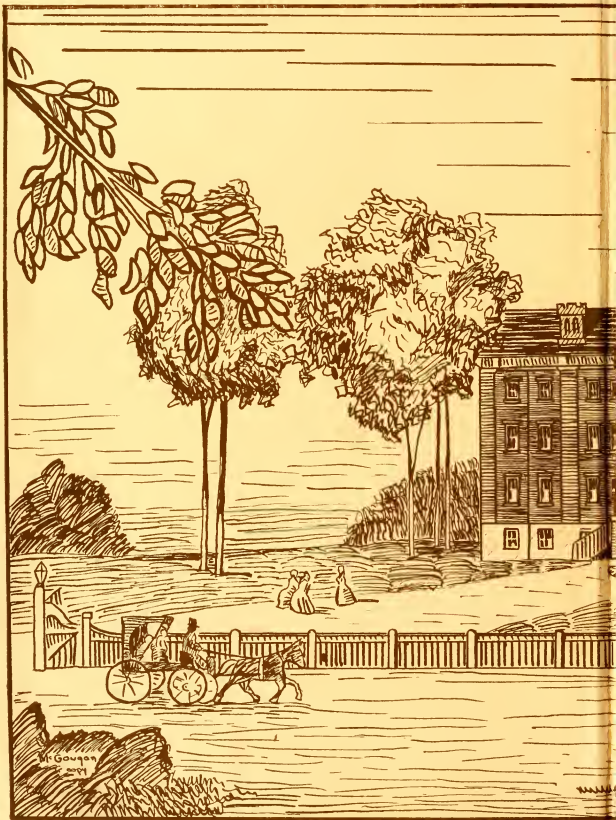

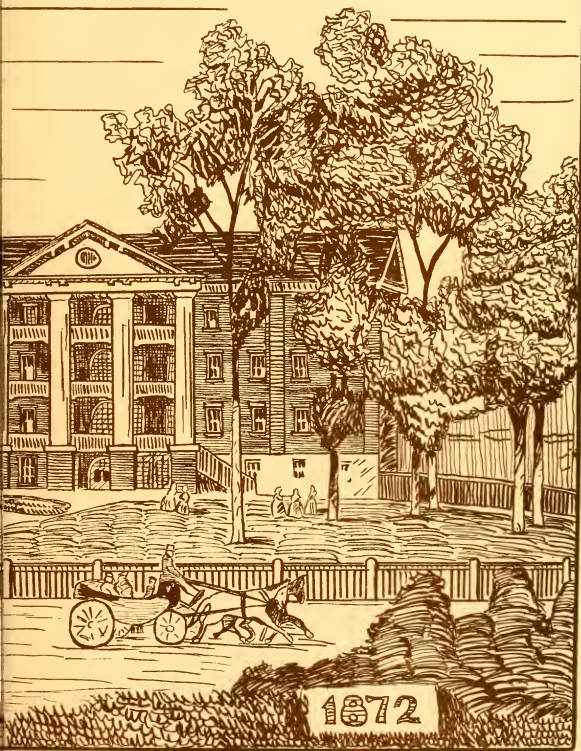

Peace College opened its doors to students in 1872 under the presidency of the Rev. Robert Burwell and the associate presidency of Mr. John B. Burwell. Since that time hundreds of students have attended Peace, and many years have gone by, so that now in 1947 we find ourselves observing the seventy-fifth anniversary of our College.
