Convocation

The Convocation on Thursday, October 10, 1963, marked one of the greatest days in the history of Peace College. More than 1,000 alumnae, parents, friends, and students attended the day long proceedings which marked the formal opening of the highly successful Pre-Centennial Development Program. The main purpose of the Convocation was to explain the scope of the Development Program and to enlist the aid and support of all members of the Peace College family in its behalf.

Highlights of the day included: a principal address by Dr. Samuel R. Spence, Jr., President of Mary Baldwin College, the dedication services for the new Grover M. Hermann Student Center, and the awarding of an Honorary Citation *in absentia* to Mr. Hermann.

Dr. Pressly stated that this citation was both symbolic and expressive of our heartfelt appreciation for the generous Christian benefaction of Mr. and Mrs. Hermann to Peace College.

Lecture and Arts Series

Lisa Sergio

Lisa Sergio is recognized on both sides of the Atlantic as one of the best informed analysts of international affairs. At the age of seventeen she was Associate Editor of the only English newspaper in Italy. At twenty-two she resigned the editorship and turned to archeology. She became the official English and French interpreter for Mussolini. In recent years Miss Sergio has visited the Soviet Union and other countries in the Soviet sphere. She has lectured through India and East Pakistan under State Department sponsorship.

Lionel Wiggam

Lionel Wiggam spoke to Peace on "Poetry—Who Needs It?" He is best known for his book of poems, *The Land of Unloving*. He has also won respect as a writer of short stories, and as a dramatist, having won a Ford Foundation award for playwriting. He was barely out of his teens when he wrote his first book of poems, *Landscape With Figures*. Some thirty of his short stories and over two hundred of his poems have appeared in the *Atlantic Monthly*, *Harpers*, *Esquire*, and other national magazines.



Iberian Dance Theater

Laura Toledo's Iberian Dance Theatre is a company of two dancers, a Flamenco guitarist, and an actress. Their program at Peace was of traditional and interpretative dances, music, folklore, and poetry of romantic Spain from the fifteenth century to the present time. 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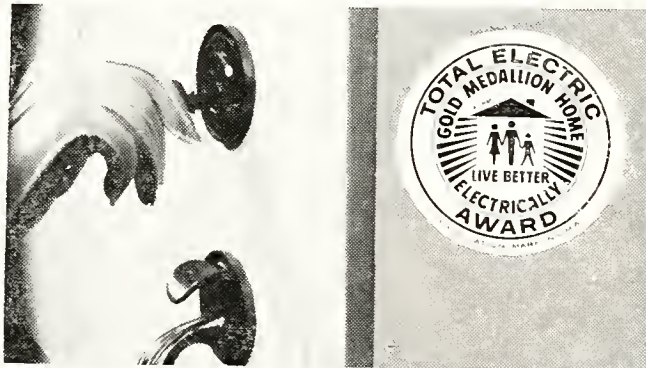
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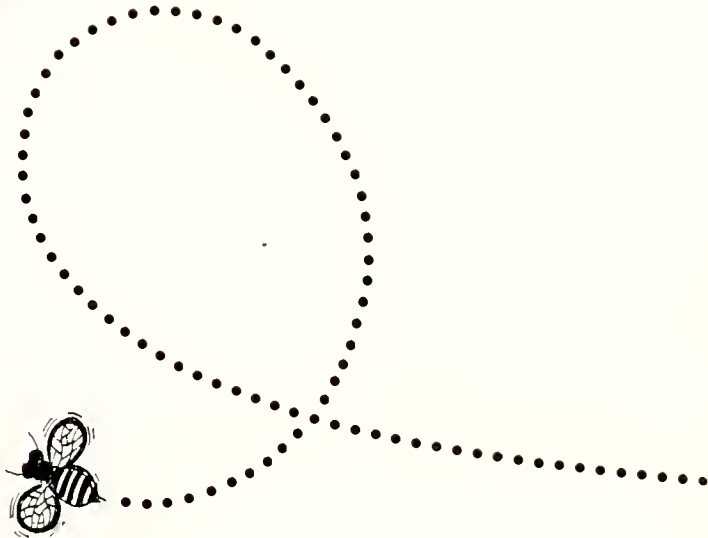
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Dear Peace Girls,
