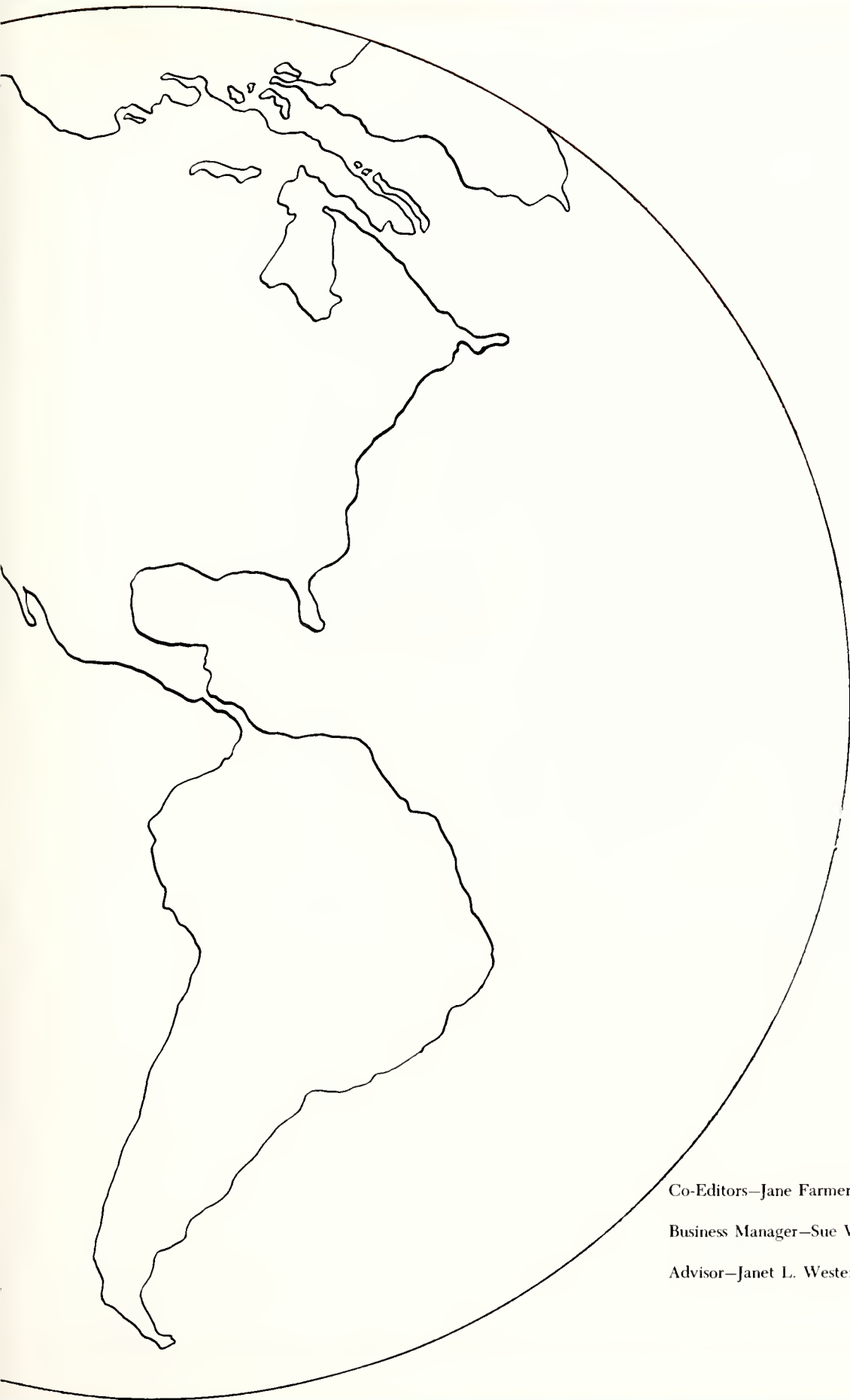

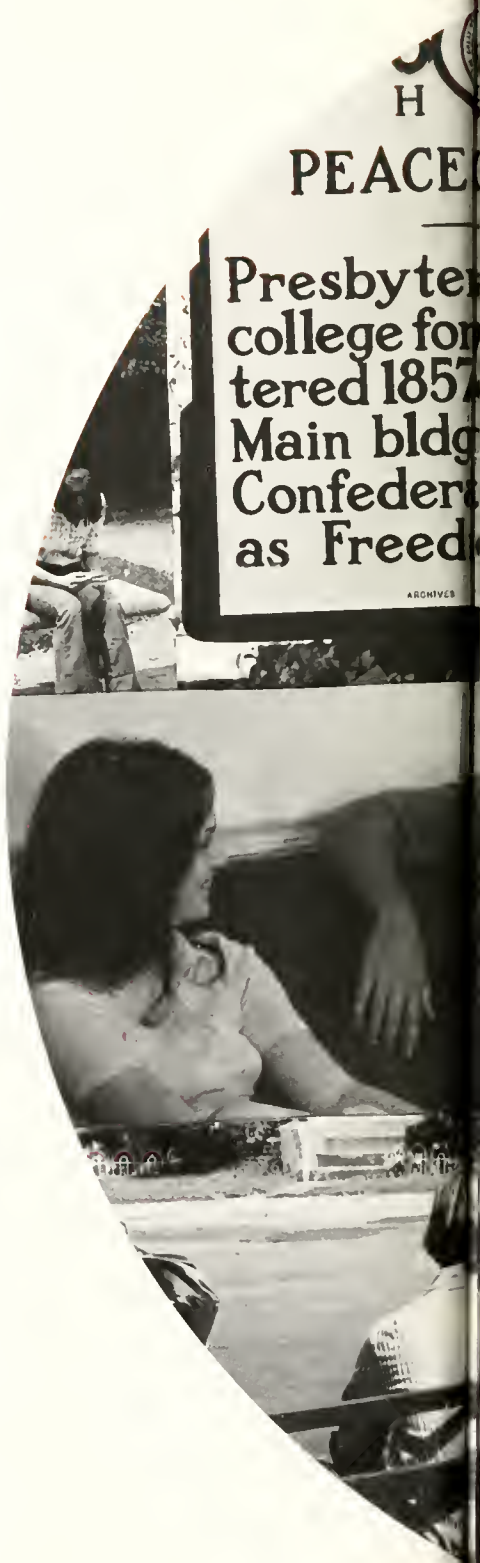
I think a lot of traditions here are like high school. After graduation, the students will be unprepared for a university. B.G.

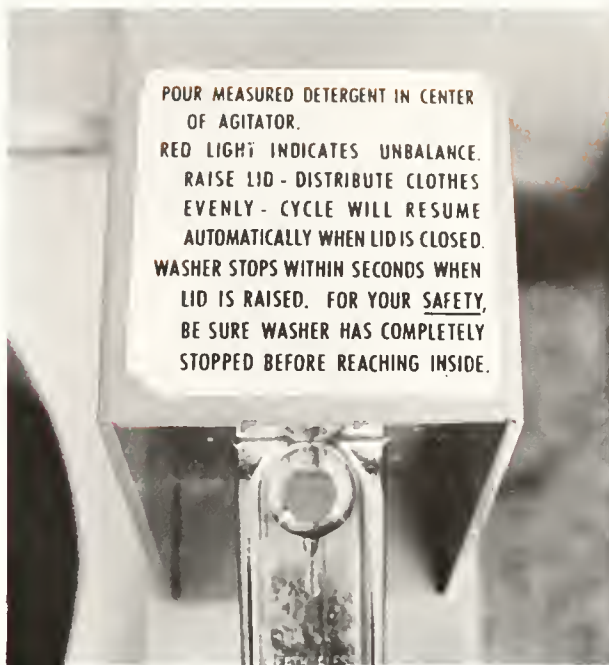

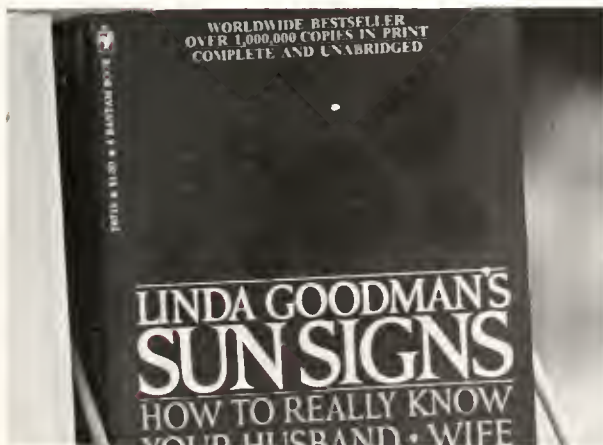

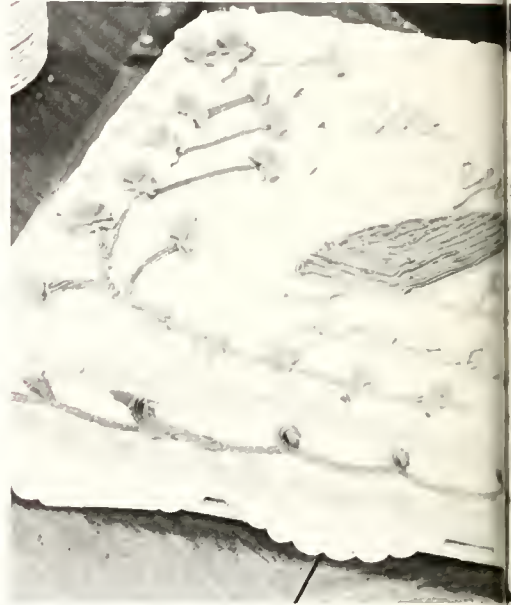
"A World of Beanies"

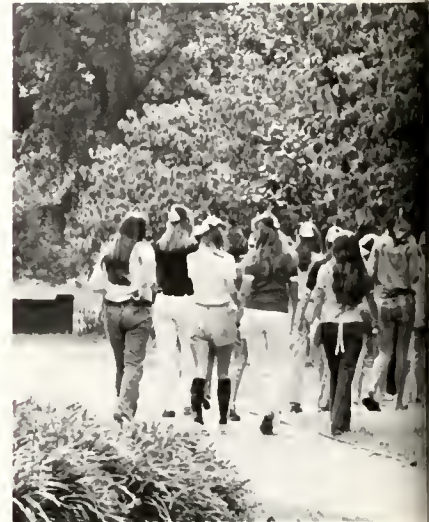
