



**MRS. RUTH HUNTINGTON MOORE**

Born in New York City, March 30, 1866

Died in Raleigh, N. C., June 27, 1936

A gifted artist, a lover of all things beautiful, a unique personality which combined a background of broad culture with wide intellectual interests, a rare sense of humor, an exceptional originality, a ready sympathy and a lavish generosity. Mrs. Moore was a dominant figure in the life of Peace for twenty-seven years.

Mrs. Moore achieved unusual recognition and success in her work. She exhibited in the Grand Salon des artistes Francaises a wonderful picture which now hangs in our President's office. While here, she painted many notable portraits; her latest, the Earl of Craven.



We were proud of Mrs. Moore; we admired her greatly. We loved her dearly for her generous character and her love for nature. Her favorite hobby was her flower garden, and there she spent many pleasant hours happily engaged in caring for her flowers. Often she would call to some one of us to see how well the new roses were growing, or to see a lovely iris that she had been afraid would not live. It was fun to share her interests and enthusiasm in flowers. We hope that the studio garden will always be a beautiful living remembrance of Mrs. Moore.

## SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

The historian is in a quandary. Surrounded by clippings from newspapers, a scrapbook, a last year's annual, and dozens of photographs, she sits waiting for inspiring words in which to chronicle the momentous history of her class. And as she glances through pictures and write-ups of events which have taken place in the two years past, each happening rises vividly before her eyes. The room becomes crowded with gay recollections of throngs of friends . . .

Here's a snapshot of a girl with a suitcase, ringing the Peace doorbell, bringing reminders of that never-to-be-forgotten day of arrival. Our history began on that day, when, two years ago, eighty-seven very green girls tapped timidly at the gate and were eagerly greeted by the old-timers. And what greetings! Girls dashing up with "Hello! I'm Lib, this is 'Freres,'" and "My name's Kitty—what's yours?" Inside of an hour or two we all felt at home, for it was not hard to get acquainted in the overwhelming rush of getting settled, registered, and scheduled.

Classes and study followed, with loads of fun mixed in—the latter being demonstrated by a picture of a motley mob in pajamas, gym suits, and sundry decorations such as umbrellas and alarm clocks, taken on that awful day of initiation. A bright-colored place card drops out of a scrapbook—but who would need a reminder of those wonderful society banquets? On that night we really began to feel as though we were a part of the school; and this feeling was confirmed a few days later when Glein Willard, awe-inspiring President of the Student Government Association, called us together to elect our officers. On that day we placed ourselves in the ranks with Ann Dees as our Captain, Sarah Taylor as Scribe, and Wilhelma Smith as Finance Commissioner. We chose as sponsor Miss Steele, and named Jean Livermore to represent us on the Council.

How clearly do certain events stand out—the first exams; leaving for Christmas holidays; returning, far more joyously than we had dreamed possible, to start once more the business of getting educated. The spring months passed quickly, dotted here and there with important events. A "Stunt Night" program comes to light—that evening will long be remembered as the one on which we proved to our Senior sisters the stuff of which we were made, by coming in ahead of them. (Incidentally, the Preps were ahead of us, but we don't like to remember that.) May Day snapshots—the festival took endless work, but oh, it was worth it!

On and on the pages are turned. A State sticker represents the Junior-Senior entertainment, a gala affair indeed, and calls to mind the labor we lavished on it. On that night we all went collegiate, and the usually dignified campus, adorned with pennants, gay young people, and golden moonlight, certainly lost its staid look for once! Pictures taken on Class Day come to light, and the memory of that day stands out vividly as the occasion of our accepting more serious responsibilities, and solemnly realizing that soon we should separate, as we joined hands around the fountain and sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

On the last page of the scrapbook a commencement program appears, rightly mounted by itself. How obviously we watched proceedings that night! It hardly seemed possible that before another year had passed, we ourselves should stand in the places of those serious-looking Seniors who so little resembled our everyday comrades.

Then the scene changes, and the summer days go by as a chapter that is skipped. We returned to Peace with our new dignity held carefully in the foreground. On this, our second year, we greeted the "Little Sisters," conducted initiation (revenge is indeed sweet!), and entertained handsomely at the Society banquets. We had not dreamed before the labor that it had cost the Seniors to put us through that day of torture and evening of fun, but we then began to realize that such things have their price in time and trouble.

A "Peace Patter" turns up, reminding the historian that the class had changed leaders. Mary Catherine had become Senior President, and soon after "Rush Week" she called us together to select her assistants. Dee Doris, and "Lib" Crosby were named as the other class officers, and Miss Wadrop became Senior Sponsor. As our Representative on the Council we unanimously chose Ann Marie Jefferson. Another meeting was soon called for the purpose of selecting a Chief Marshal, and we voted into office Blanche Harrison, a new Sig. The year was well under way.

Here's a snapshot of Fanny Cromarte, holding up a tree! She had no equal in upholding things—trees, traditions, rules and regulations. As President of the Student Government, and as "Miss Peace," she couldn't have been surpassed.

After Christmas the traditional things began to happen. Stunt Night, the Society plays, and May Day came and went, and Class Day rolled around. Jeannette Bagwell and Jean Morrow, representing the Annual Staff and the Peace Student Christian Association, were in charge of the activities, and the idea of departure was all the more sorrowful to us for the finality it held, this being our last year together.

A lighted campus, festive decorations, an orchestra—this was Junior Senior, this time with the emphasis on *Senior*! The Juniors had our sympathy in the hard work required by the extensive preparations, but we kindly repaid their labor by our enjoyment. Then comes another night, marked with white, cool dugouts, under which run intertwined a searlet thread of excitement and a deep blue one of sorrow at parting. We are no longer "green" Juniors; we have reached the top—we graduate.

The historian sighs . . . Our happy days at Peace have been filled to the brim, and we carry away scrapbooks, eyes, and hearts in the same condition. For two years we have studied and played and worked together; and though our paths be far apart, we shall be united forever in one respect—we always love you, Peace!
