 12, 1884.

1876; representative to Congress, 1877-81.





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Ninth Army Corps was formed he was appointed assistant inspector-general with the rank of lieutenant-colonel. Although his position did not require him to be on the fighting line, he actively engaged in all the campaigns of the Ninth Corps, and for a few days actually had command of the corps. He received three brevets: The first two dated August 1, 1864; one to the rank of colonel "for gallant and meritorious services in the campaign in East Tennessee and at the siege of Knoxville"; the second to the grade of brigadier-general "for gallant and meritorious services at the battles of the Wilderness, Spottsylvania, Bethesda Church and during the operations before Petersburg, Virginia." The third brevet was to the rank of major-general in 1865, "for gallant and meritorious services during the war."\* He engaged in business for a time after the war, and also carried on his father's farm at Pride's Crossing. In 1872 he was appointed to install the Way collection of Egyptian antiquities in two rooms at the Boston Athenæum; this was the beginning of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. In 1873 he was made a trustee, and when the building was erected in Copley Square he was made Curator, and from that time until shortly before his death he was executive head of the institution. His title was changed to Director in 1881, and on his resignation in 1902 to Director Emeritus.

Soon after his marriage he built a summer house on part of his father's estate at Pride's Crossing. In 1895 he built a house at Chocorua, N. H., where he spent his remaining summers, continuing to live in Boston in winter. He died at Pride's Crossing August 18, 1902. He was a member of many art societies at home and abroad, and of the Massachusetts Historical Society. (See Proceedings, March, 1915.)


He went to California at an early day, and carried on the business of transportation by trains of pack mules. On the outbreak of the rebellion he came east, and found his "double second cousin," Rear Admiral Joseph Smith, at Washington, D. C., who soon secured for him an appointment as acting master in the United States navv. He was assigned to the Galena, one of the three first ironclads, flagship of the James River expedition in May, 1862. He distinguished himself in that campaign. 1863 he was transferred to the Weehawken, one of the new monitors. Had exciting experiences in Charleston Harbor, and June 17, 1863, at Wassaw Sound in the capture of the Confederate ironclad ram, Atlanta. Captain Rodgers, in his official report, said, "I recommend Master Benjamin W. Loring for gallant behaviour under the fire of Fort Darling, serving the guns admirably; his energy and coolness were everything which could be wished." He next served in the Mississippi River Squadron; was captured May 6, 1864, and endured the horrors of a Texas stockade for six months; escaped and was retaken; again escaped with one companion, and reached Brashier, La., after weeks of dreadful struggles. After the war he had a position in the navy yard at Washington, D. C. Later he entered the revenue (naval) service; was commissioned lieutenant July 20, 1872.

In 1872 he settled at Owego, N. Y.; lived a quiet, unostentatious life. Was greatly respected; never used tobacco and was strictly temperate.

He died December 5, 1902.

Captain John Loring determined to carry religion into his own life and that of his ship's company. He shipped officers and crew with full understanding of his plan, and secured harmony. Every morning in fine weather all assembled in the cabin and the Scriptures were read, a hymn sung and prayer offered. No profanity; respect for the Sabbath; care for each other's rights and all decencies prevailed. His ship was called "a floating Bethel." For thirty-seven years he sailed without stress of bread or water, never suffering any degree of shipwreck, or a losing voyage. Record of the after life of those who had sailed with him showed good fruit of such a manner of life on shipboard, many of the men rising to excellent positions, prosperous and useful. Coming home from Japan with a cargo of costly silks and tea, in the bark Ella Loring (largely owned by Captain Loring and his brothers), he was taken ill, and died at St. Helena, to which he had asked his son to take the ship. The people of the island were impressed with his saintly bearing and covered the bier with ferns and flowers.







He was most diligent and persevering and won the respect of all who dealt with him. He was worthy of the title "master printer," and built up a good business; "accomplished more in twoscore years than many a stronger man in fourscore." He is remembered for "his faithful service, his truly Christian ideals and endeavors."

He developed a strong family feeling and conceived the plan of making a genealogy. He took the manuscript notes of the late James Speare Loring, of Boston, as a basis and corresponded industriously and gathered materials from printed books and various other sources till he had a large amount of matter, and announced that he was about ready to publish, inviting subscriptions for copies of the work. He received aid from many of the family in this, and especially from the Misses Katharine P. and Louisa P. Loring, of Pride's Crossing, who had made special study of the English field and obtained views, etc.

But consumption had laid hold on his system and overtook him before he could complete the manuscript or begin its publication.

The editor finds marks of fine work in the manuscript, the largest consideration of all the family, and readiness to do the fullest credit to all; so that the manuscript contains so much detail and extended writing that only a portion of its treasures will be issued in the present work. But Miss Katharine P. Loring, who has purchased the whole collection from Mrs. John Arthur Loring, will deposit the typewritten manuscript in its entirety in the library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, at 9 Ashburton Place, Boston, Mass., where it may be consulted by those who fail to find in these pages as much on any matter as they hoped to see. The requirements of a practical genealogy have limited the present work to more condensed treatment of the several members of the family than Mr. Loring had generously planned.

Mr. Loring was a man who gained great respect and warm friends. He and his wife were members of the St. Paul's Universalist Church, Springfield, in which he was a deacon, clerk of the parish committee and superintendent of the Sunday School. He was a "Cleveland Democrat," an Odd Fellow, a Free Mason, and a member of the Sons of Veterans.

He died March 11, 1906. His widow and daughter reside at West Springfield.
